Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

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Second Presbyterian Church is a rectangular structure, 76' x 146', of sandstone construction. The building features an asymmetrical 3-bay facade, with two corner towers, of which the northern is the taller. Originally, this northern tower was crowned with a spire which rose to a height of 200 feet above the street; a windstorm destroyed the spire in 1887, at which time the present belirrey and concave dome applied to the truncated tower. Each of the towers features a double arcaded corbel table near the eaves; the table is repeated along each side of the church also. The center bay of the facade is recessed behind the plane of the towers, and terminates in a stepped gable. Each of the three main entrances on the facade is capped by a heavy hoodmold. The walls of the nave and towers alike are supported by simple buttresses devoid of ornament. The gable roof is of metal.

The interior of Second Church is especially notable for its braced-beam segmental-arched ceiling. These braces, which are in turn supported by lavish wooden corbels, are themselves ornately carved. The tall, Romanesque window on the facade is the work of Columbus artist Ludwig Von Gerichten, who was a member of the congregation. His Von Gerichten Art Glass Co. was a nationally-known stained glass works, and this particular window was an award-winner when exhibited at the 1893 Chicago World's Fair.

The only major alteration to Second Church is a brick addition to the rear, built in the mid-1920s. Designed by Joel McCarty, of the premier Columbus firm of Richards, McCarty, and Bulford, the addition is devoid of any special ornament but does carry the fenestration rhythm of the round-arched voids of the church itself.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Second Presbyterian Church is nominated for its architecture as well as for its long association with the religious history of the city of Columbus. Architecturally, the church exhibits all the characteristics of the Romanesque Revival which flourished for ecclesiastic design during the second quarter of the nineteenth century. The round arches defind the style itself, appearing in all openings as well as in miniature in the corbel tables under the eaves of the building and towers. Even the tower roofs are typically Romanesque: pyramidal with concave slopes. Finally, the towers themselves exhibit the asymmetry which is characteristically Romanesque.

Historically, the structure is the oldest stone church in the capital city. It was built under the supervision of Col. Henry B. Carrington, from designs prepared by New Haven, Connecticut architect Sidney M. Stone. The building was commenced in April, 1857, with all stone being brought in by canal boat. The new church was dedicated on July 1,1860. In 1901, Second Church merged with Westminster Presbyterian with the new congregation known as Central, the name by which the building and congregation are known today.

The church derives additional significance from the fact that it is the product of a prolific 19th century architect who for a time specialized in church architecture. Sidney Mason Stone (1803-1882) was a Connecticut architect who practiced from 1833 until his death. He studied briefly at New York University and began work as a carpenter/builder. It is said that over his half-century career, he designed more than one hundred churches, mostly in New England. This is the only building in Columbus which is known to have been designed by this important practitioner, who was eulogized as "a man of marked ability [with] a good sense of scale...His designs were well balanced and had a solidity of effect which the architect of today often fails to secure."

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


