Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Shrewsbury lies on an elevated plain in south-central York County. The town is arranged in a linear fashion along a main north-south street, with an intersecting east-west street, and a secondary north-south street. The borough is surrounded on all sides by open farmland. The building stock of Shrewsbury is representative of the 1800 to 1930 period. Most of the major nineteenth and early twentieth century styles are represented in the district. These include Federal, Greek Revival, Italianate, Mansard, Queen Anne, Princess Anne, Beaux Arts, and Foursquare. These buildings make up streetscapes which have changed little since the first quarter of the twentieth century. The Shrewsbury Historic District contains 56.7 acres and 152 major buildings. Of these 24 are significant, 128 are contributing and 10 are intrusions.

Shrewsbury borough lies on an elevated plain in the Piedmont Plateau region of southern York County, at an altitude of around 1000 feet above sea level. The town is situated about 14.5 miles south of York, 37 miles north of Baltimore, and three miles north of the Mason-Dixon Line. Shrewsbury is surrounded on all sides by rolling, open farmland with the accompanying isolated farmsteads. The original boundaries of the borough formed the shape of an elongated rectangle with Main Street, formerly U.S. 111, as its north-south axis. These original boundaries remained until the mid-twentieth century, when suburban areas at the north and south ends of the borough were annexed.

The main east-west street in Shrewsbury is Forest Avenue, state route 851. which leads to Stewartstown, five miles to the east, and to Railroad Borough and New Freedom, one mile to the west and two miles to the southwest respectively. Three quarters of a mile east of the Main Street - Forest Avenue intersection is exit one of Interstate 83.

Shrewsbury is a farily high-density community. The houses are spaced closely and are attached in some cases. Most of the dwellings line up evenly on the inner edges of the sidewalks, while garden plots and auxillary buildings are in the rear. The houses are generally $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories in height, with gabled roofs, and are fairly uniform in size. Most are built of frame, but many are built of log and brick as well. Some of the early nineteenth century brick houses are flemish bond, and a few of the brick structures show corbelled brick cornices. Oriels, bay windows, turrets, and facade wall dormers from the turn-of-the-century era are common in Shrewsbury, mainly as add-on items.

Shrewsbury's houses in general are rather plain looking. The most notable exception to this is the large 5x2 bay Victorian Gothic/Queen Anne style house on South Main Street (8x10 photo #12). Decorated elements on this structure include a patterned slate roof, decorative chimneys, a large facade wall dormer with patterned shingles, scalloped bargeboards with fleur-de-lis pendants, and an elaborate porch with turned columns and a spindled frieze. Most of the other major nineteenth century and early twentieth century domestic styles are represented in Shrewsbury's housing stock, as well, including Federal, Greek Revival, Italianate, Mansard, Princess Anne, and Foursquare.

In comparison with the majority of Shrewsbury's houses, its public buildings are large and lavish. Most of these buildings date from the last half of the nineteenth century. The most notable examples are the Greek Revival style Oddfellows' Hall of 1853, the Romanesque Revival style Lutheran Church, dating from 1874, the Gothic Revival style United Methodist church, also built in 1874, the Gothic Revival style Reformed church, and the Neo-Classical Revival/ Beaux Arts style bank of 1908.

There are twelve intrusions within the Shrewsbury Historic District. Of these, five are modern dwellings, two are parking lots, and two are large garages. The others are a modern post office, a fire station, and a church chapel. This low rate of intrusions occurs in spite of an era of imprecedented growth in Shrewsbury inaugurated by the completion of Interstate 83 in 1960. Between 1960 and 1980 the population of Shrewsbury grew by nearly 300%, from 943 to 2688. Large subdivisions and shopping centers have drastically changed the character of areas north, east and south of the original borough limits. However the original town has been changed little by this new growth. The streetscapes of $2\frac{1}{2}$ story houses remain largely intact, and in the scale, styles, materials and arrangement of the buildings, the Shrewsbury Historic District presents a glimpse into rural, nineteenth century York County.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Shrewsbury Historic District is important as a well-preserved example of a nineteenth century turnpike town and agricultural service center. The district shows significance in the areas of community planning, transportation, and architecture during the 1800 to 1930 period. Shrewsbury was the first settlement to be laid out in south-central York County. The village consisted of standardized lots arranged along the economically important Patapsco Road. Because of its location on this main road, Shrewsbury quickly developed as a transfer point between the surrounding agrarian region and the markets to the south. The town owes its character and existence to its close relationship with this road. Shrewsbury grew little in the second half of the nineteenth century, and as a result of the town's main street presents what is perhaps the first mid-nineteenth century streetscape of any small town in York County.

During the late 18th and early-to-mid 19th centuries, the development of Pennsylvania's vast and wealthy Susquehanna Valley was influenced greatly by the continuing rivalry of the economic spheres of Baltimore and Philadelphia. Both cities sought to control the trade of this important region, as well as to gain a significant share of the trade of the opening lands to the west. Baltimore's advantage in this struggle was geography; much of the produce of the region moved down the Susquehanna River, though marginally navigable, to the Chesapeake Bay, and on to Baltimore. Philadelphia's advantage was politics; Philadelphia interests could usually control the Pennsylvania legi-Philadelphia influence was strongest in the eastern and northern portions of the Susquehanna Valley. Baltimore influence was dominant west of the Susquehanna. This influence was particularly strong in those Pennsylvania counties west of the river and just north of the Mason-Dixon line, the largest of which is York. By 1809, two major north-south turnpikes crossed York County's 41 mile-long frontier with Maryland. Over these roads the produce of York, Adams, and Cumberland Counties and points north and west flowed toward the port of Baltimore.

