## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Rosekrans Building stands at the corner of Driscoll Avenue and Genesee Streets in the village of Greene. It faces onto Genesee Street, a wide avenue lined with two-story commercial buildings which date from the middle and late nineteenth century.

The building is a simple two-story brick structure with an ornate, galvanized iron front. The structure measures forty feet across the front and sixty feet along the side; a frame second-story porch with a shed roof is attached to the rear. The property is bounded on its front (southwest) by Genesee Street, on the side (northwest) by Driscoll Avenue, and adjoins another commercial building to the southeast. A small (30' X 40') yard lies to the rear (northeast) of the building and is used for parking.

The brick is laid in common bond, six rows of stretchers to one of headers. The rear and side walls (photo 2) are pierced by narrow windows and doors with stone sills. Low segmental arches top these openings; those over the doors are formed with three rows of headers, and those over the windows with two. The low-pitched shed roof is concealed by parapets on the front and sides.

The Rosekrans Building is distinctive on a street of older structures by virtue of its intact galvanized iron store front, furnished by Mesker Brothers Iron Company of St. Louis (photo 1). At the center of the first floor are three doors: the central one gives entrance to a stairway; flanking this are two glass-paned shop doors. On either side of the recessed access area are large plate glass shop windows, the outer ones parallel to the sidewalk, the inner ones angled toward the doors. A transom window tops each of the first floor doors and windows. The corners of the first floor facade are marked by simple pilasters topped by a corbel supporting a plain, projecting cornice.

On the second floor facade a row of five windows is flanked and separated by pairs of engaged Romanesque columns. Above the columns is a broad entablature decorated with complex moldings and stylized rosettes. A heavy cornice with both brackets and modillions rests above the entablature. At each end of the cornice is a finial, while an elaborate triangular pediment rises from the center. The entire facade is a freely mixed composition of both Classical and Romanesque details.

The base of the first floor pilaster on the west side lacks any ornamentation and the central door and plate glass windows appear to be modern, but otherwise the building has remained relatively unaltered over the years. Details have been carefully maintained, including the canvas awning which shelters the sidewalk, the gilded lettering on the windows, and the Mesker Brothers plaque on the eastern corner (photo 3).

The interior retains little of its original detail, having been altered many times to accommodate various business undertakings. A safe which was installed before the building was completed remains on the second floor, too large to be removed.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Rosekrans Building stands out from the other nineteenth-century commercial buildings on Genesee Street as the only galvanized sheet iron facade and the most ornate storefront in the village. The facade has remained unchanged except for the loss of a few ornamental details since it was bought from Mesker Brothers Iron Company of St. Louis in 1892.

The Treaty of Fort Stanwix of 1784 and the Governor's Purchase in 1788 opened Chenango County to development by settlers from New England and eastern New York. Much of the town of Greene was owned by William Hornby, who had his local agent, Elisha Smith, lay out a village in 1806. This plan incorporated a few earlier houses and mills on the west side of the Chenango River but also included land on the eastern side. Although the village was named Hornby, it soon came to be called Greene because the town of Greene's post office was situated there. The first industries in the area were the manufacture of shingles and potash for shipment down the Chenango and Susquehanna Rivers, but as supplies of lumber were exhausted in the 1820's, the region turned increasingly to agriculture and trade. Since then, Greene has served as the mercantile and milling center for a sizable agricultural community.

As early as 1806, the village lay on the Cooperstown-Chenango Point (Binghamton) mail route. A major east-west route through Greene was opened in 1807 with the first bridging of the Chenango River and the laying of the Catskill Turnpike. By 1822, the village was served by the triweekly Catskill-Ithaca stage, "one of the best stage routes in the state."

The completion of the Chenango Canal, connecting Binghamton and the Erie Canal, opened the village to the commerce of the world in 1836. This encouraged the development of small industries such as an iron foundry, quarries, and tanneries. When the canal closed in 1878, some industrial and commercial establishments were resited east of the river, where the railroad ran. However, Genesee Street continued to be lined with retail shops and professional offices.

