Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Seneca Hotel was originally a 3 x 13 bay, 10 story structural steel and reinforced concrete building with English bond brick veneer. In 1924 a sympathetic 4-story addition was added to the east changing the facade (north elevation) to 7 bays and converting the plan to an L-shape. The exterior appearance is virtually unchanged since this 1924 addition.

The design, by Frank L. Packard and David Riebel & Sons, is a typical approach to taller building construction of the early twentieth century. The building rests on a solid base with most of its floors set in a rather plain middle section and then it terminates in a decorative top section. This approach reflects the base, shaft and capital of the classical column. The base of this structure is three stories high with a high basement defined by a cut stone foundation facing and a terra cotta watertable. These three floors are adorned with elaborate glazed white terra cotta window and door surrounds, quoins, belt courses, and sculptures, all contrasting with the brick. The middle section is five stories tall, consisting of four shafts divided by light wells (facing Grant Avenue). The two center shafts are 2/3 the width of the end shafts. Openings in this middle section are paired 1/1 light double hung excluding in the light wells and in the center section of the east elevation. These are single 1/1 light double hung. The top section of the building is two floors high and the glazed white terra cotta ornament is repeated in the form of belt courses, spandrels, elaborate window surrounds with sculptures, and quoins. Atop the parapet is a flat, built up roof.

The building is notable for its silhouette and judicious use of the terra cotta ornamentation. This detailing lends to the building an atmosphere of sophistication without overdoing the embellishment or detracting from its composition. Its design is reflective of the English Renaissance Revival style of architecture.

It is also significant for extant original interior details in the lobby, in particular the wood wall panelings and balcony railings.

Seneca Hotel Garage

Although clearly included within the boundaries of the National Register listing of the Seneca Hotel, 361 East Broad Street, Columbus, Franklin County, Ohio, the Seneca Hotel Garage is not discussed in the nomination. The following information is provided to supplement the record.

7. Description

The Seneca Hotel Garage is a two-story brick building located within the property boundaries of the Seneca Hotel. Fronting on Capital Alley, is located immediately east of the original hotel and immediately south of the hotel's 1924 addition.

The building rests on a poured concrete foundation and has a flat roof with parapet roofline and raised elevator housing at the southwest corner. The garage features seven bays on its main facade and eight bays on its visible east elevation. The main facade is wire cut brick, while other elevations are common brick.

Important features of the main facade include its original door and window openings on the ground floor and segmental-arched windows on the second floor with decorative continuous lintel course of soldier brick. At the center is the main garage entry door, with its original wood cross-bar door intact. To its east and west are man doors and windows with concrete lintels and continuous sill courses. At the west end is the automobile elevator entry, with an original or early rolling metal door.

Windows on the second floor are grouped in threes to either side of a single window at the center. The other elevations are unornamented except for segmental-arched window openings. Two-over-two windows still remain on the east elevation, but the north and west elevation windows have been blocked in for fire separation reasons. The interior of the building was used most recently for office space, but is currently vacant.

The Seneca Hotel is significant as the first of two known structures built in Columbus as highrise apartment hotels. The Seneca was built in 1917 and the other, The Charminel, was built in 1925. A third residential hotel also existing in Columbus today, The Norwich, was built as a commercial block originally. (The Lanman Block, c. 1890). It was converted to the residential use as early as 1899. As one of the few extant 1910's structures of any sort in the downtown area, The Seneca is also significant for its white glazed terra cotta architectural detailing influenced by the English Renaissance Revival style. Particular elements include belt courses, sculptures, elaborate window and door surrounds and quoins at both the base and parapet of the building. Furthermore, The Seneca is significant for having been co-designed by Frank L. Packard and David Riebel & Sons. Frank L. Packard was one of Columbus' best known and most prolific architects who practiced from 1892 to 1923. His most important works include three hotels - the Chittenden, the Virginia and the Seneca, and Memorial Hall, Elks Hall, Savings Bank & Trust Co., Huntington National Bank and the City Club. David Riebel was another popular Columbus architect who was particularly involved in public school designs.

