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7. Narrative Description

Location & Setting

The nominated cemetery is located in a discreet position on the east side of Albany Post Road—north of Balmville Road, east of Route 9W and west of River Road—in the hamlet of Balmville, Orange County, New York. The cemetery grounds are located on property now owned by Mount Saint Mary College, immediately north of Balmville's foremost character-defining feature, the Balmville Tree. The cemetery was established in the early 19th century on an uneven expanse of land on the east side of Albany Post Road, the site interspersed with deciduous and coniferous trees and now substantially overgrown in some areas by thick groundcover. Immediately to the west of the site is Albany Post Road; to the north is *Krans Krop*, a c. 1885 dwelling now owned and operated as an educational facility by Mount Saint Mary College; to the northeast is the *Morningside* estate; to the east is a dirt carriage road and beyond that deciduous woods and River Road; and to the south is Balmville Road. Between the cemetery and Balmville Road to the south the grade drops off quickly; this location is occupied by a stone foundation wall, presumably the remnants of a tavern, as per historical accounts. To the immediate west of the cemetery, between the grounds and Albany Post Road, is a depression that marks the location of a 19th century district school of brick construction, likewise no longer extant. To the south, along Balmville Road, are scattered a small number of residential buildings that represent the historic remnants of the Balmville hamlet.

The Balmville Cemetery occupies approximately one acre of land. The large majority of its grave markers, over 100 in number, have fallen to the ground due to neglect and a lack of significant maintenance in recent years. Only the Butterworth family plot is demarcated by iron fencing, installed in the 1940s, which separates it physically from the remainder of the burial plots. Another plot, on the south side of the yard, retains its cut stone posts though the railing associated with it no longer remains. Recent survey and unobtrusive physical investigation efforts have helped identify the location of the many of the fallen stones, most buried under a thin layer of soil and ground cover. As stones are located they are being cross-referenced to an inventory of the cemetery's interments, this list generated in the 1890s.

Funerary Art Overview

The funerary art in the cemetery is of a generally modest type, with burial markers and the nature of their carving and iconography representing characteristic trends in 19th century gravestone design. Only one marker deviates from the simple gravestone type. The stone marking the grave of John B. Nelson, who died in 1823, was executed in brownstone and features cusped upper corners, a short but nicely rendered inscription, but is absent iconography. That of Margaret Brown, d. 1839, features cusped upper corners and was rendered in marble; carved iconography includes a weeping willow tree and drapery, motifs more common to the preceding decades. Other stones of this vintage and the preceding decade display this form, i.e. a tablet with cusped upper corners. Slightly later and chaste in execution is the stone of Mary Jane Lozier, who died in 1853. Rectangular in shape it too was rendered in marble but with a broad carved border the profile of which recalls Greek Revival-style design precedents, and lacks any iconography. The stone of Nathan Coleman, d. 1850, follows these general lines but has a segmental arched head. The grave of Lucy Barns, a girl who died in her youth in 1863, is marked by a marble stone that features a bas relief rose medallion and likewise a carved vine-like motif near its rounded top.

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8. Narrative Statement of Significance

Overvien

The Balmville Cemetery is a historically significant site with salient connections to the early development of this Orange County, New York locale. While perhaps best-known for the cluster of estates developed here in the second half of 19th century under the influence of the Picturesque movement—among the chief proponents of which, Andrew Jackson Downing, resided a few miles to the south in Newburgh—Balmville witnessed its first settlement in the latter years of the 18th century and subsequently had emerged as a small but definable hamlet by the time the burial ground was established c. 1800. The cemetery contains approximately 115 graves with the largest concentration dating from roughly 1830 to 1860. Along with the Balmville Tree the burial ground remains as one of the foremost character-defining historic features of this hamlet, though in recent years it has suffered from neglect, limited maintenance and vandalism. The Balmville Cemetery appears to satisfy the National Register of Historic Places criteria consideration for cemeteries, due to its relative age in association with the hamlet and its early history. It is currently being surveyed and restored to a more ordered state by affiliates of Mount Saint Mary College, it being situated on lands under the school's ownership formerly owned by Alice C. Desmond, who resided nearby in the dwelling known as *Krans Krop*.

Historic Context & Significance

Balmville is located within the Town of Newburgh, organized in 1788. Lying to the immediate south is the City of Newburgh, site of a small c. 1712 Palatine German settlement that was incorporated as a village in 1800 and chartered as a city in 1865. This area of Orange County assumed increased regional importance in the early 19th century with the completion of the Cochecton Turnpike, c. 1808, which linked the village of Newburgh's Hudson River landing with the distant Delaware River, an economic advantage maintained until the rise of the New York & Erie Railroad in the mid-19th century. To the north, along the Hudson River, was the hamlet of Marlborough, linked to Newburgh via an early road that bisected Balmville, this transportation link spurring local development. A period of sustained growth began to transform the Newburgh area from its modest provincial origins in the second quarter of the 19th century, and with it unfolded what one historian termed "Newburgh's Age of Architecture," at which time the physical environment of the hamlet—and soon thereafter that of Balmville— was reshaped by architects such as Alexander J. Davis, his sometime associate Andrew Jackson Downing, and others. Balmville took its name from the large cottonwood tree there that dates back to c. 1699, mistakenly thought to be a Balm of Gilead tree in the 19th century. Many prominent families from the region developed estates here overlooking the Hudson River in the second half of the 19th century. Here they built substantial houses reflecting the architectural fashions of the day, set in complementary landscapes, far enough removed from Newburgh's turnpike terminus and burgeoning waterfront but nonetheless still readily accessible from Newburgh via carriage and New York City via steamboat.

