Dear Ms. Shull:

I am requesting the de-listing from the National Register of three Michigan properties which have been demolished within the past few years.

The former Woodward Avenue Baptist Church (most recently known as the United House of Jeremiah) in Detroit, Wayne County was listed in the National Register on August 3, 1982 as part of a thematic nomination of Religious Structures on Woodward Avenue. The church burned in the summer of 1986 and its ruins have been demolished (please see enclosed copy of letter from the city of Detroit's Historic Designation Advisory Board).

Italian Hall in Calumet, Houghton County, was listed in the Register on July 23, 1980. The structure was demolished in October, 1984 because of its dangerous condition and the lack of funds for repair.

The former Battle Creek Sanitarium (Fieldstone Building) in Battle Creek, Calhoun County, was listed in the Register on October 4, 1978. The building was demolished in late 1985 after a long period of dis-use. The de-listing of these buildings from the National Register has been approved by the Michigan State Historic Preservation Review Board following the required notification of the affected property owners and municipal officials. The one letter received in response to the notifications is enclosed.

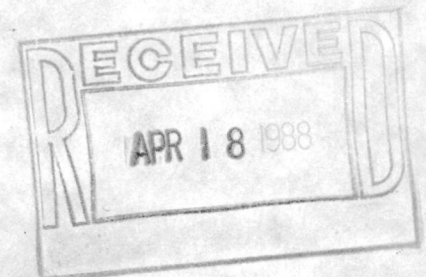

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Battle Creek Sanitarium or Fieldstone Building is a five story, L-shaped structure of uncoursed cobblestone or fieldstone construction which was built to house and still continues to serve a major medical facility. Measuring 232 feet along the main east facade and 225 feet along the south facade, the L-shaped plan consists of three full five story massive hip roof corner blocks joined by two gable roof wings in which hipped dormers provide the fifth story fenestration. Both the facade lines of the corner blocks and the connecting wings are broken by tri-sided bays which rise to the fourth story. The ornamental woodwork of the corner block bay caps and the cornices of the entire structure have been covered with aluminum, but those architectural features are believed to have survived in restorable condition. An octagonal cupola with domical roof and a classically detailed veranda with carriage porch and paired Ionic columns distinguish the structure's east facade. Painted white, the veranda also wraps around the north and south corner blocks, thereby unifying the expansive components of the large edifice.

Though the exterior walls are load bearing, the interior structure consists of an iron column, steel beam, wood joist system whose elements have been well maintained. The ornamental plasterwork details of the first floor rotunda (see photograph #3) and solarium pilasters, columns, and beams have been preserved in their original character. White enameled and classically treated, they create an open and light interior space which contrasts notably with the exterior massing of the uncoursed fieldstone facades. The structure still possesses its oak stairway wainscoting and balustrades and its two original eight by ten foot elevator shafts. A new sprinkler system and heating plant were installed in the 1940s, and some ground floor rooms have been subdivided for office use.

Several contemporary accounts of the opening of the health facility mentioned its setting, the circular driveway to the central east facade entrance, the curving walkways, and the well planted and shaded grounds. This landscaping between the east facade and Washington Avenue has been maintained with remarkable integrity and the existing trees, vistas, and setbacks continue to provide the property with one of its most attractive features.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Battle Creek Sanitarium or Fieldstone Building is significant because of its massive size and unique fieldstone construction and because of its association with the health and health food industries for which Battle Creek has gained national fame.

The Fieldstone Building was commissioned in 1899 by Dr. O. S. Phelps and his younger brother Neil. Born in upstate New York, the Phelps family moved to Washtenaw County, Michigan in 1861. After service as a hospital steward in the Civil War and medical training at the University of Michigan, Dr. Phelps practiced his profession in Michigan, California, and New York until 1898 when Neil convinced his older brother to join him in the construction and direction of a health sanatorium in Battle Creek. The two brothers incorporated the Phelps Medical and Surgical Sanatorium early in 1899, selected Robert T. Newberry of Chicago as their architect, and broke ground that spring. Newberry, formerly associated with the Chicago firms of Burnham and Root and Jenny and Mundie, received the Phelps' commission because they judged him to be "one of the few men in the country who have the capacity to do all of the work relating to a large structure, including the original conception, planning, structural engineering, equipping with elevators, engines, boilers, dynamos, electric apparatus, kitchen and laundry machinery, refrigerator apparatus, and finally the finish, decoration, furnishing and landscape gardening."¹ The excellent condition and impressive character of the Fieldstone Building and its grounds today provide convincing testimony for the accuracy of the Phelps' estimate of their architect.

