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DESCRIPTION

The Daniel Supplee Cobblestone House is located on the west side of Dundee-Himrod Road just north of the village of Dundee in the rural town of Starkey in southeastern Yates County. The former farmhouse and non-contributing garage are located on a 1.5-acre parcel surrounded in all directions by cultivated land. A severely deteriorated barn, once a part of the extensive Supplee farmstead, is located across the street; due to lack of physical integrity, in addition to being under separate ownership, the barn is not included in the present nomination. The topography of the area is relatively hilly. Lawns dotted with mature deciduous trees surround the house. A long, curving macadam driveway runs along the south side of the house, providing access to the garage slightly behind and south of the main house. Because virtually all of the historic farm dependencies have been lost and most of the once-extensive farm is no longer directly associated with the farmhouse, only the 1.5 acres presently associated with the cobblestone building are included in the nomination. (It is beyond the scope of the present nomination to evaluate the former farm for its possible significance under criterion A in the area of agriculture.)

The house, built during the 1830s and remodeled sometime before 1876, began as a vernacular, L-shaped, late Federal/early Greek Revival farmhouse constructed of variously colored and irregularly shaped field cobbles laid four stones per quoin. Built into a steep hillside, the house is two stories tall on the north side and two and one-half stories tall (i.e., with a fully exposed basement) on the south side. The cobblestone superstructure rests on a parged fieldstone foundation. Its early nineteenth century origin is reflected in the two-story, three-bay, side-hall form with one-story side wing, trabeated front entrance with half sidelights and a transom light, louvered, semi-elliptical fanlight in the front gable end, six-over-six, double-hung sash windows, and simply tooled limestone lintels and sills. Its late nineteenth century "modernization" is reflected in the broad overhanging eaves of the gable roof, the elaborate brackets along the wide frieze, the Victorian porch at the front entrance and the wrap-around verandah across the front and side elevations of the side and rear wings. The porch and verandah retain their original decorative woodwork, including ornate columns, segmentally arched friezes with scallop

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trim and denticular cornices. (The balustrade of the verandah is a non-contributing twentieth century addition.) The original decorative brick chimneys from the Victorian era have been replaced by simple brick chimneys during the twentieth century.

The rear wing, probably added during the Victorian era remodeling, is a one-story, gable-roofed frame ell extending from the southeast corner of the side wing. The ell rests on a raised stone foundation and is sheathed with clapboard siding. Like the early nineteenth century cobblestone sections of the house, the rear wing has broadly projecting, bracketed eaves.

The primary spaces on the interior of the cobblestone main block recall the farmhouse's early nineteenth century origin, with a variety of simple, Greek Revival features such as molded trim around door and window openings (some with bold corner blocks) and the original staircase with narrow, square balusters, a simple rail and a turned newel post. Wall-to-wall carpeting covers the original wide plank floor boards. The rear wing has been modernized over the years and no longer retains any historic fabric.

The farm dependencies once associated with the extensive Supplee holdings no longer survive, with the exception of a severely deteriorated barn across the street and under separate ownership. The only other feature included in the nomination is a large, non-contributing four-bay garage dating from the twentieth century. The rectangular building is constructed of concrete blocks and is surmounted by a gable roof sheathed with modern asphalt shingles.

SIGNIFICANCE

The Daniel Supplee Cobblestone Farmhouse, built during the 1830s and remodeled sometime before 1876, is architecturally significant as a largely intact example of the cobblestone method of construction in New York State, and as a representative example of mid-nineteenth century vernacular Federal/Greek Revival style rural domestic architecture in the Finger Lakes Region. The former farmhouse embodies the distinctive characteristics of the cobblestone method of construction in the use of medium-sized field cobbles (2 1/2" - 3") laid in horizontal rows and bonded with limestone mortar, the use of limestone quoins to decorate and stabilize the corners of the building and the use of limestone lintels to ornament and reinforce the door and window openings. Believed to have been built in the 1830s, the Supplee house can be categorized as either a late Early Period building (ca. 1825 - ca. 1835) or an early Middle Period building (ca. 1835 - ca. 1845) because of its irregularly shaped, variously colored stones laid four cobbles per 12" quoin on the front facade and three cobbles per quoin on the side elevations. The relatively crude masonry treatment (e.g., the comparatively large, rough stones, the simple horizontal mortar treatment and the unarticulated vertical mortar joints) suggests that the house is a fairly early manifestation of the cobblestone building technique in Yates County.

