### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Mount Pleasant is located on the south side of Indian Falls Road in the predominantly agricultural community of Corfu, Genesee County. The thirty-one acre nominated property includes the main dwelling, the original dwelling constructed on the property which now serves as a garage, a brick smokehouse, an equipment shed, a barn and three wells. The nominated property includes that portion of the original farm which retains integrity as a farm complex. A portion of land to the south which was divided from the rest of the farm by the construction of the New York State Thruway in the 1960's has not been included because it has been physically and visually separated from the farm complex. There are no extant structures on this separate piece of land. The nominated property is bounded on the south by the New York State Thruway. A three-foot high retaining wall of dry field stone surmounted by slabs of Medina sandstone forms the border between the property and Indian Falls Road to the north. Farmland lies beyond the arborvitae hedges which form the east and west borders. The original driveway still circles the residence.

Constructed in 1861-1862, the main dwelling is composed of five distinct sections. The main block is a two-story rectangle with a low-pitched hip roof topped with a cupola. Projecting to the west of this section is a one and one-half story wing with a shallow hip roof. To the rear of the west wing is a series of three gable-roofed additions, including the carriage house and outhouse. All of the components have clapboard sheathing.

The three-bay facade of the main block has a side entrance distinguished by a porch supported by clustered columns with a decorative scrollwork balustrade. Floor to ceiling four-over-four double-hung sash with louvered shutters and cornice lintels mark all the elevations. Both the main block and cupola have overhanging eaves supported by large paired brackets with pendants. The cupola has six-pane fixed windows and a large pinnacle on top.

The facade of the west wing has a porch across the first story of the main facade with detailing identical to that distinguishing the main entrance. Fenestration consists of floor to ceiling four-over-four double-hung sash with louvered shutters and small attic story windows on all elevations. A brick flue punctures the west elevation of the wing.

Positioned perpendicular to the rear of the west wing is a one and one-half story gable-roofed addition with projecting eaves supported by paired brackets with pendants. A brick chimney rises from the center of the wing. The western elevation of this addition features a small porch similar to those found on the facade of the main block and west wing. Floor to ceiling four-over-four double-hung sash, attic story windows, and a wooden door also distinguish the west elevation. The east elevation features a shed roof directly below the attic story windows. At the turn of the twentieth century, the original entrance porch, which resembled the others, was enclosed. The interior wall retains the original floor to ceiling windows and wooden door.

In 1959, this porch was extended one window length and an entrance was added in the middle.

Attached to the rear of this wing is the carriage house, a one-story, gable-roofed structure topped with a belfry. The carriage house retains its original sliding wooden doors on the east and west elevations as well as its belfry bell. At the extreme southern end of the structure is the outhouse, which retains its plank door and fixed window.

With the exception of a few minor changes in the floor plan, the interior of Mount Pleasant has remained relatively unaltered and retains the original mid-nineteenth century door and window surrounds, moldings, wainscoting, pine hardwood floors, high ceilings (nine feet on first floor, eight feet on the second floor), and mahogany stairway. The first floor originally consisted of a hall, parlor, living room, dining room, four bedrooms, kitchen and pantries. In 1910, the four bedrooms were enlarged into two with closets in each. In 1945, the south bedroom was extended into the front parlor and two more closets were added. The hall and front parlor (now a bedroom) retain their original ornamental plaster ceiling medallions. The cold pantry features slate walls and floor covering, while the kitchen pantry retains its marble shelves. The layout of the second floor has remained unaltered and features two suites of master bedrooms with one smaller room off each and one suite containing a large bedroom and two additional smaller rooms. The cupola has window seats and eight-foot ceilings. The only interior alteration on the second floor has been the enclosure of the back stairs leading to the cupola.

Directly to the south of the main house stands what is reputed to be the original dwelling. The date of construction is not known although the building is present on an 1854 map. The one-story structure has vertical board siding and a shallow gable roof. Originally containing two bedrooms, a pantry and a closet, the building has been modified to serve as a garage. The structure retains its original paneled door, window openings, and shed-roofed addition on the west elevation.

The original smokehouse stands to the east of the garage. The one-story brick structure has a stone foundation and shallow hip roof. To the west of the main dwelling is a two and one-half story, timber-framed barn. Constructed c. 1925, the barn features a gambrel roof and vertical board siding. A variety of window types punctuate the elevations including six-pane fixed sash, six-over-six and two-over-two double-hung sash. The eastern elevation has large sliding wooden doors. Situated to the southwest of the barn is a timber-framed equipment shed constructed at the same time. The one-story, shed-roofed structure is composed of vertical board siding and has large sliding wooden doors on the north elevation. The building has lost its original window sash. The original barns stood west of the property, approximately where the present structures are located, and formed a barnyard with the east side remaining open. The barns were destroyed by fire between

1910 and 1920. The well which marked the east side of the barnyard still remains as do the other two original wells to the east and west of the dwelling.