However prior to this period of estate development Balmville remained but a modest rural hamlet as described by early Orange County chroniclers like Samuel Eager and Edward Ruttenber. The latter noted the following in the 1850s:

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BALMVILLE—A small collection of houses two miles north of the village of Newburgh, and named for a large tree growing there, commonly called Balm of Gilead, which is remarkable for the strong balsamic scent of its leaves and buds. The place was formerly called Hampton, and was the commercial centre of the town [of Newburgh] as early as 1767. In later times, the freighting business was conducted here by Daniel Smith, and subsequently by the Messrs. Butterworth. The village has a district school, a burying ground, and one or two shops. The Glenburn vineyards of Arthur Potts are also located here, and in the vicinity are several fine country seats. The first settlers here were Johannes Fyscher and Andries Volck, who sold to Zacharias Hoffman.²

While the above account by Ruttenber noted this locale as "Hampton," this observation is erroneous, as Hampton was in fact a river landing a few miles north of Balmville, where a ferry operated across the Hudson River to Dutchess County. As for some of the features mentioned by Ruttenber, immediately west of cemetery, between the Butterworth burial plot and Albany Post Road, was the district school. It fell into disrepair and was razed in the 1980s.

Another of the first settlers of the immediate Balmville area was Michael Demott, who resided there by the mid-1760s and kept a tavern, with town meetings being occasionally conducted at his house. By Eager's account Demott "had a number of children, among who were William, Jacobus and Isaac, who inherited the estate, consisting of several hundred acres." Eager likewise noted the early mercantile pursuits of Smith and Butterworth, and hinted at the transition of this locale from its earlier complexion into the period marked by substantial estate development:

[Smith and Butterworth] were the patrons of it for many years, but latterly the village has been stationary, and the trade wholly fallen off. Still the spot is beautiful, and the lands in the vicinity among the richest in the town, and highly cultivated. The stately and ample residence of Mr. William Thayer, and the beautiful cottage with its neatly ornamented grounds of Frederick J. Betts, Esq., are in the immediate vicinity, on the hill north of the village. These gentlemen deserve great praise for the examples furnished their fellow citizens of the town, which cannot be too strictly followed by those, who have the means to improve and adorn their lands, or build substantial dwellings at their posterity.⁵

The burial plots for the Butterworth family are the most prominent in the cemetery, as they are demarcated by a cast-iron perimeter fence that was installed later in the yards history; this is the only such treatment within the bounds of the burial ground, excepting one plot on the south side of the cemetery, that was marked by fencing running between cut-stone posts. The cemetery appears to have been first established c. 1800, as per death dates for members of the Butterworth family, the earliest of which date from 1802 and 1805.

This property, now owned by Mount Saint Mary College, was given to the school by Alice C. Desmond, her family's holdings at one point including both *Krans Krop* and the F.C. Withers's designed Gothic

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Revival villa *Morningside*. The Desmond estate was in its earliest years associated with the Betts family, and was extensive in its day, stretching eastward to the Hudson River. It was later owned by Captain "Bully" Robinson, a veteran of the War of 1812, whose Egyptian Revival-style tomb is located in Old Town Cemetery in Newburgh and is a well-known local monument. In 1882 the Robinson property was purchased by Edward A. Wickes, who razed the existing Robinson dwelling and built *Krans Krop* shortly thereafter; he later removed to *Morningside*. The property was next owned by the Beal family, from whom Senator Thomas Desmond and Alice C. Desmond purchased it in 1930.⁶

Alice C. Desmond, from whose recollections the above overview of the property's ownership history was drawn, likewise noted the following regarding the Balmville Cemetery:

The cemetery halfway down the hill on the Old Albany Post Road dates from the early days of Newburgh. Many of the gravestones have been stolen but I have put an iron fence around the graveyard and kept the grass cut. Every so often someone arrives to look up their ancestors.

There was until a few years ago an old brick school house next to the cemetery, but the house had been broken into so many times, that for fear that someone would get hurt there, I had the school house torn down.

The three-story brick house at the foot of the hill, facing on the Betts Woods, is said to have been a tavern in Colonial times on the Old Post Road to Albany, where the stagecoaches stopped to change horses. ⁷

While Desmond believed, as one might, that many of the burial stones had been stolen, recent investigation has instead determined that the majority of the markers remain, though no longer in the upright position. The cemetery contains the remains of numerous families associated with Balmville in its earliest years, among them the Butterworths, Fowlers, Weeds, Holmes, and Merritts. It remains an important vestige of Balmville's early years, prior to the large estate developments that characterized the second half of the 19th century.

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10. Geographical Data

Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary for the National Register of Historic Places nomination is shown on the enclosed map, entitled "Balmville Cemetery, Balmville, Orange County, New York."

Boundary Justification

The boundary has been drawn to reflect the current known extent of the burial yard, largely follows an established survey map. The west, north and southern perimeters of the boundary follow a survey map prepared in association with a larger parcel now owned by Mount Saint Mary College. The upper half of the eastern boundary has been drawn to correspond with an access road that enters the property from the north; the lower portion of the eastern boundary follows a survey marker in a northerly direction, slightly east, until it meets the west side of the access road at a point directly east of the south perimeter of the fenced-in area within the cemetery. This boundary encompasses all of the known burials to this time identified as being within the cemetery's bounds.


