7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Century Association Building stands in a busy area of midtown Manhattan, overshadowed by the numerous tall office buildings constructed in more recent years. Within a radius of a few blocks are a number of other club buildings, built in the years following the construction of the Century building. The building fills its entire lot.

The four-story building has a facade of granite, terra-cotta and brick which is presented as a flat plane along the street. It is symmetrically disposed with the center being emphasized by a massive arch on the lower floors and a palladian window above it. This large arch, housing the main entrance, is decorated by delicate ironwork which fills its upper portion and an iron lantern which hangs from it. A large console bracket marks the keystone of the archway. Two bays flank both sides of the central arch and are characterized by small, square windows at the lowest level with larger, rectangular ones above them. Four elaborate iron fixtures are mounted on the rusticated walls at this second level, two flanking the arch and two near the outside corners of the building.

A protruding entablature with a delicately ornamented frieze divides the building horizontally between the second and third floors. Above the central arch is a grand and richly decorated palladian window which was originally an open loggia with an iron balustrade. Square plaques, garlands and foliate-covered console brackets are located above this opening and support another entablature bearing the date of construction. Two large windows flank each side of the central palladian window. Integrated with them by a complex decorative scheme are small, handsomely wreathed round windows. A series of fluted pilasters, both single and in pairs, runs across the upper half of the building separating the windows and forming a colonnade to support the full entablature above. The entablature consists of a richly decorated frieze and an elaborate cornice topped by a stone balustrade. A central cartouche surrounded by volutes and surmounted by an urn is located at the center of the balustrade.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The clubhouse for the Century Association is the first of many buildings of this type designed by the eminent firm of McKim Mead & White for New York's exclusive men's clubs. During the last part of the nineteenth century and the early twentieth century, many of these associations moved from their brownstone buildings in lower Manhattan to new, exclusive areas on or near Fifth Avenue where they commissioned buildings meant to impress passersby with their splendor and beauty. This structure for the Century Association was such a building and still serves its original function.

The Century Association was formed in 1847 at a meeting of the well-established Sketch Club. Its constitution states its purpose to be "promoting the advancement of art and literature" by, among other things, the establishment of a library, reading room and art gallery. Its original membership was limited to 100 men, hence its name. Many prominent New Yorkers were among its early members including William Cullen Bryant, Asher B. Durand, William J. Hoppin, Cornelius Vanderbilt and all three principals of the firm of McKim, Mead & White:

The architects began to work in the Italian Renaissance mode during the 1880's achieving great success with their designs for the Henry Villard Houses (1886) and the Boston Public Library (1887-95). Following the extreme diversity of mid-nineteenth century architectural styles, the classical tenants of the Renaissance were seen to offer an authoritative design solution which combined order, proportion, balance and urbanity. The Century Association building was their first clubhouse in New York to be completely constructed in this style. Some of its inspiration comes from San Michele's Palazzo Canossa in Verona although the scheme has been freely adapted and details from other palazzi have been included. In this building the architects juxtaposed a certain severity in the rustication of the lower floors, with ornateness and plasticity in the upper stories. Although the design of this facade has long been attributed to Stanford White, recent evidence suggests that most of the arrangement and details were worked out by Joseph M. Wells under White's direction.

Through the early years of the twentieth century, McKim Mead and White continued to explore and refine these ideas of the Italian Renaissance in their numerous clubhouses and other buildings, combining them in a truly American manner. The Century Association building was the first and a very successful effort at this type of clubhouse.


