Description

The Poughkeepsie Savings Bank, a Neoclassical building built in 1911-12, is located on the east side of Market Street in the center of the city's commercial area. It stands among other commercial buildings of similar size, materials, and dates of construction. There does not appear to be a potential historic district on the block; however, there are several buildings within a block of the bank that are individually listed on the State and National Registers of Historic Places including the Collingwood Opera House and Office Building at 31-37 Market Street, Dutchess County Court House at 10 Market Street, Farmer's and Manufacturer's Bank at 43 Market Street, New York State Armory at 61-65 Market Street, Young Mens Christian Association (Old) at 58 Market Street, Poughkeepsie (Old) City Hall at 228 Main Street, and the Poughkeepsie Trust Company at 236 Main Street. Directly adjacent to the bank on the north is a four-story early-twentieth century commercial building and directly adjacent to the south is a seven-story early-twentieth century commercial building. The latter building is now part of and connected to the bank at the lobby level, but it is not included in the nomination as it was not historically associated with the bank. This nomination includes one contributing building.

The bank is slightly trapezoidal in plan, reflecting the constraints of the developed, urban site. The monumental Market Street facade is symmetrically composed, distyle in-antis, with fluted columns of the Roman Ionic order flanked by smooth Roman Doric pilasters. A full pediment with deep entablature bearing the name "POUGHKEEPSIE SAVINGS BANK" is carried by the columns and pilasters. Dentils and prominent modillions enliven the triangular pediment; foliate carving in the tympanum bears a round shield with the initials "PSB." A shallow attic story rises behind the pediment to complete the narrow, rectangular facade. The classically inspired facade is of white, Pennsylvania marble on a base of pale grey granite.

The entry plane is deeply set between the massive columns. Central double doors of bronze-finished aluminum -- originally of wood -- are set beneath a heavy, marble entablature, framed by marble piers to form a tripartite composition. A shallow cornice carried on carved brackets marks the entry bay. Above the entry level, a large window with bronze mullions fills the remainder of the recess and continues the tripartite composition below.

Entrance to the banking room is through the original ornate glass and cast bronze vestibule fashioned with fluted Ionic columns bearing a cornice with dentils and a freely interpreted crest of foliate forms and anthemias.

The approximately 40 x 60 x 40 foot high banking room is the focus of the building's composition. Reflecting the classical vocabulary of the exterior, the banking room walls rise from a wainscot of red numidian marble and are articulated by fluted Ionic pilasters bearing a deep entablature continuous around the room. Between the pilasters, the walls are divided into upper and lower panels by a belt course bearing a greek fret motif.

Steel framing for the flat roof is reflected in plasterwork entablatures spanning the outermost pilasters, leaving a large recessed panel above the center of the banking room. Once containing a large skylight, the recessed central panel has been covered, and interior illumination now relies on modern chandeliers and the expanse of glazing on the west. The original banking room floor of white marble is retained beneath the present carpeting.

The counter line, originally projecting from east wall in a U-shape to provide teller service on three sides, was reconfigured in 1931 to enclose the northeast portion of the room. The original teller counters of cast bronze with classical detailing were retained in the remodelling.

The east wall, above the teller counters, is dominated by a 19 foot by 17 1/2 foot stained glass window mirroring the glazing on the west facade. The large stained-glass window was conceived to commemorate the 400th anniversary of Henry Hudson's exploration of the Hudson River and the 100th anniversary of Robert Fulton's pioneering steamship. The design, created by the D'Ascenzo Studio of New York City, is composed of both streaky cathedral and opalescent glass, up to three layers thick and with applied paint, especially in areas depicting landscape. Hudson's ship, the "Half Moon," is particularly detailed in glass work and lead filigree. After construction of an addition on the west c. 1957 which blocked the stained glass window, artificial back-lighting was installed.

In addition to alterations noted above, the remodelling of the banking room interior in 1931 by Mowbry, Uffinger and Bookwalter -- successors to the original designers -- included partial opening of the south wall in 1948 for expansion of banking functions into the ground story of the adjacent, seven-story building to the south. This area is currently used as offices for the bank's mortgage department and other officers. A modern, two-story passage of concrete block construction on the east provides access to ancillary storage and office areas further east that were an addition to the bank c. 1957. This addition does not contribute to the significance of the bank.

