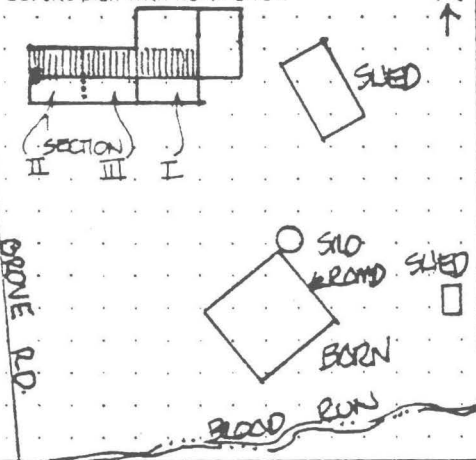

26. brief description (note unusual features, integrity, environment, streets and associated buildings)

The Hoffman House is located along Grove Road and faces south within the small valley drained by Broad Run. George Hoffman's 1772 purchase of 275 acres in the southwestern portion of the Township came to be known as the Barren Ridges and Hoffman's Barrens, indicating it was relatively poor, hilly land. Consisting of, at present, five sections four of which are stone, the Hoffman House and associated agricultural buildings nevertheless bespeak a prosperous past. The Hoffman House is a fine example of an additive, vernacular dwelling and is of particular interest for the manner in which it grew. From the 1798 and 1799 tax lists it is apparent that George Hoffman, first settler, had built a two-story, stone (16'x20') house with attached one-story log (16'x18') kitchen. He also had a log barn ("in bad repair") and a wheelwright-workshop. Despite the allegation that the homestead was "razed," an examination of the existing structure indicated it was, rather, incorporated into the body of the house (see Section I). It was originally 2 low stories with just 1 window (6/6,3/3) on each level. Section I's dimensions (Cont'd)

Exploration/Settlement: The Hoffman House was the homestead of first settler George Hoffman and home to his descendants until 1902. George Hoffman had emigrated from Germany, served as a teamster under General Braddock during the French and Indian War (1755), and finally settled in West Whiteland in 1772 where he purchased 275 acres of ground from Evans Jones and built a house. Hoffman was highly regarded in his day and, upon his death in 1829, it was noted that he was one of the chief founders of the Methodist Church in Chester County. In addition, he was important to the

approximate 16'x20', its interior features are 18th century, and its roof obviously has been raised. To the north of Section I is an old kitchen with cooking fireplace and evidence of a bake oven; this probably replaced the earlier log kitchen. The kitchen has no foundation but steps contain old stone steps (concealed beneath the floor) which lead to the cellar of Section I. The westernmost part of the Hoffman House likely was built next (Section II) circa 1805. It is stone with prominent quoins, 16'x22', a two-bay Penn Plan, and underlain by a cellar featuring niches, an arched fireplace support, and log joists. The chimney is entirely stone. A narrow passage leads from the cellar of Section II to the ground level kitchen of Section I. There is no direct access from the cellar of Section II to that of I or to any of III, the 18'x22' stone center portion of the house. This area, built in the mid-19th century, provides the house with a center hall and a wide stairway of two flights. Sections I, II, and III have a common roofline and show pegged rafters marked with roman numerals; between Sections I and III, however, there exist the remains of a pointed-stone wall, indicating that the roof of Section I originally was lower. To the east of Section I is a frame addition (c.1900) containing present-day cooking facilities. Associated buildings include a banked, double-decker stone barn, corn crib, and many old foundations.

development of the Grove crossroad village. His son, Benjamin, purchased the homestead, left it to his brother's son, George, and it then descended through George's line. In 1883, it was regarded as "one of the most beautiful farms in West Whiteland." It was a dairy farm which shipped to the Philadelphia market.

Architecture: Architecturally, as stated above, the Hoffman House is a representative example of an additive vernacular dwelling and is particularly noteworthy for its external integrity and unity. The unusual progression of additions is of extreme interest and apparently unique to the Township. Hoffman was a German and this particular building could be the southernmost evidence of German occupation in Chester County.

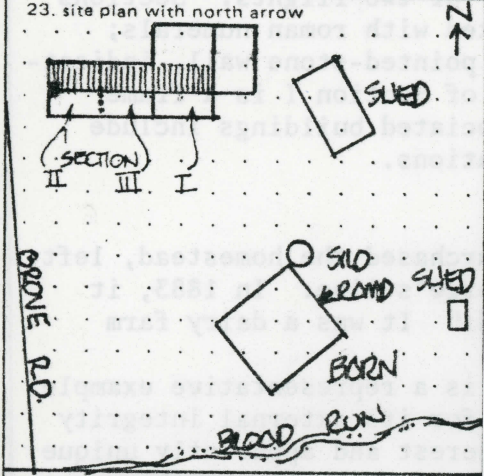
