Narrative Description

The Callicoon Methodist Church, built 1871, and Parsonage, built 1889, form a late nineteenth century vernacular church ensemble. They overlook Church Street (NYS Rte. 97), flanked by, and across the street from, residences, most of which were constructed 1890-1915. The wooded hillside to the east forms a backdrop. Although there were few buildings in the area when the church itself was constructed, the design of surrounding buildings and spatial relationship remains essentially unchanged from that revealed in early twentieth century photographs.

The church and parsonage are set back from Church Street, with a stone sidewalk slightly above street level, and steps leading up to the terrace on which the buildings are located. There are front and side lawns to the north and west of both church and parsonage. A paved driveway runs between the church on the north and the parsonage on the south, leading to garage/barn at the rear (east). Immediately behind the church and barn, there is a steep wooded hillside.

The church building is a vernacular frame building, with modest details derived from the Romanesque Revival style. Facing Church Street, the front of the building is surmounted by a spire, a square steeple tower forming the central bay of the building. Exterior steps lead up to an arch, centered within the tower. Over the recessed double door, a semi-circular stained glass window is designed around the words "Methodist Episcopal Church." The body of the building is gable ended, with the central tower piercing the front gable. A two-story, cross gabled addition, at the rear, houses a parish hall, kitchen, lavatories, and Sunday school rooms. The roof is asbestos shingled. The concrete foundation was added with excavation of the basement and installation of the central heating system in 1905. There is an interior brick chimney between the sanctuary and parish hall sections of the building.

Three stained glass windows decorate each side of the church, and two stained glass windows are placed on the front (west) facade flanking the entrance. The windows, installed in 1914, match in size, general design, and iridescent coloring. Each of the side windows includes a central oval picture depicting a religious theme (e.g., cross and crown, Bible).

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The interior of the church is divided into vestibule/balcony, sanctuary, and parish hall. The front entrance leads into the vestibule, a shallow room stretching across the front of the building. Three doors from the vestibule open into the center and side aisles of the sanctuary. A door at the southwest corner leads to the basement; there is also an exterior basement entrance on the south side of the building. On the west side of the entrance, a stairway with varnished wood banister leads to the balcony. The balcony stretches across the front of the building above the vestibule, overlooking the sanctuary, and providing access to the belfry. The sanctuary provides seating for approximately 300, with pews divided by a central aisle, and with flanking side aisles. At the east end of the sanctuary, a raised platform accommodates enclosed choir and organ stalls on north and south sides, a brass altar rail across the front, and an central open platform furnished with altar table and lectern. Walls are plastered. The ceiling is of pressed metal, painted white, in excellent condition. Two electrified chandeliers are suspended over the center aisle. Door frames, window frames, the paneled front of the balcony, and moldings are unornamented, flat wood, unpainted, and varnished to match the wooden pews. On the east wall behind the altar platform, two doors lead to the parish hall. Symmetrically designed varnished wood arches form a backdrop, with a cross within the central arch.

The parish hall is attached to the rear of the building, forming an "L" shape. It can be entered through doorways from the sanctuary or through a south side exterior door. The main room is two stories high, with an elevated stage and back stage area at the north end. Originally designed to allow for basketball games, its ceilings are high and its large, double-hung windows are protected with wire mesh. A kitchen is located at the rear of the building. Lavatories are located at the south end of the building. Sunday school and storage rooms are above the kitchen, reached via an enclosed stairway at the southeast corner.

The parsonage is a cross gabled, wood frame building, sided with white asbestos shingles. It is two-storied, three bays by two bays, with a one-bay extension at the rear. Center steps lead up to a one-story porch, with millwork balustrade and posts stretching across the front of the building. The centered entrance door is

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surmounted by a transom light. Windows are one-over-one, double hung, with peaked wooden moldings. There are two brick chimneys. The foundation is of mortared stone. The rear one-bay addition is rectangular in configuration, with a north entrance, and no particular architectural distinction. The interior is largely unaltered. On the first floor, there is a living room, a dining room, a kitchen, and a pastor's study (in the rear addition). A central vestibule and stairway face the front entrance. Bedrooms and bath are on the second floor.

A two-story, gabled barn, built in 1894, is used as a garage. It is clapboard sided, with a narrow frieze band below the roof line. The barn is located at the rear of the terrace portion of the property, near the southeast corner of the church. The first floor is used as a garage and storage area. The second floor, reached by south side interior stairs, is also used for storage. Although the main door has been changed to accommodate automobiles, the loft door above it remains unaltered.

