

DESCRIPTION

Pt. Pleasant is a small, unincorporated hamlet (1990 pop: approx. 100) located on the northeast bank of the Ohio River, 25 miles upstream from Cincinnati. This sleepy, riverine community occupies a second terrace backed by a ridge of steep Ohio hills. Big Indian Creek marks the southeastern edge of the village and also serves as the southeastern boundary of the district. Architecturally, Pt. Pleasant has a modest collection of 19th century vernacular dwellings, almost all of frame construction. U. S. Route 52, the old turnpike road between Portsmouth and Cincinnati, parallels the river and bisects the village. A small store and roadside park lie immediately northwest of Route 52 and opposite Grant Memorial Park. Both properties lie outside the district boundaries. Southeast of the district and beyond Indian Creek is the Clarke Farm Site (33-CT-22 CT 22; NROHP 1974), a significant prehistoric habitation area. Of interest to industrial archaeologists is the site of the former Peterson Pottery and Pipe Factory, a once thriving operative that produced highly detailed kaolin pipes during the 19th century. Substantially altered ca. 1970, this site is believed to lie outside the district boundaries immediately southeast of the bridge.

Contributing resources within the district include Grant Memorial Park (site), Grant Birthplace (building), Caretaker's House (building), Caretaker's Garage (building), Grant Memorial Bridge pylons and beacons (objects), and WPA landscape features (structure). The concrete bridge span is considered a non-contributing structure (Figure 11 - Site Plan).

The Grant Birthplace (ca. 1820, 1936)

The Grant Birthplace is a vernacular, one-story, three-bay, timber-frame building with a limestone foundation (Photo #1). The house has a wood-shingled, end-gable roof with no eaves. The balanced, east-facing facade consists of a center door framed by single 6 over 6 double hung windows. The main portion of the south elevation is blank with a single 6 over 6 window in the shed-roof addition. The west-facing rear elevation of the shed has a single 6 over 6 window and doors (Photo #2). The north elevation is dominated by a large external chimney which vents the cooking fireplace, a single door and a 6 over 6 window. The interior of the house consists of a single

large room with random width floor boards and plain woodwork, with the exception of a 1/4 inch bead on either side of the fireplace. The room is furnished as it might have been when Grant was born. The space is defined by the cooking fireplace on one side of the room and a rope bed, chest and cradle on the opposite side. The shed-roof addition is divided into two rooms, a small office and an exhibit space. A white board fence encloses the front yard.

Lee Thompson House/Caretaker's House (ca. 1820; 1936-1937)

Immediately north and west of the Birthplace is the Caretaker's House, a vernacular, single story brick dwelling with gable roof (Photo #3). This private residence was leased to the Ohio Historical Society in 1937 and subsequently purchased in 1953. The original portion of the house is rectangular in plan with interior end chimneys and small window bays. Brickwork appears to be common bond with houndstoothing at the cornices. Attached to the northwest and northeast elevations are sensitively constructed, single story wings (Photo #4). Designed in 1936 by the Columbus architectural firm of Goller, Harsh and Davies, the additions complement the historic fabric and fenestration of the original brick cottage. The clapboard wall treatment and eight-over-eight and six-over-six window sashes are original to the 1936 design. An asphalt shingle roof has since replaced the 1936 wood shingle roof surface.

Caretaker's Garage (1936-1937)

Located approximately 50' northwest of the Thompson House is the caretaker's garage, a simple, balloon frame, single story, gable roofed frame structure (Photo #5). The garage retains its original novelty siding and six-over-six double hung window sashes. The rubble limestone foundation reportedly was laid using WPA labor (Fuhrman, 1997).