The Supplee house is one of nine extant cobblestone buildings in Yates County, eight of which survive intact and are included in the present Multiple Property Submission. The other seven are the Bates Farmhouse (ca. 1836), the Barden Farmhouse (ca. 1843), the William Nichols Farmhouse (ca. 1844), the Jephtha Earl Farmhouse (ca. 1850s/1860s), the Angus Farmhouse (ca. 1831-34), the Young-Leach Farmhouse (ca. 1836) and the Dr. Henry Spence Farmhouse (ca. 1848). (The ninth extant cobblestone building, the Olney-Royal Farmhouse [ca. 1835], is in the process of being remodeled; the present alterations have severely compromised the physical integrity of the former vernacular, Early Period farmhouse.)

Both the Robert Roudabush Inventory and Carl Schmidt's Cobblestone Masonry (1966) identified eleven extant cobblestone buildings in Yates County, two of which no longer survive: the Noble-Preston House (Schmidt, page 207) on the east shore of Canandaigua Lake in Benton and District #5 Schoolhouse (Schmidt, page 208) in Potter.

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The eight surviving, intact farmhouses can be categorized into groups according to the levels of sophistication displayed in their cobblestone masonry; these groups generally parallel the Early, Middle and Late Periods as outlined by renowned cobblestone scholar Carl F. Schmidt in his Cobblestone Architecture (1944) and Cobblestone Masonry (1966). As Schmidt notes, these periods tend to be fluid and overlapping; an "unsophisticated" later building can look just like an earlier building and a "sophisticated" earlier building can easily be mistaken for a later building. Other features of the building and the history of the area are often better indicators of the exact period of the building. Nonetheless, for purposes of comparison, the buildings can be grouped as follows. Early, relatively roughly executed, vernacular cobblestone dwellings include the Bates, Barden and Supplee houses; they feature irregularly shaped, sized and colored stones laid three or four cobbles per quoin. The Angus and Young-Leach houses also feature relatively irregular field cobbles, but they are particularly distinguished in their herringbone masonry pattern. Built during the 1830s, neither the Angus nor the Young-Leach house features the highly sophisticated, finely crafted herringbone articulation characteristic of later cobblestones. Nonetheless, they are notable for their early embodiment of the technique in the statewide context; furthermore, they are the only examples of the technique in the local context. (There is only one other example of the herringbone technique in Yates County: It is the small cobblestone smokehouse associated with the William Nichols Farmhouse.) The Nichols and the Earl houses represent more highly sophisticated masonry techniques associated with the later Middle and Late Periods: both feature small, nearly perfectly matched reddish, oval, lake-washed cobbles set at an angle and laid six cobbles per quoin. Joint work in the mortar is meticulously articulated. The anomalous Spence house features relatively small, even stones, but they are laid without the careful attention displayed in the Nichols and Earl houses and are set within an excess of unarticulated mortar, giving the otherwise large and grand house a rather vernacular character overall.

The Supplee House is also architecturally significant as a representative example of nineteenth century rural domestic architecture in Yates County. It began as a typical late Federal/early Greek Revival style vernacular dwelling, as reflected in the standard two-story, three-bay, side-hall main block with one-

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story side ell, the medium pitched gable roof, the six-over-six, double-hung windows with simple wooden trim and massive stone lintels, the Federal inspired louvered lunette in the front gable end, the Federal style entrance details (e.g., fluted pilasters, narrow transom and half-sidelights) and interior woodwork (especially in the front hall). At some point during the Civil War era, broadly projecting bracketed eaves were added. A wrap-around verandah was added to the front and side elevations of the side ell and a hip-roofed entrance portico was added to the front facade of the main block. The details of the verandah and front portico are virtually identical, clearly suggesting the same date of construction. However, the illustration in the 1876 Combination Atlas and Map of Yates County depicts the side verandah but not the front porch. Artistic license may have been taken in the 1876 illustration, but additional research must be conducted to clarify the exact dates of the verandah and front porch. For the purposes of the present nomination, however, both elements are significant reminders of late nineteenth century, Picturesque building fashions in the region.

The massive barn depicted in the 1879 illustration has lost too much physical integrity to be included in the present nomination. (The barn, located northeast of the former farmhouse across Dundee-Himrod Road, is currently under separate ownership.) It is not clear how many other dependencies were ever associated with the Supplee farm. Currently, there are no other extant historic support structures associated with the house; the only other element on the nominated property is a large, non-contributing garage.

