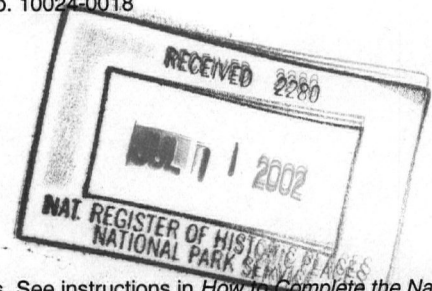

The Moses Mould House occupies a six-acre parcel of land on the south side of New York State Route 17K and the east side of Kaisertown Road in the northwestern corner of the Town of Montgomery. The area is characterized by farmland used for the planting of crops and the grazing of cows as well as sections that have been transformed into residential neighborhoods. Located less than one-half mile south of the nominated property on the east side of Kaisertown Road is the Jacob Shafer House (NR Listed 1996).

The house is set back from Route 17K and the associated barns and outbuildings dot the rolling agricultural landscape that extends south from the house. Included in the nomination is the Moses Mould House (ca.1850), a horse barn (ca.1870), a shed (1870), a privy (ca.1870), a shed (ca.1890), and a well house (ca.1870) and the intact rural landscape associated with the nominated property.

The heavy black outline on the attached county tax map identifies the boundaries of the nominated property. The boundary line coincides with the current legal boundaries of The Moses Mould House holdings on the south side of New York State Route 17K. This property is not located within an historic district.

The house, erected ca.1850, is a one and a half story five-bay center hall structure with a small one-story side wing attached to the east gable end of the original house. With the exception of the wing, the house rests on a stone foundation. The house is sheathed with original clapboards and is covered by an asphalt shingle clad gable roof. A Victorian-era gable dormer is centered on the north elevation of the house. The house primarily features single light modern double hung sash windows, which are flanked by louvered wood shutters.¹ Broad cornerboards with molded capitals grace the corners of the house. The roofline is enlivened with a broad molded cornice and frieze, which terminates at the gable end walls in partial returns.

The front façade of the house, which is oriented to the north, displays a variety of design features associated with the Greek Revival era. Most indicative of this period is the front doorway. It contains a late nineteenth century glass and wood panel door, which is flanked by a set of sidelights that are also flanked by a set of wide pilasters. Above the door and sidelights is an ornamental entablature. Below each sidelight is a narrow recessed paneled field trimmed with simple molding. The façade is spanned by a single story Victorian-era porch. The porch is composed of square posts decorated with scroll-sawn brackets supporting a low-pitched hipped roof. A scroll-sawn balustrade encircles the porch. Windows are symmetrically arranged on the front facade of the main block with two windows on each side of the main doorway and five

¹ Windows throughout the house originally featured six-over-six light sash. These elements were removed in the early 20th century and replaced. In the 1990s the sash were again replaced with modern units. Despite this modern alteration the building with its associated setting and outbuildings retains sufficient integrity to meet the test of the National Register Criteria.

windows across the upper story. A single round-arched louver is centered in the late nineteenth century gable above the center bay of this elevation.

The west gable end of the house features two windows on the first story and two slightly smaller windows on the second level.

The south elevation of the house is highlighted by a finely crafted Greek Revival entry. The entrance is composed of a six-panel door flanked by sidelights. Pilasters flank the door and sidelights supporting a broad entablature. The entry is sheltered by a single bay-wide single story Greek Revival porch. The porch is composed of two square posts, which match the entrance pilasters, supporting a single entablature and low pitched hipped roof. The porch undoubtedly provides some evidence of what the original porch on the façade may have looked like prior to the Victorian era renovations. This elevation features five windows across the upper story and two windows flanking the entrance on the west. East of the entry on the first floor is a secondary entrance composed of a simple glazed and paneled door and a bay window. These elements appear to date from the mid-twentieth century.

The east elevation of the house is dominated by a two story (exposed basement level and first floor) wing, which was added to the house in the late nineteenth century.

The interior room configuration consists of a traditional center hall, double pile plan. The front entry opens into a wide central hall that runs the full width of the house. A narrow stair with finely turned balusters and newels occupies the east half of the hall. At the rear of the hall is south entry. Doors from the hall lead into the east and west parlors. Each room contains a fireplace with their original Greek Revival style mantels. Located through and archway behind the west parlor is a smaller sitting room. Located behind the east parlor is a second sitting room, which now opens into the twentieth century kitchen wing. Wood flooring, plaster on lath wall finishes window and door architraves and wood moldings all survive with a high degree of integrity. The second floor plan of the house mimics that of the first. The only change to the plan is the addition of a modern bathroom to the north half of the center hall in the early twentieth century.

