#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on the north side of West 145th Street, a major east-west thoroughfare which is filled with small shops and theaters, the Hamilton Grange Branch Library, built in 1905-1906, was designed in the style of

the Italian Renaissance and has the character of a Florentine palazzo. Characteristic of the style, the openings are the major elements. The openings are graded from the large, round-arched door and windows of the first floor, to the rectangular, pedimented windows of the second story. There are narrow windows between the larger ones, which also are aligned one above the other, but they are graduated the opposite way: from the smallest at the first story to the largest at the third. opposing gradations work together to set up the dominant up-and-down move-ment across the facade. Countering that movement is the fact that the heavier rustication at the first floor gives a solidity to the base, and the fact that the second and third-story windows are resting on band courses which are emphatically horizontal.

The composition is unified by the rustication and the fined detail which is carried over the entire facade. The bronze lamps, the grilles on the small windows of the first story, the lace-patterned fence, are well balanced by the decorated panels above the small second-

story windows, and the frieze with fleur-de-lis ornament.

The composition is symmetrically ordered. This is emphasized by the large escutcheon on the keystone above the central entrance. bearing the seal of the City of New York. It is further emphasized by the use of an arched pediment over the central window, instead of the triangular pediments which surmount the two windows at either side. The inscription, "New York Public Library," centered on the frieze, completes the central

emphasis at the cornice level.

Although originally designed as a detached building, the architects designed the side elevations as party or commonwalls. The rear wall is brick and is seven bays wide. The firstfloor windows have been removed and a one-story, flat-roofed wing which is used as a reference room for the public was added to the rear of the building in 1973. In that year, the interior was completely rebuilt. The library reopened on June 16, 1976. The main floor is the location of the circulation desk, the card catalog and reading areas. The remaining floors contain the stacks and house the staff. 1 Since the interior was completely gutted, no interior historic features remain. The rear wing is considered to be a non-historic addition. The entire tax lot (less than one acre) is included in the nomination and the library fills most of the lot. On either side of the library, are non-historic buildings consisting of tenement buildings, a laundromat and a Footnotes school.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Hamilton Grange Branch of the New York Public Library, is an outstanding example of the work of McKim, Mead and White in the Italian Renaissance style. The subtle, precise control of detail and elements results in a classically symmetrical yet dynamic composition. In addition, its construction was associated with Andrew Carnegie's unique gift to New York City and its library system.

The Hamilton Grange Branch Library is one of eleven libraries designed by McKim, Mead and White for the New York Public Library. It is one of their most successful adaptations of the Italian Renaissance style.

McKim, Mead and White believed that buildings of the same basic type and use can still adapt to a particular environment and place. An illustration of this is the series of branch libraries. . . designed for the New York Public Library system between 1902 and 1914. The individual buildings were to be scattered about the city within easy reach of all citizens. The plans for each of these eleven were nearly identical, yet each building is an imaginative variation on a common theme. The designs have balance . . . that seems suitable for a library. Each design is so varied as to be quickly distinguishable from the others, making each library unique to its neighborhood. 1

This library was one of sixty-five branches built with funds contributed by Andrew Carnegie, as part of the program to develop a branch library circulating system. At the turn of the century, there were three public libraries in New York City: the Astor Library, the Lenox Library and the Tilden Library Trust. These three libraries merged in 1895 and the New York Public Library system was established. The goal of the Board of Trustees was to create a free circulating library branch system for the city and for this purpose, the steel magnate, Andrew Carnegie, donated \$5,000,000. This system developed into the present eighty-two branch libraries.

When the Hamilton Grange Branch Library was constructed, the area in which it is located was predominantly middle class and residential. During the first half of the century, this composition changed to a lower income, multi-racial community. The Hamilton Grange Branch Library, however, has remained a center of stability in the neighborhood.


