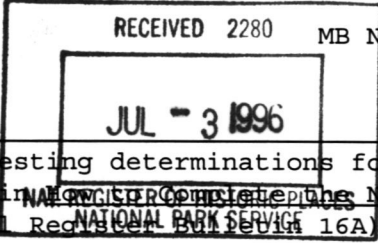

The Jacob Shafer house occupies a 7.59 acre parcel on the east side of Kaisertown Road in the agricultural and developing residential south western section of the town of Montgomery. Kaisertown Road, a country lane which borders the property, is characterized by open land used for the pasturing of dairy cows, farmhouses and modern residential dwellings. Several nineteenth century farm complexes stand along the road. Across the lane from the nominated property is a large tract currently undergoing development into a golf course and some residential housing. On the tract appear to be the remnants of an early mill along with an intact foundation ruin of an eighteenth century farmhouse. The integrity of these features are currently threatened. Several residences are visible from the Shafer house. To the southeast is a stone dwelling which incorporates the ruins of the pioneer residence of Dedrick Shafer and, northwest, across Kaisertown Road, a modern dwelling.

The farmhouse and outbuildings are sited relatively close to one another with grassy lawns surrounding the house and stretching outward towards the garage and sheds. Kaisertown Road marks the western boundary of the property. The farmhouse and outbuildings are set on top of a small hill which gradually slopes downward. To the south of the farmhouse and across the driveway is a non-historic, non-contributing two car garage which was recently constructed on the site of a swimming pool. East of the garage is the foundation ruin of a nineteenth century barn complex which is historic; contributing. Within the barn ruin is a small shed (non-historic; non-contributing). To the rear of the garage is another shed (non-historic; non-contributing). On the east side lawn of the farmhouse is a stone-lined well which is a contributing component of this nomination. The heavy black outline on the attached county tax map identifies the boundary of the nominated property. The boundary line coincides with the current legal boundaries of the property. The Shafer house is not located within an historic district.

The Jacob Shafer house property consists of a Greek Revival era farmhouse, a barn ruin, a stone lined well, two sheds and a garage on a 7.59 acre parcel located on the east side of Kaisertown Road.

The farmhouse, erected in 1842, is a two story three bay frame building with a one and one-half story wing attached to the east wall of the main block. The entire structure rests on a raised stone foundation and both sections are surmounted by gable roofs. The roof on the west block is pierced on the west end by two brick chimneys and the roof on the smaller east block is pierced on the east end by a tall brick chimney. The east block also contains a twentieth century shed dormer across a portion of the front. The house primarily features six-over-six, double hung sash which, for the most part, possess their original panes of glass. The windows of the main block are flanked by early louvered shutters. The farmhouse also retains a majority of its original clapboards which are maintained in a remarkable state of preservation. Two period porches are attached to the main block; one on the front

corresponding with the main doorway and the other corresponding with a less formal doorway on the back side of this block. Both porches have their original decorative balustrade--the only of its kind in the town of Montgomery.

The front facade of the house, oriented south toward the driveway, displays a variety of design features associated with the Greek Revival era. The front doorway is in high Greek Revival style with a double raised panel door flanked by two side lights which, themselves, are flanked on each side by a set of flat pilasters. Below each side light is a raised recessed panel and, above the door and side lights is a large transom which is flanked by a set of short flat pilasters. Raised panels surround the outside of the doorway opening. The front door, as with many of the interior doors, retains its original mortise lock. Other examples of Greek Revival era detailing on the front facade, as well as on the two sides and rear of the main block, include corner pilasters which support a wide frieze and windows with shouldered architraves above which are wide lintels. In addition there are also the front and rear porches of the main block.

