DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Gwynne Building is a 13 story commercial office building constructed of a steel frame with reinforced concrete floors and ceilings, built in 1913. Designed by Ernest Flagg in the Beaux Arts style, it retains today all of its Beaux Arts ornamentation and classical revival design and proportions (see photo #1 & #2), except on the first floor facade, (which alterations will be described later). There are two adjoining buildings which have connecting upper floors and are utilized in conjunction with the main building.

The main building, designed by Flagg, is distinguished by a 14th story tower surmounting an individualized bay on the northwest corner of the building. Originally, the ground and second levels were designed to be a series of two-story arches presenting a strong vertical impression at the street level (see photo #1). Presently, however, that vital portion of the architectural statement has been interrupted by inappropriate contemporary horizontal signage and earlier alterations including applied green tile, green stone and stainless steel to all facade surfaces on the exterior first floor (see photo #2) which work required the removal of the original classical entrance pediments and cast iron grills under the store front windows.

The third level windows are capped by classical bracketed unbroken pediment lintels, except for the tower bay which contains elements and ornamentation at variance with and in slightly different proportions from all the other bays.

The fourth through eighth floors have rectangular 48 light windows with decorative window grills (incorporating the letter "V" or "G" in alternate panels horizontally and vertically) and iron columns. The ninth floor has segmental lintels with interior cornice. Note the four heads (steer) at the corners and the applied limestone ornamentation above and below the ninth floor windows. Also on nine, the columns are replaced by finials capping the grill height column bases.

The tenth floor window fenestration narrows by the incorporation of square stone columns and is foreshortened in anticipation of and to act as a base to the two-storied arches (floors 11 & 12) repeating the verticality of the openings at street level. Note the elaborate stone work and variations in horizontal bonding between floors 8, 9, 10 and 11. The 11th floor windows are framed by vertical bands of gold mosaics (design indiscernible at present) and pediment lintels.

A highly decorative copper bracket and cornice with acanthus leaf and animal head runs across the top on the south and west facades to the 13th floor tower base.

The tower, 14 stories high, is capped by a classical temple; two white corinthian columns on each of four sides are set off by the exterior integrail colored stucco walls (in pompeian red decorated with white banding and greek key cornice) of the observation rooms (one above the other approached by a circular stair).

The addition to the north of the Gwynne Building (610 N. Main Street) was constructed in 1939 and designed by the Cincinnati architectural firm of Hake and Hake. It was constructed as part of the business expansion of Proctor and Gamble.

The four story building, constructed of brick with limestone facing, is in the Art Deco style. Divided into three bays the emphasis is on the vertical. The first floor,

designed as commercial space, exhibits a polished marble wall treatment and a horizontal fluted marble band broken by stylized relief.

The second through fourth floors are accentuated by set back bays exhibiting metal sash straight headed casement windows. The piers exhibit setbacks and the spandrels are large polychromic with mixed motif relief.

The parapet is distinguished by a band of fretwork, circular plain medallion, and a stylized Pegasus in relief.

The addition to the east (see photo #6) of the Gwynne Building was constructed in 1916 of brick with limestone facing. The first floor has been altered, but the second floor with its pier and spandrel fenestration, decorative panel and low parapet with cornice to match the interior cornice of the second floor of the Gwynne Building remains intact.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Gwynne Building was commissioned by Alice Gwynne Vanderbilt, the daughter of Abraham Even Gwynne and Cettie Moore Flagg to be designed by Ernest Flagg and constructed on the northeast corner of Sixth and Main Streets. His design, in the Beaux Arts style, is one of the most elegant extant examples of the commercial application of this style. Furthermore, it is one of the very few Flagg designed buildings still standing in the United States (other Flagg buildings include: the Naval Academy, Annapolis; Corcoran Art Gallery, Washington, D.C.; Washington State Capitol; first tower sky scraper in the world, the Singer Building, and Scribner's, New York City; and buildings in India, Europe, and Russia.

Flagg's work reflects his training at the Ecole Des Beaux Arts in Paris. The Beaux Arts tradition to which the Gwynne Building belongs were considered "Retarditaire" when most histories of modern architecture were written, because it used historicizing ornament and fostered complexity instead of simplicity. Beaux Arts "Skyscrapers" such as the Gwynne, consist of a block-like mass with a narrow tower and everything is laden with ornament borrowed from historic styles.

Following the construction of the Gwynne, a promotional brochure prepared to advertise the available 100,000 square feet of office space touted that the building was virtually fireproof . . . and "doesn't contain enough wood to make a pencil."

