**Re: *Sesquicentennial Symposium on Engineering and
the Environment February 27 - 29, 1992***

When I last wrote you on July 24, 1991, the Sesquicentennial Symposium seemed to be in the distant future. It is hard to believe that the symposium is now only four months away. I am pleased to say that the arrangements are coming together well.

You may recall from our earlier correspondence that the symposium will run from the morning of Thursday, February 27 to noon on Saturday, February 29. The symposium opens with a plenary session on Thursday morning. This session will be followed by three technical sessions. The technical session on Thursday afternoon will have as its theme *Chemicals and the Environment*. The technical session on Friday morning will have as its theme *Energy and the Environment* and theme of the afternoon session will be *Urban Development and the Environment*.

The conference banquet will be on Thursday evening. Friday evening there will be a panel discussion on the topic of *Solid Waste Management--What are the Options?* The symposium closes on Saturday morning with judging of student design projects. We very much hope that you will be able to attend the entire symposium.

As indicated on the attached tentative schedule, your presentation will be the opening talk of the symposium on Thursday morning. We have developed the schedule on the assumption that each presentation will be approximately 30 minutes in length, and that each speaker would be prepared to entertain questions from the audience for approximately 10 minutes. We anticipate the audience will consist primarily of students and staff from our various engineering departments, together with a number of invited alumni and guests and local politicians and Kingston residents.

As an alumni of Queen's University, you are probably familiar with the modes of public transportation which serve the city. I'm not sure if you are aware that Kingston is now approximately an hour's flight time from Toronto. Canadian Partner (an affiliate of Canadian Airlines International) has several daily flights from Toronto's Pearson International Airport. Accommodations have been reserved for visiting speakers at the Hochelaga Inn. This elegantly restored inn was constructed in the early 1880's and is within walking distance of Queen's University.

Could I ask you to help us with the next step of our planning by completing the enclosed information sheet and returning it to Ms. L. Wagar, at the address shown on the sheet?

We would very much like to include a short biography and a recent photograph of each of the speakers together with a synopsis of the talk in the promotional material for the symposium. If this material and the completed information sheet could be sent to Ms. Wagar by November 25, 1991 it would be most helpful.

Birgit Breuel has headed the Trusteeship Agency (Treuhandanstalt) since last April and has been a member of its Board since October 1990. The Treuhand is charged with privatizing firms in all sectors of the once communist economy of eastern Germany. With as many as 10,000 firms originally in its control, it has already sold off over 3,000 of them.

A Christian Democrat since 1978, Ms. Breuel has been a member of the CDU's Lower Saxony Executive Board since 1982 and of its national Executive Board since 1983. She has held two ministerial posts in Lower Saxony, transportation (1978-1986) and finance (1986-1990).

She succeeded Detlev Rohwedder as the head of the Treuhand following his assassination. Dr. Rohwedder spoke under the Institute's auspices on the Agency's work in November 1990.

In addition, he is a member of the National Academy of Sciences, of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, a foreign member of the Brazilian Academy of Sciences and a Benjamin Franklin Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts (London).

CEI's fall schedule of educational programs offers a full complement of topics, issues and strategies for addressing environmental problems.

The September workshop on "The Future of the Finger Lakes" sparked interest and ideas and generated information about unmet needs. CEI staff and a Board-level steering committee are now evaluating and recommending a course of action.

The September Timely Topic Seminar on the Genesee Valley Greenway highlighted an important regional initiative for which CEI is pleased to provide office space on behalf of the New York State Parks and Conservation Association, the project

sponsor, in concert with a regional steering committee.

In October, "Environmental Dialogue—Making Contact With the Other Side" will be offered by CEI's Program in Environmental Risk Communication in co-operation with the Center for Dispute Settlement.

Our Annual Meeting in November will feature a talk by **Dr. Allan Bromley**, the President's science adviser, on an Action Plan for Global Climate Change, to be followed in early December by the eighth annual Washington conference of our Air Resources Information Clearinghouse on the topic of Global Climate Change: Linking Energy, Environment, Economy and Equity.

I'm pleased to tell you that CEI has received another grant from Region II EPA to hold a workshop in Westchester County in early December modeled after the workshop on recycling nontraditional materials (oil, batteries, tires, plastics) held in Rochester earlier this year.

And, finally, we take this opportunity to join with all of the Greater Rochester region in salute to Assemblyman **Roger Robach**, whose un-

timely death leaves a great void. His advocacy in Albany on behalf of this area ensured the viability of many vital services and programs. CEI's free information services received much needed support of \$5,400 this year from the state's aid-to-localities budget, due in large part to his efforts. We extend our sympathy and appreciation to his family.

