Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

St. Cornelia's Episcopal Mission Church is a small Gothic Revival structure of granite native to the area. The cruciform plan building includes a crenelated tower at the north transcept and a small narthex extension at the entrance (west facade). Battered buttresses mark the bays of thenave of the church. Memorials include a rose window on the upper front gable for Bishop Henry Whipple's wife, Cornelia, and an arched window over the altar for Rev. S.D. Hinman, who began mission work with the Dakota during the Agency period. Interior walls are of brick and rafters are exposed.

The church is situated in a central green area at the Lower Sioux Community. Construction of a stone church had begun at the nearby Lower Agency before the 1862 Uprising, but the building was never completed. Materials from this structure were transported a few miles west to the Lower Sioux Community site in 1889 for the construction of the present building. Two distinct colors of stone on the structure may reflect the use of both the earlier obtained materials and the stone quarried at the time of the buildings completion.

Grave sites immediately adjacent to the church include those of Rev. Hinman to the south, and, to the north, of Andrew Good Thunder and Susan Salisbury, who headed the mission during the first three decades of the century and who has largely responsible for the lace-making industry centered there. Two other cemetery areas, the Agency School (now a pottery workshop), a community center, and a few residences are also in the immediate vicinity.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

St. John's Episcopal Mission was established at the Lower Sioux Agency in 1860 under the direction of Bishop Henry B. Whipple. Rev. S.D. Hinman served the church until 1862, when the Dakota members of the congregation were dispersed after the Uprising and the partially constructed church was abandoned.

Andrew Good Thunder, who had been the first person baptised at St. John's returned to the area in 1881. Five years later, partially through the efforts of Bishop Whipple, Congress authorized government purchase of lands in the area for assignment to Mdwakenton Sioux who wished to return, and the Lower Sioux Community developed a few miles to the west of the Agency site.

Both Bishop Whipple and Rev. Hinman returned to re-establish the mission, renamed the Birch Coulee Mission. The present church was constructed on lands donated by Good Thunder, with much of the construction work done by congregation members. The church was named St. Cornelia's after the Bishop's wife.

Both the land assignment procedures (augumented by additional lands purchased in 1934) of the Lower Sioux Community and St. Cornelia's congregation continue to function today.

St. Cornelia's is significant as a link between the end of Dakota occupancy of the area brought about by the Uprising and the later establishment of a Dakota community (one of the most unique settlements in the area). It is also significant as representative of one episode of Episcopal Bishop H.D. Whipple's extensive missionary work among the Indians in Minnesota and as one of the many fine Gothic churches built under his direction throughout the state during the latter half of the 19th century.



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