Alterations have been carefully documented: church basement excavated and furnace installed (1905); stained glass windows installed (1914), parish hall added (1916); barn door altered (ca. 1921); choir stalls and arches behind the altar added (ca. 1938); parish hall altered to include kitchen and Sunday school rooms (1941). The building of NYS Route 97, in the late 1930s, lowered the street level, and necessitated construction of steps leading from the street to the church and parsonage.

All buildings are in good condition.

Significance Narrative

The Callicoon Methodist Church and Parsonage satisfies Criterion C, Criteria Consideration A, for its significance as an intact example of vernacular religious architecture in the Upper Delaware Valley, from the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The church ensemble consists of a frame church building constructed in 1871 with Romanesque inspired details, a connected church hall built in 1916, a parsonage built in 1889, and a carriage barn built in 1894. The church itself is typical of vernacular Protestant meeting houses of the post Civil War era in rural New York, and is distinguished by its simple rectangular massing, a projecting bell tower at the west facade, and modest architectural details which conform to the religious fashions of the period. The church is also noted for its late Victorian period interior, modified in 1914 with the installation of stained glass windows, but largely unaltered since. Overall, the church complex appears much as it did during the growth years of the railroad boom in Callicoon, and remains as one of the valley's most distinctive examples of vernacular church architecture.

The Callicoon Methodist Church is the largest of the community's Protestant congregations, and achieved early prominence in the area through the success of the Methodist tradition of small classes and circuit riding preachers. The origin of Callicoon's congregation dates back to 1831, when the first Methodist classes were held at St. Tammany's Flats, across the river from Callicoon. Circuit riders served local classes at St. Tammany, and later at Callicoon. In 1860, a church was formally organized at Callicoon, and a building was erected on the flats near the confluence of the Callicoon Creek and the Delaware River. In less than a decade, the congregation, responding to the community's railroad based expansion, had outgrown its building. The church on the flats was sold to the Roman Catholics in 1869, and work was begun on a new building, to be located on the hillside to the north. Until the new building was completed, the congregations shared quarters, each holding services in the old church on alternate Sundays; this began a strong tradition of mutually supportive denominational churches in the community, which continues today. The village cemetery now occupies the property where the old church once stood.

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The new Methodist Church was dedicated in 1871. In 1889, the parsonage was built next door. A barn was added five years later. All three buildings are in use today. Reflecting the growth of the congregation and accommodation to modern conveniences, a basement was excavated and a furnace added in 1905, stained glass windows were installed in 1914, and the barn was converted for use as a garage ca. 1921. In the 1930s, when NYS Rte. 97 replaced the unpaved village street, the grade was changed and front steps were added to provide accessibility to church and parsonage. Reflecting a greater emphasis on office work and in-office counseling, a pastor's study was added to the rear of the parsonage in the 1960s.

For both congregation and community, however, the most dramatic change took place in 1916, when the parish hall (then called "The Community House") was added to the rear of the church. As documented in its souvenir dedication program:

When the Rev. Robert Elliott Gardinor was appointed to the Callicoon charge, April 1, 1916, he found, after a careful survey, that the church building was inadequate for the needs of the rapidly growing Sunday school, which in now the third largest in the county . . . Moreover, there was no place in the village for the young people to assemble . . .

Supporters from all denominations in the community contributed to the project. One of the selling points was inclusion of "basket ball facilities," since the local school did not, at that time, have a gymnasium. By 1941, when the parish hall was renovated, the school had a gymnasium. Upgraded kitchen facilities and new Sunday School rooms were identified as the primary needs, and that was the focus of the alterations.

The Callicoon Methodist Church has traditionally been the largest Protestant church in the Callicoon area. The parsonage provides housing for the minister of a four-point charge, serving Methodist Churches at Callicoon, Hankins, Fremont Center, and North Branch. Its history has followed the history of the community at large. The congregation was founded in the earliest days of the settlement, serving a dispersed, largely agricultural community. The railroad gave the hamlet its original name, Callicoon Depot,

and was largely responsible for the growth of the community, and consequently the growth of the church. The economic base feeding its nineteenth and early twentieth century membership was dependent upon railroad supported industries such as boarding houses and creameries. All of the extant buildings on the church property were built during the Erie Railroad and Callicoon's heyday: 1850-1920.

The style and construction of these buildings is characteristic of church and residential architecture in the study area during the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. The parsonage and barn are vernacular buildings, with Italianate and Queen Anne styles. The church, with its prominent tower and steeple, finely crafted architectural elements, and well maintained condition, is one of the largest and most distinctive religious buildings in the valley. Among the most notable of its architectural elements are the pressed metal ceiling and varnished woodwork in the sanctuary. The complex continues to evoke the feeling of turn of the century rural America, as it was found in the Upper Delaware Valley.

