Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Central Savings Bank is located just north of the triangular Verdi Square in a congested commercial and residential section of Manhattan's upper west side. Built in 1926-28, the structure was designed by Benjamin Moscowitz of York & Sawyer in the manner of a grand Italian Renaissance palace. The tapezoidal building follows the shape of its site, which is located at the intersection of Broadway and Amsterdam Avenue.

Although each side of the building shows a different fenestration pattern, a continuity of design is maintained through the clear division of the rusticated walls into a base, two middle sections, and an attic story. A full story high, the base is surmounted by a torus molding and pierced by entrances on the west, south, and north elevations. The entrances are framed by heavy stone architraves with denticulated cornices. The south, 73rd Street, entrance is crowned by two stone lions flanking a clock. The western, Broadway, wall is designed as the principal facade, with three tall, centrally located, arched windows lighting the interior banking room. A row of 14 small, rectangular windows appears above the arched windows. Separated from the lower floors by a molded string course, the fourth and fifth stories are incorporated as one in a loggia-like composition that alternates Doric pilasters with 14 balustraded windows. The vertically paired windows are separated by iron spandrels. This composition is repeated on all elevations and differs only in the number of bays. The lower portion of the southern wall is pierced by a single, massive arched doorway and window. Four bays define the upper portion. The eight-bay, north elevation has a large single arch located on the left side of the wall. Five arched windows pierce the east wall. A modillioned cornice crowns the bank, while a classical attic with paired windows and flanking pilasters rises above. The attic is surmounted by a hipped, tile roof. Exterior ornament includes decorative stone plaques with carved mottos, intricate wrought-iron window grilles capped with gargoyle heads, and lanterns that flank the entrances. All of the ironwork was executed by the studio of Samuel Yellin of Philadelphia.

The bank has elaborate interiors, dominated by a two-story banking room. Here, honey-colored stone piers rise to a soaring, coffered, barrel-vaulted ceiling. Marble mosaic floors, marble wainscot, intricate wrought-iron and bronze grilles, and magnificent chandeliers contribute to the overall effect of splendor, wealth and tradition.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Central Savings Bank, overlooking Verdi Square, dominates the intersection of Broadway and Amsterdam Avenue. Manhattan's only freestanding bank building, the Central Savings Bank is unusual as a trapezoid-shaped structure, conforming to the unusual shape of the lot. Modelled on the lines of a Renaissance palazzo, the structure is a superbly proportioned example of the neo-Renaissance style. It was designed in 1926 by Benjamin Moscowitz of the eminent firm of York & Sawyer, who met the challenge of a difficult site with skill and sensitivity. The impressive exterior of the bank is equalled by a splendid interior banking room, finely detailed with marble, cast iron and bronze.

The Central Savings bank was founded in 1859 as "the German Savings Bank in the City of New York" and had its first quarters in the Cooper Union Building. In 1864 the bank moved to the remodeled Napier house at Fourth Avenue and 14th Street, and a new bank was constructed on that site in 1872. The bank changed its name to the Central Savings Bank during World War I in response to anti-German sentiment in the United States at that time. Because of the bank's steady growth, the trustees decided to extend its services to the west side and constructed their new building at Broadway and 73rd Street in 1926-28.

The firm of York & Sawyer, commissioned to design the bank, was founded in 1898 by Philip Sawyer and Edward Palmer York, both of whom had worked for the firm of McKim, Mead & White where they received valuable training in the tradition of classical design. York & Sawyer gained a reputation for the design of large office buildings, banks, and hospitals in New York and other cities. Among their commissions were the Bowery Savings Bank on 42nd Street, the Federal Reserve Bank of New York on Liberty Street (listed National Register, 1980), and the Flower Fifth Avenue Hospital.

The Central Savings Bank project was headed by Benjamin Moscowitz, who executed a careful, well-proportioned design perfectly suited to the unusual trapezoidal site. Essentially, the architect recreated a monumental Italian Renaissance palazzo at the apex of two important avenues, creating an excellent backdrop for the triangular Verdi Square, a public space sited immediately south of the bank across 73rd Street.

When built, the bank contained banking rooms, dining rooms, kitchens, and a basement recreation room with bowling alleys, shower baths, and locker equipment. The main banking room occupies some 10,000 square feet with a central enclosure surrounded by a wide public space. Opulent materials and rich colors were used to create an interior that is surpassed by few other buildings in New York. The striking ironwork of the well-known craftsman Samuel Yellin, both inside and outside the building, is a distinctive feature which adds visual interest to an already accomplished design.