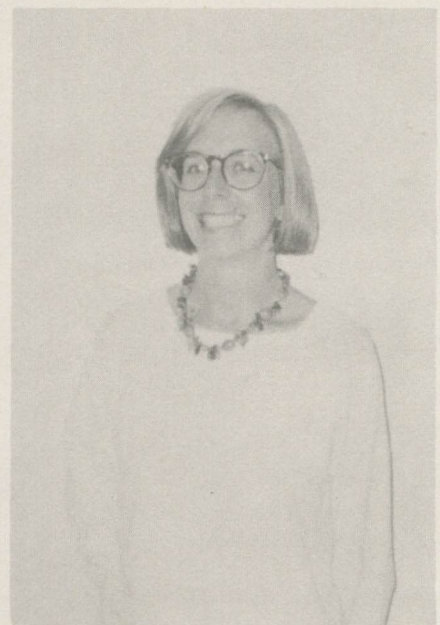
Her academic credentials include a 1985 B.A. in English from William Smith College and a Master of Library Science degree from the Syracuse

GREENWAY PLANS PROCEED

The Genesee River and Canal Greenway Project is off to a successful start according to **Jeff Swain**, Chairman of the New York Parks and Conservation Association.

Speaking at a September Timely Topic Luncheon, Swain reported that 25 out of the potential 50 miles of trails—that would run from Letchworth State Park to Rochester along the abandoned Genesee Valley Canal, Pennsylvania Railroad and Genesee River—have been inventoried.

This inventory was accomplished thanks to the efforts of local town officials along the proposed route, as well as regional and state officials and a 36-member steering committee, chaired by **Charles L. Van Arsdale**, retired President of the Bank of Castile.

Said Swain, the success of the greenway depends entirely upon this type of intermunicipal and regional cooperation, as well as the grassroots efforts of local citizens and property owners who live in areas that will be affected by the project.

The only funding the project has received so far is a \$40-\$50 thousand two-year grant for planning purposes only. No state money is currently avail-

able due, in large part, to voter rejection of the proposed 1990 Environmental Bond Act.

However, other greenways have been successful under similar financial circumstances, according to the second speaker, **Karl Beard**, who is New York Field Office Director for the National Park Service. Beard gave a slide presentation of the Hudson and Delaware Canal Greenway, which was developed with a minimum of money. Land easements, land gifts, leasing and volunteer efforts all combined to make that project workable.

According to Beard these innovative techniques can and should be explored as ways of making the Genesee River and Canal Greenway a resource that will enhance the quality of life in upstate New York.

Once the corridor is a reality, upkeep expenses can be eliminated if local groups and organizations undertake the responsibility of keeping trails clear and in good condition. As an example, Beard cited the Appalachian Trail, where the entire 2,100 miles of trails are maintained by private groups along the way.

Action plans for the Genesee corridor to be undertaken in 1992 include: reaching an agreement on trail development and management issues with Rochester Gas and Electric owned trail sections in Livingston County; working to highlight existing projects along the riverfront; and providing technical assistance to grassroots working groups in towns along the corridor to help them open new trails and river-access points.

Future of Finger Lakes Assessed at Workshop

What issues are of greatest importance to the Finger Lakes Region as a whole? Water quality and land use and development, according to a survey of seventy-three invited attendants at CEI's one-day conference, "The Future of the Finger Lakes Region—Revisited," held recently at Cornell University's Agricultural Experiment Station in Geneva, New York.

The majority of survey respondents also believed that regional cooperative efforts "should extend beyond individual lake watershed boundaries."

Water pollution was selected as the problem common to the region which caused the greatest impact, with overdevelopment a close second. Other problems cited included the negative impacts of tourism, lack of uniform zoning, conflicting land and water uses, new septic regulations, and lack of coordination and planning at all government levels.

In discussing how to tackle these complex issues, most workshop attendants rejected the idea of a Finger Lakes "superagency." Instead, talk centered around State University of

tal Studies, **Dr. Robert Hennigan's** suggestion of creating a new institution from "the bottom up." This idea, heard frequently at the conference, was developed by **Martin Culik** of the Cornell Cooperative Extension who noted that the "bottom up" approach depended upon input from the general public as well as a developed program of community education.

In a three-page letter of post workshop suggestions, **Dr. Harlan Brumsted**, Department of Natural Resources, Cornell University, urged that CEI assist the Finger Lakes Region in areas in its (CEI's) areas of expertise such as "leadership, organization, development and especially public education...for awareness and action, that is, delivering the knowledge to provide understanding required for effective public action."

The workshop, co-sponsored by the Rochester Area Foundation, was a follow-up to a 1978 two-day CEI conference, "The Future of the Finger Lakes." Additional funding for the session was provided by Wegmans and an anonymous donor.

of Monroe, Orleans, Wayne, Genesee, Livingston, Ontario, Seneca, Yates, Steuben, Schuyler, Tompkins and Chemung. Candidates for the award may come from either the public or private sector, and are eligible regardless of their place of residence or location of employment, as long as their environmental efforts have benefitted the twelve-county region.

