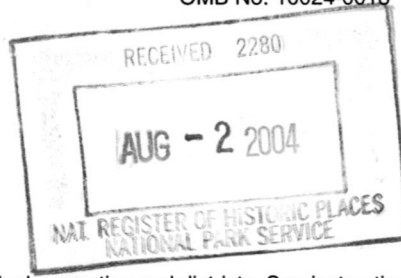

DESCRIPTION :

Located at the northeast corner of Maple and Elm Streets, the Gilbert E. Purple House is part of a residential neighborhood in the Village of Newark Valley in Tioga County, New York. The village is approximately 10 miles north of the Village of Owego, the seat for Tioga County and 20 miles northeast of the city of Binghamton. The Gilbert E. Purple House is in the west portion of the village, west of Owego Creek and the old Lehigh Valley Railroad tracks that follow a north-south path through the village, parallel to Main Street (SR 38). The house and two contributing outbuildings are located on a double lot containing approximately 19,000 square feet. The surrounding residential neighborhood contains a mixture of late-nineteenth and twentieth century residences.

Built by Herman Saddlemire in 1903, the house was purchased by Gilbert Purple in 1911 who substantially expanded it, beginning in 1913. The house is a modest two and one-half story Queen Anne style building constructed of wood frame and clapboarding. There is a stone foundation in the earlier portion of the building and a concrete foundation in the later section/northern portion. The formal entrance to the house is located at the southeast corner of the south elevation, emphasized by a one-story angled porch that extends along the south and east elevations. The porch sections end at two projecting gable-ends that mirror each other on each elevation. Both of these sections contain a large central window with two smaller windows on either side that are angled and recessed. Each recess is framed by a simple arch molding with a pendant at the peak. This recessed arch design is repeated on each corner of the north elevation and contains a window in the west corner and a door in the east. There is a small, pitched gable covering with side brackets that cantilevers over the door. A large concrete square chimney dominates the north elevation, running from the foundation through the peak of the roof gable.

To the left of the chimney, the north elevation contains a one-over-one double hung sash window. All second story windows are of one-over-one double hung sash. The windows are paired in the projecting gable end in the second story. The windows in the southwest corner are directly over the entrance and windows in the first floor. There are three windows directly over the second story windows in this corner that are part of a third-story turret capped with a steeply pitched bell roof. Each roof gable end has a small square window directly over the paired windows in the second story. The roof is cross-gabled with a plain molding and fascia board under a slightly projecting eave. The entire roof is covered with asphalt singles.

There is a large two-story addition on the west elevation of the house, constructed ca. 1930. The addition is rectangular in shape with a slightly sloping roof. The northwest corner of the addition is set at an angle to the building in keeping with the rest of the corner treatments of the house. There is also a cellar entrance below the first floor window. The first floor has a covered entrance at the north end. Next to the door are two sets of paired windows with six-over-six lights. There are two sets of these same windows in the north side of the addition. The south side of the addition has one offset one-over-one double hung sash window. The second story contains a half-wall with 5 large screened porch openings. This rectangular addition contains an enclosed porch and kitchen on the first floor and a sleeping porch attached to a small bedroom on the second floor.

Access can be gained to the interior through the ca. 1930 addition. The door to the interior leads directly into the first floor porch that is adjacent to the main kitchen. A dining room is to the east of the kitchen with an

adjoining sitting area to the south that also contains the main stair to the second floor and formal entrance. There is music room to the west of this area and another room to the north of the dining room. The floor plan of the second story level mimics the first floor with bedrooms over corresponding rooms below. The second floor contains three bedrooms, bathroom and sleeping porch with adjacent bedroom on the west side of the house. The first and second floors contain approximately 1240 square feet each of interior space.