The windows on the main portion of the house are symmetrically arranged. On the front and rear, beside the doorways, are two windows. Directly above, on the second floor, are three windows that are in line with the two windows and doorway below. The west side of the main block contains five windows; two of which are on the first floor, two, directly above, on the second floor and a smaller attic window positioned directly below the peak of the gable. This window has a decorative sash currently hidden behind louvered vents. The fenestration on the kitchen wing is not symmetrical. What was originally a porch across the front was glassed in and made into a room, however, the four original porch columns remain in situ. The rear of this block contains a bay window where there was probably originally two six-over-six windows. The east end of this wing contains its original fenestration; two second floor gable windows and, below on the first floor, two windows, one of which is larger than the other. The southern most window on the first floor of this gable is in line with the northern most of the second floor gable windows. Projecting outward from the basement of the kitchen wing is a long narrow structure, the back wall of which is stone and the front is frame. This may have originally served as a tool shed or workshop.

Interior room configurations and much of the nineteenth century fabric survives. The main hall along with the adjacent front and back parlors contains high styled Greek Revival era woodwork. Battered, shouldered architraves stretch from the floor to just below the ceiling and enclose a raised paneled field below each window. The parlor mantle is rather unusual compared to those in other houses in this area of the period. It consists of two flat pilasters which support an entablature and two shorter pilasters. The entablature bows outward with a square panel in the center. The back parlor, no doubt, had a mantel identical to this one. It was removed in the mid twentieth century when the fireplace was bricked off and the flue used for the furnace in the basement below.

The central hall features a stairway which contains a turned newel post, spindles and railing in a pattern common to the era. They are made of mahogany. Below the stringer of the stairway is an exquisite paneled wall covering the stairway to the basement which is accessible to the rear of this wall. As mentioned earlier, there are two entries to the hallway from the exterior; one at the front of the hall and the other at the back. Interior molding of the front doorway is more formal than that of the rear doorway. In each of the upper corners of the front entry are square ornamental blocks. Baseboard molding in the hall along with the parlors, is very wide and comprised of complex profiles.

Woodwork on the second floor of the house, as would be expected, is less formal than that on the first. The stairway to the attic, directly above the stairway to the second floor, is enclosed by a wide beaded board wall.

It is important to note that the house plan for the Jacob Shafer house, three bay main block with side gables and a side kitchen wing, is a form that persisted from the late eighteenth century into the nineteenth century in and around Montgomery. As the Greek Revival era swept through New York State, in most rural areas the side gable house form was rotated establishing the gable end as the principle facade. This provided the house with a more classical "Greek Temple" appearance. To this form side wings with separate entrances were added creating the classical "gabled-el" house form. Perhaps another hold over exhibited in the Jacob Shafer house are the underscaled six-over-six windows. Many of the homes of this era had larger windows. This house, through its proportions and detailing, displays the wealth of its owner who, no doubt, could have easily afforded the larger and more stylish windows when the house was built. Perhaps it was his preference to use the smaller windows or maybe the preference of the builder.

Across the driveway from the house is a two car garage and, adjacent to it are two sheds--all of which are non-contributing elements of this nomination. The one shed is constructed within the foundation ruin of the barn complex. This ruin is a contributing component. On the side lawn of the kitchen wing is a contributing stone line well. The shaft has been filled and covered over. It was positioned close to the basement keeping room.

The Jacob Shafer house (1842) is a unique example of survival in the town of Montgomery. The farmhouse is architecturally significant as an intact example of a mid-Greek Revival era residence. It fully illustrates the adaptation of the Greek Revival style into the local vernacular and reflects the evolution of the local building tradition from the pioneer box-like farmhouses of the first settlement period, as the original stone Shafer farmhouse on the adjacent tract started out as, into the more standardized and generalized forms, styles and decorations of the first half of the nineteenth century. The Jacob Shafer house stands as a testament to the endurance of this house form which persisted for over half a century in and around Montgomery. The high quality of the detailing of this building coupled with its country-like setting and two contributing support structures (barn ruin and well) enhance the significance of the nominated property.