Distinguished by outstanding integrity, Mount Pleasant remains today as a working farm complex with much of its original acreage intact.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Mount Pleasant is architecturally significant as a fine example of an Italianate style residence in the midst of a well-preserved mid-nineteenth century farm complex. Constructed in 1861 by Abram Mook, a wealthy farmer instrumental in the early growth and development of the area, the structure is a blend of high-style Italianate detailing and ornament on a vernacular house form and plan. The complex retains many of its period outbuildings including the original dwelling (pre-1854), several gambrel-roofed wells, a privy, a carriage house, a smokehouse and a distinctive, early twentieth century dairy barn. Distinguished by outstanding integrity, Mount Pleasant remains today as a working farm with much of its original acreage intact.

In 1793, Robert Morris of Philadelphia bought the land west of the Genesee River from the state of Massachusetts. After retaining a strip for himself surrounding the river, Morris sold the remainder to the Holland Land Company, a group of Dutch investors. The Indian title to the land was not extinguished, however, until the signing of the Big Tree Treaty in 1797. In the following year, Joseph Ellicott, the first agent of the Holland Land Company, began his survey of western New York. In 1802, Genesee County was created with Batavia as the county seat. The county embraced all of the Holland Land Purchase, approximately three and one-half million acres.

The area surrounding Pembroke was aided in its growth by the location of Batavia directly to the east. Batavia grew quickly as a result of its location at the junction of major north-south and east-west Indian trails and its position as the hub of new transportation routes created by Ellicott. In opening up the tract to settlement, Ellicott placed emphasis on the Genesee Road (Route 5) which continued west from Batavia through East Pembroke. As time passed, many other roads emanating from Batavia were built to open all areas of the Holland Land Purchase, including State Route 63 which went northwest to Lockport. This route proved invaluable when, in 1825, the Erie Canal was built through Lockport. With the coming of the railroad, the area once again became a transportation center.

In 1841, the huge area had been subdivided into eight counties. As the region became inhabited, the Iroquois Indians, the original settlers, were confined to an area surrounding the present town of Pembroke. As white settlers advanced on the land, the Indian reservation shrunk until its present boundaries were set in 1858 and the immediate surrounding region was fully open for development.

Abram Mook moved to North Pembroke in 1847 and settled on Lot 29 on the north side of the Tonawanda Creek, just east of the reservation boundary. Tax records reveal that he owned several parcels of land in the surrounding

region. Little is known regarding Mook's early life except that he was born c. 1822 in Pennsylvania to a German father and an American mother and had a sister and two brothers. It is unclear when the family moved to New York although Abram's sister, Effie, married and settled in North Pembroke in 1837. The 1850 census lists Mook's worth as \$3,500 and notes that he had a wife, Amy, two children and his youngest brother living with him. Active in the area's early growth and development, Mook built the Indian Falls-Batavia Road from the south part of North Pembroke road westward to the present New York State Route 77 prior to 1854. In 1854, he purchased the north part (thirty acres) and the southwest quarter (fifty-seven acres) of Lot 20. Two years later, he moved onto the thirty-acre parcel and lived there until 1861 when his dwelling burnt. During this period, having purchased farms on both sides of the Tonawanda, Mook and his brothers built a suspension bridge across the Tonawanda. Measuring forty-eight feet long, the bridge was completed in October, 1860. The census of the same year reveals that Mook's family had grown by two and that he had acquired additional farm laborers. The census also stated that he had amassed huge land and cash holdings.

In 1861, Mook employed seven carpenters to build his twenty-room Italianate style dwelling on the fifty-seven acre parcel of Lot 20. While the new residence was under construction, Mook and his family occupied the original dwelling located on the property, which was built prior to 1854. This structure still exists although it has been altered for use as a garage. The yellow pine and ornate trim for the Italianate style residence was shipped to Lockport via the Erie Canal and carted by horse and wagon to the construction site. The residence represents a typical, rural interpretation of the Italianate style, one which combined Italianate ornamental features on a traditional house type. The ornate porch, floor-to-ceiling windows, scrolled brackets with pendants, and cornice lintels are features associated with a relatively high-style example of the Italianate design. However, these ornate features have been applied to a vernacular three-bay, side-hall house form with a smaller three-bay wing. The inclusion of several projecting wings to the rear, including the carriage house and privy, also reflect a more vernacular building tradition.