Columbus, as both, a governmental and business center, had many downtown hotels. included the Chittenden, Hotel Columbus, the Southern, the Northern, the Neil House, the Deshler, the Jefferson and the Virginia, to name a few. Of these, only the Southern remains standing. These were the hotels which catered primarily to the transient visitors to the community. The Seneca Hotel was not built to compete with these hotels, however. Although strategically located along the major east-west corridor of the city, it was too far east to be classified with the downtown. In the 1910's, the area of East Broad Street where the Seneca was built had already established itself as a prominent residential boulevard. As the prestigious area developed eastward along with the growth of the city in the late 1800's and progressively through the early 1900's, these areas already oriented to singlefamily residences also grew. The definition of downtown was moving eastward and multiresidential and commercial structures were being built in areas which were formerly resi-The Seneca Hotel was one of these new introductions. It made a grand statement when it was built and it continues to contribute significantly to the cosmopolitan flavor of the East Broad Street area. Although this type of hotel, that which caters to permanent residents, was common at the time to larger cities like New York, it was quite unusual for Columbus.

The Broadway Company was the owner, manager and operator of the Seneca Hotel. Frank C. Huling, its' president, was a prominent attorney and son of Cyrus Huling, founder of Columbus Savings Association. Mr. Frank Huling was married to Hester Vercoe, daugher of John Vercoe, who began Vercoe & Co., Inc., the well-respected brockerage firm active in the city today. Cyrus Huling was from Seneca County, Ohio, hence the name of The Seneca.

Various offices and commercial functions operated out of the Seneca, including the University Club of Columbus, the Junior League of Columbus, Anheuser-Busch, assorted cigar shops, clothing shops (including a corsetieres), beauty parlors, and a radio broadcasting station (WMAN and WSEN). Today the building serves as offices for the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, almost exclusively.

8. Statement of Significance

The Seneca Hotel Garage is a significant component of the Seneca Hotel property for two reasons: it was built specifically to service the hotel and it retains important physical features relating to its use as an early 20th century parking garage. The construction of this garage adjacent to the hotel in 1918 also helps to illustrate the status of the Seneca Hotel, one of only two known high-rise apartment hotels in early 20th century Columbus. Since the Seneca catered to permanent, rather than tansient residents, the provision of a parking garage added a great deal of prestige to the site.

The Seneca Hotel Garage was constructed in 1918, one year after the adjacent Seneca Hotel was completed. It is first listed in city directories in 1918 as the "Seneca Garage" at 372 East Capital Alley. Built to service the hotel, the garage had capacity for 35 cars. It was used primarily for parking, but may have also been used for automobile servicing. When originally constructed, the building was not attached to the hotel.

The two-story garage retains its exterior physical character, including its brick facade with decorative brick lintel courses, its original cross-bar design wood garage door, and its automobile elevator with roll-down metal door. The building has integrity of setting, materials, design, and association with the Seneca Hotel. Its presence on Capital Alley reinforces its original function as a garage.

Dear Sirs:

Thank you for your submission of the "Historic Preservation Certification Application - Part 2" for the above property pursuant to the Tax Reform Act of 1986 and U. S. Department of the Interior Regulations 36 CFR 67.

The Mid-Atlantic Regional Office of the National Park Service has determined that the proposed rehabilitation project described in the submitted documentation will meet the Secretary of the Interior's "Standards for Rehabilitation" providing that the following conditions are met:

The decorative iron rail and newel posts should not be removed from their historic location at the upper floors and reinstalled as part of the restored main stair that will run from the first to the third floors. Instead, we suggest that a new but compatible stair should be designed.

Material submitted for conformance with the above condition should be submitted to this office through the Ohio State Historic Preservation Office. This office will review any additional material relating to this condition as soon as it is made available. Any substantive change in the work as described in the application should be brought to our attention in writing prior to execution to ensure continued conformance with the Standards.

In addition, we note that the adjacent garage is not specifically mentioned in the National Register nomination, despite its clear inclusion within the boundary description. Therefore, we recommend that a supplemental listing record, documenting the garage's historic significance and it relationship to the Seneca Hotel, be submitted to the Ohio SHPO.

This letter is a <u>preliminary</u> determination, since a formal certification of rehabilitation can be issued only to the owner or qualified lessee of a "certified historic structure" after the rehabilitation work is completed. To request certification upon completion of the project, a "Request for Certification of Completed Work" should be completed and submitted to the State Historic Preservation Office along with photographs, both interior and exterior, that fully depict the completed rehabilitation work, and documentation of fulfillment of the above condition. An on-site inspection of the final project may be made by an authorized representative of the Secretary of the Interior prior to final certification of rehabilitation.
