

Bryant Park is a small axial park with a central green and peripheral walks, designed in the French classical tradition. Strategically located just west of the New York Public Library, Bryant Park is bounded by West 40th Street, the Avenue of the Americas, West 42nd Street, and the western property line of the New York Public Library, and is approximately 500' x 500' in size.

The present landscape design dates from 1934. It was the creation of architect Lusby Simpson of Queens, New York, who won the competition for the Bryant Park design. Simpson's plan is straightforward and symmetrical. Raised above street level, the park is enclosed by a granite retaining wall crowned by balustrades at the raised terrace area and by cast— and wrought—iron railings. The height of the wall varies in accordance with the slope of the site. The focal point of the park is the depressed central lawn area which is enclosed by balustraded railings. The east—west axis of the park is emphasized by four flagstone walks, two on each side of the lawn, sheltered by four rows of plane trees. The walks, which are separated by beds of ivy, are bordered by handsome benches.

The central vista of the park is dominated at the western end by the Josephine Shaw Lowell Memorial Fountain. Designed by architect Charles A. Platt in 1912, the fountain is constructed of pink Stoney Creek granite. A shallow contoured basin rests on a handsome sculptured base set in a large pool.

The raised terrace at the eastern end of the park, which dates from the time of construction of the library building and was designed by architects Carrère & Hastings, is the most "architectural" portion of the park. The terrace is raised in a series of gradual steps from the central lawn and paved with gray flagstones and red brick, providing a contrast in texture, color and pattern. The statue of William Cullen Bryant, by the sculptor Henry Adams, dominates the terrace. The handsome Roman-style arch protecting the statue incorporates a small demirotunda with coffered semi-dome. The arch and rotunda are supported on elegant columns and pilasters. Flanking the arch are two stone urns set on the balustraded wall which spans the width of the terrace. The urns are strikingly decorated by a Roman motif of garlanded friezes with central stylized bull's heads.

Adding further sculptural interest to the terrace at the north and south ends are statues of William Earl Dodge by John Quincy Adams Ward, and Johann Wolfgang von Goethe by Karl Fischer.

The stone kiosks set in the outer walls at the western end of the raised terrace are also of Carrère & Hastings' design. These were originally used as comfort stations. The sides of the buildings which face the street are embellished by garlanded bull's-eye windows set beneath segmental arches. A garlanded frieze incorporating the Roman motif of garlands and bull's head decorates all four sides of each building.

Handsome bronze lamps line the walkways and terraces. A slender fluted shaft placed on a base with crossed laurel motifs supports each lamp.

More recent additions to the park include the square cut into the park at the northwest corner, facing the Avenue of the Americas, made to accommodate a memorial to Jose Bonifacio de Andrada e Silva (1763-1835), patriarch of Brazilian independence. It is dominated by the statue of Andrada, executed by Jose Lima in 1889, and presented to the United States by Brazil in 1954.

The landscape and architectural elements of Bryant Park work together to create a contained and orderly open space which encourages repose and leisurely strolling. Its natural elements provide a pleasant and welcome enhancement both of the Public Library, immediately adjoining the park, and the surrounding urban environment.

Bryant Park, with its central lawn and peripheral walks, is a prime example of an axial park in the French Classical tradition. Located just west of the New York Public Library, it creates a harmonious environment and complementary setting for the library building.

Bryant Park has had an illustrious and somewhat controversial history. George Washington and his troops defended themselves against the British on the site during the Revolutionary War. During the 1820's the city used the land as a potter's field.

The vast Croton Reservoir was built in 1842 on the land now occupied by the New York Public Library. In 1846, the Common Council ordered the ground adjoining the reservoir to be "graded, sloped and sodded on the sides bordering upon the avenue and streets, and that the same be enclosed by a neat ornamental wooden fence..., the same to be used as a public park until required for reservoir or other purposes." The park idea apparently never came to fruition, for in 1853 when the Crystal Palace was under construction there, the site was described as consisting of "vacant lots, strewn with rocks, deep pits and relics of shanties."2 The Crystal Palace exhibition hall for the International Exhibition of the Industry of All Nations, was perhaps the most famous occupant of the site until it burned to the ground in 1858.

On May 12, 1884, the name of the site was officially changed from Reservoir Square to Bryant Park, in honor of William Cullen Bryant (1794-1878), poet, editor and orator.

Late in the 1890s the Croton Reservoir was removed to enable the New York Public Library to be built on the site. The architects of the library, Carrère & Hastings, carefully planned certain architectural elements that would harmonize the building with the park: the raised terrace at the east end of the park, the stone kiosks, and the handsome archway enclosing the statue of Bryant which was presented to the city by the Century Association in 1911, the same year the library was opened; the Lowell Memorial Fountain was erected the following year.

By the late 1920s the park was sadly neglected, and even further disrupted by the subway construction on Sixth Avenue. A copy of Federal Hall, built in the spring of 1932 and razed the following year, did not help the general state of the park.

Various city groups began to call for the renovation of Bryant Park during this period. In 1928, the Fifth Avenue Association presented a new plan for landscaping the park to the Board of Estimate. Although the plan was not approved, it is interesting to note that it called for a large, depressed central lawn area--very similar to the present landscape scheme.

Finally in 1933 the Architects' Emergency Committee held a competition for a new Bryant Park design open to all unemployed architects and draftsmen registered with the committee. The winning design by Lusby Simpson of Queens was carried out by PWA3 workers under the supervision of the Parks Department in 1934. Bryant Park was officially rededicated on September 15, 1934.