Grant Memorial Bridge (1925-27; 1984)

The original Grant Memorial Bridge (CLE US 52-10.70) was replaced in 1984 by a reinforced concrete deck span (Photo #8). The bridge span is a non-contributing resource. The 1927 structure was a Parker through truss span manufactured by the Brookville Construction Company, Brookville, Ohio (Figure 9). However, the original commemorative stone end pylons, decorative bronze beacons, bronze plaques and wingwalls remain in situ (Photo #9). The plaques contain brief biographical information on Grant and the bridge. One of the plaques exhibits a handsome bas relief of Grant in uniform (Photo #10). The original manufacturer's nameplate was removed from the bridge during demolition and now stands in the highway rest area immediately northwest of the bridge.

Grant Memorial Park (1925-1928)

A small village, Pt. Pleasant's fame as always been its association with Grant. The idea of developing a park in honor of Grant can be traced to 1922 when J.B. Winspear, a local grocer and head of the Centennial Committee, recommended demolition of several houses for a new park. Supporters felt it was important "this place [Pt. Pleasant] will have something to show to persons patriotic enough to come to the birthplace of the nation's greatest general" (*Enquirer*, 1922). Upon recommendation of the Grant Centenary Commission, in January, 1926 the State of Ohio began acquiring lots 21, 22, 27, 28, 29 and 30 for creation of Grant Park, which would provide an open vista from the newly designated Atlantic and Pacific Highway (U.S. 52) of the Grant Birthplace Site. Today, the park remains an open wooded space and several trees, including Buckeyes, Red Maples and Ash, appear to be vestiges of the original park plantings. The portion of Grant Memorial Park located southwest of U.S. Route 52 and S.R. 252, presently serving as a highway roadside rest, is excluded from the nomination by virtue of new bathroom facilities and major site alterations.

Landscape Features (ca. 1937-1940)

The limestone retaining walls, sidewalk flagging and gutters constitutes an important part of the district (Figure 11; Photo #7). Background research indicates these features were built in conjunction with a Works Progress Administration (WPA) project to improve the park and enhance its historical setting. The main retaining wall extends approximately 370 feet from the confluence of Indian Creek and the Ohio River and parallels the north bank of the creek adjacent to the roadside park (Photo #10, Figure 3, Map #2). A short flight of stone stairs leads from the wall down to the confluence. This section of the wall and stairs is overgrown with foliage and portions have been covered with river debris and sediment. The wall continues beyond the east side of Route 52 forming the southern boundary of the parking lot. Built of Trenton limestone, the walls feature rock faced ashlar surfaces and flagstone coping (Photo #11). The numerous limestone outcroppings around Pt. Pleasant were identified by Bownocker in 1915 as the "Pt. Pleasant Beds" (Bownocker, pp. 17-18). A series of stone landscape features also distinguish the park and Birthplace property. Fronting Grant Park along Route 52 is a low limestone wall. A handsomely crafted limestone gutter parallels the northwest side of State Route 232 from Route 52 to Back Street. Stone flagging, original to 1937 with subsequent improvements, fronts the Birthplace and Caretaker's House (Photo #12). Between the Birthplace and the Caretaker's House is a flagstone walk with a ca. 1937 wooden "wishing well" (Photo #13). At the rear of the Birthplace is a flagstone patio and sundial mounted on a battered stone base. Another series of low limestone walls runs perpendicular to the Caretaker's House and separates it from the open space to the northeast along Back Street (Photo #12). Another limestone wall runs from the rear of the Caretaker's House along the back side of the Park northwest to Locust Street.

While undoubtedly repaired over the years, all of the above landscape features appear to have been built as part of and in conjunction with the WPA.

The parking lot facing State Route 232, constructed in 1937 using WPA funds, is included in the district (Photo 19).

<u>Significance</u>

The properties comprising U.S. Grant's Birthplace and Grant Commemorative Sites Historic District in Pt. Pleasant, Ohio, are significant under Criterion A for their role in commemorating the birth of Ulysses S. Grant, president, West Point graduate and Union general, and under Criterion Consideration F as commemorative monuments within the context of U. S. Grant iconography. The birthplace, memorial park and related commemorative sites represent places associated with Grant's birth in Clermont County and also as twentieth century tourist-related sites which in their own right have come to physically symbolize his Clermont County heritage. The district further represents how patriotic meanings are communicated through commemoration and, by implication, the connection between grass-roots patriotic sentiment and the nation (Glassberg, 2). In the case of the Grant's Birthplace, the period of significance begins ca. 1864 because this was the period when Grant emerged as a nationally significant figure and associations were being made to his place of birth (Figure 4).