Though the Phelps brothers built their Medical and Surgical Sanatorium "to rival the famous Kellogg sanitarium, the largest medical and surgical sanitarium in the world,"² neither they nor successive owners could sustain that competition. The Fieldstone Building passed into the

possession of Charles W. Post around 1905. That outspoken manufacturer and mass advertiser, the inventor of Postum and Grape Nuts, in turn sold the structure to Bernarr Macfadden, a flamboyant publisher, health nutritionist, and physical culturalist, who from 1907 to 1910 served as proprietor of the Fieldstone Macfadden Sanatorium. Though C. W. Post went on to head several national alliances opposed to trade union organization, and Macfadden succeeded in establishing a firm which published popular magazines such as True Story, True Romances, True Detective Mysteries, and a highly successful series of six pamphlets on sex, neither they nor the Phelps could generate sufficient revenue from the structure to sustain its operation. Consequently the Fieldstone Building was purchased in 1914 by the Battle Creek Sanitarium's health propagandist par excellence and breakfast food king, Dr. John Harvey Kellogg.

By 1914 Dr. John H. Kellogg had emerged as a controversial and key leader in the major Battle Creek industries of health food and health care. Born in 1852 of Michigan parents who had recently converted to the Seventh Day Adventist faith, John grew up in Battle Creek, the national headquarters for that church. After receiving his medical training at the University of Michigan and New York City's Bellevue Hospital, Dr. Kellogg returned to Battle Creek where he edited the Adventist Health Reformer and directed their Western Health Reform Institute which he renamed in the late 1870s as the Battle Creek Sanitarium, "a place where people learn to stay well." The Sanitarium prospered under Dr. Kellogg's well publicized supervision. He advocated a regimen of regular exercise and fresh air and abstinence from alcohol, tobacco, coffee, tea, refined sugar, and meat. This program plus sound medical practice made the institution a successful enterprise which was patronized by thousands of prominent Americans. Moreover, Dr. Kellogg's dietary convictions prompted his establishment of an experimental food laboratory where in the 1890s he developed the first flaked cereal, corn, and rice--products subsequently mass produced at enormous profit by his younger brother W. K. Kellogg. Although Dr. Kellogg initially enjoyed Adventist support, his strong and contentious personality, desire for ever-expanding programs, and theological departures eventually led to irreconcilable differences and he was formally excommunicated from the church in 1907. One of John Harvey's more controversial departures from religious orthodoxy resulted in his creation of the Race Betterment Foundation which he organized in 1914 to promote his interest in eugenics, a movement concerned with improving the human species through the control of hereditary factors in mating.

After its purchase in 1914, John H. Kellogg used the Fieldstone Building to house the Race Betterment Foundation and portions of his Battle Creek College. The Fieldstone Building served in those capacities until 1943, the year of Dr. Kellogg's death, when the principal Sanitarium complex located one block to the south on the east side of Washington Avenue was sold to the federal government.³ Thereafter the Fieldstone Building assumed its present name as the Battle Creek Sanitarium. Ownership of the structure was eventually transferred from the Race Betterment Foundation to a Seventh Day Adventist Board of Trustees which presently operates the Battle Creek Sanitarium Hospital. Modern medical facilities have been constructed immediately to the south, and the Fieldstone Building currently provides space for administrative offices, central storage, and food service facilities which are open to the public and continue to prepare wholesome Adventist meals.

Thus long associated with some of the nation's most famous leaders in the related industries of medical treatment and health food production, the massive Fieldstone Building also known as the Battle Creek Sanitarium continues to stand as architectural and historic landmark of unique significance for the City of Battle Creek and the State of Michigan.