The basement level of the house also retains a high degree of integrity with the survival of its keeping room located on the west side of the house. This space retains its original cooking fireplace.

Located south of the house along Kaisertown Road is a single-story, heavy timber frame barn/shed. The building appears to date from the third quarter of the nineteenth century. East of the shed is a one-and one half story timber frame animal barn. The barn also dates from the same period as the shed.

Located directly behind the house are two one story frame buildings. The first is a privy and the second is a shed. Also located in the grouping is a small frame well house. All three buildings appear to date from the same era as the barns.

The Moses Mould is architecturally significant as an intact example of Greek Revival residential architecture. The accompanying farm related out buildings and landscape features enhances the significance of the nominated property. As a collective unit, these resources reflect the Town's development as a prosperous rural agrarian community and are likely to yield information on the agricultural practices of the Wallkill and lower Hudson Valley regions.

The nominated property was once part of the vast Germantown Patent granted by Acting Governor Peter Schuyler to Francis Harison, Oliver Schuyler and Allan Jarret on July 7, 1720. This area was part of Ulster County until 1798, when it was partitioned off and added to Orange County. The property was originally located in the Precinct of Shawangunk. In 1743 it was divided from the Shawangunk Precinct and added to the Precinct of Wallkill. Wallkill was in turn divided to create the Precinct of Hanover. Given the unpopularity of the Hanoverian Monarchy in post Revolutionary America, the name of the community was once again changed to Montgomery.

The nominated property was once part of a large farm owned by Johannes Mould. Mould (or Moul) was among a group of the earliest German Palatines to settle in this portion of the town. Mould arrived in the region ca. 1740 and established his home just north of the nominated property. It would be his descendent, Johannes Mould who would construct the home on the property. Mould was the son of John (Johannes) C. Mould and Mary Shafer. He was born in 1821 and christened in the old Dutch Reformed Church of Montgomery on July 10, 1821. He married Mary Van Alst on November 18, 1847. An 1850 map of the town depicts the house of his father, west of the nominated property but does not indicate the presence of Moses' home. However, the 1862 farm map of the town of Montgomery does show the home of Moses Mould and his 100-acre farm.

As built ca.1850 the Mould house is a representative local example of the Greek Revival aesthetic. The Greek Revival movement in the nation grew from a revival of interest in classical culture, which had swept America as a result of the archeological discoveries at Herculaneum and Pompeii and sympathy for Greece during its war for independence from the Ottoman Empire (1821-30). The convergence of these forces led to a revival and reinterpretation of classical models in art and architecture. The widespread use of the Greek Revival style in the first half of the nineteenth century also reflected the shift of American popular taste away from British architectural influences as a result of the War of 1812. Perhaps most important, Americans revered ancient Greece as the homeland of democracy. In incorporating forms and symbols associated with the architecture of ancient Greece into contemporary churches, schools, and civic buildings Americans reaffirmed the ideals and aspirations that they held for their new communities and for the new nation.

In form and detail the home of Moses Mould is clearly a builder's adaptation of this first national style. The home is noteworthy for prominent siting, craftsmanship and attention to details. The two story rectangular form, evenly spaced windows, broad frieze, partial cornice returns, broad corner posts and classical entrances lend a sense of scale and prominence to the building as well as alluding to the stone Greek temple form. The home is further distinguished by the survival of several of its historic nineteenth century outbuildings and an intact agricultural landscape.

The Town of Montgomery would like to commend the National Park Services on the recommendation of the Moses Mould House in Orange County to the National Register of Historic Places. The house and structures located on the nominated property was once a farm, and is presently reflected in its intact agricultural landscape.

As previously recognized the property as well as the Moses Mould House is culturally significant. Johannes Mould owned the property that was once part of the German Patent granted under the acting Governor Peter Schulyer in 1740. Over time the property evolved from being solely located in Ulster County (1720) to being divided and added to Orange County (1743). 

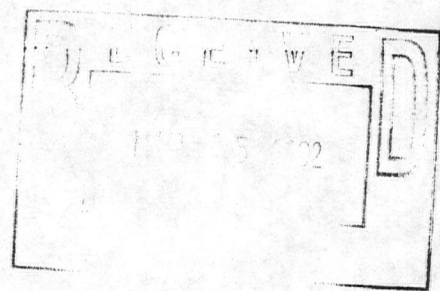