The center of the early transportation network was the junction of the turnpike, now Genesee Street, with the canal towpath, now Driscoll Avenue. A dry-goods establishment was sited there for many years, the building being removed in 1889. In 1892, Charles J. Williams, a local builder, erected the present Rosekrans Building there, ordering an elaborate galvanized iron facade from St. Louis.

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Although experimentation in the use of iron as a building material began in Europe, the production of sheet and cast iron exteriors was an American innovation. When first introduced in the 1840's, cast-iron construction was scorned as unsafe and unwieldy, but its advantages were soon proven. Iron could be molded into extremely ornate forms, and at very small expense, due to mass production of architectural elements. These elements could be shipped almost anywhere and erected quickly and easily on site, an early form of prefabrication. As the popularity of iron exteriors grew, new manufacturers entered the market, developing modern designs and new technologies.

The Mesker Brothers Iron Works of St. Louis, Missouri, was founded by Frank and Bernard T. Mesker in 1879. (A third brother, George, ran a similar business in Evansville, Indiana.) Their specialty, patented in 1887, was complete facades fabricated from galvanized sheet iron, like the one bought for the Rosekrans Building in 1892. An 1892 catalogue from Mesker Brothers illustrates cornices, window caps, elevators, gutters, skylights, iron ceilings, "patent steel columns for brick buildings," and custom wrought-iron work, in addition to thirty-three complete Galvanized Iron House Fronts. The purchaser of a complete Modern House Front would receive, "F.O.B. cars St. Louis, ready to put up, ... Combination Wood and Steel Columns, Show Windows, Doors, Transoms, Box Window Frames and Sash, ... All Galvanized Iron Work from bottom of Lintel Cornice to top of Cornices and Pediments, with wood lookouts every eight feet apart," all of which could be "put up by any mechanic, at one-tenth the cost of similar work manufactured by others." The Mesker Brothers firm was extremely successful, although not quite achieving their aim, "to have our complete house fronts introduced into every town and city of the United States and Territories." When the popularity of iron fronts waned, the firm undertook the manufacture of such items as cooking ranges and door casings. Most recently, it produced aluminum doors and extrusions, until it was closed by labor problems in 1966.

Because they were made up of stock pieces, designs in the Mesker catalogue could be adapted to any size building. Design No. 1010--shown in the catalogue as a three-story front, twenty-three feet wide, with a central double door--was ordered by Mr. Williams to serve a two-story building, forty feet wide, with three single doors in the center. The east side of the first floor was originally a jewelry store, but has been a men's clothing store for more than

eighty years. The west side served as the Greene Post Office for twenty years, and was an ice cream parlor, then a drugstore, before being absorbed into the men's furnishings store in 1968. At that time, the partition between the east and west stores was removed for the shop expansion.

The west side of the second floor has been a law office since 1892, while the eastern side was originally an apartment, but now houses part of the expanded law offices of Fred Rosekrans.

The Rosekrans Building displays one of the few Mesker Brothers storefronts surviving in the region. It is, and has been since its purchase, the most imposing and elaborate storefront in Greene. Almost unchanged since the time of its construction, it survives as a rare example of a once-common building type.

I thank you for your letter of June 12th advising me that the real property in the Village of Greene which I own has been nominated for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

I am delighted with this information and hope that the property will receive a favorable consideration.

You probably have information that the building is pictured in a book of pictures of historic buildings of Binghamton, New York and surrounding areas. I have recently discovered an undated post card and have had an enlargement made from the post card of a picture of my building. I enclose a copy of the picture for your files and information. The building is facing south. The street is Genesee Street and runs east and west. This street was formerly the old Catskill Turnpike. You will note on the picture that the United States Post Office was located on the first floor, westerly portion of the building. We have dated the picture as approximately 1910.