Since its rededication in 1934, Bryant Park, with its fine statues and graceful fountain, has become a necessary and useful part of the urban fabric and is much used and enjoyed by the people of New York City.



The Library traces its ancestry back to the philanthropy of three wealthy New Yorkers. John Jacob Astor, albeit unknowingly, took the first action that eventually culminated in the creation of the New York Public Library when in 1838 he decided to leave the City of New York \$350,000 and a piece of ground for a public library. A year later, he increased the sum of money to \$400,000. Following Astor's death in March, 1848, the trustees of the fund decided to build the Library on the east side of Lafayette Place and to call it the Astor Library. A competition for a suitable design produced a winning plan, finally adopted on December 10, 1849, and the cornerstone was laid on March 14, 1850. When opened on January 9, 1854, the library occupied a Byzantine style building and owned between 80 to 90,000 volumes. The books alone had cost about \$100,000.

In the succeeding decades, the Astor Library greatly expanded, but remained difficult to use. Aproposits growth, the building had two additions by 1879 and 225,477 volumes by 1895. Its books made the Astor one of America's major libraries, but the library so restricted readers that the institution alienated the public. No books could be borrowed; and the librarians discouraged any but well-to-do individuals from visiting the library,

While the Astor Library grew and discouraged the general reader, another rich New York citizen, James Lenox, created a new library. Lenox's affluence enabled him to retire from business in 1845 and to devote himself to book collecting. A shrewd bookman, he gathered up the works of Milton, Shakespeare, and Bunyan. He also specialized in Americana, and bought, among other things, the famous Bay Psalm Book. Ten years before his death in February, 1850, Lenox founded the Lenox Library, conveying to its trustees 97,000,000 worth of stocks and bonds and a plot of ground on Fifth Avenue, between 70th and 71st

Streats. When the building was opened on January 15, 1877, most of Lenox's collections had been transferred to it.

New York City had a magnificent new library, but admission, as at the Astor Library, was difficult to obtain. Even after admission tickets had been abandoned in 1887, only scholars could use the institution's books. That restrictive policy did not go unnoticed. A cartoon that appeared in Life, January 17, 1884, shows the library as a beleaguered fortress, with bodies of would-be users lying around the building.

The public benefactions of Astor and Lenox were duplicated by Samuel Jones Tilden, an eminent politician, in his creation of the Tilden Trust. Upon his death in August, 1886, he left the city a library of about 20,000 volumes and an endowment of some \$2,000,000. The sum of money became involved in litigation, which only ended in March, 1892, and resulted in a substantial decrease concerning the amount finally received by the city.

Even before litigation over the Tilden Trust had been concluded, a movement had developed that contemplated the consolidation of the Astor, Lenox, and Tilden Trusts. Although ample when given, neither the Astor nor Lenox Trusts provided sufficient income for their respective libraries by the 1890's. New York had grown within fifty years from 500,000 to 2,000,000 people, and neither library, even as restrictive as they were, could properly serve their users. Supported by prominent men in the city, the consolidation movement rapidly advanced. On May 23, 1895, the consolidation of the trusts occurred, which resulted in the creation of the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations -- The Reference Department. In 1901, as the result of a gift by Andrew Carnegie, the New York Public Library consolidated with ten independent circulation libraries to form the Circulation Department. .

The consolidation was a major achievement, but the new library needed a building. Negotiations with the city resulted in an agreement on December 8, 1897, whereby the City agreed to erect a library building and the library agreed to establish a free circulating library and a free circulating branch.

Litrle time was lost after the agreement with the city in beginning work on the new building. A design by the firm of Carrere and Hastings was accepted on November 11, 1897, and the demolition of the Croton Reservoir, the site for the library, began on June 2, 1899. The completed building was formally opened on May 23, 1911, having cost \$9,002,52309, or about eighty-seven cents r cubic foot.

Since the New York Public Library's opening in 1911, it has become one of America's leading cultural institutions. Open to all, general readers and scholars from throughout the United States have benefited from the generosity of Astor, Jenox, Tilden, and the City of New York.

Present Condition of the Site

The handsome and monumental library building sits some distance back from Fifth Avenue. At the top of a flight of steps from the sidewalk sit two stone lions, and just beyond them a flight of stairs leads up to the triple-arched and Corinthian-columned main entrance. A spacious hallway lies behind the entrance, with a handsome stairway at its north and south ends. Two flights up and at the back of the building is the main reading room.

The main reading room is one of America's most heavily used rooms. It covers half an acre, being two blocks long, and is fifty feet high. There are sufficient spaces at the reading tables to seat almost 300 people. Open shelves border the walls and they contain some 20,000 reference works, which the reader may use himself. Other volumes are obtained by filing requests in the Public Catalog Room. Some eighty miles of shelves hold the remainder of the library's volumes. Just outside of the main reading room is the public catalog. The heart of the library, the catalog contains 10,000,000 index cards for the Reference Department's 4,000,000 volumes.

Twenty-one specialized reading rooms supplement the main reading room. The reading room for American History, for example, is at the south end of the main reading room and there the reader may obtain special works on America. A specialized room of major interest is the manuscript room, which contains some of the great collections of Americana.

The library is open every day of the year, 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Monday - Saturday, 1:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Sunday.




