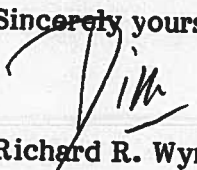
The purpose of the congress is to train students how to share their faith with their peers. Our goal is to have 20,000 young people and youth leaders from across the nation in attendance.

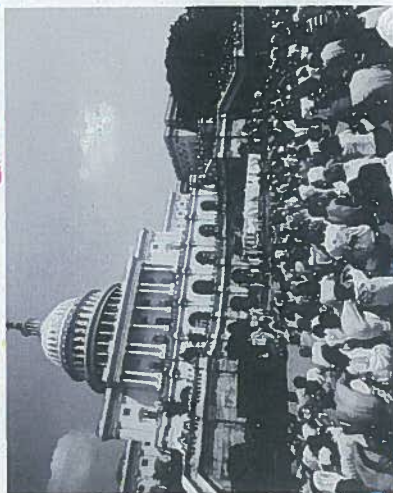

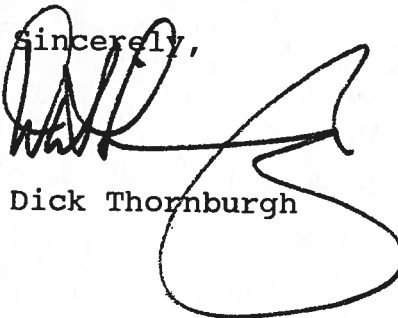

121st Congress of Correction

THEME AND GOALS

"The Evolution of Corrections: Options for the Future" is the theme for the 121st Congress of Correction. This theme indicates the need for corrections professionals to examine the history of this vital field so that we may better prepare for the future. Through more than 200 years of corrections' history, we as corrections professionals have grown and achieved a tremendous amount; this year's Congress will reflect on the past while we look to the possibilities and challenges of the future. In keeping with the theme, the Coordinating Council has selected seven broad goals for the Congress:

- to examine the evolution of corrections over the past two centuries, to look at how corrections will develop and grow in the '90s, and to reflect on how corrections professionals might influence its future;
- to discuss ways in which corrections can improve its image with the public, media, and the electoral body;
- to create an awareness of the appropriateness of and the need for intermediate sanctions for offenders over the next several years;
- to focus on staff wellness in developing and maintaining a healthy, highly skilled workforce;
- to promote pride in corrections as a career, and create a better awareness of the need for corrections' services within other agencies;
- to examine the opportunities for corrections to be a more positive source in society for both the United States and abroad; and
- to develop viable ways in which to interact more effectively with all aspects of the criminal justice system.

121st Congress of Correction

MAJOR SESSIONS

Major Session A: Intermediate Sanctions: Developing Punishment Alternatives in Community Corrections Coordinated by: Dennis S. Avery

The escalating cost of prison construction and the continuing operational costs associated with lengthy terms of confinement are taxing all levels of government to the limit. How can corrections hold offenders accountable to their victims and to society while serving the purpose of punishment, short of imprisonment? This session will explore sentencing models between traditional probation and prison which can help us respond to the growing need for alternatives to incarceration.

Goal: To provide a forum for discussing corrections' role in promoting models of effective sentencing within the community, and to explore specific sentencing options, programs, and strategies currently being used as community-based sanctions.

Major Session B: Special Needs Offenders: Nobody's Sole but Everybody's Shared Responsibility Coordinated by: Judy Culpepper Briscoe

Just as issues in society have become more complex, so have the needs of offenders. Multi-problemmed offenders, whether male, female, juvenile, adult, or aged, are the most difficult with whom to work and are many times victims themselves. Because their problems transcend traditional agency jurisdictions, no one agency can address all their needs. Corrections and human services professionals must begin merging ideas and resources. Sex offender treatment, service brokering for the mentally retarded/developmentally disabled, pre-trial diversion for the mentally ill, and health care for the aged are cooperative approaches. The future demands that we work together to develop innovative strategies to meet offenders' special needs.

Goal: To explore strategies to overcome territorial imperatives and look at ways to begin working with other systems to share resources and responsibilities for special needs offenders.

Major Session C: The Glass House: The Public Image of Corrections Coordinated by: Lynne N. DeLano

The public's perception of corrections is heavily influenced by its portrayal in the media. The case of Willie Horton was transformed by the media and politicians from an isolated tragedy to a national debacle for corrections, and ultimately resulted in a significant, regressive change in correctional policy across the nation. Willie Horton, however, is perhaps more symbolic of our failure to deal effectively with the external environment—the public, media, and politicians—than a reflection of poor corrections policy.

Goal: To explore the important role and impact of the media and politics on correctional policy and practice, and to discuss strategies for marketing corrections to the public, the media, and the electorate.

Major Session D: Substance Abuse: Interventions to Break the Vicious Cycle Coordinated by: Tamara Holden

Causes and cures identified thus far in the effort to stop substance abuse are multi-dimensional. Prevention options must be implemented to break the cycle of generations of addicted families. Clinics, residential treatment centers, and secure facilities must be available and equipped to treat offenders with substance abuse problems. Effective sanctions to inhibit dealers who are not users must also be developed. Many other options must be explored if the corrections field is to positively affect the destructiveness of substance abuse.

Goal: To continue the dialogue among corrections professionals, which will lead to the implementation of multi-level options for combatting substance abuse.