The State of Ohio's acquisition of Grant's Birthplace in 1925 was authorized to preserve, for the benefit and inspiration of ensuing generations, the traditional site of the birthplace "cabin" and park property. State government, augmented by the federal government's WPA construction programs during the 1930s further reinforced this vernacular interest in local history. As one historian notes, during the 1930s and the depths of the Great Depression, members of the professional classes and governmental officials "sought to inculcate civic obedience and loyalty in an era when discontent was widespread, and transform the meaning of vernacular symbols" (Bodnar, 137). Over the past seventy-five years the Birthplace, returned to its original site in 1936, and associated U. S. Grant sites have been imbued with their own historical importance as commemorative monuments to the Union general and eighteenth president.

The Grant Birthplace Memorial Park, established by the Grant Centenary Commission in 1922, was acquired by the state in 1925, ranking it among Ohio's early public historic preservation and conservation initiatives. Although significant prehistoric and Indian War related sites such as Ft. Ancient had been acquired by the Ohio State Archaeological and Historical Society (hereafter referred to as OAHS) as early as

1891, it wasn't until the World War I period that historic buildings and historic sites were incorporated into the state's site system, later coming under the aegis "State Memorials."

Characteristic of many early historic house museums, Grant Birthplace began as a commemorative site recalling the history of a great man (Photo #15). During the first half of the 20th century, buildings housing museums or birthplaces were generally vehicles for interpreting something other than architecture--the preservation of history (McDonald, 22). These early sites were preserved for their historical associations hallowed by virtue of their important military and political connections. The 1920s and thirties also saw a widespread romance with two quintessentially American concepts which are in themselves contradictions: the road and the small town. Small towns such as Hodgenville, Kentucky, and Pt. Pleasant, Ohio represented the quintessential American experience, evoking a time when people seemed more sure of their place in the world. The yearnings for lost innocence, conquests and historical achievements were seen to compensate for modern-day failures of the Depression era. Ordinary people celebrated their local ancestries and sought inspiration in the present by making their counterparts in the past seem almost heroic. As historic symbols commemorative sites helped soothe the personal needs of ordinary people and the political needs of professionals and officials. Americans were longing to experience traces of an authentic, more fulfilling past, a desire to experience something untouched by the ravages of time (Bodnar, 135; Boyer, 200-201). "The urge to commemorate America," explains one author, "combined with the burgeoning availability of the automobile and a new national road system, led to a wave of interest in seeing America." (Shubinski, 1997). The Grant Birthplace and Grant Commemorative Sites Historic District epitomize this early expression of auto-related patriotic commemoration.

In Clermont County, efforts to physically memorialize Grant began, at least in more formal terms, in 1907, when a Civil War cannon and bronze tablet were placed in front of the birthplace site (Photo #14). At the dedication ceremony Governor Andrew Harris addressed a large throng that had traveled upriver from Cincinnati by steamboat. As visitation to Pt. Pleasant increased, and road access gradually improved, interest grew in relocating the Birthplace to its original site.

GRANT'S POINT PLEASANT YEARS (1822-1823)

While a good portion of the birthplace's history has been a peripatetic one, the first 60 years of its existence were confined to its original site in Pt. Pleasant, Ohio, a sleepy hamlet located on the Ohio River 25 miles upstream from Cincinnati. Today, untouched by sprawl or tacky tourist stands, Pt. Pleasant retains much of its quiet, sleepy ambience, much as it has for the past 150 years. Pt. Pleasant was platted in 1813 by Henry Ludlow to include 100 in-lots. In 1837 Warren Jenkins described Pt. Pleasant in his gazetteer as:

a flourishing little town in Monroe Township, Clermont County. on the north bank of the Ohio River. It contains about 30 houses, 130 inhabitants, and two stores. It is situated immediately below the mouth of Indian Creek (Jenkins, 366).