Both the first floor porch and adjacent kitchen feature bead board wainscoting and original wood trim. The main kitchen also has pass-through cupboards that connect to the adjacent dining room. The dining room cupboards have hardwood-paneled bases with fluted trim that is repeated in the windows and doors. The hardwood floor in the dining room has a pattern of alternating strips of dark and light wood around the perimeter. All floors in the house except for the kitchen are original the hardwood. The dining room floor pattern repeats in the adjoining section to the south that contains the foyer/entry hall. There is also a winding, wooden paneled staircase with plain moldings and a low, curved seat next to the bottom step. The fluted trim window and door treatments continue throughout the foyer and into the small parlor on the south side of the house. All rooms in the second floor except the bathroom have original wood floors and window trim. The sleeping porch features the same beadboard trim that is in the first floor porch. The closet in the east bedroom also has similar beadboard.

An attic and turret are located above the second floor and are accessible via a stairs next to the east bedroom. The attic is unfinished except for a room in the turret located in the southeast portion of the attic. The attic and finished turret room contain approximately 941 square feet of space. The turret room is octagonal shaped and features two built-in storage cabinets and a built-in desk. This room was used for record storage when the house contained the offices of the Northern Tioga Telephone Company.

Just west of the house is a contributing two-and-one-half story garage and workshop containing 4364 square feet and a small, one-room shed that occupies 80 square feet and was used as a bicycle repair shop by a Purple family member. The garage/workshop is of cast concrete construction on the first floor and wood clapboarding on the second level. There is a large opening on the south side of the first level that accommodated a telephone company vehicle. The second floor has a workshop for fabricating telephone boxes/bases. The attic space above was used for wood storage and still contains a fair amount of wood left by the telephone company. Since much of the wood is the same stock used in the interior of the house, the current homeowner is storing the wood to use for necessary repairs should they be needed.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

Located in the Village of Newark Valley, the Gilbert E. Purple House is significant under Criterion A for its association with the historic context outlined in Section B-3 "Agricultural Development and Rural Newark Valley, 1865-1946" in the 1997 State and National Registers of Historic Places multiple property listing entitled *Historic and Architectural Resources of the Town and Village of Newark Valley, New York*. The house is also significant under Criterion C as an intact example of early twentieth century Queen Anne style architecture in the Southern Tier region of New York State. The house was originally built in 1903 by Herman Saddlemire and expanded by Gilbert Purple after he bought the property in 1911. The Gilbert E. Purple House was originally built as a private residence, but by the mid-twentieth century, it served a dual purpose of residence and offices of the Northern Tioga Telephone Company, a small, independent local telephone company. A combination garage and workshop was built circa 1930 for use by the telephone company and is still on the property and largely intact. There is also an intact bicycle repair shop dating to the period of significance on the property. The house and its associated outbuildings retain a high degree of integrity in terms of location, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association.

HISTORICAL CONTEXT:

When he moved his family from Owego to the village of Newark Valley in 1911, Gilbert Purple bought a small house from Herman Saddlemire located on a sizable lot at the corner of Maple and Elm Streets. Saddlemire originally built the house in 1903 and Purple began expanding it in 1913 by adding a large, two-and-one-half story section to the north end of the building and later, a two-story enclosed porch on the west elevation. Purple kept the building in the same Queen Anne architectural style and repeated the window details that Saddlemire incorporated into the house, such as a large prominent window flanked by angled and recessed windows at the corners and a single window in the gable ends. The addition and enclosed porch were constructed of wood framing and clapboarding in keeping with the 1903 portion of the house.

Little is known about Herman Saddlemire, but Gilbert Purple was a prominent person in the village of Newark Valley. He was born in Smithville in Chenango County in 1861 and moved to Newark Valley from Cortland County with his family in 1879. A year later at the age of 19, Purple began an apprenticeship with the Tioga County *Herald*. He left the paper in 1882 when his family moved from the village. After working briefly for a creamery in Elmira and afterwards as a typesetter for the Binghamton *Morning News*, Purple returned to Newark Valley to take charge of the Tioga County *Herald*, serving as editor, compositor and printer. In 1884, he purchased a half interest in the paper, eventually becoming the sole owner. By 1901, Purple had 8-9 employees and offices in a building on Water Street in the village.

