Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The First Police Precinct Station commands an open, waterfront site at the otherwise densely developed southern tip of Manhattan. The entire nominated lot is a self-contained unit bounded on all four sides by city streets, and the building occupies the entire lot thus circumscribed. The freestanding, 11-bay, four-story, limestone structure was designed in the neo-Italian Renaissance style by Hunt & Hunt and erected in 1909-11. It is characterized by horizontal, strictly symmetrical massing and minimal detail. The elevations are clearly divided into three sections: molded granite base, rusticated limestone upper stories, and unadorned attic level (photo 1) The main entrance is centrally located on the south facade, approached by a short stone stoop(photo 4). Composed recessed, paneled wood-and-glass double doors and a transom light the entry is crowned by a triangular pediment mounted on console brackets. Engaged, rusticated Doric columns flank the doors, supporting a modillioned entablature capped by a stone balustrade.

Secondary doors pierce the base of the building on either side of the main entrance, flanked by recessed, arched, two-story window bays with bracketed sills. These windows are marked at second story level by bronze spandrel panels that appear over iron grilles. Similar bronze panels crown the double-doored entries and splayed stone voussoirs cap the windows. Eleven square windows with corbeled sills and rusticated voussoirs light the third story.

The central window over the main entrance is surmounted by an elaborate cartouche bearing the date of the building and the seal of the City of New York. A molded string course marks the division between the smooth-faced attic story and the rusticated lower floors, serving as a sill for the eleven, plain attic windows. The 11-bay north elevation and single-bay sides are designed with the same fenestration as the front wall. An overhanging denticulated and modillioned cornice crowns the building

Inside, the station retains the original oak sergeant's desk, a three-story cell block, and a cast-iron staircase that extends the full height of the building.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Designed by the prestigious firm of Hunt & Hunt, the First Police Precinct Station is an excellent example of the neo-Renaissance style with the distinctive profile of an early Renaissance palazzo. Many of its features, such as the arched openings of the main story, the rusticated walls, and the dominating cornice, are reminiscent of the fifteenth-century Palazzo Ricardi in Florence, designed by Michelozzo. Although the building is small in scale, the succinctly composed structure gains special power from an accomplished play of voids and solids. The station house is one of few low-massed, classically inspired buildings that stands in a highly congested and developed area of Manhattan.

The waterfront site, Old Slip, is important historically as the city's oldest commercial slip and official market place established in the seventeenth century. The slip began to be filled in at the turn of the eighteenth century and eventually formed a wide street of the same name. In 1821, the Franklin Market was erected on Old Slip. Despite all precautions, the Great Fire of 1835 entirely destroyed this market building and much of lower Manhattan. During the next year, the second Franklin Market was constructed on Old Slip between Front and South Streets, the newly declared legal eastern boundary of Manhattan. The upper floors of the Franklin Market housed the First Police Precinct after the municipal police department had been organized in 1844. The station house was moved to 29 Broad Street for a short period during the 1860's.

In 1883, the newly elected mayor of New York, Franklin Edson, recommended the erection of new station houses to replace earlier delapidated ones. As a result, several station houses were immediately built, including the First Police Precinct Station of 1884 at Old Slip. Reportedly the city's first modern police station, this four-story structure stood until the present station house was erected on the same site in 1909-11.

Renderings of the new station house were displayed at the 23rd Annual Exhibit of the Architectural League of New York in 1908. The architects, Richard Howland Hunt (1862-1931) and Joseph Howland Hunt (1870-1924), were the sons of the prominent New York City architect Richard Morris Hunt (1827-1895). The elder son practiced with his father until 1895 and in 1901 the brothers established their own firm. They were well known for elegant Long Island and Newport residential works, as well as for New York City townhouses, including the famed George Washington Vanderbilt House (1902-05) on Fifth Avenue.

Richard Howland Hunt also carried out his father's design for the central portion of the Metropelitan Museum of Art after the latter's death.


This police station was occupied by the First Precinct until January 1973, when it was vacated. It remained vacant until 1979, when the Whitney Museum remodeled the interior of the station house as the Whitney Museum Downtown Cultural Center. The structure housed newly designed studios and exhibition and performance areas, and preserved the exterior of one of Manhattan's finest examples of neo-Renaissance design. The building has been vacant since 1981.