The highly decorative and spacious interior includes nine bedrooms, a cupola, an entrance hall, living room, parlor, kitchen and two pantries. Distinctive interior features include decorative plaster ceiling medallions, a slate-covered pantry, pine woodwork, and a two-story mahogany stairway. The dwelling is especially remarkable for its integrity of detail.

Abram Mook died in 1908 and the following year his son lost control of the property through foreclosure. Frank and Charles Stang bought Mount Pleasant for \$5,210 on November 29, 1909. The Stang brothers were active politically in the town of Pembroke and held various civic positions. In 1945, Charles sold the property to his nephew, LaVerne Lamkin, the present owner.

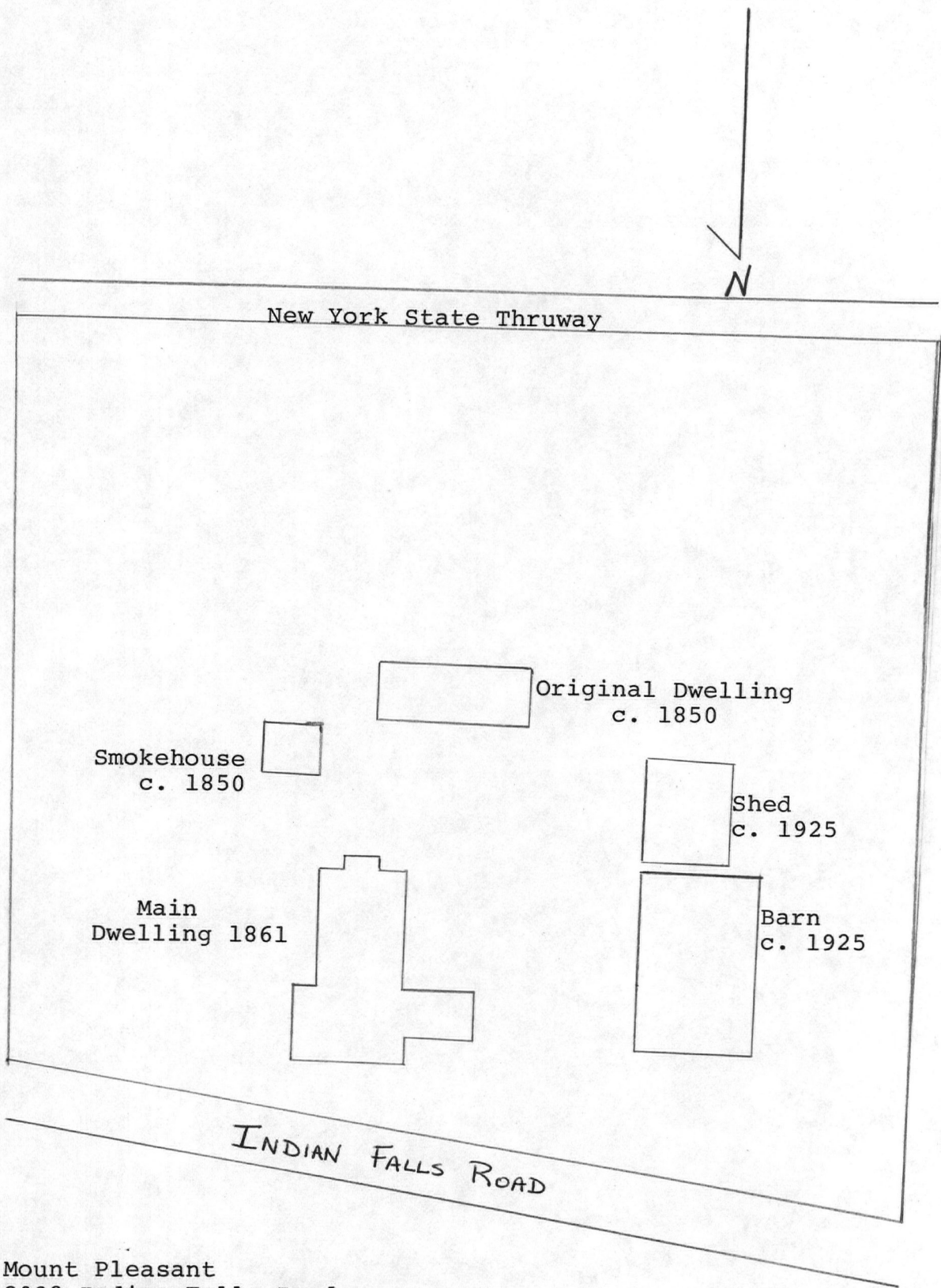
