**SUBJECT: REPORTING CABLE ON ACADEMICIAN SULTANGAZIN'S  
MEETING WITH DR. D. ALLAN BROMLEY ON MAY 19, 1992**

**SUMMARY:**

**END SUMMARY.**

**ACADEMICIAN UMIRZAK SULTANGAZIN CALLED ON DR. D. ALLAN BROMLEY, THE ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT FOR SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY AT 4: 30 PM IN ROOM 358 OF THE OLD EXECUTIVE OFFICE BUILDING. SULTANGAZIN WAS ACCOMPANIED BY AN INTERPRETER. DR. BROMLEY WAS JOINED BY DR. J. THOMAS RATCHFORD AND JOHN O'NEIL OF OSTP, AND CATHY KVALEC OF THE KAZAKH DESK, STATE. SULTANGAZIN WAS IN WASHINGTON IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE VISIT OF THE PRESIDENT OF KAZAKHSTAN, NURSULTAN NAZARBAYEV.**

**ACADEMICIAN SULTANGAZIN BEGAN BY DISCUSSING S&T LEGISLATION**

AND MANAGEMENT IN KAZAKHSTAN. HE REPORTED THAT HE HAD LED A GROUP TO PREPARE S&T LEGISLATION. HE LAMENTED THAT SINCE THERE WAS NO SPECIAL LEGISLATION FOR S&T NOR TALK OF A LAW governing science (?) GOVERNED SOCIETY IN THE USSR, THE GROUP STUDIED LEGISLATION AND MANAGEMENT STRUCTURES IN A NUMBER OF COUNTRIES, BUT CHIEFLY THE U.S. MODEL.

HE POINTED OUT THAT HIS PURPOSE WAS NOT TO CRITICIZE THE SOVIET SYSTEM, UNDER WHICH SCIENCE HAD ADVANCED. BUT, HE SAID, IT IS NOW TIME TO JOIN THE WORLD COMMUNITY AND SINCE REFORMS COME 20 YEARS LATE IN KAZAKHSTAN, THEY FACE WHAT HE CHARACTERIZED AS A DISASTROUS SITUATION.

SULTANGAZIN REPORTED THAT HIS ACADEMY WAS FOUNDED 50 YEARS AGO AND INCLUDES DEPARTMENTS OF: MATHEMATICS; PHYSICS; NUCLEAR PHYSICS (WITH 900 PERSONNEL, A THIRD OF WHOM ARE RESEARCHERS); HIGH ENERGY PHYSICS (INCLUDING COSMIC RAY INVESTIGATIONS); PHYSICAL-TECHNICAL; AND ASTRO-PHYSICS (WHICH HE SINGLED OUT AS WELL-DEVELOPED AND INCLUDING SOME OUTSTANDING SCIENTISTS.) COMMENT: THE LONGER HE DESCRIBED THE INSTITUTES OF THE ACADEMY THE LESS CLEAR IT WAS WHETHER HE WAS DISCUSSING DEPARTMENTS OR INSTITUTES. HE MENTIONED AT THIS POINT THAT FORMERLY HE WAS HEAD OF THE MATHEMATICS AND MECHANICS

INSTITUTE.

HE REPORTED THAT HE HAD MET WITH MR. SAMUEL KELLER, ASSOCIATE DEPUTY ADMINISTRATOR OF NASA, AND THAT THEY WERE PURSUING COOPERATION IN THE ENVIRONMENT. SULTANGAZIN ADMITTED THAT THE ENVIRONMENT WAS A PROBLEM LATELY IN KAZAKHSTAN. HE CITED THE ARAL SEA, SEMIPALATINSK, POLLUTING INDUSTRIES, AND THE CASPIAN SEA, WHICH HE REPORTED HAS RISEN TWO METERS IN THE PAST 10 YEARS. ( HE MENTIONED THAT THE VOLGA IS RISING AS WELL.) HE LAMENTED THAT THERE ARE MANY PROBLEMS BUT FEW THEORIES, ALTHOUGH HE OFFERED THAT MOVEMENT OF TECTONIC PLATES MAY ACCOUNT FOR THE RISING WATERS. HE ASKED IF THERE WAS INTEREST IN COOPERATION AND RELAYED THAT THERE ARE MANY PROPOSALS OF SUPPORT FROM THE AMERICAN SCIENCE COMMUNITY IN DEALING WITH THE ARAL SEA BUT THAT THEY MUST BE REALISTIC. HE STATED THAT TONS OF SALT ARE EMITTED INTO THE AIR FROM AREAS THAT HAD BEEN UNDER WATER IN THE ARAL SEA. THIS POLLUTION ADVERSELY AFFECTS THE PEOPLE AND THE GROUND WATER WHICH IS SINKING. HE REPORTED DISCUSSION OF DEVELOPING A MATHEMATICAL MODEL FOR THIS PROBLEM, BUT INDICATED HE WOULD LIKE HELP IN DEVELOPING THE MODEL AND IN ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING.

HE THEN PROPOSED TRAINING THROUGH AN EXCHANGE PROGRAM. HE RECOUNTED HIS OBSERVATIONS WHILE AT STANFORD UNIVERSITY IN 1978. CITING THE CASE OF CHINESE, HE SAID WHEN THE U.S. RECOGNIZED THE PRC, ONE RESULT WAS A GREAT NUMBER OF CHINESE STUDENTS STUDYING IN THE U.S. THIS TRAINING OF CHINESE STUDENTS, HE SAID, PLAYED A LARGE ROLE IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF S&T IN PRC. HE ADMITTED THAT NOTHING HAD BEEN PREPARED FOR SIGNATURE ON THIS VISIT BUT THAT PRESIDENT NAZARBAYEV HAD INSTRUCTED HIM TO DETERMINE THE POSSIBILITIES FOR SUCH A PROGRAM.