It was in this riverine community that Jesse and Hannah Grant operated a tannery. According to his *Personal Memoirs*, President U. S. Grant wrote, "In June, 1821 my father, Jesse R. Grant, married Hannah Simpson. I was born on the 27th of April, 1822, at Point Pleasant, Clermont County, Ohio." Dr. J. G. Rogers, the first physician of neighboring New Richmond (see CLE-442-10), assisted with the birth of baby Hiram, later named Ulysses. Jesse, Hannah and infant Ulysses lived in the one-story foreman's cottage which Jesse rented from Lee Thompson, next door to the tannery above Indian Creek. Tradition claims the house was built in 1817, although one account attributes it to 1820.

The family's move from Point Pleasant to Georgetown was dictated by Jesse's desire to better himself economically by establishing a new and larger tannery near an area promising a ready supply of tanning bark (Bearss, 1). Grant was brought to Georgetown in 1823 as a 16 month-old baby and lived in the Boyhood Home (NHL, 1985) with his parents until leaving home to enter the U. S. Military Academy in May, 1839.

POST-GRANT YEARS IN POINT PLEASANT (1823-1885)

The Birthplace appears to have remained relatively intact during this period. In 1885,

just prior to its removal from Point Pleasant, Henry Howe noted the house "remains as well preserved as originally built; a lean-to kitchen has since been added. It is a one story frame, 16 x 19 feet, with a steep roof, the pitch being five feet, and on the right or north end is a huge chimney, affording a spacious fireplace" (Howe, 421; Figure 1). A photo taken of the house in July, 1864 shows it to appear much as Howe described it twenty years later (Library of Congress, 1864, Figure 4).

REMOVAL OF BIRTHPLACE (ca. 1886-1935)

On August 2, 1885, the Estate Section of the *Cincinnati Enquirer* featured the following advertisement: "Michael Hirsch, owner of the decayed little frame house at Pt. Pleasant, in which General Grant was born, yielded yesterday to a \$7,000 offer from New York, transportation to be made by the buyers. A year ago Hirsch was willing to sell the house, land and all, for \$300." The sale apparently never took place. Yet following Grant's death in 1885 the Birthplace was moved by towboat from Point Pleasant to Cincinnati and leased for the 100 day celebration of the Ohio Valley Centennial, despite opposition from some Clermont County and Pt. Pleasant citizens, who feared the house would never be returned. A small fee was charged to view the Birthplace and the owner, Michael Hirsch, received one-fourth of the exhibition proceeds.

It was while viewing the house on exhibit at the Centennial Exposition in 1888 that Henry Chittenden, "a friend and admirer of Grant," and William F. Burdell of Columbus concluded it was inappropriate to use the birthplace for commercial purposes. Only a year earlier Congressman John Little of Ohio proposed the federal government acquire the birthplace, but action was never taken (OHS VFM-161). Convinced of its authenticity, Chittenden purchased the Birthplace in 1888 for \$3,000 and first moved it to Goodale Park in Columbus as part of the GAR national encampment. This "Great Reunion" saw 70,000 comrades march in procession in front of an estimated 100,000 spectators, the largest such assemblage since the great Washington parade of 1865 [43rd AR Board of Agriculture, 74]. Subsequently, the birthplace went on a tour of the nation before being moved to the State Fairgrounds in Columbus, where it became a featured attraction (Figure 5).

