### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The McCracken-McFarland House is a wood frame structure, presently resting on a ceramic block foundation. It is sheathed in shiplap siding trimmed with endboards. It features a 5-bay facade, with the main entrance to the house located in the center bay. This entrance features a handsome trabeated door with transom and sidelights presently of red glass. A hipped roof open frame porch, supported by Tuscan columns, is inset two feet from each end of the house and extends across much of the front side. The windows are flat-arched but are set in casings with slightly pitched tops. Presently the windows on the front and sides are two-over-two lights; those on the rear contain the original six-over-six configuration. The main portion of the house is capped with a slate-covered gable roof, distinguished by inset gable-end chimneys. The house appears to have been ell-shaped in original plan. At least two comparatively early wood frame additions were made to the structure: a 26'x20' gable-roof addition on the south side of the rear wall, and a 7'x14' wood frame addition with a 6'x9' open frame porch, appended to the first addition. As noted above, the additions retain the multi-light window sash.

The house originally stood at the northeast corner of Steubenville Avenue and North Eighth Street, and was oriented toward the south. In 1915 the structure was moved about two hundred feet to its present location at which time the present foundation was laid and the porch added. The house was moved by James MacFarland who was about to build a Neo-Classical Revival residence on the site, but who realized the significance of the earlier structure. No outbuildings exist.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The McCracken-McFarland House is one of the few examples of settlement architecture which remain in the city of Cambridge, and is an intact example of Greek-Revival-influenced tradition architecture. It was built for one of the town's most important civic leaders, William McCracken (1787-1872) and was later the home of an exceptional religious leader The Rev. N. William McFarland (1832-1910).

McCracken, a native Pennsylvanian, came to the Guernsey County seat in 1809 and became the village blacksmith. His services were in such demand that his customers collected enough money to pay another man to take his place during the War of 1812. He probably built this house during the 1820's, since a new brick residence was constructed for him nearby about 1830. Although not residing in the older house after completing the newer one, he did retain ownership of the property until 1867, when he sold it to a William Clark for \$2500. In 1868, Clark sold it to Rev. McFarland for \$3500, indicating that perhaps one of the additions to the rear of the house was made during Clark's one-year ownership.

William McFarland was born in New Athens, Harrison County, Ohio and graduated in 1849 from Franklin College, of New Athens. In 1854, he graduated from Allegheny Theological Seminary, and later served on its board of trustees. He was ordained into the Presbyterian ministry in 1857 and was installed into the pastorate of the Cambridge United Presbyterian Church in 1860. Ironically, the United Presbyterian Church in Cambridge had been founded in 1822 by William McCracken, whose house McFarland occupied for more than forty years. In 1862, Rev. McFarland enlisted in the 97th Ohio Volunteer Infantry and served as that unit's chaplain until 1865, when he returned to his Cambridge pulpit. For twenty-eight years he was treasurer of the Muskingum Presbytery. He retired in 1900 and died in his Steubenville Avenue home on January 10, 1910.

As noted in the foregoing description of the property, the house was moved to its present location in 1915. Jeanette McFarland, Rev. McFarland's daughter retained possession of the house until 1966, when the Guernsey County Historical Society took possession of the building for their museum.

Revised Significance Statement

The McCracken-McFarland House is nominated for its significance to the early settlement history of the city of Cambridge and also for its association with a long-time leading religious figure in the community. The house also possesses a secondary significance in the area of architecture, being a generally intact example of classically-influenced vernacular residential architecture. While it is likely that much of Cambridge's early architecture was similar to this particular structure, all but a few examples have disappeared from the scene.

The house was built for one of the town's most important early civic leaders, William McCracken (1787-1872), a native Pennsylvanian who came to Guernsey County in 1809 and became the village blacksmith. His services were in such demand that his customers collected enough money to pay a substitute for him in the War of 1812. He probably had this home built in the early 1820s since a new brick dwelling was constructed nearby for him in the early 'thirties. Although he did not reside in the older house after completing the newer one, he did retain ownership of the property until shortly before his death, selling it to a William Clark in 1867 for \$2500. Since Clark sold it the next year for \$3500, it seems likely that some improvement (probably an addition) was made during his one-year ownership.

In 1868 the Rev. Dr. William H. McFarland (1832-1910) purchased the house from William Clark. McFarland had assumed the pastorate of the Cambridge United Presbyterian Church nine years before, and for the next thirty years was to play a central role in the religious and civic life of the Guernsey County seat. Dr. McFarland was born in New Athens, Harrison County, Ohio, and graduated in 1849 from Franklin College, which was located in his home town. Five years later he graduated from the Allegheny Theological Seminary, an institution which he was later to serve as a member of its board of trustees. He was ordained into the Presbyterian ministry in 1857, and was installed into the pastorate of the Cambridge United Presbyterian Church three years later. Interestingly, the Cambridge U. P. Church was one of the oldest organized congregations in the town, having seen its formal organization in 1822 under the influence of William McCracken, whose home McFarland was to occupy for more than forty years. In 1862, Dr. McFarland enlisted in the 97th Ohio Volunteer Infantry and served as that unit's chaplain until 1865, when he returned to his Cambridge pulpit. He was a tremendously active civic leader, and was particularly involved with the local monumental association which in 1903 erected the Soldiers' Monument which still stands in front of the county court house. Retiring at the end of a forty-year pastorate at the

Cambridge church, McFarland related that in his pastorate there he had preached 4450 sermons, attended 2820 prayer meetings, made 2400 public addresses (ample indication of his civic involvement), baptised 621, received 1384 new members, conducted 700 funerals, performed 538 marriages, and had made 21,000 pastoral visits. He also served twenty-eight years as treasurer of the Muskingum Presbytery. He retired in 1900 and died at his home on Steubenville Avenue on January 10, 1910.

After Dr. McFarland's death, the property remained in his family for over fifty years. His son, James, wished to build a new home on the site of the old homestead, so he arranged to have the old house moved to its present site, approximately 200 feet to the north of its original location, in 1915. No documentation exists dealing with this move, but it seems likely that the present open porch was added to the facade at that time. Jeanette McFarland, Dr. McFarland's schoolteacher-daughter, retained possession of the house until 1966 when it was presented to the Guernsey County Historical Society for use as its museum.

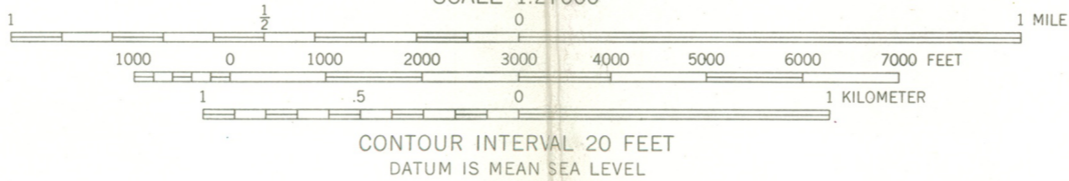
