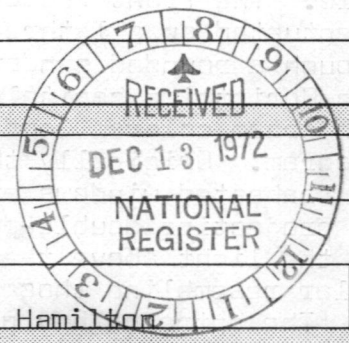

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a three story, red brick, fourteen room house with grey slate gabled roof. It can be described as modified Italian Villa Style. The front facade is symmetrical and the center entrance is accentuated on all three levels. On the first level the entrance is through a rounded sandstone arch supported by slender stone pillars with Corinthian capitals. The two flanking porches are embellished with cream colored wooden balustrades and brackets bearing an "M" monogram. Originally there were balustrades at the porch roof level. The trabeated windows at the first level rise the full room height. The projecting double-door entry is arched to echo the porch entry, and the light above the door is split in the center by a wooden pillar resembling those on the porch.

The entrance bay projection extends through the porch roof to form the base of a tower. The windows on the second level are also trabeated, but in the tower projection they are very slender and are accentuated by a grey slate hood supported by brackets. On the third level the tower stands free from the gabled roof. The steeply pitched roof of the tower, with its own gabled dormer, rises almost another story above the roof line. Originally both the tower roof and the main roof were decorated with ornamental ironwork.

The facade shows a great deal of organization in its detail. The windows are paired at each level but are closer together at each level so that at the roof level they are under one pointed-arch dormer. This emphasizes the vertical element of the tower. The brackets found at each level are regularly spaced along the cornice and become more elaborate and larger at each level so that in the tower each bracket is emphasized by a pointed arch above the cornice. On the south side of the building there is a rectangular bay; on the north side there is a five sided bay. The rear of the house is asymmetrical, and the kitchen wing projects to the northeast. The conservatory which was entered from the dining room was not original to the house, and it has been removed.

The house has been recently renovated by the new owner, the University of Cincinnati. The exterior has been sandblasted to the original red brick. The house had been painted grey although this may not have been the original color. On the interior, the wood-work and parquet wooden floors still have their original finish. - The living room, to the right of the center hallway, was redecorated in the later part of the 19th century by a French artist with painted wall panels of gold, green and lavender and with a ceiling mural of cupids and clouds. Both the walls and ceiling have been repainted recently although the fireplace still retains the original decorations. The original wooden fireplace is stored in the carriage house. The only other alteration to the interior has been the removal of wallpaper from all the rooms. The library, to the left of the center hallway, has built-in book cabinets and this woodwork, as well as the woodwork throughout the house, is walnut. Both the trim around the doors and fireplaces is heavily molded with shouldered architraves.

The house was originally lit with gas. The fixtures were removed on the first floor with the exception of the entrance hall

and dining room. They were kept in the other parts of the house. The original fireplaces, some of marble, remain throughout all three floors. All the windows have the original wooden shutters which fold into the paneled window reveals.

The house retains its basic integrity, and the recent renovation has respected the original architectural character. This house is a good example of a residence for a large family of substantial means built in a fashionable style but one which was adapted by their architect to meet their needs.

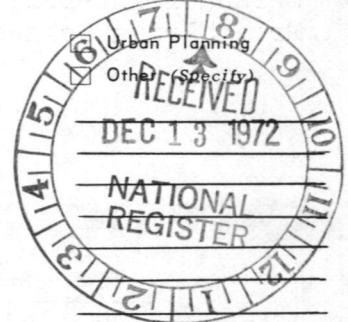

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The house was originally built for Thomas Morrison (1838-1908), who came from County Antrim, Ireland in 1860 to work for Morrison and Cardukes Pork Packers, Cincinnati, Ohio. His brothers, James and John, were members of the firm. In 1897, the company ownership passed to Mr. Thomas Morrison. The company became one of the largest of its kind and pioneered the establishment of foreign trade in the field of meat packing. At one time it was the largest exporter to Europe, especially to Great Britain.

Morrison was active in local civic affairs in the village of Clifton and later Cincinnati. He was president of the Cincinnati Freight Bureau, trustee of the Cincinnati Southern Railway, and president of the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce. He was also an elderman of Emmanuel Presbyterian Church and managing director of the Spring Grove Cemetery Association.

Thomas Morrison's wife, Olivia Proctor Morrison, was the daughter of William Proctor, the founder of the Proctor and Gamble Co. Mrs. Morrison was a founder of Emmanuel Presbyterian Church. Her sister, Elizabeth Ann Proctor, was married to her brother-in-law, John Morrison. Thomas and Olivia Morrison had eight children, many of whom lived in the house until their deaths. Their daughter, Olivia Proctor Morrison, lived in the house until it was sold to the University in 1971.

The house was designed by Samuel Hannaford (1835-1910) in 1873. It is among the earliest of his works still extant. Hannaford was a prolific architect whose works have given this area a distinct character. The Morrison House predates one of his most ambitious works, Music Hall, already on the National Register of Historic Places. Among his other representative works still extant are Cincinnati City Hall, the Workhouse, First Regiment Armory, and St. George Church. In addition to the Morrison House, he designed other residences in Clifton and the Cincinnati area. Hannaford's career remains to be fully documented and his importance as a local architect will emerge further when this is accomplished.