Exposed to the elements and throngs of visitors for nearly a decade, the birthplace's condition became a growing source of concern among state officials, principally the

Secretary of Agriculture (BOA, *Annual Report*, 8). In September, 1896, a glass and limestone pavilion was erected on the fairgrounds to enclose and protect the Grant Birthplace, where it remained sheltered until 1936 (Figure 6). At the dedication ceremony opening the pavilion, Henry Chittenden, vice president of the [Ohio] Centennial Board, undoubtedly spoke for many Ohioans when he proclaimed, "We have gathered about this now consecrated spot to complete an affair that had its beginning some eight, or perhaps better, eighty years ago when this little cottage which we see here was reared upon the banks of the Ohio River to be the home of a single pioneer of our great state" Adding somewhat nostalgically, Chittenden said of the cabin, "I here deliver once more to the care of the people of his [Grant] native state, to shine like a gem on her fair bosom...to be the mecca of millions of grateful, pious pilgrims and to present to unborn generations the most impressive and instructive of lessons for the conduct of life...." ("Dedication of Memorial Building," 291).

Given its numerous relocations and the physical demands of lengthy exhibits, some doubts about the Birthplace's authenticity began to emerge. Chittenden was quick to respond to such murmurings, pointing out that testimony and affidavits were taken regarding the building's authenticity and sketches were made of its original appearance so any details could be reproduced. Chittenden further noted,

Upon each removal extreme care, involving in every case an expenditureof money far beyond the first cost of the building, has been exercised to transfer and replace every particle of the building as it was found to be after Grant's glorious achievements had thrown a luster and sacredness about hisevery belonging and made this humble house sacred to the American people. Nothing was added and nothing was taken away and it stands today as it stood for more than half a century looking out upon the glancing waters of the beautiful river ("Dedication," 291).

In 1897 President William McKinley came to the Ohio State Fair and made a special point of visiting the Grant Birthplace. A hushed silence fell over the crowd as the President stood looking at the house, removed his hat and entered the low door. "Inside the memories that came over the minds of the veterans present, standing as

they were in the birthplace of the grand Union general, were too sacred to find utterance and the few remarks addressed by one to the other were in whispers," a newspaper account said of the scene (*Dispatch*, 8/17/97).

The centennial in 1922 of Grant's birth served as a catalyst for commemoration activities. A U.S. Grant State Memorial Association was created and a Grant Centenary Commission was appointed by the Governor. In addition, Congress approved the creation and sale of Grant commemorative coins, which, along with the formation of the Grant Memorial Highway Association, helped fund road improvements between New Richmond and Pt. Pleasant, Ohio (Figure 7). The road gained further attention in 1928, when a congressional Committee on Post Roads and Post Offices designated it as part of a proposed Atlantic to Pacific Highway (Atlantic to Pacific Report).

No event focused more attention on Grant and the plight of his birthplace more than the centennial celebration of his birth, held at Pt. Pleasant April 27, 1922. Standing on a platform near the site of the birthplace, President Warren G. Harding addressed an estimated crowd of 30,000 through an electronic device known as a Bell Loud Speaker. The President's speech was broadcast simultaneously to an equally large gathering at Cincinnati's Lytle Park, marking one of the earliest uses of the recently developed technology of electronic voice amplification (*Cincinnati Bell Telephone Bulletin*, 67; *Long Lines*, 13).

The early importance of the site rather than the building itself is partly evident from a description in 1930 of a GAR pilgrimage to Point Pleasant. In a lengthy, somewhat obsequious summary of the day's activities under a cut line that read, "At the Grant Cottage," the newspaper columnist concluded by stating, "There was a pilgrimage to the plain comfortable little cottage of Grant's nativity, and back to the boat, and downriver to Cincinnati" (*Times Star* 8/30/30). Apparently unbeknownst to the writer, Grant's actual Birthplace was still in Columbus, and would not return to Pt. Pleasant for another six years.

