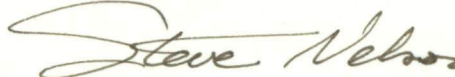

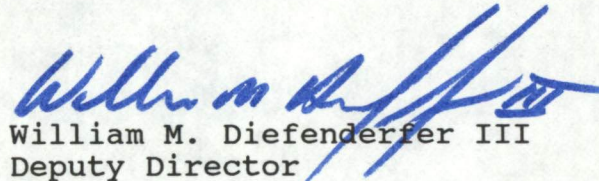

Separate ceilings are provided for discretionary appropriations categories, for direct spending, and, if appropriate, credit limitations. Details concerning multi-year totals and category sub-totals can be provided by staff of this Office. (Additional details for the current and budget years are shown in Chapter XII.B., "Federal Programs by Agency and Account," and Chapter XIII.A., "Detailed Budget Estimates by Agency" of the 1992 Budget.) These are the amounts within which your activities should be planned for the period FY 1991 through FY 1996. Supplemental appropriations for FY 1991 or FY 1992 will not be considered unless accompanied by an equal reduction.

Ceilings on civilian employment for your agency are provided in Enclosure B.

The Administration is committed to abiding by the limitations on discretionary appropriations and to maintaining deficit neutral direct spending, under the terms of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as it was amended by the Budget Enforcement Act of 1990. The President is depending on you to manage your resources prudently under these constraints and to ensure that Federal responsibilities are carried out in an effective and efficient manner.

Thank you very much for your letter of 21 February. In acknowledging it, I welcome the opportunity to report to you that the President's science budget for 1992 has been received with approval and relief by the many physicists who are deeply concerned about the state of science support in our country. We are indeed pleased that the policies which you outlined to us shortly after you went to Washington are clearly reflected in the budget document. This is the crucial first step in the budget process, and we shall do all we can to let our representatives in Congress know that the recommended increases point us in the right direction.

The enclosed memorandum to the APS Physics Planning Committee briefly comments on recent Washington developments. It also refers to Leon Lederman's recent initiative. I know that you will use your much-respected powers of persuasion to insure that the core of Leon's plea - to strengthen science education and research for the good of the nation's future (and not just for the pleasure of a generation of scientists) - does not get drowned out by a chorus of critics of his exuberant and admittedly "unrealistic demands".

We look forward to seeing you at the APS Washington meeting, if not sooner.

SUBJECT: Comments on Minutes of 14 December 1990 Meeting

We have finally found time to edit the minutes of our last meeting. If you read them, you will observe that the passage of two months has dated them in many ways. This note summarizes the events since 14 December.

The Council has approved a formal statement about the Space Station, quite close to the draft which the PPC sent back to POPA. Recently, the APS President has responded to a request from George Brown's Committee on Science, Space and Technology for written testimony with regard to the Space Station.

Entitled "Their Most Productive Years: Young Physics Faculty in 1990", the PPC report on the Survey appears on page 37 of the February 1991 issue of PHYSICS TODAY. Initial reactions to the presentation have been positive, but as expected the substance of the report has caused some dismay.

The Lederman report on "Science: The End of the Frontier?" has received much attention in Washington during the past six weeks. Leon gave several presentations at the AAAS meeting, and the report has been repeatedly referred to in the newspapers. George Brown grappled with it on at least two occasions. The AAAS is establishing a committee that will consider how best to advance the case which Leon has so made so passionately. The heart of Leon's message is that the nation needs a flourishing science enterprise as an investment in the future. It is important that this proposition not be obscured by arguments about the reliability of some of the dollar figures and percentages. Leon intends to make as much common cause as possible with the scientific societies and plans to involve the Council of Scientific Society Presidents, which APS has just rejoined after a lapse of several years.

The President's 1992 Budget contains some good news for science, as you know from What's New, AIP's FYI, and articles in SCIENCE and elsewhere. As Bob Park and Allan Bromley frequently remind us, none of this is final, and the budget that emerges from Congress next fall may be quite different. The time to make our case before Congress has arrived. Congressional Day, on Thursday 25 April, will provide an opportunity for constructive interactions with responsible people in Congress. Preparations are moving along under the direction of Tina Kaarsberg and Bob Park (plus some extra part-time help hired for the occasion).

The Council Statement on Physics Funding and the SSC and a page of explanatory text have been widely distributed by the Washington Office. In his retiring presidential address at the AAAS, Don Langenberg cited the statement approvingly as a rare example of scientists doing their "civic duty". There has of course also been some "flak", but most of our colleagues seem to feel that the Council did the right thing.

Where shall we go from here? Please be prepared for debating that question when we meet on **Friday, 26 April, at the APS Washington Office.**