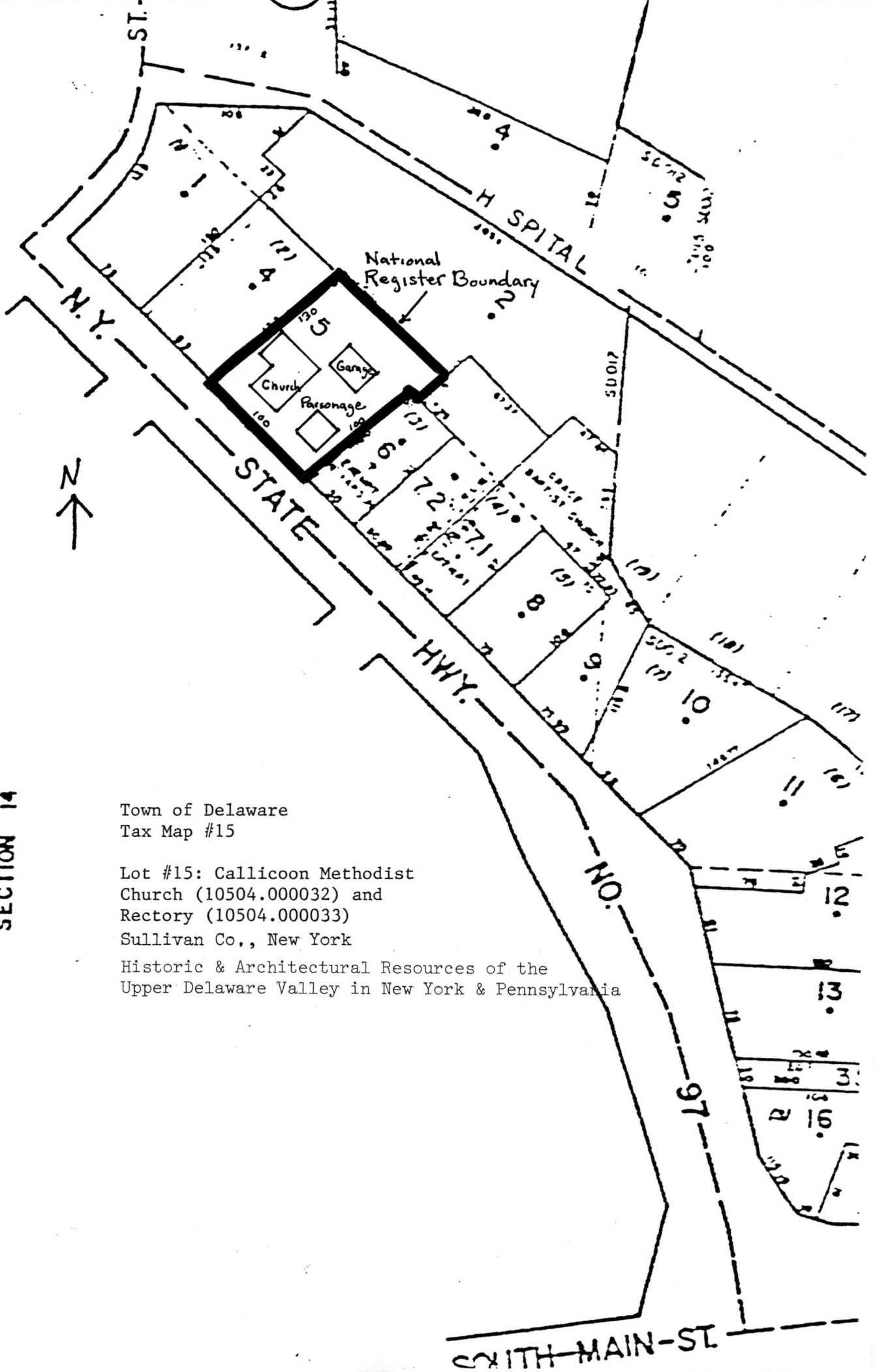

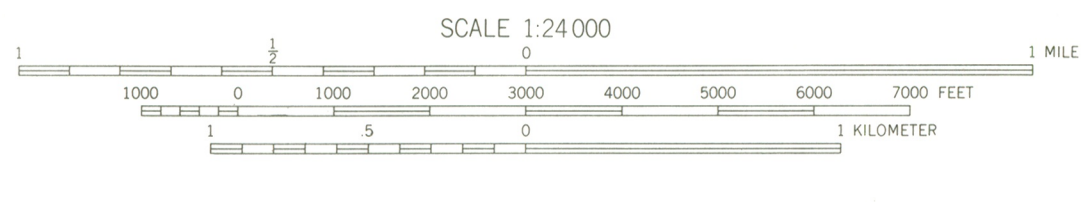