Hugh Nichols, former Chief Justice of the Ohio Supreme Court and Chairman of the

Grant Centenary Celebration Committee, and Clermont County native, was a strong advocate of returning the birthplace to Point Pleasant. Propitiously, during the 1920s and early 1930s events were taking place, both locally and nationally, that led the return of the cottage (Figure 8). Restorations at Colonial Williamsburg, Greenfield Village and Old Sturbridge helped raise the nation's historical consciousness, coupled with the celebration of the United States sesquicentennial in 1926. In November, 1925 the Grant Centenary Commission acquired its first parcel of property in Pt. Pleasant, and by January. 1926 the State of Ohio had begun acquiring several lots in Point Pleasant, including the property where the birthplace formerly stood, and a Grant Memorial Park was established. The OAHS did not assume official responsibility for administering the Grant Memorial State Park until 1932 (Deed Files, Facilities Division, OHS). The almost fraternal connection of presidential sites manifested itself that same year when the Conservation Committee of Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs planted willow trees from Mt. Vernon along Indian Creek (Times Star 4/6/32). Today none of the willows survive, although a Buckeye, Sweetgum and Red Maple planted in the park during the 1920s still stand. The Grant Birthplace was among the first historic sites in Ohio acquired by the state and marked the beginning of an era when houses deemed to possess statewide historical importance were preserved and interpreted. Prior to this period the emphasis toward preserving Ohio's significant places was more prehistoric in scope (Ft. Ancient, acquired 1891, NHL 1964; and Serpent Mound, acquired 1900, NHL 1964). Hayes Presidential Center (acquired 1915) and Campus Martius (acquired 1918) were the first individually significant historic buildings acquired by the State of Ohio (OHS, Education Division, Site Files).

In 1927 construction for the Grant Memorial Bridge, a Parker through truss span with decorative stone pylons and cannons, was completed over Indian Creek along Route 52 (Figure 9). The entire structure, noted a Department of Highways publication,

was given special architectural treatment as a memorial to General U. S. Grant. . .the substructure approach was given particular attention, being built in part, of stonemasonry consisting of native stone trimmed with cut Bedford limestone. Decorative bronze beacons serve to beautify and light the structure, while the end pylons serve as pedestals for cannon obtained from the War Department for this particular purpose (*Dept. of Highways*, 156).

Unable to handle the heavier truck traffic, the steel truss was imploded in 1983, replaced in 1984 with a modern concrete deck span. At the time all of the stone pylons and walls were dismantled, repaired, rebuilt and repointed. During background research for the bridge replacement project the Ohio Department of Transportation noted a concrete bridge was originally specified for the site, but soil tests dictated a lighter weight, steel span. It is useful to note the original bridge was built partly from funds raised from the sale of special Grant dollars and half dollars minted for the occasion (*Times Star*, 9/30/36).

In 1932 over 50,000 visitors registered at the park, making it one of the most visited sites in southern Ohio (OHS, Box 82). Finally, in May 1935, the Ohio legislature authorized and directed the OAHS to remove the house from the fairgrounds to the original site in Pt. Pleasant, Ohio (House Bill 168, May, 1935).

In March, 1936, under the supervision of H. R. McPherson, Director of OAHS, the Birthplace was dismantled in sections and shipped by six trucks to Point Pleasant. The building was stored in a barn and erected in sections on its original stone foundation. A simple two story frame house that had occupied the site since ca. 1885 was moved to a nearby lot on Locust Street in Pt. Pleasant. Evidence suggests much of the original fabric of the birthplace was replaced during and immediately after the move. One period account noted curators "Found [it] impossible to return original house, but through the enthusiastic and untiring efforts of Judge Hugh L. Nichols, the house was rebuilt, following out in every detail the plan of the original house." A typewritten description of the site taken ca. 1941 reported "The house as it now stands is an exact replica of the house in which President Grant was born" (OHS, Site Files; OHS Archives, Box 87, Folder 45). Establishing any authenticity of the house's historic fabric remains conjectural given the fact no detailed field notes or reconstruction specifications have been found. One newspaper account reported the

original hand-made brick nogging had been preserved (*Enquirer* 7 March 1936). It is definitely known the floor and floor joists were so rotten they were replaced at the time of re-assembly (OHS Deed Files. 8" x 10" sills were placed under the "cabin" and 6" x 8" sills under the leanto in 1936).

For years local folklore claimed the lean-to addition on the Birthplace was the site of Grant's birth, but subsequent research and fabric analysis refuted this claim since the leanto was added to the cabin following Grant's occupation but prior to 1864 (Frost, Grant Album, 234). The rear of the original house features two outside windows, a door and clapboard siding nearly identical to the other three exterior elevations (Photos #2 & #16).

