### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Long and Third Commercial Building is a rectangular, four-story, 7 bay X 5 bay common bond brick structure of a design influenced by the Second Renaissance Revival style. The building has wooden beam and post construction typical of turn-of-the-century commercial structures and it sits on a stone foundation. The roof is flat with random chimneys. A detailed metal cornice projects out over the fourth story on the south (facade) and west sides with returns on the north and east sides. The cornice is embellished with large scroll modillions and dentils. A parapet with corbeling and coping stretches around the building atop the cornice and steps back on the east side.

Openings in the first story facade are commercial storefronts divided by narrow brick piers. Although the storefronts have been modernized, the piers are still intact. A narrow arcaded entrance to the upper stories is centered in the facade and there is a flat-arched single door entrance on the west side with a two step approach. Other openings in the building are a combination of flat arched (2nd & 4th stories) and round arched (3rd story), and all are single light sashes double hung.

This building is notable for the intricate brick patterning and unusually fine craftsmanship of its facade and west elevations. These ornamental facings of stretcher bond brick are divided into three distinct horizontal sections by shaped stone belt courses (currently deteriorating). The elevations are highlighted by an arcaded third story. Rustication and quoins typically of stone in the Second Renaissance Revival style are simulated here by brick details of contrasting color.

The brick ornamentation of the center three bays in the facade is different from the other bays. In this section a flat arched center bay is flanked on each side by two round arched openings. Hoodmolds over these openings are composed of three concentric stilted semi-circles of brick, (with) the outside curve formed by a solid band of brick stretchers and the two inside curves formed by brick headers arranged in a checkerboard pattern." [Architecture: Columbus, p.111.]

The other arched openings have radiating voussiors and stone scroll-shaped keystones. The piers between the openings have the brick corbeling and the spandrels have two-tone brick panels.

Remaining details on the facade include two carved stone panels with a stylized urn and flora design located between the first & second bays and the sixth & seventh bays on the fourth story. There are also five iron tie rods of a modified fleur-de-lis design centered in the spandrels of the middle three bays.

The interior of the building has been remodeled numerous times to accommodate the many shops and manufacturers it has housed. There is an elevator in the southwest corner of the building. Proposed rehabilitation plans will highlight the beam and post construction and be sensitive to the openness of the factory spaces in the upper floors.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Long and Third Commercial Building, significant simply as one of the few turn-of-the-century commercial buildings remaining in the central business district of downtown Columbus, is distinctive because of its unusually fine craftsmanship and superb architectural detailing.

Many details of the building are reflective of the Second Renaissance Revival style of architecture. They include defined horizontal sections, assorted wall treatments, a combination of arches over the openings, an arcaded third story, a projecting cornice decorated with large modillions and dentils, and a parapet.

In addition to these significant stylistic influences, the facade is decorated with intricately patterned brickwork. The corbeling is accented by the use of different colors of brick and some stone details.

The building has housed over forty-five different businesses since its construction. Some of its most notable tenants include 1) The Columbus-New Albany-Johnstown Traction Company from 1902 to 1919, who laid one of the early interurban lines in Columbus in 1901, 2) The Eugene Gallagher & Bro.'s cigar manufacturing company from 1920 to 1939, 3) The Voisinet Garment Co. - uniform manufacturers - from 1945 to 1968, and the eateries, 4) Pappas' Philadelphia Restaurant (1920 - 1966) and 5) The Sportsman's Grill Restaurant (1934 - 1975+).

The owners of this property have ambitious rehabilitation plans for this currently underutilized and deteriorating structure. They are sincerely interested in the property's preservation and taking advantage of the related tax benefits.