One of these turnpikes was the York and Maryland Line, chartered in 1806 and completed in 1809. This artery followed the route of the old Patapsco Road, laid out in 1742 to join York with the Chesapeake ports of Joppa and Patapsco, later called Baltimore. In a speculative venture the village of New Shrewsbury was established in 1794 by Baltzer Faust at a crossroads on this important route. The settlement consisted of standardized 66x264 foot lots arranged in a linear fashion along the road.

Shrewsbury was the first settlement to be laid out in south-central York County. The town grew rapidly, and quickly became the center of commerce for the surrounding region. By 1800 the town had a store and a school house. It was also about this time that the predominantly German settlers began to call the town "Strassburg". The name "Shrewsbury" was reinstated sometime before the borough was incorporated in 1834.

The most significant period of development in Shrewsbury occurred during the first six decades of the nineteenth century. During this era Shrewsbury developed into the religious, educational, financial, social, mercantile and artisans' center for the Shrewsbury Township area. During the 1840's for instance two brick, church affiliated schools were built. In 1850, the Shrewsbury Savings Institution was established. In 1856 a public school was established, as was the Shrewsbury Academy, which had a staff of six professors. Numerous church congregations were established, and many civic committees, fraternal organizations, and social clubs were founded. In 1853, only seven years after gaining its charter, the local Oddfellows chapter built its own hall. This large, 3½ story brick structure was constructed in the Greek Revival style and is south-central York County's finest example of that style. The building is particularly noteworthly when one considers that the population of Shrewsbury at this time was around 500.

In 1838 the railroad line which later became part of the Northern Central system was completed between Baltimore and York.* The route passed about one mile west of Shrewsbury in a narrow stream valley, close enough for a stop named Shrewsbury Station to be established. Soon afterward a turnpike was established between the new station and Shrewsbury Borough. This station grew to be an important shipping and manufacturing center, and was incorporated as Railroad Borough in 1871. The rail line marked the beginning of the end of the turnpike as a major link between Baltimore and the Susquehanna Valley. In 1858 the line was completed to Sunbury.

Shrewsbury, continued to be the dominant community in Shrewsbury Township during the years just after the opening of this new rail line. However, over the next half century the new, nearby rail towns of New Freedom, and in particular, Glen Rock rose to challenge the preeminence of Shrewsbury in the area.

The second half of the nineteenth century remained prosperous for Shrewsbury, but the town attracted little new growth. The population of Shrewsbury Borough declined from a peak of 600 in 1870 to 554 in 1900. On the other hand, the population of Glen Rock, with an economy based on light manufacturing, mush-roomed from 537 in 1870 to 1117 in 1900. Glen Rock remained the larger of the two towns until the mid-twentieth century. New Freedom Borough, one mile southwest of Shrewsbury along the rail line, began to develop in the 1880's as a light manufacturing center, much like Glen Rock. By 1910 New Freedom has also become more populous than Shrewsbury, and remained so until the 1960's. New Freedom in recent years has developed much like Shrewsbury.

*Two years later the Susquehanna and Tidewater Canal was completed between Wrightsville and Havre de Grace.

Shrewsbury's building stock is mainly reflective of an early to mid-nine-teenth century, agriculturally based turnpike town. The linear arrangement of the buildings along Main Street illustrates the importance of the turnpike in the town's early development. Shrewsbury's houses are, for the most part, rather plain and modest in scale, and many would not be particularly note-worthy by themselves. However, most of the major nineteenth and early twentieth century styles are represented in Shrewsbury's housing stock, and as a group these plain and modest houses present a cohesive and complete mid-nineteenth century streetscape, perhaps the finest such streetscape of any small town in York Co.

The wealth which Shrewsbury generated during the nineteenth century is not generally conspicuously displayed in the housing stock. This however, is not the case with Shrewsbury's public buildings, the most numerous and obvious of which are the churches. The most impressive church in the borough is the Romanesque Revival Lutheran church of 1874, which has a particularly noteworthy spire. Also important are the Gothic Revival Methodist church of 1874, and the Gothic Revival Reformed church. Other public buildings of significance include the Greek Revival Oddfellows' hall of 1853, mentioned earlier, and the Beaux Arts/Neo-Classical Revival bank of 1908.

There are only 12 intrusions within the Shrewsbury Historic District, and most of these do little to compromise the integrity of the district. Five of the intrusions are not visible from the main streets, and those that are, with the exception of the 1970's fire hall, are small. Thus, at least in scale, they are in keeping with the character of the district.

The relative importance of Shrewsbury Borough within Shrewsbury Township has changed dramatically over the last 25 years. With the completion of Interstate 83 in 1960 Shrewsbury became more accessible than it had ever been, and the rural character of the area appealed to weary suburbanites, many of them from the north Baltimore area. This new accessibility has transformed Shrewsbury from a small, agrarian mercantile and business center into an expressway bedroom community with subdivisions, shopping centers, and fast food restaurants, and has made Shrewsbury the largest boro in the township again after nearly 100 years. In spite of the recent wave of development in the Shrewsbury area, however, the central core of the town has retained much of its rural nineteenth century character, and presents a cohesive and complete nineteenth century streetscape.