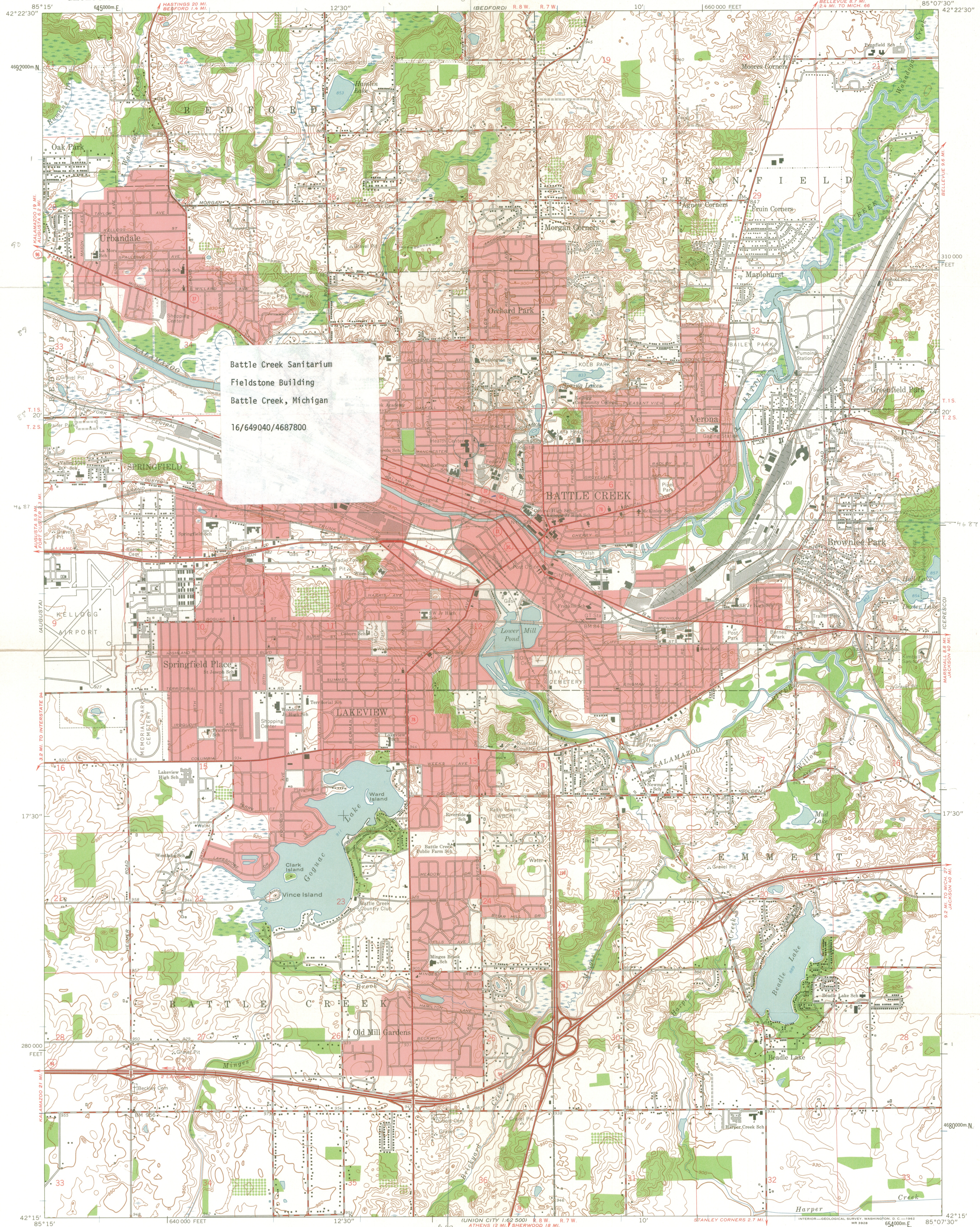

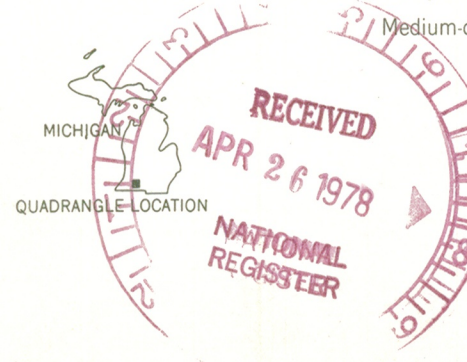
