Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Although this is a continuous structure of consistent design throughout, it is actually two buildings separated by a party wall. The entire structure is a large rectangular building approx. 235 feet by 135 feet and six stories wall, thirteen bays long and eight bays wide. There are two additional stories above the five bays to the north. They were added at an undetermined date after the original construction. The masonry wall piers form a two-tiered arcade, with the lower arches embracing two stories and the upper arches three stories. Each bay is three windows wide; the windows are slightly set back so that the wall is clearly articulated by the piers. On the east elevation the elliptical arches contain fanlight mullions; on the north there are recessed brick arches. The westernmost bay of the north elevation has a driveway into a service area. The sixth story consists of a narrow range of rectangular windows between piers alternating with three colonnettes. On the north part of the building the upper three stories rise from the cornice line above the fifth story; these upper stories are a simple rectangular grid of masonry piers and recessed spandrels.

The building is constructed of brick masonry, Iron and wood. The exterior bearing walls consist of the large square brick piers and masonry arches. On the interior, the lower floors have structural cast-iron columns, some of which have elaborate foliated capitals of an original design. The upper floors have square wooden posts, some of them tin-clad, supporting a framework of wooden mill construction. The roofs are of corrugated metal construction.

It is impossible to photograph the west elevation of the building because of the closeness of the adjacent buildings.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Root & McBride-Bradley Building is one of the three most significant 19th century structures in the old warehouse district which comprises most of the northwest quadrant of the original plat of downtown Cleveland (1). Its open glass bays demonstrate the limits to which masonry wall construction was pushed in the 1880s; this in turn provides insight into the widespread development of the commercial architecture whose history has been dominated by the Chicago school. Cudell and Richardson, architects of this building and the Perry-Payne, also designed Victorian Gothic churches in which the ratio of masonry to glass provides an interesting precedent for such commercial structures (2). Finally, the original owners of the two parts of the structure, Root & McBride and Morris Bradley, were significant in the mercantile history of Cleveland.

The building represents an intermediate stage in the development of 19th century commercial building structure. The combination of masonry bearing walls, metal posts, and wooden mill construction epitomizes the transitional nature of American building in the 1880s. The extreme width of the window bays in relation to the relatively slender brick piers demonstrates the attempts of late 19th century architects to achieve lightness of structure and increased space, as well as anticipating the aesthetic of the all-metal frame.

Erected in 1884, the south part of the building was occupied by Root & McBride Brothers, the successor of Morgan, Root & Company which was established in 1849. A pioneer wholesale dry-goods firm in Cleveland, it became one of the leading dry-goods firms in the Midwest. The Root & McBride Company was incorporated in 1895. The north part of the building was named for Capt. Alva Bradley, a Great Lakes ship builder beginning in 1868. On his death in 1885, his son Morris Bradley took over the business and became one of the largest owners of downtown real estate, erecting several important buildings on the properties. Among his interests were Bradley Transportation, a shipping company, and Cleveland & Buffalo Transit, a passenger-freight steamship line incorporated in 1895 with Bradley as president.

The owners of the Bradley Building (north five bays of the structure), Triskett Realty, have notified the tenants that the building is an uneconomical investment and that their only alternative is to demolish the building, contemplated for September, 1980.

The tenants, mostly light manufacturing (clothing and printing), do not want to move. They are trying to discuss alternate solutions with the present owner, including the possiblity of forming a tenant-owned corporation to purchase the building.

The entire building is clearly eligible on its own significance. The additional incentives offered by the various tax provisions may enable the tenants to accomplish the preservation of the building.