Major Session E: Juvenile Justice: A System in Transition Coordinated by: Charles J. Kehoe

The juvenile justice system is under attack as public attention is drawn to youth charged with violent crimes or drug offenses. The percentage of minority youth in juvenile correctional programs is growing at an alarming rate. More and more states are adopting "get tough," automatic transfer statutes. In spite of all this, there are states where model programs and innovative approaches address the needs of violent and non-violent juvenile offenders. This session will examine national trends and explore strategies to stabilize the role of the juvenile justice system.

Goal: To provide participants with facts regarding youth in the juvenile justice system, to realistically define the juvenile justice system's role, and to learn new strategies for providing services to youth and families.

Major Session F: The Correctional Environment: Promoting Safety, Reducing Violence Coordinated by: Jess Maghan, Ph.D.

The correctional environment is increasingly fraught with danger. The supervision and security mission of institutional and community-based correctional agencies is essential to the safety of the public, staff, and offenders. The experiences of correctional employees provide a rich resource and can contribute to a safe and secure working environment. This knowledge can both reinforce traditional and assist in identifying innovative ways to ensure safety.

Goal: To allow correctional employees the opportunity to discuss and present the most effective ways for reducing violence and promoting safety.

Major Session G: The Changing Role of Detention Facilities: Local Jails or Local Prisons? Coordinated by: Robert M. Martineau

Offenders are serving longer sentences in local and county jails, thus influencing and changing the role, culture, and the dynamics prevailing in these facilities. Many sentences approximate those served in state and federal systems. The two worlds of jails and prisons, once clearly distinct, now begin to more closely resemble one another—innovative programs and services once identified only with state and federal prisons are now being offered in jails.

MAJOR SESSIONS

(continued)

Developing work and earning opportunities and job readiness training; mental and physical health services; and introducing educational and computer literacy, and improved staff training are several programs in practice and under consideration by county and local jails. This Major Session will address these and many other options and practices.

Goal: To share strategies among local, county, and state corrections professionals on adapting to the changing role of local jails. Sharing technologies and developing long-term working relationships will be examined.

Major Session H: Offenders as Resources

Coordinated by: Gary D. Maynard

The resource potential of our offender population is virtually untapped. Ecological, environmental, and societal problems can be addressed by the creative use of offender talent, skills, and initiative. Projects for the aging, children, handicapped, and homeless can benefit from the human resources we have in abundance.

Goal: To inspire corrections professionals to look at offenders as assets and resources, rather than liabilities and problems. Corrections' leaders should look to the past for great public works and conservation efforts that have application today.

Major Session I: 200 Years of Correctional Design and Technology

Coordinated by: Walter B. Ridley

As we acknowledge the 200th anniversary of prisons in America, it is imperative that we examine how far we've come in correctional design and technology, as well as where we are going. Using a modified debate format, this Major Session will examine what effect correctional design and technology has on corrections in America.

Goal: To provide participants with several perspectives into the correctional system as design and technology has and will continue to evolve.

Major Session J: Correctional Health Care: Issues for the '90s

Coordinated by: Patricia Satterfield

Health care costs continue to spiral upward while the economic forecast for corrections is bleak. The demand for offender care spans the gamut from the cradle to the grave. Challenges for the '90s include the management of the AIDS/HIV epidemic, an aging population, the special problems of the handicapped, and the prevalence of the mentally ill. In response to health care needs, correctional administrators must be innovative and seek new resources to deal effectively with these issues.

Goal: To provide a forum for corrections professionals to discuss strategies that will address the multiplicity of health issues, and to identify cost-effective solutions.

Major Session K: Legal Issues: The Impact on Corrections' Mission

Coordinated by: John J. Vollmann Jr.

The correctional mission is highly affected by legal issues, often causing frustration among corrections practitioners. This session will address issues such as employee drug testing, freedom of information for correctional records, confidentiality and the AIDS/HIV clients, use of force, and current litigation.

Goal: To develop staff awareness of current legal issues, and how they pertain to the daily activities of corrections professionals.

Major Session L: The Corrections Workforce: Invest Now or Pay Later

Coordinated by: Marjorie H. Young

Corrections is facing a future of continued scrutiny by the public, limited resources, and more complex offenders. Our most valuable resource to face this future is our workforce. Priority must be given to maintaining the well-being of correctional

employees. A highly skilled workforce is needed to address public safety and motivate offenders toward rehabilitation. Our greatest challenge is to develop and maintain an enthusiastic, healthy, and professional workforce.

Goal: To share strategies on how to develop and retain a highly skilled and productive workforce.

Major Session M: International Corrections

Coordinated by: Sara Heatherly, Chair, International Relations Committee

Major Session N: Standards and Accreditation

Coordinated by: James R. Irving, Chair, Standards and Accreditation Committee

NIC Special Intensive Skills Training Workshops

Liaison: Jim Robertson, NIC Jails Division

The National Institute of Corrections will sponsor three Intensive Skills Training Workshops. The goal of these sessions will be to develop various professional skills through training and group interaction. Facilitators will use group interaction as a teaching method and are required to measure goal attainment.

Professional Education Seminars

Liaison: Raymond A. Helgemoe, Professional Education Council

The Professional Education Council will sponsor three Professional Education Seminars which will cover topics pertinent to corrections. The goals of each session will be determined individually.

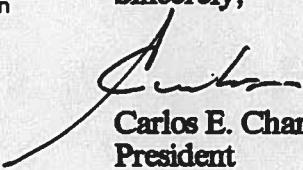

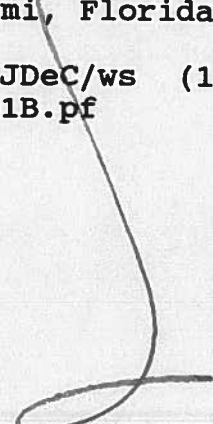