Jacob Youngblood Shafer was the grandson of Dedrick Shafer who is believed to have built the stone house on the adjacent parcel in the second half of the eighteenth century. The ruins of his pioneer structure are incorporated in the stone walls of the present house on that tract. From Dedrick, the farm passed to his son, Daniel, who was born ca.1762. During the course of his life he had married three times--two of his wives died young. His third wife was Eve and they resided on the farm where they raised their family. Their son, Jacob Y., one of several children from this marriage, was born in the old stone house in July of 1808. When he reached the age of thirty-one, Jacob surely must have known that his father intended to leave him the old farmhouse as Daniel's will was written in 1839, four years before his death. Perhaps the thought of living in an antiquated stone house was not appealing for a young man especially of his means. Besides, in this period, many town of Montgomery homes were either being remodeled or entirely replaced with up-to-date structures. In 1842, Jacob had the present building constructed on a rise of ground within view of his grandfather's pioneer dwelling. The new house was among the finest to be built in the Kaisertown district. At this location, Jacob operated a large farm which, according to the 1862 farm map of the town of Montgomery, consisted of 98 acres. He died intestate in September or October of 1892 leaving his only surviving child, Mary S. Comfort, his only heir at law.

Mary was the wife of Harvey Daniel Comfort, a well known businessman in Montgomery. Both he and his brother, Walter, owned the Union Dairy which had an outlet in Newburgh. They became involved with the manufacturing of ice cream which was considered an extravagance at the time and, not too distant from the farmhouse, Harvey set up the first commercial ice cream plant in Orange County. Both Harvey and his wife resided in the Jacob Shafer house where they raised their family of six children--two of which died young. In 1924 the Comforts sold the house and property to Helen Loghry Rector who, in 1936, sold the farmhouse and acreage to Kate Seredy, an author of national fame at the time. Some of Seredy's books were written while living in this house. During her ownership, she sold the ruin of the original Shafer stone dwelling to May Masse of the Viking Press who had rebuilt and enlarged the pioneer dwelling and made it into an English or Irish style farmhouse with interior whitewashed walls and exposed beam ceilings.

From Seredy, the Jacob Shafer house passed through several hands before being purchased by Carl and Trudy Larson in 1974. When the Larsons purchased the property, the parcel had been whittled down to 7.59 acres.

As noted earlier, the Shafer house embodies a variety of high style design features associated with the Greek Revival era. These include the front and rear porches, the corners pilasters and wide frieze above on the exterior and the woodwork of the interior. These design features survive in only a handful of homes in and around the town of Montgomery. The corner pilasters and wide frieze are similar to those on the nearby Daniel Waring house (NR Listed 1995). The newel post with spindles and handrail in the Shafer house resemble the ones at both the Daniel Waring house and the Jacob Bookstaver house (NR Listed: 1996). Interior window and door trim of the first floor main block of the Shafer house share some similarities with the Smith house on Route 17K near the Brick Church. The overall house plan resembles that of the earlier Mason House located on Union Street in the Village of Montgomery. The closest overall comparison to the Shafer house would be the Sears house on River Road. This house, however, does not display as high degree of wealth of Greek Revival era design as does the Shafer house. It is also not nearly as well preserved as the Jacob Shafer house.

Although the wing of the residence has undergone limited renovations the dwelling, nevertheless retains an outstanding degree of architectural integrity. The Shafer house retains some of the most significant interior finishes of the period in the community. As such, the Jacob Shafer house is an important example of its type and is a significant visual and architectural landmark in the community.