Presently the house is occupied by the President of the University of Cincinnati, Dr. Warren G. Bennis, Mrs. Bennis and family. The house will be used by the President for official entertaining as well as the family residence.

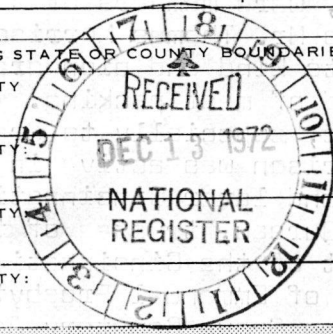

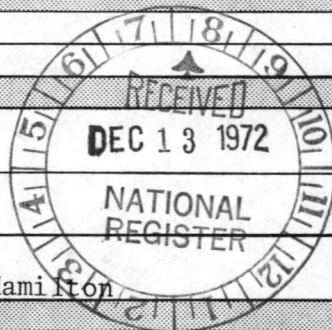

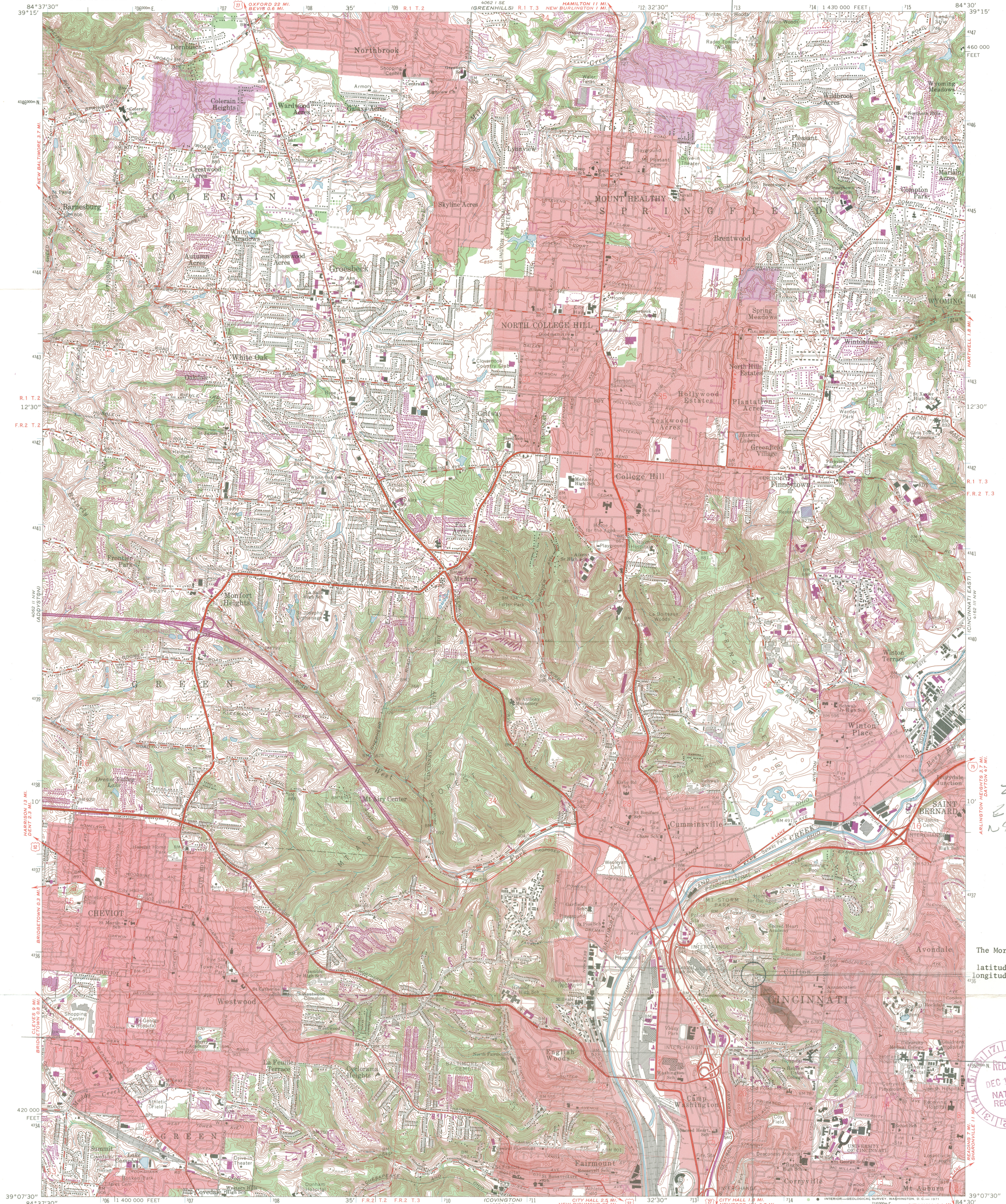
