

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Palace Theatre Building is a rectangular, reinforced concrete structure. Its classically inspired facade of terra cotta with cut stone details along the parapet and corners, contains wide office windows on the second floor, showroom windows for four stores along the street, and a central marquee and recessed theatre entrance.

The interior is even more elaborate. This includes a marble-floored foyer, a carpeted lobby with fireplaces at either end, and a .59 acre auditorium decorated in the Italian Renaissance style. The 3500 square foot stage has a Wurlitzer pipe organ, an orchestra pit, and ten dressing rooms with shower facilities. The broad proscenium arch has floral decoration encased in panels arranged in a sunburst pattern. Beyond this is a central 3/4 ton chandelier hanging from a dome 20 feet in diameter and side walls of roundarches, Tuscan pilasters, and intervening pateras. The auditorium, loge, and two box seats have a capacity of 1950 people.

The lobby is two stories in height with more of a Venetian Gothic character. This is conveyed by frescoes, antiqued stucco, and extensive terrazo and tile work which is carried into the smaller public spaces and restrooms.

The overall impression of the Palace Theatre is that of overwhelming size and grandeur coupled with lavish detail. One is constantly aware that the interior decoration has no functional purpose other than as a stage-set for the audience itself.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE


The Palace Theatre was the largest theater of its kind in Ohio as well as an excellent example of the dramatic possibilities of the late 1920's architectural eclecticism.

The building replaced the Old State Theatre which was destroyed by a tornado that swept through Lorain on June 28, 1924. President Silverman of the Variety Amusement Company wanted the new theatre to be the best of his 16 other properties in Northern Ohio. He spent \$500,000 in eight months for a "tornado-proof" concrete structure which was then the largest one-floor theatre in the state. It featured one of the largest Wurlitzer pipe organs then available and an unusual fire-proof projection room. The interior's palatial image was made possible by craftsmen from the Venetian Art Mosaic Company, the Italian Fresco and Paint Company, and the Cleveland Plastering Company, all of which specialized in theatre decoration.

On the Palace's opening night, April 19, 1928, the talking movie device, the Vitaphone, was heard for the first time in Lorain. Legitimate theater, charity shows, and vaudeville acts soon brought large crowds to what was advertised as the "Temple of Amusement dedicated to the Future Progress of Lorain".

The Palace Theatre Building is an important landmark in the Lorain community, both at the time of its construction and now as the focus of a broad-based effort to restore it. The theatre is both unique for Lorain and typical of an era in which physical luxury and public entertainment were highly regarded.