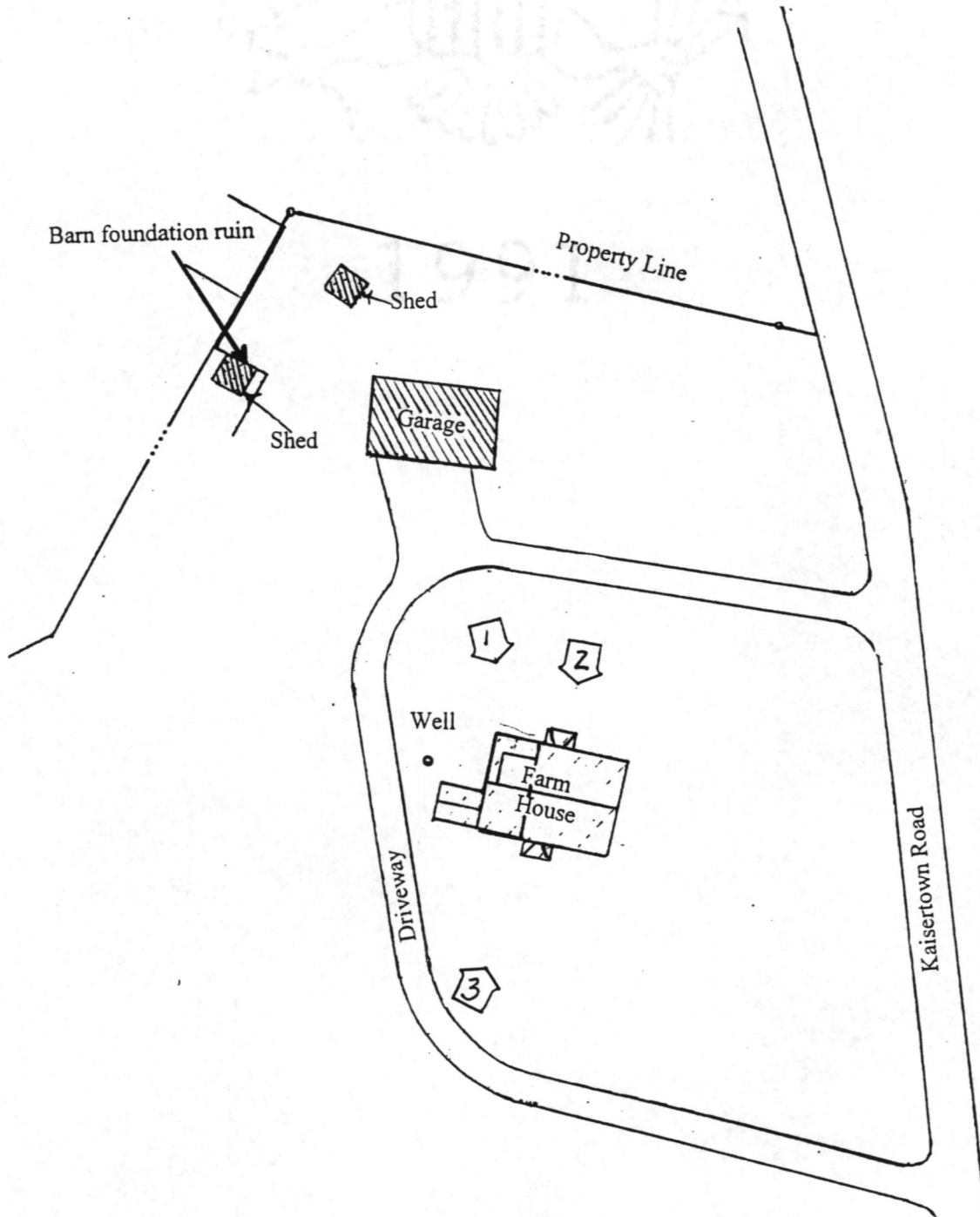

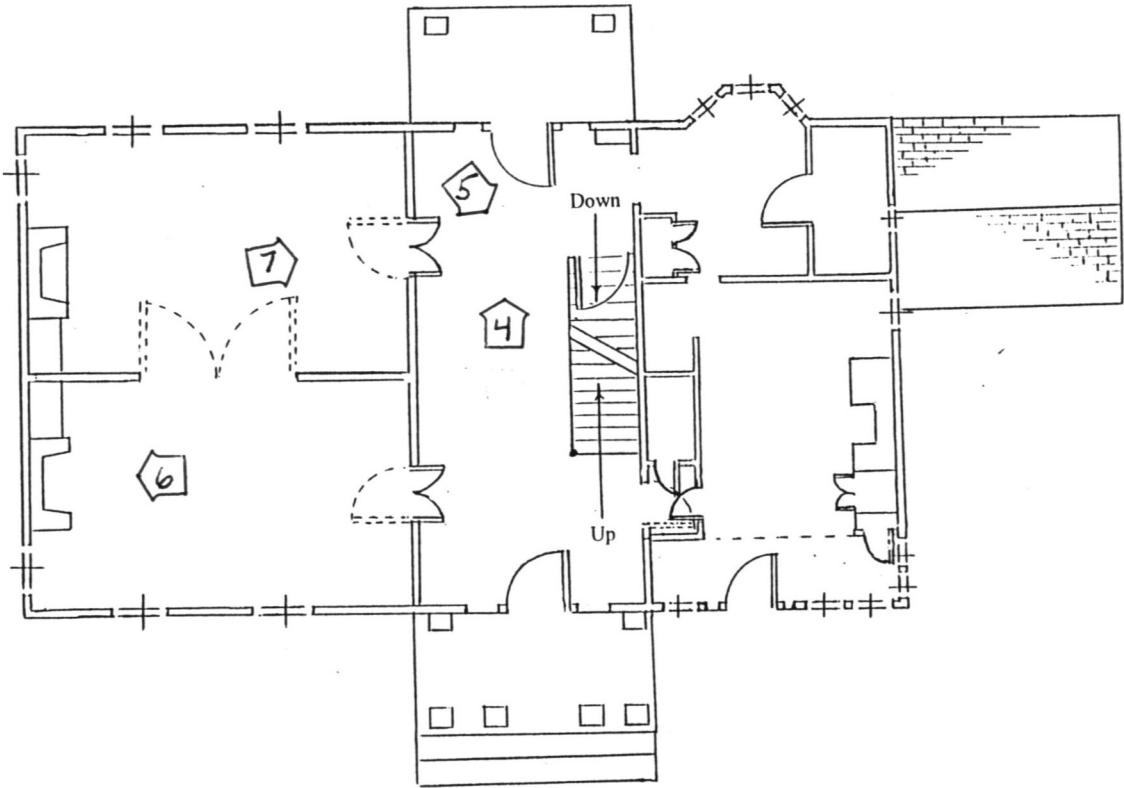

