#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hamilton Park Historic District consists of a compact, cohesive area located on the Near East Side of Columbus between two major east—west streets — Broad St. and Long St. The district is one of three streets which comprised the East Park Place Addition. It is the easternmost of the three, the middle street — Lexington Ave. was replaced by Interstate 71 and Jefferson Avenue is located in the downtown area and is already listed in the National Register. There are 17 contributing buildings (several which include significant carriage houses) and two non-conforming buildings — two brick apartment houses located at 58 and 72 Hamilton Park. Following are brief descriptions of the contributing properties:

- 33 Hamilton Park This brick, 2½ story brick structure with gable and hip roof was constructed during the 1890's. The chimney features decorative brickwork and a semicircular window is located in the gable end. A carriage house with jerkin head gable roof is located to the rear. This residence belonged to Peter Merkle who ran a restaurant in Union Station. It is vacant and the owner has rehabilitation plans. (Photo 1)
- 43 Hamilton Park This enormous 2½ story buff colored brick residence is one of the best preserved in the district. Distinctive features include the corner turret (which originally had a conical roof), neo-classical treatment of the entrance with Ionic columns and segmental arched pediment, french doors leading to the terrace on the north and east sides of the building, outstanding interior panelling in the entrance hall and living room, which also has a coffered ceiling. A large carriage house in the same brick with a slate roof is located to the rear. W.I. Vorys, of the prominent law firm of Vorys, Sater, Seymour and Pease lived here during the early 20th century. P (Photo 2)
- 55 Hamilton Park The Parkview Apartments are Tudor Revival in design and were constructed in 1928. The large, 3 story building has a flat built up roof. The only decorative detail is on the facade and cosists of half timber treatment on the second and third stories, stone trimmed central entrance and slate gabled roof. (Photo 3)
- 65 Hamilton Park This 2½ story brick residence features a slate covered hip roof, frieze windows, entrance with transom and sidelights, projecting bay in front and simple stone lintels. A prochawith paired columns extends across the facade. G. Peters, President, of the Peters & Heron Dash Co. lived here at the turn of the century. (Photo 5)
- 85 Hamilton Park This  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story painted brick structure is one of several in the Italianate style on the street. Typical treatment includes the hip roof, bracketed cornice, frieze windows, deocrative hoodmoulds, entrance with transom and projecting bay on side. A two story enclosed porch is a later addition. This was the residence of John B. White, President of the White-Haines Optical Co. (still in business). (Photo 6)
- 91 Hamilton Park This massive stone structure is one of very few remaining stone residences in Columbus. The exterior has not been altered and features a corner turret with conical slate roof, tall chimneys, round arched window in gable, contrasting stone trim, stained glass windows, stone columned porch. A brick carriage house with a hip roof is located at the rear. Dr. Andrew Timberman, an ear, nose and throat specialist lived here. (Photo 6)

95-97 Hamilton Park - This is one of the few multiple family residences on the block. It is constructed of brick, is  $2\frac{1}{2}$  stories in height and features a projecting bay with decorative woodwork, slateltrim and semicircular windows in the gable ends, frieze windows and irregular roofline. (Photos 6,7)

105, 109, 111 and 117 Hamilton Park are similar is size, materials and age but have different decorative features. Decorative hoodmoulds, bracketed cornices, frieze windows, slates roofs and entrances with transoms are shared. 109,111 and 117 have mansard roofs and 109 and 119 have tower treatments. (Photos 7,8)

102-120 Hamilton Park - This 3 story buff brick apartment building is the largest in the district. Its distinctive features include the oriel windows, neo-classical entrances with pilasters, stone beltcourses and brick parapet above the cornice. It is an early 20th century building. (Photo 9)

98 Hamilton Park - This Italianate brick residence is distinctive because of the richly carved stone hoodmoulds -they are certainly among the finest in Columbus. Other decorative features included the panelled frieze and bracketed cornice, and the front porch across the front. T.J. Duncan, an attorney and Common Pleas Judge resided here. (Photo 10)

90 Hamilton Park - This  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story brick and wood frame building features a columned porch across the front, shingle siding with curved edges alongside the windows in the gable. J.R. Gobey, V.P. of Throop-Martin (still in business) lived here. (Photo 11)

