#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Lamb's Club building is located near Times Square in the heart of Manhattan's theatre district. The structure occupies the whole of its double lot (76 feet wide by 100 feet deep) and abuts a hotel on the east side and a commercial building on the west. The only visible elevation is the front (north) wall. The original six-story clubhouse was designed in the neo-Classical style by Stanford White of McKim, Mead & White and constructed in 1904-05. A western extension, added in 1915 by George A. Freeman, matched the original facade and doubled the width of the building to six bays. Symmetrically massed, the clubhouse is constructed of brick, with a smooth-faced marble ground floor, terra-cotta trim, and stone quoins. Each of the twin facades has a ground floor entrance framed by engaged Doric columns and full entablature and located between multi-paned windows with simple crowning keystones and decorative grilles. A Greek fret band course marks the division between the basement and the upper stories.

At the second story, each side of the facade is articulated by three pairs of French windows with transoms, opening onto wrought-iron balconies. The columns and foliate terra-cotta corner pilasters support a full entablature with a foliate frieze that traverses the full width of the building. A large plaque appears on the center of the facade. The third story is pierced on each side by recessed, arched double-hung windows that are cleanly cut into the wall. Recessed panels create pseudo piers between the windows, which are trimmed with terra-cotta impost blocks and paneled keystones. Carved lamb's heads project from the arch spandrels. The fourth story windows are capped by splayed terra-cotta lintels with paneled keystones capped by lamb's heads. A large plaque crowned by a cartouche flanked by lambs marks the center of the building between the third and fourth stories. A molded terra-cotta string course runs above, where six simple windows light the fifth story. A modillioned cornice surmounts the fifth floor, and a classical attic with cornice above the sixth floor is crowned by a stone roof balustrade.

The interior of the Lambs Club building retains much of its original neo-Federal detail. The second-story rooms, well-lit by the expanse of French windows, are finished with fluted Ionic pilasters, paneled beams, and a denticulated mantel decorated with classical swags. The third story theatre has a richly paneled stage and loge.

In addition to the 1915 extension, alterations to the original exterior include the removal of a cast-iron fence at street level, the replacement of the central wall plaques and the crowning balustrade, and the removal of the cornice modillions and stone balustrade at sixth-floor level.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Lambs Club building is significant as the site where the staging of excellent theatrical productions was a long tradition, making an important cultural contribution to New York as the city's foremost theatrical club. For over seventy years, the Lambs Club, located in the heart of the city's famed theatre district, provided a convenient and attractive meeting place for actors and musicians. Designed in 1904 by Stanford White, the structure is also one of New York's best examples of the neo-Colonial style. Based on a romantic recollection of early American architecture, the style enjoyed immense popularity in New York during the early twentieth century. The clubhouse has a particularly interesting architectural history as it was doubled in size by the addition of a twin facade in 1915 by architect George Freeman. Its superb interiors include a private theatre on the third floor and handsome reception rooms distinguished by fine neo-Federal detail. The clubhouse originally contained a library, dining and lounge rooms, private living rooms, agrillroom, and a bar.

The Lambs was founded in 1874 by a small group which included several members of the Wallack Theatre Company for the "social intercourse of members of the dramatic and musical professions with men of the world, and the giving of musical entertainments for mutual amusement and instruction." Henry J. Montague, one of the founders, had belonged to a similar club in London named the Lambs (in honor of Charles and Mary Lamb, who had held weekly open house for theatre people) and suggested the name for the New York group. The club was formally incorporated under New York state law on May 10, 1877. Rented social halls in the vicinity of Union Square served as headquarters for the organization for a number of years. The meeting place was known as the Fold, the President and vice president were called the Shepherd and the Boy, and the club's annual outings were called washings or shearings. The club became well-known in New York City for its public and private Gambols, satirical theatrical revues, which began in 1888. Members also presented many plays which later achieved popular success on Broadway.

The Lambs moved into a building at 70 West 36th Street in 1897 to which alterations were made by Stanford White. The club soon outgrew these quarters and began to make plans for a new building. The commission was given to the prestigious firm of McKim, Mead & White, all of whom were members of the Lambs, and the design is largely attributed to Stanford White.


In 1915, George Freeman, a Stamford, Connecticut architect, doubled the size of the building, matching the original facade while maintaining the integrity of White's design. Freeman preserved and reproduced almost all of the original details, including the terra-cotta lambs' heads. The classically inspired details such as the graceful entrances designed in the Doric order, and the slender Ionic columns placed at second-story level interspersed with iron balconies to create a "loggia" effect, exhibit the building's neo-Colonial design quality. Since 1974 the building has been owned and occupied by the Church of the Nazarene.


