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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Alwyn Court, an apartment house in the French Renaissance style, was built in 1907-09 and is located at the southeast corner of Seventh Avenue and 58th Street (180 West 58th Street). Containing twelve stories, the facade is divided horizontally into the base (four floors), the shaft (five floors) and the crown (three floors) by strong projecting decorative bands. Pilasters with Corinthian capitals vertically separate the Seventh Avenue elevation into four bays and the 58th Street elevation into five. The building is crowned by a roof balustrade with the capitals of the pilasters projecting slightly above the cornice. The shafts of the pilasters, some with lonic capitals, are treated as Renaissance panels and have a profusion of French Renaissance details. The tripartite windows at each floor are separated by richly decorated mullions and spindles; the spandrels between floors are divided into three panels, each luxuriantly decorated. The whole stone facade is heavily fenestrated and is distinguished by its richly ornamented terra-cotta sculpture work, a "filigree of fine ornament on every pilaster, soffit and mullion." Details of ornament and architecture consist of early French Renaissance and French Renaissance borrowings from Italy, such as the Quattrocento pilasters and baldacchino canopies, and the crowned salamander, much in evidence, a symbol of King Francis the First. The prominent rounded corner facing the corner of Seventh Avenue and 58th Street is a striking and interesting feature contributing to the overall feeling of richness. The recessed corner arch is decorated with the same detail as the rest of the facade and contains salamanders set between each pair of baldacchino canopies. (There are two pairs of canopies.)

The original entrance to the building was relocated from the rounded corner bay to the Seventh Avenue side of the building in 1938. South of this entrance, the building contains a modern shop front, taking up about one quarter of the ground floor frontage. Along the north side of the building is a handsome wrought iron gate with fine decorative scroll work and topped by fleur-de-lis ornament.

The neighborhood in which Alwyn Court is situated, traditionally the center of New York's cultural life, consists today of small shops, luxury hotels (one of the most distinguished being the Plaza, a New York City landmark two blocks east of Alwyn Court), concert halls—Carnegie Hall one block south (also a New York City landmark building), and Lincoln Center, seven blocks northwest—and Central Park, one block north.

When Alwyn Court was constructed, it contained twenty-two apartments with two apartments of fourteen rooms and five baths on each of the twelve floors. The vast suites were decorated with Caen stone, marble and wood panelling and exhibited the luxury of French Renaissance lavishness, with music rooms, salons, drawing rooms, libraries, conservatories, living and dining rooms. None of this remains, however, the interior having been completely remodelled by Edgar Ellinger in 1938 with \$200,000 from the Drydock Savings Bank. This remodelling retained only the concrete floor arches and the exterior walls and created a completely new interior without any change in the steel shell. It was rebuilt with seventy-five apartments with six apartments of three, four and five rooms to each floor.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

A unique turn of the century example of an apartment house utilizing terra-cotta decoration as well as one of the earliest luxury apartment houses built on the upper west side, Alwyn Court is the finest building of its type in New York City. The building is significant in the history of New York residential architecture for its social history as well as its architectural menit.

Alwyn Court contributed to the transition of Manhattan's upper west side from an area of open countryside and farmhouses to an affluent residential neighborhood and an urban environment. After the opening of Broadway in about 1869, the construction of the elevated railroad and the introduction of trolley lines in 1880 that made the adjacent portion of Central Park accessible and opened the area to construction, the rapid growth of population in the upper part of Manhattan was assured.

Alwyn Court remains today a reminder of the origin of the upper class acceptance of apartment house residences in place of the self-contained private dwelling. At the turn of the century, a time of transition, the apartment residence was a fairly new experiment for middle and upper income families and a new concept in residential housing in this country. The concept originated in France and was introduced here by Richard Morris Hunt in 1869 in his design for the Stuyvesant at 142 East 18th Street, the first apartment house in New York City. Early attempts to provide the advantages and amenities, without the responsibilities, of private housing, plus the additional conveniences of a condensed space on one floor in a highly urban setting, gained general acceptance. Alwyn Court is closely related in plan to the most famous of these buildings, the Dakota, built in 1884 by Henry Janeway Hardenbergh at I West 72nd Street, the first of the vast "superblock apartments," as well as the Apthorp, designed by Clinton and Russell in 1908 at 2201-19 Broadway.