Nominations, which must be received by October 15, will be considered by a four-member panel. Activities the awards committee will consider can consist of technical contributions or achievements, or can center on contributions of time, expertise or other resources. Such activities must have taken place within the immediately preceding year and may

have occurred over past years. Contributions of either a one-time or a continuing nature may both be considered.

Whatever form this activity takes, it should be substantial and have been undertaken beyond the performance of a routine job, community expectation or legal requirement.

The winner of the 1991 award will be announced on October 30, and the award will be presented at CEI's Annual Meeting on November 6.

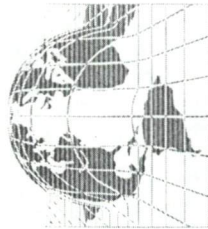

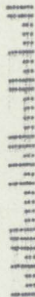

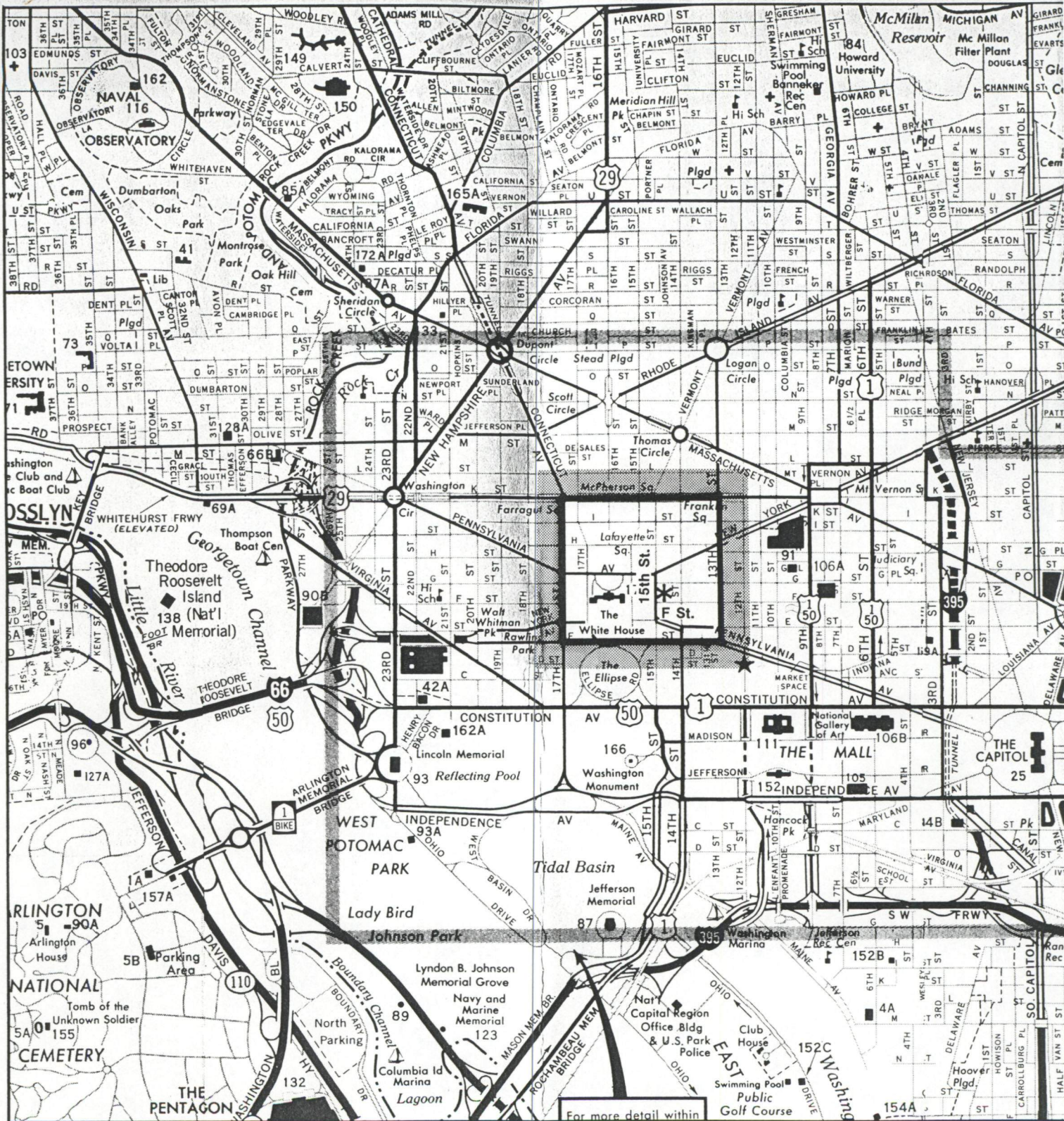