Attempts to trace the original elevations and floor plans (drawn on linen) have failed to date, including contacts with Flagg's daughter, Mrs. John Melcher of Maine, who informed that upon Flagg's death, his original drawings were given to the owners of the buildings he had designed. Some fragments remain of the floor plan blue prints taken from those linen drawings -- but no elevations are at hand.

Because of its architectural design, the building adds diversity to the commercial buildings in the Central Business District.

Between 1935 and 1956 the Gwynne Building served as the corporate headquarters for the Proctor and Gamble Company, the largest manufacturer of soaps, detergents, and tooth-pastes in the world.

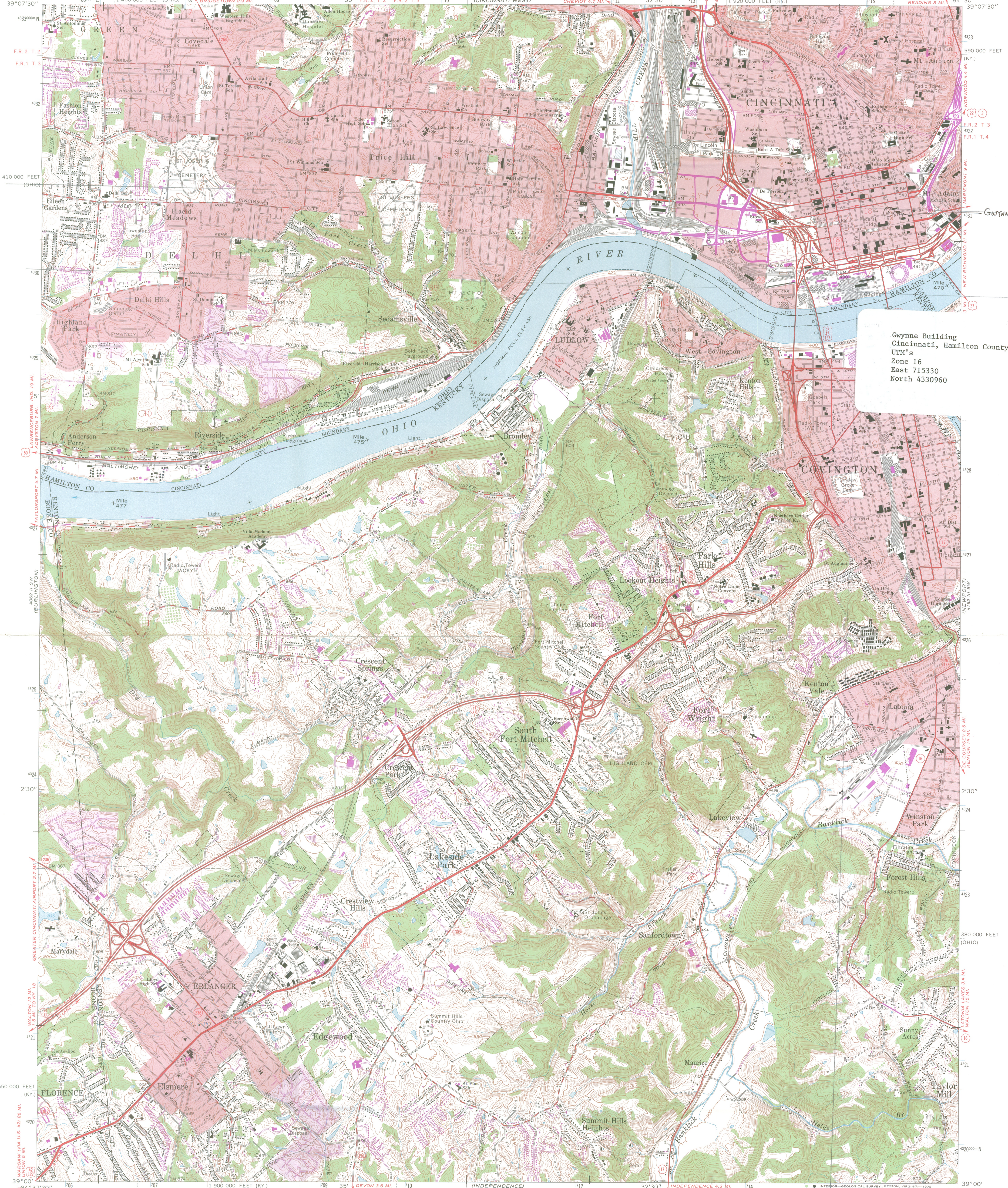
