

Narrative Description

The **Mount Tremper Fire Observation Station** is located at the 2,740' summit of Mt. Tremper in the town of Shandaken, Ulster County, in the Catskill Forest Preserve. The fire observation station includes a 47-foot tall, steel frame lookout tower erected in 1917, and a jeep/hiking trail, which extends from the base of the mountain to a point below its summit. The boundary for the nominated property is drawn to include a 500-foot square area surrounding the tower and the full length of the 2.5-mile trail leading up to the tower from the base of the mountain and related features (e.g., culverts, swales, support and retaining walls).

Contributing resources: 2 (tower, jeep/hiking trail)

Non-contributing resources: 0

The tower stands in a clearing on the summit. The 47-foot tower was prefabricated by the Aermotor Corporation and erected in 1917 and is typical of the "heavier type" structures with integral staircases built by the Conservation Commission. The structure consists of a square steel "cab" enclosure for observation erected atop a riveted and bolted frame of angular steel. Steel stairs divided into nine flights and eight landings provided access from the ground to the cab. The legs of the structure are anchored by four standard connection plates, which are bolted into the exposed bedrock on the summit.

The summit is descended by two trails. The older trail descends in a westerly direction into the Esopus Valley along numerous switchbacks to the trailhead along Route 40. This runs largely along the route of the original hotel trail, which was subsequently used to convey, quarried stone from the mountain and enlarged for use by a jeep. The other trail, not included in this nomination, leads in an easterly direction to the hamlet of Willow.

The trails are maintained by the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation and remain in active recreational use. The tower roof is rusted and wind-damaged and wood treads and landings are missing, but the structure is otherwise intact and awaiting restoration.

The Mount Tremper Fire Observation Station is a component in the multiple property submission, Fire Observation Stations of the NYS Forest Preserve. It was identified as a historic resource in an unpublished inventory prepared by NYSDEC in 1991. Subsequently, with assistance from the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, Field Services Bureau, the Mt. Tremper Fire Observation Station was identified as meeting the criteria for listing on the State/National Register of Historic Places.

Statement of Significance

The **Mount Tremper Fire Observation Station** is significant under criteria A and C for its association with the New York State Forest Preserve and as a representative example of an early twentieth century fire observation station with a tower with associated hiking/jeep trail.

The mountain was named by the Tremper House, the first substantial railroad hotel in the area, which had opened in 1879 for anglers. The hotel developed the first trail to the summit for its guests.

The New York State Conservation Commission chose Mount Tremper (2,740 feet) as the site of its eighth tower in the Catskill region. The site was chosen because it overlooked large portions of the Forest Preserve that had not been visible from the Belleayre or Hunter Mountain towers. 1 The Commission's report from 1917 stated: "There is a large visibility from this mountain, much of the land being owned by the state, which was not previously visible from any of the stations previously operated in the Catskills." 2

The new station on Mount Tremper included the existing 47-foot steel tower and a cabin for the observer. It was one of two new stations established that year, the other being Hadley Mountain (also included in this multiple property submission). The tower was one of 13 new steel towers that year and one of the first 12 described as a heavier type equipped with steel stairs.

William Smith was the station's first observer. During his first year (1917), he reported six fires and 17 the following year. During his last year at the station (1930) he reported 30 fires. Many hikers visited Smith. In 1921, 930 visitors signed his register and; in 1928, there were 1016.3

There have been two observer's cabins at the Mount Termper Fire Observation Station. The first was contemporary with the tower. It was one of seven, the others built at Hadley, Hurricane, Blue, Kempshall, Rondaxe, and Twaddell. In 1929, a new standard type observer's cabin, measuring 16' by 27', was built at the station. It was one of five built that year, the others being Owls Head, Boreas, Beaver Lake, and Dickinson Hill. "All replaced obsolete and inadequate facilities." In 1975, NYSDEC declared the cabin at Mount. Tremper to be surplus and sold it to a private individual for salvage.

In July 1966, a lightning strike damaged the Mount Tremper tower, which required repair. In 1968, the southerly section of the trail was relocated off of private lands onto an old quarry road. And in 1971, the station was closed when the state shifted to airplane surveillance to spot forest fires.

Following the removal of towers from Spruce, Slide and Belleayre in the early 1990s, the Catskill Center for Conservation and Development began to work toward the preservation of the remaining five towers at Mount. Tremper, Balsam Lake, Red Hill (all included in this multiple property submission), Hunter (already listed on the National Register of Historic Places) and Overlook.

In 1996, NYSDEC received an ISTEA commitment to restore and reopen the tower at Mt. Tremper, but work was delayed by SEQRA review of other projects tied to the grant. In early 1997, a volunteer steering committee was established to explore connecting the hamlet of Phonecia to the summit by a hiking trail.




