Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The DeLamar Mansion, an imposing Beaux-Arts style structure built of limestone, is situated in the Murray Hill section of Manhattan on the northeast corner of Madison Avenue and East 37th Street across the street from the J.P. Morgan House. The main facade of the mansion, which faces 37th Street, is designed in a tripartite division both vertically and horizontally. The vertical division is the dominant one, reinforced by projecting end pavilions. The horizontal division is created by a wide, smooth-faced, molded band course above the ground floor and by the roof cornice above the third floor.

The first three floors display a careful balance of architectural elements. while the upper two stories introduce an asymmetrical composition creating a sense of height that belies the size of the mansion and gives the building its most striking feature. The sense of height is further emphasized by the continuation of the rustication of the lower floors up into the fourth floor of the western pavilion, giving it a tower-like appearance.

The major windows of the first three floors of the building are paired with the exception of those on the recessed section of the Madison Avenue facade. All have smooth-faced enframements which provide contrast with the rusticated wall surfaces. At the second floors of the end pavilions, tall paired windows are set behind balustrades supported on massive console brackets which are decorated with classical swags. Over the windows are denticulated cornices carried on console brackets that are extended up to the third floor where they serve as sills. Above the third floor is a denticulated and modillioned cornice carried on massive, paired console brackets at the corners.

The commanding feature of the mansion is the treatment of the upper stories and the great mansard roof. The lines of this very elegant roof are emphasized by copper crestings decorated with shell motifs.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The DeLamar Mansion, now the Consulate of the Polish People's Republic, is an imposing Beaux-Arts style residence designed by the noted New York architect. Charles Pierrepont H. Gilbert in the great scale and elegance of the limestone mansions that once lined upper Fifth Avenue. It is a striking reminder of the time when Murray Hill was a fashionable residential district of Manhattan, and it is one of the most elegant residences in the French Beaux-Arts style of architecture in the city. The mansion was built for Joseph Raphael DeLamar in 1902. DeLamar was born in Amsterdam in 1843 and emigrated to this country in the 1860s, settling first in Massachusetts where he worked as a ship contractor. With the discovery of gold in Colorado in the late 1870s, DeLamar went west and soon amassed a fortune. After a brief period in local politics, he returned east in 1888 and settled in New York City where he died in 1918.

Charles Pierrepont H. Gilbert (1860-1952) was born in New York City. After studying at Columbia University and the Ecole des Beaux-Arts, he spent the early years of his career in the mining towns of Colorado and Arizona. Perhaps DeLamar and Gilbert first met while they were both in the West. It is not known when Gilbert returned to New York, but by the late 1880s he had designed several handsome Romanesque Revival houses in the Park Slope section of Brooklyn. Late in the 1890s, he began to receive commissions from prominent members of New York society including the Woolworths, the Warburgs, Isaac D. Fletcher and Edmond C. Converse. After an extremely long and successful career, Gilbert retired to Pelham Manor where he died at the age of 92.

In 1923, the DeLamar Mansion was sold to the National Democratic Club for use as its headquarters. In 1973, the Polish Government purchased the building and has since restored much of the splended interior spaces.