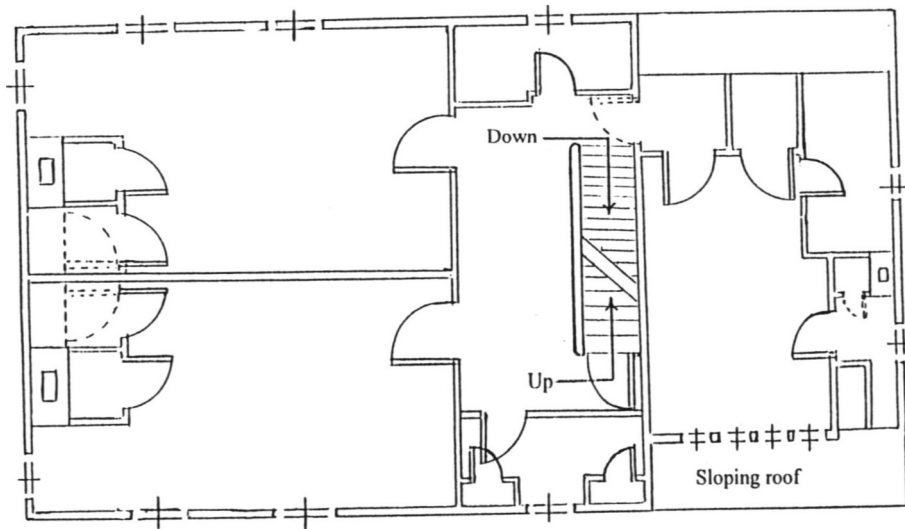
Site Plan



The Jacob Shafer House



