#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Schlee-Kemmler Building is a 5-story masonry structure built with a facade of stone and metal. The building's most distinctive feature is its facade which clearly exhibits the freewheeling eclecticism of late 19th century design. Essentially divided into 3 bays, the facade is divided by Corinthian pilasters such that each of the bays rises to a Romanesque arch just below the cornice (Photo 1). Within each bay, windows are flat-arched, set in twos and threes. The lavish stone treatment includes quoins, incised lintels with decorative corbeled drip labels, pilasters, rosettes, griffins, and swags (Photo 2). The handsome metal and stone cornice features an arcaded corbel table and a rectangular centered pediment, below which appears the building's name. The date of construction appears in the pediment in raised letters (Photo 3). This ornament as well as the stone construction is carried around the north side of the building ca. 15'. With the exception of the storefront, the exterior is unaltered from the original, as evidenced from a photo taken ca. 1920 (Photo 4). The rear portion of the building is devoid of ornament and is articulated only through the use of flat and segmental arched windows, 6/6 (Photo 5). The storefront (Photo 6) has been altered considerably; originally this area consisted of a typical arrangement of display windows flanking a recessed doorway, and a stair to the upper floors located along the south side of the structure (Photos 4 and 6). Remaining elements of the storefront include three stone pilasters with capitals and modest carved ornament.

The interior of this building originally contained commercial space on the first story with office space and a public hall on the stories above. The long use of the structure as a furniture warehouse has left little evidence of original interior detail.

## Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Schlee-Kemmler Building is nominated for its significance as one of the very few stone-facade 19th century commercial buildings left in the city of Columbus, and additionally as the most highly ornamental of those which remain. At one time the city could boast a tremendous number of high-style commercial buildings from this period. However urban renewal and redevelopment have resulted in the demolition of countless commercial buildings from this period, making the Schlee-Kemmler Building all the more significant. Architecturally, it is emblematic of the waves of eclecticism which swept American design during the waning years of the nineteenth century. Its detailings runs the gamut from Romanesque arcading to neo-classical pilasters to Colonial Revival swags.

The building was built for brewer Nicholas Schlee (1836-1914) of the Bavarian Brewery and Charles Kemmler who had his General Fire Insurance Agency on the second floor. Schlee was an important local German businessman, serving as president of the Great Southern Fireproof Building and Opera House Co, the organization which was constructing the Great Southern Hotel across the alley from the Schlee-Kemmler Building at the same time Schlee & Kemmler were building their store. Since Schlee was the head of the hotel corporation, it seems possible that the same architectural firm, Dauben, Krumm, and Riebel may have designed both the hotel and the Schlee-Kemmler Building. The storefront has housed a variety of uses, including Sidney Hessenaur and Edward Lee's Saloon, the Bismark Cafe and the Southern Taxicab Co. For a time during the early twentieth century, the Humbart Camp and Cedar Camp #1 of the Woodman of the World held their fraternal meetings in the fourth floor public hall. From ca. 1916 until fairly recently the building was the home of the Echenrode Furniture Co.








