Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The RKO Keith's is situated at the northern end of Main Street, at its intersection with Northern Boulevard in downtown Flushing, Queens. Typical of theatres designed for central business districts, the RKO Keith's is the central component of the commercial block fronting on Northern Boulevard. Retail businesses and offices flank the theatre on either side.

Despite minor alterations, the fenestration, texture and rhythm of the front facade remains the same. The ornamental cresting above the third story windows has been removed and the area has been stuccoed to match the exterior; the marbleized veneer in the spandrel panels has been replaced with an opaque, brown veneer. Large commercial signs obscure the original configuration of the first story shopfronts. An early, curved and heavily ornamented marquee has been removed and a horizontal advertisement of a more contemporary nature installed. The massive but plain exterior of the theatre and the adjacent commercial businesses belie the grandeur that is found upon entry. The theme of the RKO Keith's is Spanish Baroque Revival—expressed in the auditorium through a series of outdoor Spanish facades set in a garden.

The gilded plaster and wooden facades are, in the atmospheric manner, built up against the walls and run around the three sides of the auditorium, meeting up with the organ screens at the sides of the proscenium arch. The arcades and broken pediments end at the ceiling, where their tops form a romantic outline set against an evening sky. The ceiling was lit, like a planetarium, with projected images of stars and moving clouds. The elaborate organ screens are covered with spiral columns, niches, volutes, and other baroque ornament. The proscenium arch is a complicated twisting form, with molded plaster ornament of similar fantasy.

The theme of the Spanish Baroque style is carried throughout the theatre-to the semi-oval grand foyer, mezzanine promenade, lounges and lower auditoriums. The women's and men's lounges retain elaborate wrought-iron work, polychromatic terra-cotta drinking fountains, and gilded plaster moldings. The ticket-booth hall is a square, two-story-high room, the upper story of which is a series of columns and gilded plaster carvings rising to a flat blue-sky ceiling.

The RKO Keith's is exceptional in that there has been only a minimal amount of alteration to the original Lamb design. Careful renovation carried out in the mid-1970's divided the interior into three theatres—one upstairs and two downstairs—leaving the lower lobby, the four lounges and the balcony level remarkably intact. Elaborately gilded plaster work and wood ornamentation are visible throughout these spaces, and the original color scheme is evident. The balcony, in particular, retains the aura of a courtyard in Spain. The full effect of Lamb's design is apparent in the ornamental facades that surround the three sides of the auditorium. These facades are silhouetted against a ceiling which remains painted a deep blue to simulate the evening sky. In addition, original tapestries and murals decorate the wall space on the small three-dimensional balconies located on both sides of the auditorium.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The RKO Keith's Theatre in Flushing, Queens is one of the few extant atmospheric movie theatres in the Northeast. Located at the juncture of Main Street and Northern Boulevard, the RKO Keith's is the focal point of Main Street in the central business district of downtown Flushing. The RKO Keith's was designed by Thomas Lamb, one of the country's most prominent theatre architects, and opened in 1928 as a vaudeville house for subscription holders. The theatre was part of the original Keith-Albee circuit, the largest vaudeville chain in the country. By the mid 1920s, however, vaudeville was in direct competition with a then novel form of entertainment, the motion picture. In 1927-28, the years of the RKO Keith's construction, the corporations with a controlling interest in the Keith-Albee circuit were consolidated under the name Radio-Keith-Orpheum (RKO). Soon thereafter, in order to compete with the rapidly growing motion picture industry, facilities and equipment for movie showings were incorporated within the traditional vaudeville theatre form.

The major period of movie theatre construction in the United States peaked between WWI and the Depression. The number of theatres built in urban areas increased twofold and the concept of the small neighborhood house evolved in outlying areas. These theatres had a capacity for large audiences averaging 2500-3000 seats. The RKO Keith's is representative of the neighborhood house of this era. In its heyday, it was the leading entertainment center serving Flushing.

Thomas Lamb was one of several architects who gained recognition through the numerous theatre commissions he executed. Among other noteworthy theatre architects of this period were John Eberson, B. Marcus Priteca, C. Howard Crane, Walter Ahlschlayer, G. Albert Lansburgh, and Rapp and Rapp. Lamb was undoubtedly the most prolific. He began designing theatres as early as 1909, and by the time of his death in 1942, had completed over 300 theatres. Lamb's early theatre designs were influenced by the 18th-century Scottish architect, Robert Adam. Using classical forms and motifs of the Adamesque style, Lamb created elegant interiors that were rich and restrained in ornamentation without the lavishness apparent in his later works. Notable New York City theatres of this period designed by Lamb include the Strand, Rialto and Rivoli.

The marked change in Lamb's style of the late 1920s and in his design of the RKO Keith's, in 1927-8, reflects a significant change in theatre design across the country. The classical design of the early 1920s was abandoned for a more elaborate architectural treatment of theatre interiors. Theatre designers became architects of fantasy, creating environments that transported the ordinary American theatregoer to the environment of other lands. A wide variety of decorative motifs that included Spanish Baroque, Moorish, Peruvian, and Oriental were employed in this era throughout the theatre interiors.

Marcus Loew's declaration, "we sell tickets to theatres not movies," best reflects the attitude toward movie theatres—later coined movie palaces—that prevailed throughout the 1920s. Critical to the success and proliferation of movie palaces of this period was the intent of the theatre entrepreneur to appeal to and serve all Americans. The movie palace was not an exclusive form of entertainment and, unlike the nineteenth—century nickelodeons and vaudeville enterprises, was considered a respectable establishment that could be attended by women and children.

It was one of Thomas Lamb's contemporaries, John Eberson, who pioneered the most dramatic theatre design of the decade with his atmospheric theatre for Houston, Texas in 1922. The atmospheric theatre was intended to simulate an evening outdoors. The ceiling was painted a deep blue and studded with stars; most theatres featured a cloud machine that operated during movie showings. Lamb was commissioned by several of the principal theatre chains--RKO, Marcus Loew's, Stanley Fox--to design a series of theatres for them. The success of Eberson's atmospheric made it a popular theatre form for all the major chains. To some extent, Lamb's designs were dictated by the theatre entrepreneurs. Lamb, however, designed very few atmospheric theatres. Although the elaborate Spanish Baroque Revival treatment of the RKO Keith's interior is typical of Lamb's designs of the late 1920s, the atmospheric design of the auditorium and, particularly, Lamb's carrying it through to the outer lobby, is extraordinarily unusual. The RKO Keith's has survived with a minimal amount of alteration to the original Lamb design. renovation has divided the RKO Keith's into three theatres without seriously altering its character, particularly on the balcony level. Here the full effect of the Spanish facades framing the three sides of the auditorium, and set against a ceiling that was painted a deep blue to simulate the evening sky, can be seen. The opulent interior remains intact and features gilded plaster work and wood with elaborate ornamentation.

In recent years a number of significant theatres dating from the 1920s have been demolished throughout the New York metropolitan area and few theatres with the once popular atmospheric design are extant. The RKO Keith's survives as an exceptionally intact example of a 1920s movie palace designed by one of the country's leading theatre architects.