On October 4, 1936, dedication services were held in Point Pleasant celebrating the return and "restoration" of the birthplace (Shetrone, "Grant Cabin," p. 103; Figure 10). Marking the occasion was Governor Myers Y. Cooper, who in addressing the crowd solemnly observed:

Due to the fame of a citizen who was born on this spot and in this house, there was removed from this site many years ago, the home in which was born a child who was destined to illumine [sic] America and the world with the grandeur of his character and of his patriotic mind and heart.

It was a great conception of Judge Nichols to perpetuate this shrine, and cause to be built here a magnificent memorial bridge, over which thousands will pass in safety and security as they visit this sacred spot.

So, my friends, we celebrate this unusual circumstances of a home restored and rededicated to God and country. From this day forth it will be a shrine attracting people from the North, South, East and West of our own country, and from lands beyond the sea, who will come here, leaving with a rebirth of faith in the virtues for which Grant lived and died (Cooper, "Address at Pt. Pleasant," 1936).

During the year, 100,000 people visited the Birthplace, of which 63,000 signed the guest register.

With the house successfully relocated to its original site (Photos #17 & #18), improvements to the park and adjacent areas soon followed. A long term lease for the Caretaker's House was negotiated by the OAHS in October, 1937 with an option to purchase. Alterations and additions to the Caretaker's House were implemented in 1937 according to designs rendered by the Columbus, Ohio architectural firm of Goller, Hirsch and Davies (Deed Files, OHS). In August, 1936 the OAHS was awarded a series of WPA sponsored construction projects for state memorials. As was customary for WPA projects involving "sites and structures of historical and archaeological importance," all planning and construction was subject to the written approval of the [National] Park Service. The Park Service commended the Society for the quality of its restoration work to date, calling it a "model of its kind." In this same letter to H. C. Shetrone, then Acting Director of the National Park Service, A. E. Demaray wrote "We appreciate the importance of the preservation work which you are carrying out and will cooperate with you in every way towards its progress." Included in the project were funds for the construction of retaining walls, sidewalks and street gutters at Grant Memorial Park, with additional federal flood relief funds awarded later for repairs to the house, which had suffered some damage during the epic Ohio River flood in January, 1937. Total cost for the WPA project was \$42,734.00 (Letter from A. E. Demaray to H. C. Shetrone, 16 September 1936, Letter from Weldon McGlaun to S. Harrison, 5 March 1937, Series 3078, Box 92, Folders 29 & 42; Times Star, 3/30/37).

Since 1937 the Ohio Historical Society has endeavored to maintain the integrity of the Birthplace and Grant-related structures. In 1953 the Caretaker's House was acquired by the OAHS from the Allison family, and in 1966 minor restoration work was conducted on both the interior and exterior of the Birthplace. Other than the replacement of the bridge span in 1984 and modernization of the roadside rest in 1984 (outside the boundaries of the district) the Grant Birthplace and Grant Memorial Park appear much as they did in the late 1930s.

The various memorial and tourist sites associated with Grant have been integral to area tourism efforts since the early 1900s. Clermont County emphasizes its identity

as the birthplace of Grant while Brown County promotes his boyhood years there. The Birthplace and park sites are simply interpreted, serving as the keystone of Clermont County's heritage tourism efforts.

A birthplace of a historical figure is eligible if the person is of outstanding importance and there is no other appropriate site or building directly associated with his or her productive life. In the case of Grant, there are several other properties, including his boyhood home in Georgetown, Ohio, that are more closely associated with his productive career. Therefore, the Birthplace is not considered eligible under Criteria Consideration C (See *National Register Bulletin* 15, pp. 32-33).

BIRTHPLACE OF GEN. U. S. GRANT, POINT PLEASANT.





FIGURE 1. & 2.








FIGURE 12. Atlas of Clermont County, Ohio. 1891.




