PANTIGO ROAD HISTORIC DISTRICT
Village of East Hampton Multiple Resource Area
East Hampton, Suffolk County, New York

3. Description.

The Pantigo Road Historic District is located in the northeast corner of the Village of East Hampton along the north and south sides of Pantigo Road, the major highway connecting East Hampton with Amagansett and Montauk to the east. Pantigo Road and its adjacent side streets are predominantly residential with commercial development and farmland present in areas outside of the district boundaries. A total of 43 contributing buildings are present in the historic district including 27 principal buildings and 16 outbuildings. Five non-contributing principal buildings including a modern clinic and four non-historic houses are also present. No structures objects or sites have been identified within the district.

The boundaries of the historic district separate the historic resources contained within from non-historic commercial and residential properties at the perimeter. The east boundary is formed by Amy's Lane and the south boundary by the rear and side lot lines of nos. 76 - 148 Pantigo Road and 30 Egypt Lane. This boundary separates ten historic houses from non-historic residential development south along Egypt Close and North Circle. The west boundary follows the east side of Egypt Lane and Accabonac Highway between nos. 30 Egypt Lane and 28 Accabonac Highway, including eight significant houses and excluding several small office parks and several automobile dealerships to the west. The north boundary is formed by the Long Island Railroad right-of-way, rear and side lot lines between 83 and 101 Pantigo Road, and the southern curb of Pantigo Road between nos. 110 and 148. This boundary separates several of the district's earliest and most significant properties from later development north of the railroad and from a car dealership and telephone company substation on Pantigo Road East of no. 101.

Houses within the historic district vary widely in terms of design and dates of construction, ranging from the early eighteenth century Dayton-Stratton House at 89 Pantigo Road to a group of modest American four-square and Colonial Revival style houses built during the first three decades of the twentieth century. The majority of the contributing houses in the district are sheathed in wood shingles and represent vernacular house forms typical of their respective dates of construction. At least four houses within the historic district were built as farmhouses, and several, including the c. 1800 Jacob Hedges House at 73 Pantigo Road

and the 1864 Stephen Hedges House at 16 Accabonac Highway, retain historic barns and outbuildings.

Although the majority of the houses in the district are relatively simple in their basic design and finish, many show evidence of period tastes, craftsmanship and construction practices. The c. 1715 Stratton-Dayton House, for example, retains an exposed timber framework in the west room with chamfered edges and lamb's-tongue stops, characteristic of early building practices in East Hampton. The c. 1800 Jacob Hedges House at 73 Pantigo Road includes a simple Federal style entrance surround at the facade and consistent period trim at the interior. The 1864 Stephen Hedges House at 28 Accabonac Highway and the c. 1870 alterations to the Nathaniel Barnes House at 148 Pantigo Road are both ornamented with elaborate scroll-sawn porch brackets of the post-Civil War period. Details common to the Queen Anne and Shingle styles during the late nineteenth century, such as fish-scale patterned shingles, rounded window reveals, and small paned attic window sash, are evident in the c. 1890 J. M. Strong House at 55 Pantigo Road, the J. M. Strong Jr. house at 12 Accabonac Highway, the Conklin House at 97 Pantigo Road and the c. 1902 Boyle House at 20 Egypt Lane. Jerkin-headed roofs, often associated with Craftsman style houses, are illustrated in the 1913 Russell House at 76 Pantigo Road and Colonial Revival style details including classical entrances porches, doors with sidelights, quarter-round attic windows and clapboard siding distinguish otherwise plain houses at 80 and 88 Pantigo Road.

Streetscapes within the historic district are generally characterized by deep building setbacks (except at the western end) and very old maple and elm trees, which form an arched canopy over Pantigo Road and portions of Egypt Lane and Accabonac Highway. Open farmland at the rear of 148 Pantigo Road and at 28 Accabonac Highway reinforce the district's rural character. An annotated building list describing each property within the historic district follows:

4. Significance.

The Pantigo Road Historic District is architecturally significant in illustrating a continuum of vernacular residential architecture in East Hampton between c. 1715 and c. 1920. The district includes significant and relatively intact examples of typical East Hampton house types which correspond to broad periods of development in the village. Generous building setbacks, ancient maple and elm trees and the survival of a number of agricultural outbuildings evoke the rural character historically associated with the village but present in few locations today.