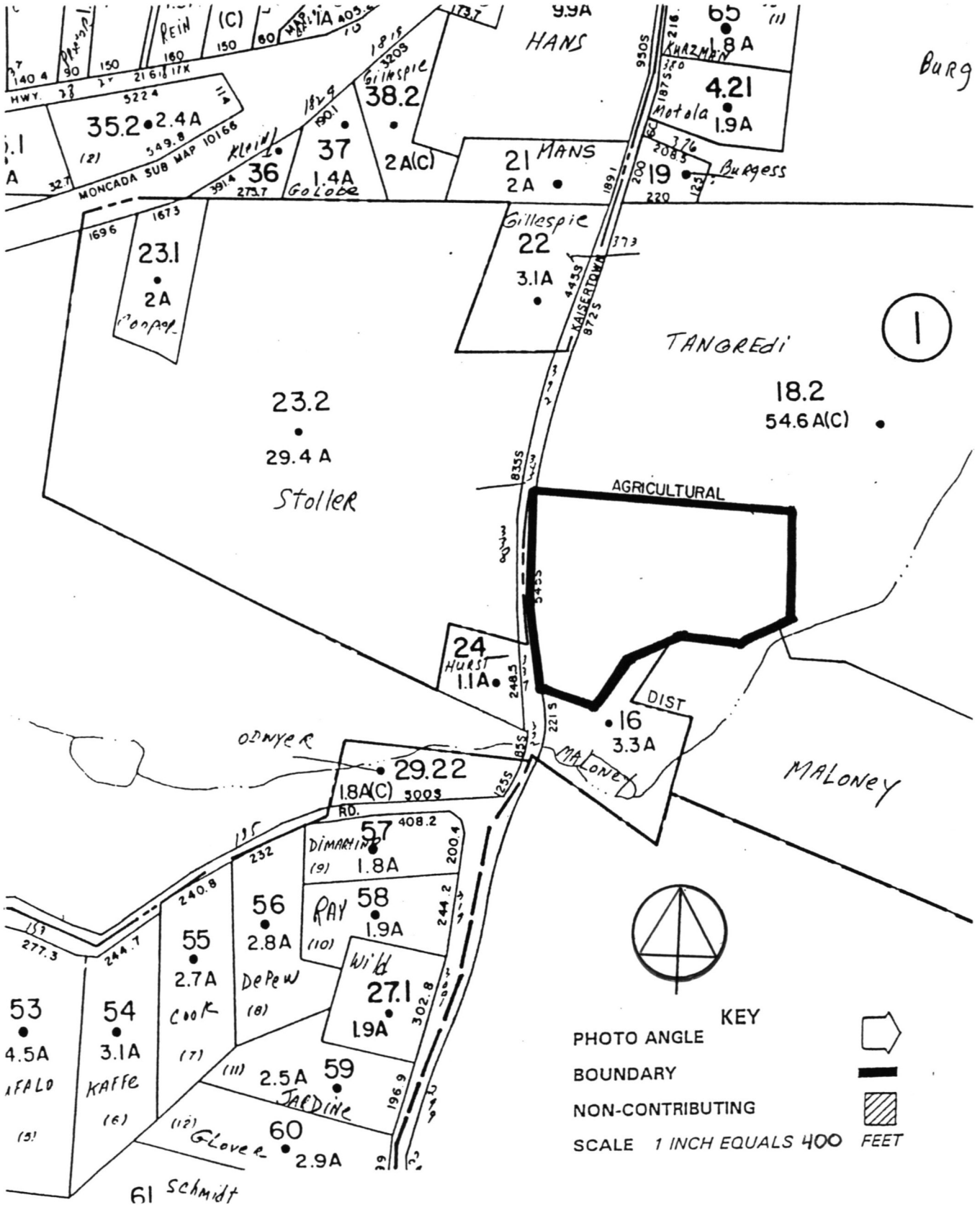
FIRST FLOOR PLAN

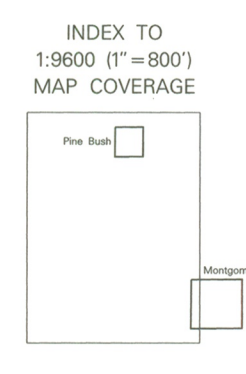