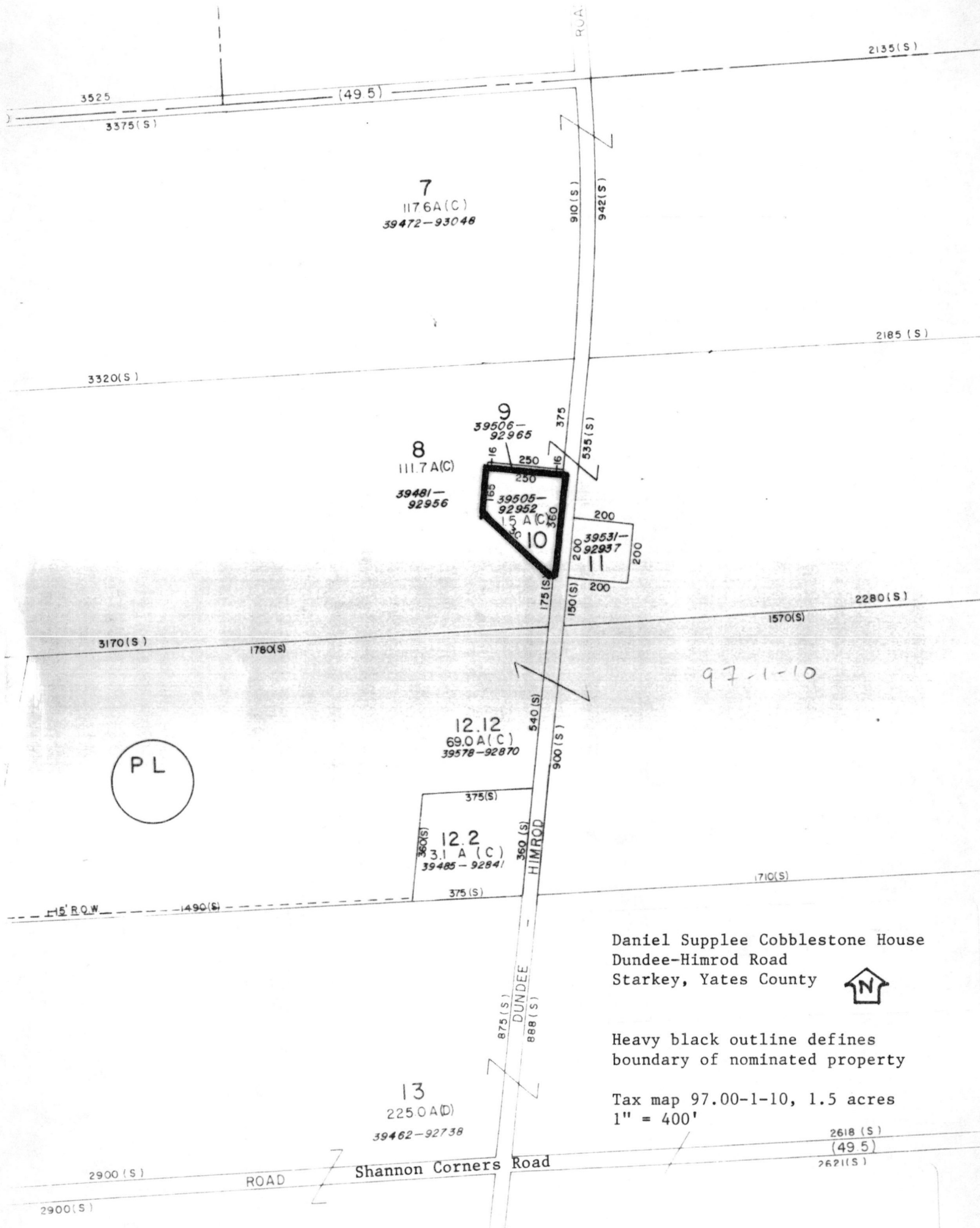

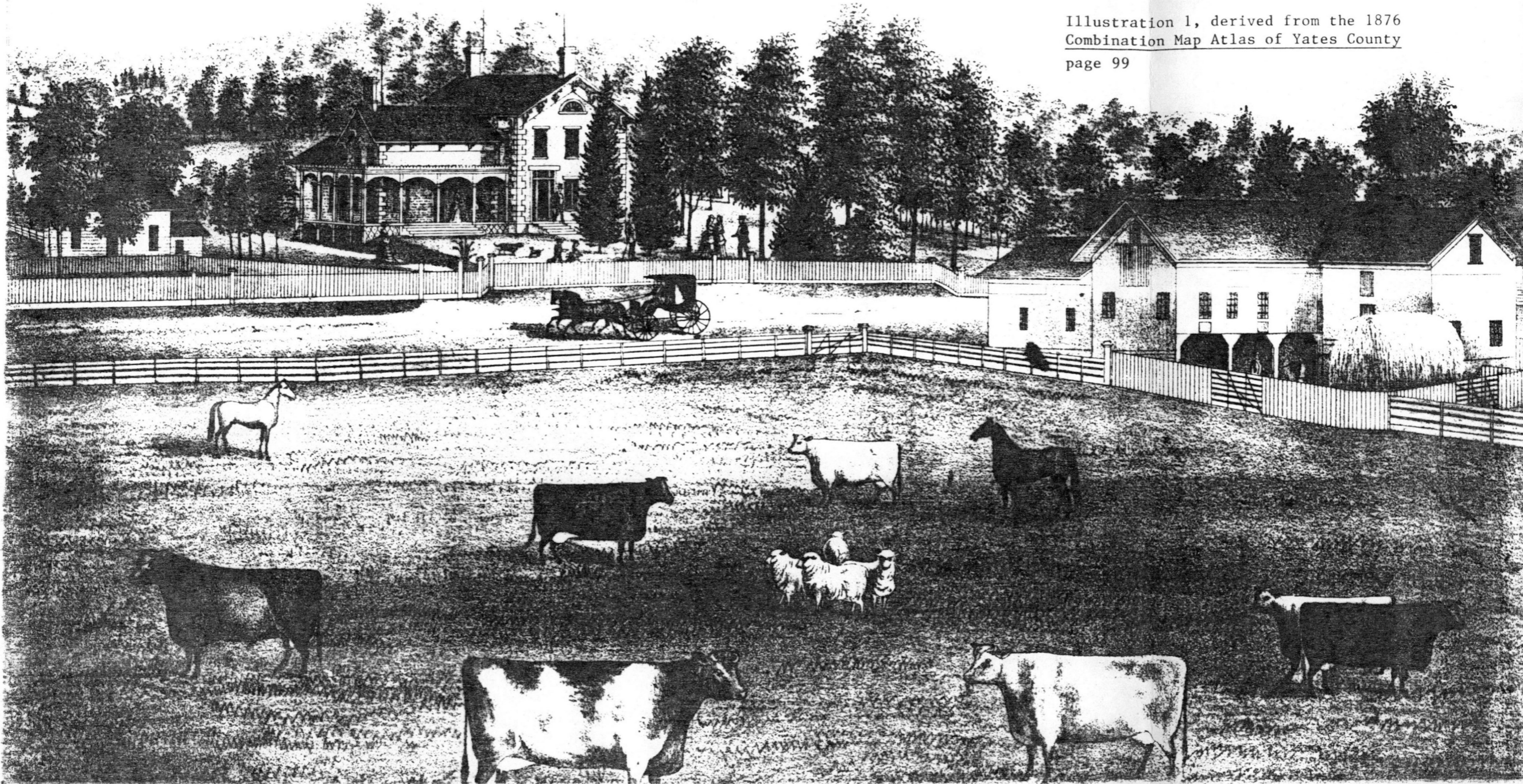

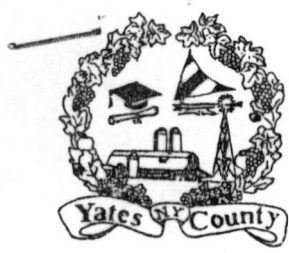

Dear Mr. Lehman:

The Yates County Planning Board recommends State and National Registration of the historic sites listed on the enclosed sheet. The Planning Board finds that the distinctive construction method of these cobblestone farmhouses makes them unique in both New York and the nation.

Not only are these cobblestone structures important to the state and the nation, but they are an important component of Yates Counties unique rural character. It is the Planning Boards policy to give historical sites special consideration in the planning process.

Listing on the State and National Historic Registries will give these cobblestone structures the recognition they very much deserve.