84 Hamilton Park - 20th century brick residence with slate covered hip roof, dormer porch across front. Inhabited by B.S. Throop, President of Throop-Martin Co., (s which manufacturers wood doors, window sash etc. (Photo 12)

78 Hamilton Park -  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story shingle style building with horizontal siding and fish scale shingles, slate roof, oriel window on side, projecting bay in front, rounded edges along windows in gable and tall decorative chimneys. (Photo 12)

50 Hamilton Park - This  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story brown brick is one of the most interesting on the street with its decoative brickwork, round arched windows, wide overhanging eaves, contrasting stone trim and large front porch. A 2 story carriage house is to the rear. Foster Copeland, President of City Deposit Bank (now BancOne) lived here during the early 20th century. (Photos 14,15)

The properties included in the district include several significant carriage houses on the lots (see map) as well as several garages and other outbuildings which are not architecturally significant (indicated on map).

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hamilton Park Historic District is significant as an excellent example of an 1880-1930 upper middle class neighborhood in Columbus. In addition to the variety of historic buildings, the street plan is unusual for the city of Columbus. The wide, oval shaped street is divided by two islands (believed to have been a single large island originally) and is one of three streets in the East Park Place Addition. Columbus neighborhoods are typically platted in a simple grid pattern. There was a deliberate attempt to make this addition different from any other area of Columbus at the time (platted in the 1870's). The other two streets in the addition - Jefferson Avenue has already been listed in the National Register and is located in the downtown area and Lexington Avenue was replaced by Interstate 71. Hamilton Park is the easternmost street in the addition and the last to be developed. The majority of the properties were constructed between 1880 and 1910 with an apartment house added in 1928.

City Directories from the period of 1890-1930 show that this street was inhabited by prominent business and professional men. Included among them were: W.I. Vorys, a founding member of the Vorys, Sater, Seymour and Pease law firm (still one of the largest and most influential in the city); Foster Copeland, President of City Deposit Bank (now BancOne, one of the largest in Ohio); B.S. Throop and J.R. Gobey, President and Vice President of the Throop-Martin Co. (still in business making doors and wooden window sahs); J.B. White, President of White-Haines Optical Co. (also still in business); T.J. Duncan, Common Pleas Judge and T.R. Shinn, Vice President of the Citizens Trust and Savings Bank.

The district is a compact, cohesive area with a variety of architectural styles and a pleasant spacious and residential character. Several of the residences are individually significant architecturally including 43 Hamilton Park with its outstanding architectural features intact and 91 Hamilton Park with its impressive stone facade and decorative detailing. There are only two non-conforming buildings in the district -58 and 72 Hamilton Park - brick,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story 1960's apartment houses.

Hamilton Park, the home of many locally prominent business and professional men, is architecturally significant as a reflection of local tastes and trends in residential architecture. Architectural styles range from Italianate to popular turn-of-the-century styles such as Queen Anne, Colonial Revival and Shingle. The diversity and variety in texture and design of these styles are well represented through the wide range of materials and decorative features used.



Beginning at the northeast corner of Avon Place and Clover Alley go north along east curb of Clover Alley approximately 1000' to the southeast intersection with Boone Street; go east along south curb of Boone approximately 80' to a point opposite the northeast intersection of Boone and unnamed alley; go north along alley approximately 140' to the northwest corner of property of 119 Hamilton; go east approximately 300' to east curb of Hamilton; go along said curb to southeast corner of Hamilton and E. Long; go east approximately 50' to rear property line behind 102-120 Hamilton; go south along property lines for property facing Hamilton to south curb of Boone; go east along said curb approximately 500' to southwest intersection of Boone and N. Garfield Ave; go south along west curb of N. Garfield approximately 1100' to northwest corner of N. Garfield and Avon Place; go west along north curb of Avon approximately 900' to point of beginning.

These boundaries were selected because they incorporate the most intact, cohesive grouping of buildings along Hamilton Ave. The area around the landscaped islands was the most prosperous along Hamilton Ave. and therefore the houses and street plan stand out from that to the north of Long St. The only non-conforming buildings are two recent apartment buildings. The large vacant lot on the west side of the street never did have any building on it.






