Dear Dr. Bromley:

The International Association of University Presidents (IAUP), at its triennial meeting in Spain in July 1990, approved a working relationship with the Department for Disarmament Affairs of the United Nations. Enclosed is a Statement of Support from that Department.

The centerpiece of this relationship will be the formation of a commission of rectors, scholars, diplomats, arms control experts, and citizens, for the purpose of developing a cluster of interdisciplinary courses on arms control issues. This team will then select a few universities where these courses can be experimentally offered and evaluated.

We anticipate that the commission will consist of two layers: a steering committee of around 15, and a "corresponding" segment of around 30 persons. The former will meet monthly at the UN in New York, and will therefore need to live chiefly in that region. The corresponding members may reside anywhere, and will communicate primarily by telephone, FAX, and normal correspondence.

Except in hardship cases, participants will be expected to cover any travel expenses. However, U.S. meetings will be held annually in conjunction with ACE, and meetings abroad in conjunction with IAUP Executive Committee and triennial meetings. At IAUP meetings, all in-country expenses are covered by host governments or universities. Foundation funds are being sought, and a few donors have already expressed interest.

The IAUP Executive Committee, with the support of the UN Department of Disarmament Affairs, wishes to extend to you an invitation to be a member of the steering committee. We are especially seeking persons like yourself who have a concern about arms control, work well across cultural barriers, and/or are outstanding scholars or practitioners in one or more of the fields listed below. In addition to the foregoing qualities, we are anxious to involve persons who can speak and write in layman's language and who are sympathetic toward a multi-disciplinary approach.

Members of this commission might be asked at some future time to speak in support of arms control at seminars and conferences sponsored by the UN and related bodies. Your acceptance of this invitation, and/or nominations of other



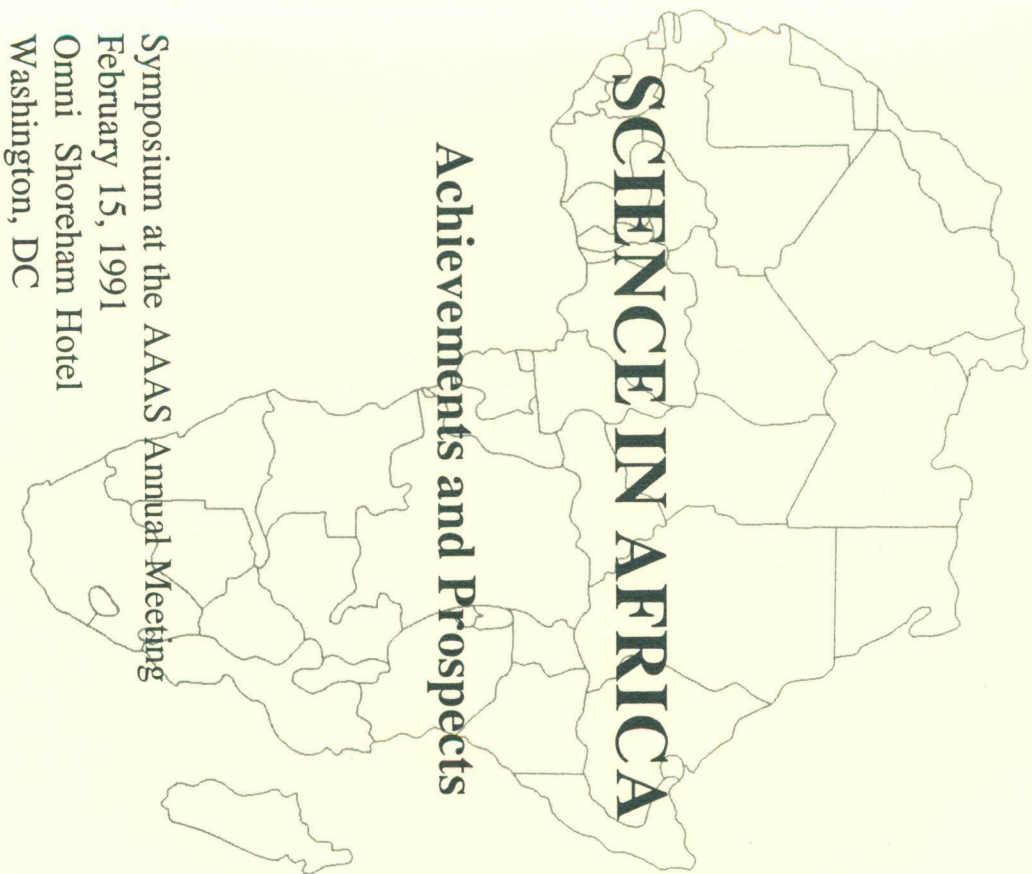

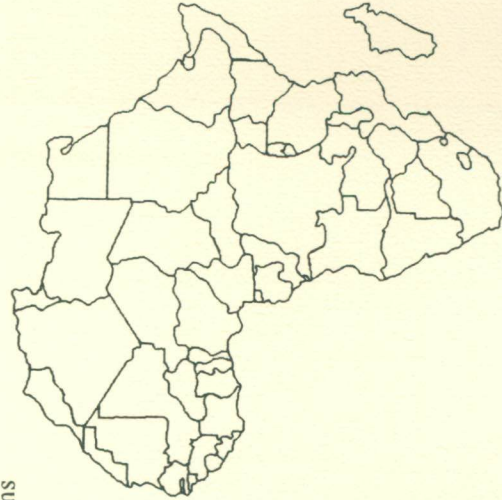

For the Sub-Saharan Africa Program of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), one of the most important realizations gleaned from years of collaboration with African colleagues has been the high quality of their research and their extensive contributions to African development. 
