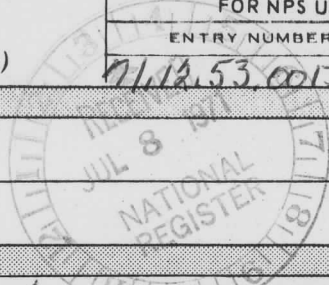

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Pickett House was built in 1856, and is presently standing on the original site. It is a two story frame house, with wood and concrete foundation. The main portion of the house contained a study, master bedroom downstairs and two bedrooms upstairs, with access to the upper floor provided by a ladder. A leanto at the side of the house contained the dining room and kitchen. There was a fireplace in the kitchen, with a chimney made of mud and sticks. Renovations have been made by various owners, in order to make the house more livable. A newer kitchen was built on the back of the leanto, and the first kitchen became the present bathroom. The original dining area has become the caretaker's living room, so that the entire leanto area is a small apartment for the caretaker. The study in the main portion of the house is now an elegant living room, and the master bedroom is a dining room, where the meetings of the Daughters of the Pioneers are held once a month. The ladder to the upstairs rooms has been replaced with a small staircase. All the rooms have wallpaper hung over the original wide undressed planks, and the original floor boards have several newer layers of wood flooring over them. The plumbing and wiring is recent, with electric heat recently installed as baseboard units. Also on the property is a pear tree planted by Captain Pickett in 1856, which is still producing large crops of pears annually, and the stables, which have not been renovated.

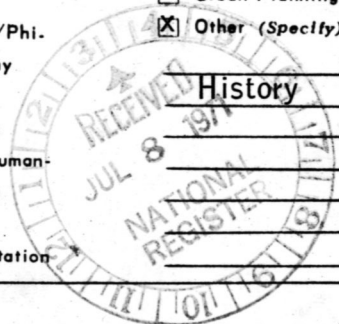

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Pickett House, built in 1856, is one of the few remaining buildings in Whatcom County that date to the earliest days of the white settlement on Bellingham Bay. It is an undistinguished small house, but was for awhile the home of a most distinguished man, General George E. Pickett, of Civil War fame. Pickett was sent as Captain in charge of Company D, Ninth Infantry, in August of 1856 to erect a fort on the bay to protect the small settlement from Indian raids, for at this time, the entire Northwest was expecting a major Indian uprising. The fort was built a few miles northwest from Bellingham, around the bay, and Pickett's house was constructed at the same time, on the bluff above the bay, in the dense woods on the northwest edge of the settlement. The lumber used for the house and the fort was cut at the Roeder mill on Whatcom Creek, and this sawmill was essentially the nucleus of the settlement, with approximately twenty families on homestead claims. Captain Pickett married an Indian woman from a noble family of the Haida tribe, in the year after his arrival, and a son, James Tilton Pickett, was born to them December 31, 1857. Several months afterwards, Mrs. Pickett died, and Captain Pickett cared for the boy until 1859, when his company was removed to San Juan Island, in the Straits of Juan de Fuca, some miles to the west of Bellingham, during the San Juan Boundary Dispute with Great Britain. The boy, through his father's friend, Major James Tilton (Jimmie's namesake), was placed in the care of earlier acquaintances, the William Collins of Arcadia, Washington, near the present capitol of Olympia. Pickett resigned his commission in 1861 and went by ship to the south, to join the Confederacy. He never returned to Washington or saw his son again, but through the underground, he communicated with Major Tilton, a Union officer, and managed to provide the boy with supplies and clothing. Major Tilton had assumed a great portion of the responsibility for young Jimmie. Pickett married a childhood sweetheart, La Salle Corbett of Richmond, in 1864. Later, after Gettysburg and Pickett's famous charge, Pickett was paroled with other Southern officers. He was maligned in Congress by a bitter Union officer, General Butler, after Lincoln's assassination, and with his wife was forced to find safety in Canada. They later were given safe conduct by General Grant, and they returned to Virginia. Pickett died at age fifty, on July 30, 1875, and was later interred with full military honors.

The Pickett House has been constantly occupied since it was built in 1856. Pickett left it in 1859, and it was later sold, exchanging hands until the last

individual owner bought it in 1889. The property was conveyed by the owner to the Washington State Historical Society on January 25, 1936, and it was maintained by the state until September of 1965, when the Society presented it to the Daughters of the Pioneers. It is maintained by the Daughters as a small museum for mementoes of Captain Pickett and early Whatcom County; a young caretaker couple occupies the house now, and guided tours are given for school children and other groups.

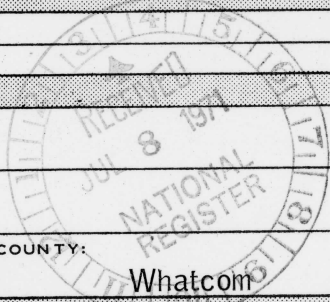

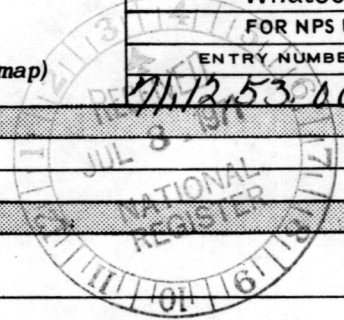

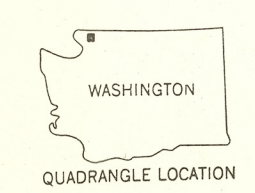

DESCRIPTION

Whatcom is located in Sections 19 and 30 T. 38 N. R. 3 E. and Sections 24 and 25 T. 38 N. R. 2 E. The initial point is the corner common to the four Sec. mentioned above which is 135.40ft South and 1.90ft West of the North Corner of block 185. The pugent sound Guide Meridian crosses the S.E. line of Broadway 2.72ft S.W. of the corner of block 185 and at a distance of 133.46ft N of said Section corner. The angle included between the Guide Meridian and Broadway is 44° 21'. The streets N.W. of Broadway are due N and S. or due E and W as shown on the Map except Front St which bears 66° 05' W all streets are of Broadway are either parallel with or at a right angle with Broadway.