Alwyn Court is an outstanding manifestation of the fashion for eclecticism in architecture which became popular after the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893. Its early French Renaissance style, incorporating as it does Italian Renaissance borrowings, is seen in many of its details, as well as motifs of terracotta ornament (and includes the Quattrocento pilasters). The use of terracotta (a cast clay product glazed and fired), a material in vogue at the time Alwyn Court was built, made it possible to build the entire structure for under a million dollars. Since each mold could be used repeatedly, the amount of decoration desired was restricted only by the budget. This made possible the richness and complexity of the exterior decoration which would have been economically prohibitive in stone.

Alwyn Court's striking rounded corner bay was thought desirable from a tenant's point of view because of the "simultaneous command it gives of two streets furnish(ing) an interior attraction which any occupier would be delighted to acquire..."⁵

Although comparatively small and without the individual entrances that characterized the other well-known courtyard buildings, Alwyn Court's courtyard is an interesting feature which remains an elegant appurtenance still admired today for its rarity and its reminder of a past filled with amenities we still hold precious amidst the hectic pace of modern urban life. The idea of a courtyard developed from that of an airshaft, but in New York at that time architects were concerned with additional amenities besides creating a respite from the noise and tension of urban life, and in New York those aesthetic and social values then fashionable gave the concept of a courtyard an added attractiveness.

"In this building ...(Alwyn Court), the ultimate seems to have been reached in apartment house construction, in extent, in planning, in equipment, and all appurtenances..."

The spaciousness and luxury of the original rooms (one of the thirty-four room suites had been equipped as a faithful replica of a French castle with costly French panels and stones) were designed for an era when home entertaining on a lavish scale was more in vogue among the well-to-do. As the way of life for which this building was designed passed away with the Depression, little by little its large suites were vacated, until the last tenant moved out in 1936. The building remained vacant for two years, but its structural soundness was a factor arguing for its interior remodelling rather than its demolition.

The architects of Alwyn Court, Herbert S. Harde and R. Thomas Short, who also designed the very similar rounded corner bay building at 45 East 66th Street in 1908, specialized in multiple dwellings in New York City from the late 1890's until the end of their partnership around World War I. An early building designed by Harde which also contains a rounded corner is at the northeast corner of 80th Street and West End Avenue. In 1903, Harde and Short designed the "Red House" at 350 West 88th Street, where we find the salamander motif seen at Alwyn Court. Their three most important buildings are Alwyn Court, 45 East 66th Street and 44 West 77th Street, built ca. 1906-07. Alwyn Court was constructed by Hedden Construction Company of Broadway at a cost of \$900,000 and was named after one of the owners, Alwyn Ball, Jr.