In 1908, Purple sold the *Herald* and moved to Owego to become the managing editor of the Owego *Daily Record*. A year later, he moved to Waverly, 30 miles to the southwest of Newark Valley, when the

paper was consolidated with the *Waverly Free Press*. He continued as the managing editor until the paper ceased operations in 1911. It was at that time that Purple decided to retire from the newspaper business and return to Newark Valley. He was one of the shareholders of the Northern Tioga Telephone Company and decided to concentrate his efforts into running the company.

Although a small number of independent telephone companies existed from the time the telephone was invented, the independents became an industry in 1893 when patents held by the American Bell Company expired. The independent companies serviced smaller, mostly rural areas not covered by Bell and by 1897, more than 6000 independents were operating in the United States. At first, the independent companies could only provide service between their subscribers but in 1913, a ruling from the U.S. Attorney General allowed the companies to interconnect with the Bell system. The Northern Tioga Telephone Company was one of the independents serving the rural area of northern Tioga County. It organized in 1904 and by 1908 expanded to include 600 telephones. Gilbert Purple became the sole owner and ran the company from 1908 to 1922. His sons Jay and Carl joined him after their return from service in World War I and he turned the entire company over to them in 1922. Carl later moved to Norwich in neighboring Chenango County to work for the Chenango Telephone Company. Jay continued to run the company until he sold it to the Call Telephone Company in 1951. Jay Purple used the large room in the first floor addition as offices for the Northern Tioga Telephone Company and the room in the attic turret for record storage. Older residents of the village still recall paying their telephone bills at 34 Maple Street.

In addition to running the newspaper and the Northern Tioga Telephone Company, Gilbert Purple was active in civic affairs. He helped organize the Newark Valley Fire Department in 1885 and served as its first engineer. He was also president of the village and served numerous terms on the village board, often spearheading projects such as a municipal water system in 1904 and electric lighting for the village in 1914. He was one of the founders of the Northern Tioga Agricultural Society (1880) and served as its secretary for 19 years. He was also instrumental in consolidating the village's school districts and active in temperance matters, working to keep Newark Valley "dry". Gilbert Purple died in 1949 and was buried in Hope Cemetery in the village.

Although it is not clear whether Gilbert Purple built the addition and porch or had it done for him, it is known that his father was a carpenter and that young Gilbert assisted him with projects. It is assumed that his father passed on his skills of carpentry to his son. The additions to the house at 34 Maple Street attest to someone's skill with its well-crafted rooms and attention to detail. When the sleeping porch on the second floor was built, the builder used thin strips of wood for flooring in order to make the floor follow the bend of the wall by arranging the strips in a pinwheel fashion. The beaded wainscoting was repeated in both the first and second floors in the enclosed porch to maintain consistency in design.

When Purple began adding onto the house, he had the addition match the earlier portion, giving it the appearance of one seamless structure. The foundation has the only visible exterior evidence that the house was built in two sections at two different times. The foundation under the earlier portion is stone and the later portion has concrete. According to village histories, the earlier portion of the house was built by Herman Saddlemire and shows a high degree of craftsmanship as well. The exterior has well-

executed elements characteristic of the Queen Anne style such as large porch, asymmetrical appearance and a turret with a high pitched cap. As previously mentioned, Saddlemire's corner window recesses were copied by Purple. The house also has a built in curved corner seat which appears in other houses built in the area, including the Knapp House, listed on the State and National Registers of Historic Places in 1998.

The house remained in the Purple family until Jay's death in 1981 and was purchased by the current owners in 1983. The current owner is also a carpenter and appreciates the fine craftsmanship exhibited in the house. Any repairs or maintenance are done sympathetically to match the historic fabric of the house. The owner would also like to see the house listed in the State and National Registers of Historic Places in recognition of the building's place in the history of Newark Valley and to be part of revitalization efforts in the village.
