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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hotel Gerard is a U-shaped building constructed of salmon-colored Roman brick and rusticated limestone and decorated with an unusual combination of German Renaissance and Northern Gothic details. The facade consists of a two-story limestone base supporting eleven brick stories which have a strong vertical emphasis culminating in steep gables and tall dormers. The side elevations (east and west) consist of neutral brick punctuated by plain, square-headed windows. The rear elevation (north) is similar but its window bays overlook the small rear courtyard. The Gerard lies close to Times Square and is located on the north side of West 44th Street surrounded by structures vastly different in age, style and scale. The building and courtyard fill their entire tax lot. There is no historic district potential.

The facade's lower floor contains several altered storefronts. At the second floor level there is a small, bracketed balcony-like projection above the two central bays which originally carried the hotel's name. Above these floors, the exterior remains almost entirely intact.

The third to the sixth floors contain bowed pairs of bays, each bay having three windows. The central pair of bays are trapedzoidal and those on the third and fourth floor are faced in terra cotta. At the seventh floor, the outer bays have two round-arched windows set above the sixth floor balconies. The two central bays are set in a raised terra-cotta relief panel. The eighth and ninth floors are identical, with oriel windows in the outer bays and three square-headed windows in each of the central two bays. The tenth floor has six bays of three square-headed windows each. Iron railings at the seventh and tenth floors have been removed. (Illus. 1)

The outer bays on the eleventh to thirteenth floors diminish into steeply pointed gables. The ornate central pair of bays have two-story engaged columns beneath heavily modelled entablatures on which rest dormer windows with decorative urns on top. The roof slopes back from the front gables and has been covered with tarpaper. One oculus (out of the original four) remains intact and there is a chimney on each side.

Within the interior, the ground floor has lost its original plan, having been converted from hotel reception rooms to commercial space, but some major architectural elements (fluted columns, tiled floors) still survive in the former cafe (photograph 4), now a restaurant

A few very minor details (egg-and-dart moulding) exist in the other commercial spaces. The basement has been totally altered in plan and in finish.

On the upper floors, the U-shaped configuration of the hotel consists of a center main stairway and two elevators running perpendicular to smaller side halls. These hallways connect a basic matrix of

suites of four rooms each (generally a bath, two bedrooms and a sitting room), although various interconnecting doors could be opened or closed to expand or contract the suites. Generally the sitting rooms faced the street or rear court to take advantage of the light, and the bedrooms were located in the darker inner sections (photograph 5). In recent years the hotel was in single room occupancy and there were resulting partition and plumbing changes. The rooms are densely packed, the halls narrow and the light and air marginal.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hotel Gerard is the oldest high-rise structure remaining in the Times Square section of Manhattan as well as one of the earliest examples of a multiple-family dwelling remaining in the city. Designed in 1893-4 by architect George Keister, the hotel is also architecturally significant as an unusual example of German Renaissance and Northem Gothic decorative motifs applied to a high-rise building. Built at a time when the Times Square area consisted mainly of brownstone rowhouses, the Hotel Gerard is both a reminder of that neighborhood's original residential character and an example of its early commercial development.

The German Renaissance detailing imparts a distinct character to the exterior, which, stylistically, makes the building unusual in New York City. The superscale gables, sloping roof, attenuated quality of the urns, and floral ornament are generally similar to Northern European Renaissance examples, while the heavy rigid control of the facade suggests severe German models, such as the Pellerhaus in Nuremburg (1605). Stylistic influence of this type is atypical in high-rise buildings in New York City, and the closest other examples are the Dakota apartments (1884) and the Plaza Hotel (1907) - both designed by Henry Hardenbergh and listed on the National Register. On the Gerard, the adaptation of this relatively obscure style is representative of the experimentation with Renaissance forms concurrent with the Renaissance Revival of the early 1890's.

George Keister, the architect of the Gerard, was a long-time New York City architect, practicing from 1887 into the 1930's. Most of his earlier work was for speculative tenement house builders, including several projects for the builders of the Gerard. In the twentieth century he designed a number of theaters and theater-related buildings.

As originally built, the Gerard was representative of the gradual adoption of the high-rise, multiple dwelling by the upper classes. At first it served as an apartment hotel with central dining, but as the Times Square area became more commercial, it was converted for transient use. In design and in use, the Gerard is an important midway illustration of the change in residential urban living from the earlier nineteenth-century brownstones to the tall apartment houses of the 1910's found along West End, Park and other avenues.

The Gerard is the oldest high-rise structure remaining in the Times Square area as well as one of the earliest tall multiple dwellings remaining in the city. It is the most visible reminder of the time when that area was in large part residential. At the time of its



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