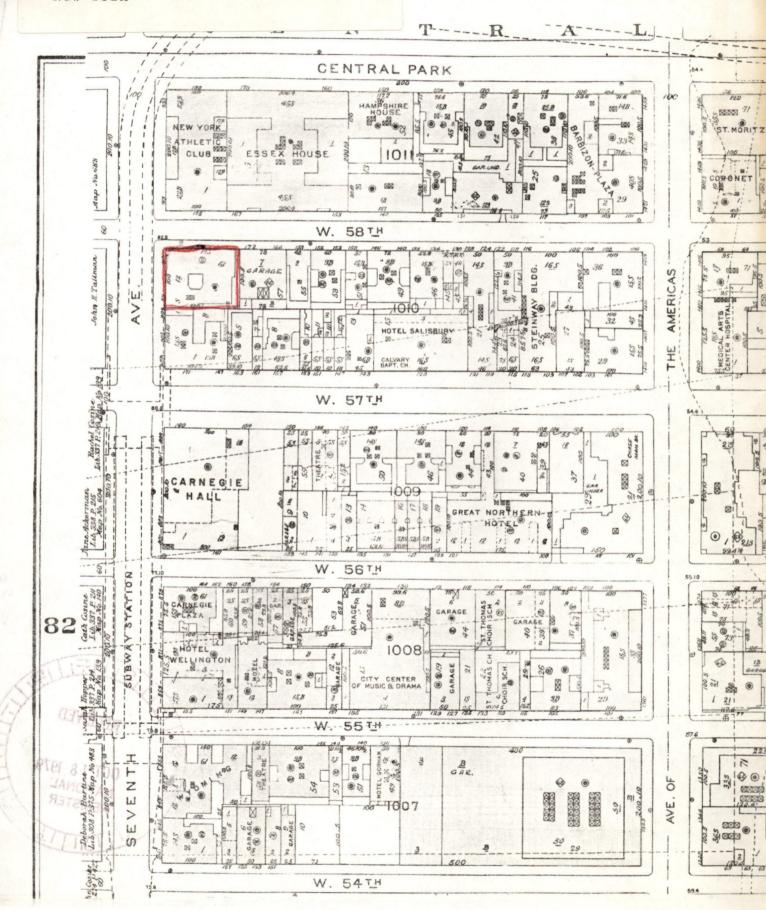

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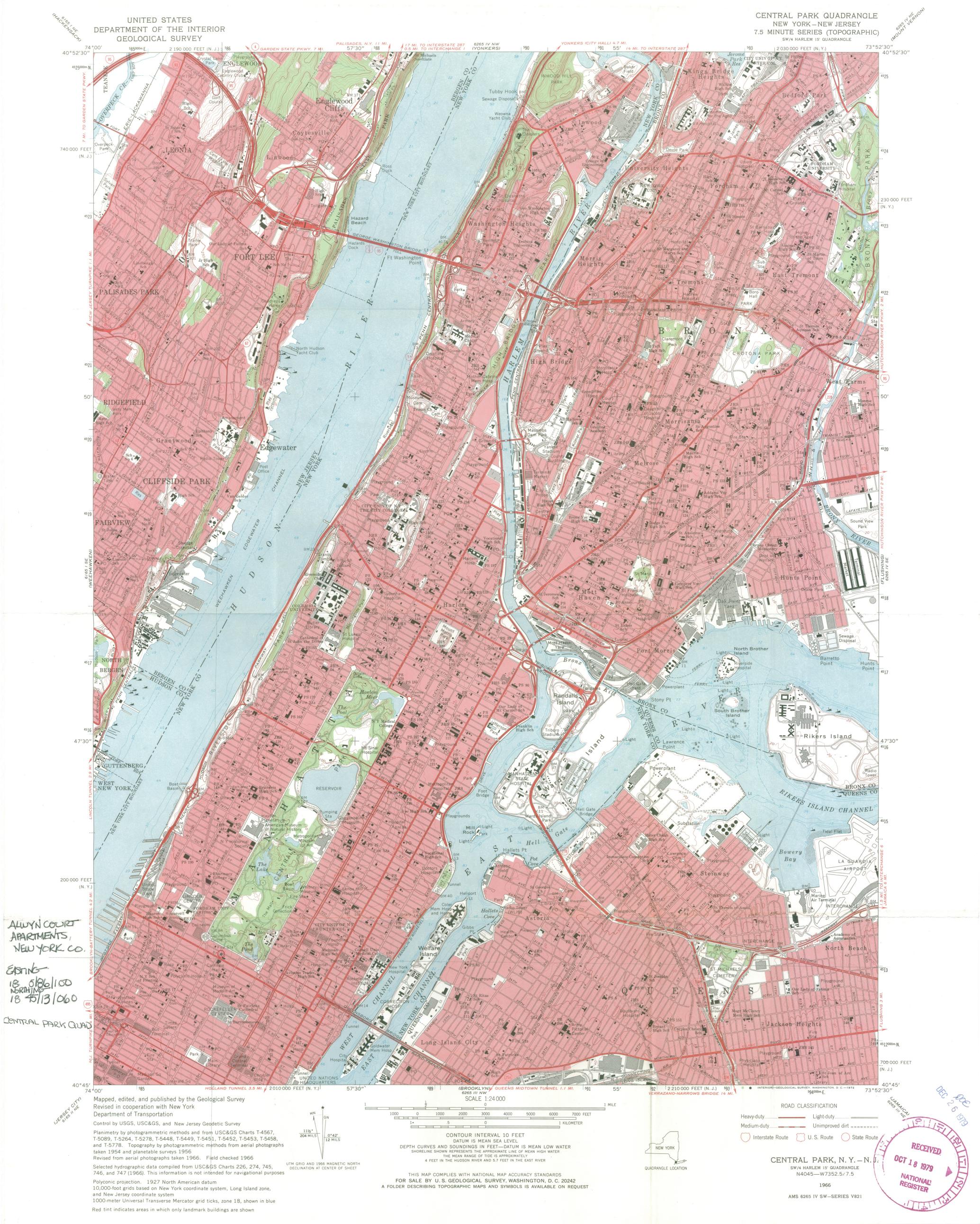