PANTIGO ROAD HISTORIC DISTRICT
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Pantigo Road dates back to East Hampton's settlement era and was part of the highway connecting the village to Amagansett and grazing lands to the east. Farm sites appear to have been established along the western end of the road in the early eighteenth century, as evidenced by the c. 1715 farmhouse built by Samuel Dayton at 83 Pantigo Road. Other houses associated with the agrarian development of the village, and in some instances accompanied by surviving farm outbuildings, include the c. 1800 Jacob Hedges house at 73 Pantigo Road, the c. 1825 Nathaniel Barnes house at 148 Pantigo Road and the 1864 Stephen Hedges house at 28 Accabonac Highway. Each of these houses reflects the vernacular building practices of its day and each is constructed with heavy framework and is sheathed with wood shingles. The c. 1715 Dayton house, despite alterations, retains evidence of its early saltbox-shaped configuration and incorporates exposed framing members at the interior detailed with chamfered edges and lamb's tongue stops. The c. 1800 Hedges house is a representative example of a "half-house" in plan but includes a full second story and a gable roof. The house is also significant for its surviving Federal style trim. The c. 1825 Nathaniel Barnes House is a typical side-hall house of the early nineteenth century. Its elaborately ornamented porch reflects later nineteenth century tastes for the "picturesque." And, finally, the Stephen Hedges house, built in 1864, reflects an adaptation of a common early nineteenth century side-hall house type with more up-to-date vertical proportions and bracketed trim.

Land within the district was further subdivided in the mid-nineteenth century and a number of unpretentious houses were built along the road between the earlier farmhouses between 1848 and 1900. Several of these houses were built for or occupied by village mechanics and businessmen, including mill operator Felix Dominy, wagon maker Benjamin Worthington, blacksmiths John Youngs, James Gay and J. M. Strong, and realtor and livery stable owner J. M. Strong Jr. Notable among this group are the simple but intact houses of Felix Dominy, built in 1889 at 60 Pantigo Road, and J. E. Gay, at 65 Pantigo Road, built in 1891. Both feature gabled three-bay side-entrance facades, two-over-two double-hung sash windows and pointed attic windows. The houses built for J. M. Strong and his son J. M. Jr. in the 1890s (55 Pantigo Road and 12 Accabonac Highway, respectively) are both vernacular expressions of late Victorian period architecture and feature the picturesque massing, L-shaped verandahs and small-paned attic windows often associated with the Queen Anne style. Several other houses built for members of old East Hampton families in the area during this period reflect similar but more modest design qualities including the 1882-1883 Jonathan Baker house at 118 Pantigo Road, the c. 1890 G. B. Conklin house at 97 Pantigo Road, the c. 1900 T. Stratton House at 89 Pantigo Road and the c. 1902 J. Y. Strong House at 59 Pantigo Road.

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The Shingle style, especially popular in East Hampton's burgeoning summer colony at the turn-of-the-century, is represented by only three houses in the historic district. These include two similar gambrel-roof cottages built c. 1902 at 20 and 24 Egypt Lane and a larger more typical example of the style, also featuring a gambrel roof, built c. 1900, at 102 Pantigo Road. Otherwise, the growth of the village as a summer resort is only indirectly reflected within the historic district.

The last phase in the development of the historic district resulted in the construction of a group of middle-class houses for year-round residents that reflect the influence of early twentieth century catalogue company house plans. In design, these houses are derived in part from the Colonial Revival style, the Craftsman style and the so-called American four-square mode. Representative examples of each include the c. 1920 modified Colonial Revival style at 80 Pantigo Road, featuring a small columned entrance porch and paired and tripled windows units; the 1913 Craftsman style Fred Russell house at 76 Pantigo Road, with its characteristic jerkin-headed roof; and the c. 1916 American four-square built for Norman Cleaves, with its typical hipped roof and hipped roof dormers. Most of these later houses are sheathed in unpainted wood shingles in keeping with East Hampton's vernacular tradition and are compatible with earlier buildings in the historic district in terms of scale and texture.

Compared with the areas immediately adjacent to Pantigo Road and its related side streets, there have been relatively few changes within the historic district since 1920. Where new buildings have been introduced, their affect upon the historic character of the district has been mitigated in most instances by appropriate setbacks and the survival of old trees.
