Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The Dorilton is ten stories tall and has an additional three stories contained in its massive curved mansard roof. Built with an H-shaped plan, it fills the irregular angle created where Broadway meets 71st Street and forms a recessed entrance court between projecting pavilions on the 71st Street elevation.

The three-story rusticated limestone base ternimates in a balustraded balcony. Commercial storefronts have been inserted on the first floor of the Broadway facade. The main body of the building is built of red brick with contrasting stone quoins defining four corner pavilions which become pronounced only at the roof level. Curved bay windows of bronze rise from the balcony level at the center of Broadway elevation and in each of the 71st Street wings. A second balustraded balcony with urns once surrounded the 10th floor and was supported by massive scrolled brackets which survive. The elaborate mansard has been altered by replacing its original slate roof with black tar paper. Much of the ornate copper coping framing the roof pavilions, the sculptured terracotta segmentally arched lintels at the eleventh story, and the terracotta lintels on the three major attic dormers have been removed. However, a large part of the coping remains as do the tall, freestanding chimney stacks and some of the details of the attic dormers.

Other handsome decorative features are the mock pedestrian bridge on the tenth floor level above the entrance court; the tripartite decorative wrought-iron gates supported by limestone columns which define the carriageway and central pedestrian gate, and sculpture, including allegorical female forms on the fourth floor balcony, "Atlase's" bracketing the metal bay windows of the 71st Street facade, and putti framing the lettered "D" cartouche above the gateway.

The typical floor in the Dorilton includes four apartments. Long, private, central hallways lit by French doors, some irregularly shaped rooms, many corner fireplaces, and asymmetrically placed, round window bays vary from one interior to the next. Other details, such as ornate Queen Anne fireplaces and paneling, survive. Many of the apartments, however, have been subdivided into smaller units and are considerably altered. The main lobby is classically inspired but the ornate detail has been heavily painted. The vestibule contains putti figures supporting a cartouche which repeats the motif over the gateway.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Dorilton Apartments is one of the great surviving luxury apartment buildings constructed in New York near the turn of the century. Architecturally it is one of the finest Beaux Arts apartment buildings in Manhattan. Designed by Leo & Janes and erected by Hamilton W. Weed as a speculative building venture in 1902, its elaborate and even flamboyant form and ornament was sharply criticized by some critics. Nevertheless, the building reflects the opulent taste of the period and was, as a luxury apartment building, an innovative building type at the time. With the Dakota and the Ansonia (both listed on the National Register), two equally elaborate neighbors, the Dorilton reflects a high point of design and development in the remarkably rapid expansion of the upper west side between 1890 and 1915.

Although little has been written about the Dorilton's architects, Elisha Harris Janes and Richard Leopold Leo, they were a competent and popular design firm in New York City between 1897 and 1911. After 1900 their offices were located at 2585 Broadway on the upper west side of Manhattan where the majority of their known designs survive. Though the Dorilton is perhaps their most well-known work, they also designed many single family residences and several churches, including All Souls Church on St. Nicholas Avenue at 114th Street, the Alimar apartment house on West End Avenue, and a row of seventeen single-family houses within the Riverside Drive-105th Street Historic District. Most of their designs, like the Dorilton, were in the French Beaux-Arts style and many were published in the important architectural periodicals of the day including Architectural Forum, Architect and Builder's News, and Architectural Record.

Janes is also known for the series of articles he wrote for the <u>Brickbuilder</u> during the second decade of the century on the development of studio and duplex apartment houses and the related cooperative and speculative financing of their construction.

The Dorilton was erected by Hamilton W. Weed, a speculative builder and developer, who was active in New York City at the turn of the century. His involvement with Janes and Leo began a year or two before the Dorilton with several of the seventeen single-family houses designed by them and located in the 105th Street Historic District.