Statement of Significance

The Poughkeepsie Savings Bank, now the Bank of the Hudson, is architecturally significant as an impressive example of Neoclassical commercial architecture in the city of Poughkeepsie. Designed by the New York City firm of Mowbray & Uffinger and built in 1911-12, the bank exhibits the characteristic features of its style and type, including a stone facade dominated by colossal Ionic columns, a triangular pediment, modillioned cornice, and a monumental public banking hall on the interior. The period of significance for the nomination, 1911 to 1931, includes the date of construction of the bank to the remodeling of the banking room in 1931.

The Poughkeepsie Savings Bank was identified in a 1977 inventory of historic resources of the city of Poughkeepsie and, along with nine historic districts and 50 other individual properties (Poughkeepsie Multiple Resource Area), was approved for nomination to the State and National Registers of Historic Places by the Committee on the Registers in 1982. The bank was subsequently withdrawn from nomination due to owner objection. The bank is not specifically mentioned in the cover form for the multiple resource area, but the cover form provides the contextual information for the bank and other related early-20th century commercial buildings in the city of Poughkeepsie.

The present Poughkeepsie Savings Bank building is the third bank of the same name on the same site at 21 Market Street. It was the first savings bank established in Dutchess County, incorporated in 1831 by William Davies (who also founded the Church of the Holy Comforter in Poughkeepsie - National Register listed). After 20 years on Main Street, the bank purchased the 21 Market Street site and built the first bank there in 1853. In 1870, the adjacent lot at 23 Market Street was purchased, and in 1872 the bank was enlarged and remodeled with a cast-iron front. The bank flourished, and in 1911 the firm of Mowbray & Uffinger was hired to design a new building.

The partnership of Mowbray & Uffinger was formed in 1895 when Louis M. Mowbray joined with Justin M. Uffinger to open an architectural office on West 23rd Street in New York City. Mowbray had attended the U.S. Naval Academy and the City College of New York, later joining the prominent architectural firm of McKim, Mead and White in 1888. Less is known of Uffinger's early experience, but it is reported that he had been employed by the office of Richard M. Hunt prior to partnership with Mowbray.

The partners were soon established as specialists in the design of banks and office buildings. Notable commissions in addition to the Poughkeepsie Savings Bank (1911) include; the People's Bank, Brooklyn (1899); People's Trust Company, Brooklyn (1903); Dime Savings Bank of New York in Brooklyn (1907), Hibernia Bank, Savannah, Georgia (1916); Chatham and Phoenix National Bank, Manhattan (1918); Crozer Building, Chester, Pennsylvania (1918); and the First National Bank of Rochester, Rochester, New York (1924, National Register listed).

The construction history of the Poughkeepsie Savings Bank is well documented. The bank was constructed in only six months, during the second half of 1911, and it opened on January 2, 1912. The cost of the new bank was \$85,000. In actuality, the side walls of the previous bank were retained and incorporated into the new building. The contractors and suppliers for all of the various components are as follows:

The Poughkeepsie Savings Bank is a fine example of Mowbray & Uffinger's work, although somewhat simpler than some of their other Neoclassical bank buildings. It is also one of the few Neoclassical buildings in Poughkeepsie - the only commercial building in that style. Like many other banks in urban areas in New York State, the bank is on a relatively narrow lot, so the main elevation is the only elevation visible from the street. To achieve a more imposing effect, the Poughkeepsie Savings Bank and others of the early-20th century were designed as monumental one-story temples with bold classical details, smooth wall surfaces in marble or granite, and large windows framed in bronze to let light into a single huge banking hall.

The banking hall also typifies those in larger urban areas of the early-20th century with its grand scale and elaborate classical ornamentation in plaster, marble, and bronze. Of particular interest is the huge stained glass window installed on the east wall of the banking hall a few months after the bank opened. Designed by D'Ascenzo Studios of Philadelphia, depicting Henry Hudson's *Half Moon* sailing on the Hudson River in 1609. D'Ascenzo Studios designed and created stained glass, mosaics, and murals from 1896 to 1954. Founded by an Italian, Nichola D'Ascenzo, the studio was known for combining the style of 12th and 13th-century stained glass along with the contemporary ideas of John LaFarge and Otto Heinigke. Their work is found in St. Thomas' Episcopal Church and the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City, the National Cathedral in Washington, and the great west window in the chapel at Princeton University.

In 1931, the firm of Uffinger, Foster & Bookwalter (the successor firm of Mowbray & Uffinger) was hired to modernize the floor plan, but other than the teller counter, most original features were retained. In the 1950's (c.

