#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ansonia, an apartment-hotel constructed between 1899 and 1904, was designed by Paul E. M. Duboy in the French Beaux-Art style. It occupies the entire blockfront on Broadway between 73rd and 74th Streets on the Upper West Side of Manhattan, and rises on a conspicuous site to a height of seventeen stories.

The building is an irregular H shape in plan, and approximately 200 by 200 feet in size. Two entrances lead to a block-long corridor from 73rd to 74th Streets. Maximum light and air is provided to the apartments by recessed courts: two on the north side (74th Street), two on the south side (73rd Street), and one on the Broadway side.

The three main facades are characterized by overscaled Beaux-Art details, but an effect of lightness and grace has been achieved by the careful massing of elements. A sense of verticality established by tiers of windows and recessed courts is skillfully modulated by a series of horizontal balconies. Large limestone balconies run just above the three story rusticated base and near the top of the building between the twelfth and thirteenth floors. Smaller limestone and iron balconies divide the intermediate floors and define major window groupings.

A careful choice of materials also contributes an air of delicacy to this massive structure. Highly ornamental ironwork is contrasted against white-glazed terra cotta and limestone details, and quoins and restication are contrasted against smooth panels of light-colored brick.

The building's most striking features are domed corner towers on Broadway that rise slightly above and repeat the theme of the three story convex mansard roof that crowns the building.

Techniques well in advance of their day were employed in the building's construction. All masonry construction and thick interior partitions were used to make the building fireproof and also rendered it soundproof. Six passenger elevators plus service elevators provided circulation. When the hotel opened, it had attractions unheard of at the time, such as two swimming pools and a roof garden.

A number of alterations have been made to the Ansonia. The ground floor archways have been altered into shopfronts, some of the balconies and railings are missing, and cupolas that once crowned the corner towers have been removed. The lobby has been remodeled, but retains its original plan and marble floors. The main staircase, constructed of ornate iron and marble, is the most important original interior feature. Several of the apartments retain their original plan, but most have been divided to increase the original 300 suites into about 540 apartments.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ansonia Hotel is world-renowned as a center of musical activity. Designed with a truly splendid Beaux-Arts exterior, it was solidly built with virtually soundproof construction and was the largest apartment-hotel in the world.

The Ansonia Hotel was built by William Earl Dodge Stokes, a noted capitalist and builder who was one of the leading developers of Riverside Drive and the Upper West Side. It was designed, in accordance with his specific instructions, by Paul DuBoy, a French architect. It was built by the Onward Construction Company which was owned by Stokes and for which he served as treasurer. His personal fortune had been inherited from his father, James Stokes, a partner in Phelps, Dodge & Co.

The name Ansonia was derived from Ansonia, Connecticut, where Stokes spent many summers and the town, in turn, had been named for Anson Greene Phelps, his maternal grandfather, who founded the Ansonia Brass & Copper Company.

Mr. Stokes had many ideas in advance of his day that were carried out in the construction of the Ansonia which he superintended in person. His early advocacy of fireproofing accounts for the all-masonry construction and the thickness of the interior partitions. In order to insure its high quality, he had the terra cotta ornament made at a plant he owned at Perth Amboy, New Jersey, under the supervision of a manager brought over from France. The elevators were likewise installed by a firm he owned in Worcester, Massachusetts.

The Ansonia Hotel is known the world over as a residence for musicians. Among those who have lived there are Leopold Auer, Karin Branzell, Enrico Caruso, Gatti Casazza, Bruna Castagna, Feodor Chaliapin, Fausta Cleva, Alessio De Paolis, Mischa Elman, Geraldine Farrar, Herbert Janssen, Lauritz Melchior, Yehudi Menuhin, Ezio Pinza, Lily Pons, Tito Schipa, Friedrich Schorr, Antonio Scotti, Igor Stravinsky, and Arturo Toscanini. Theatrical notables who have lived in the Ansonia include: Billie Burke, Florenz Ziegfeld, De Wolf Hopper, and Sol Hurok as well as the authors, Theodore Dreiser, Elmer Rice and W.L. Stoddard. Because of the many musicians who have lived there, the Ansonia's private apartments have been used for countless music lessons over the years. The building therefore has historic significance in music education.





This architecturally significant example of the French Beaux-Art style is visually striking when viewed from Broadway or from Verdi Square which is adjacent to it. Although a massive building, its design is at once extremely forceful, and rhythmic with varied design elements so that the structure's physical impact is not overwhelming. The set back arched entrances on the side streets (see photo 4) are grand and yet human oriented; an amusing face stares down from the massive archway. The richly decorated surfaces (see photo 3) vastly enrich the experience of the passerby. The Ansonia is a distinctive example of turn-of-the-century, urban architecture and well represents the period taste for highly decorative surfaces.



Dear Mr. Norman:

Enclosed for your records are enlargements of photographs submitted to the Commission on 7/10/84, which show the Ansonia's workmen in the act of defacing cartouches located on the SE corner of the South Central Bay at the 15th floor level. After receiving our 7/10/84 letter, the Commission allowed 4 other stone cartouches to be destroyed with black tar (they are located on the SW corner of the South Central Bay and the SE corner of the SW Bay). Then the Commission authorized the landlord to cover up this defacement with a beige-colored compound without even ascertaining the chemical composition of said compound. The Commission removed the violation numbered V-84-0513, even though it is clear that these cartouches have been defaced beyond repair.

Although the Commission saw fit to send our landlord copies of all of the tenants' communications, it never offered the tenants the same courtesy of sending them copies of the landlord's correspondence. Although we requested written information about violation #V-84-0513, we were unable to obtain it without the intervention of our elected public officials.

Subsequently, we wrote to you about a dozen violations which had been placed on hazardous balconies by the Dept. of Buildings. Since these items required immediate repairs, we expected to hear from you within a week or two, after delivering our letter to the Commission on April 19. Yet, nearly three and one half months have passed without our receiving one word from your Commission on the matter.

The preservation of the rich architectural heritage of our city, indeed, of our country, depends upon the vigilance of your Commission in preventing such depredations as those which Ansonia Associates have committed upon our building.