1957) the skylight was covered over and an addition was made at the rear of the building, obscuring natural light from the stained glass mural. The chandeliers were replaced in the 1970's. In 1997, through an amendment to its charter, the bank changed its name to the Bank of the Hudson. Today, although the bank is considered a branch office, the building still receives special affection from customers, employees, bank directors, and the public.

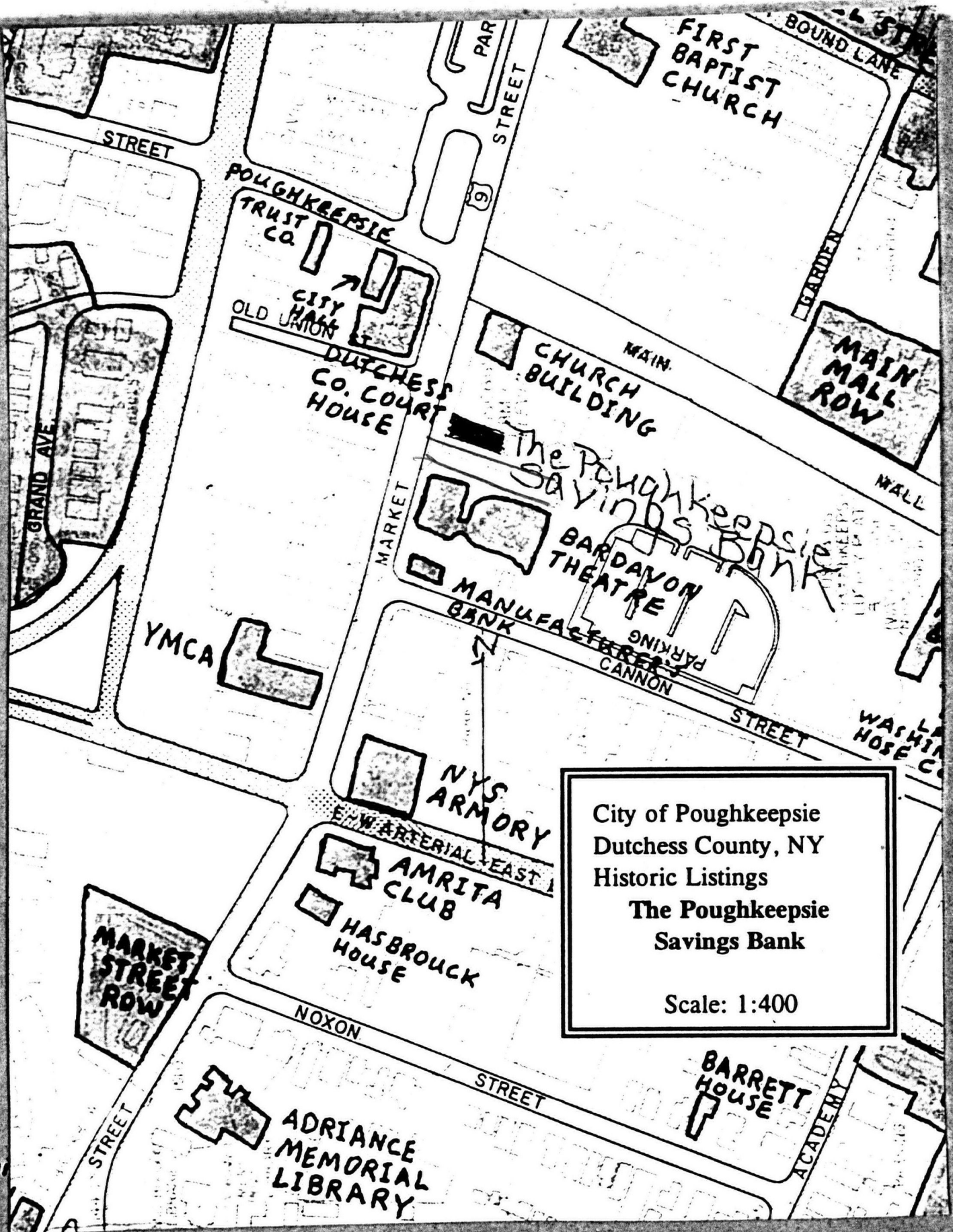

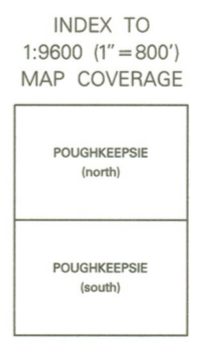