DR. BROMLEY REPLIED THAT IN THIS COUNTRY EACH COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY ACCEPTS OR REJECTS STUDENTS ON ITS OWN INITIATIVE. HE ADMITTED THAT SOMETIMES THE U.S. DOES HAVE PROGRAMS OF SUPPORT BUT THAT FOREIGN STUDENTS ALSO MUST APPLY TO A UNIVERSITY OR COLLEGE. STUDENTS FROM THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY, EUROPE, ASIA, AND OTHERS REQUEST SUPPORT, JUST AS MANY AMERICANS DO. HOWEVER, AT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT LEVEL, THE ABILITY TO PROVIDE SUPPORT IS LIMITED. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS NO CONTROL OVER WHICH STUDENTS ARE ACCEPTED OR REJECTED BY SCHOOLS. THE U.S. MAY FACILITATE, BUT IN THE PRC EXAMPLE, THE CHINESE HAD PRESELECTED THE STUDENTS SO ONLY THE BEST APPLIED FOR ADMISSION TO U.S. SCHOOLS. HE THEN OFFERED THAT KAZAKHSTAN

COULD DO THIS AS WELL. WHEN SULTANGAZIN STATED THAT FUNDS WERE THE MAJOR OBSTACLE, DR. BROMLEY REMINDED HIM THAT POSITIONS IN AMERICAN SCHOOLS WAS A PROBLEM, TOO.

SULTANGAZIN THEN MENTIONED DEVELOPMENT OF AN INSTITUTE WHICH HE CHARACTERIZED AS OF MUTUAL BENEFIT TO THE U.S. AND KAZAKHSTAN. HE SAID THAT HE HAD DISCUSSED SUCH AS INSTITUTE FOR SPACE AND BAIKONUR WITH MR. KELLER WHO EXPRESSED INTEREST IN THE MISSION TO MARS AND THEREFORE IN MOCKUPS OF REACTORS FOR LONG SPACE FLIGHTS. DR. BROMLEY ASKED IF THE U.S. DELEGATION VISITING ~~TO~~ RUSSIA TO DETERMINE SPACE ITEMS OF MUTUAL INTEREST WOULD VISIT KAZAKHSTAN AS WELL. SULTANGAZIN WAS UNAWARE OF THIS DELEGATION BUT CATEGORIZED THIS TYPE OF ACTIVITY AS AN EXAMPLE OF AN AREA IN WHERE BOTH SIDES HAVE SPECIALISTS. ANOTHER EXAMPLE, HE SAID, WAS SEMICONDUCTORS.

*Technological*  
DR. BROMLEY PRESENTED THE ISSUE OF OWNERSHIP OF PROPERTY AND DEVELOPMENTS AS A PROBLEM FACED BY U.S. INDUSTRY IN DOING BUSINESS WITH THE REPUBLICS OF THE FORMER SOVIET UNION.

SULTANGAZIN ADMITTED UNCERTAINTY IN THIS AREA BUT OFFERED THAT THE TREATY ON TRADE SIGNED THE DAY OF HIS MEETING (IN CONJUNCTION WITH PRESIDENT NAZARBAYEV'S VISIT) MIGHT HELP. THE POINT WAS MADE THAT THERE WOULD BE NO MAJOR FINANCIAL

COMMITMENTS WITHOUT ASSURANCE OF OWNERSHIP RIGHTS.

SULTANGAZIN NOTED THAT KAZAKHSTAN HAS ADOPTED SOME ACTIONS THAT DEAL WITH INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS (IPR). HE CAUTIONED AGAINST HASTE IN THIS MATTER AND RECOMMEND A JOINT EXPERTS GROUP TO STUDY THE MATTER AND FORMULATE RECOMMENDATIONS. HE ADDED THAT THE CHEVRON VENTURE DEALS WITH MANY SCIENTIFIC PROBLEMS. DR. BROMLEY EXPRESSED THE U.S. INTEREST IN ESTABLISHING A WORKING RELATIONSHIP AND THAT A JOINT GROUP SOUNDED REASONABLE.

IN A CONTINUATION MEETING WITH DR. RATCHFORD, SULTANGAZIN REPORTED THE RECENT FORMATION OF A MINISTRY OF SCIENCE IN KAZAKHSTAN, HEADED BY A KAZAKH MINISTER OF SCIENCE NAMED SBILSEZAR (PHONETIC). PREVIOUSLY HE HEADED LASER CENTERS IN SKATURA (PHONETIC) AND ALMA ATA. HE REPORTED THE CURRENT EFFORT TO INVENTORY APPROXIMATELY 100 INSTITUTES WHICH WILL COME UNDER THE MINISTRY. THESE INSTITUTES HAD BEEN UNDER THE CENTER IN THE FORMER USSR.

HE OFFERED THAT THERE ARE NO AGREEMENTS WITH OTHER COUNTRIES AS OF YET AND SULTANGAZIN THEN HANDED OVER A NUMBER OF PROPOSALS. DR. RATCHFORD PRESENTED SULTANGAZIN WITH

INFORMATION ON THE AGREEMENTS THAT WERE IN EFFECT BETWEEN THE U.S. AND THE SOVIET UNION AT THE TIME OF ITS DISSOLUTION AND OFFERED THE POSSIBILITY OF DISCUSSING THESE WITH THE NEW SCIENCE MINISTER AT SOME TIME IN THE FUTURE. THERE ENSUED A DISCUSSION OF THE BOTTOM UP APPROACH TO COOPERATIVE RESEARCH ~~AND THAT~~ <sup>NOTING THAT</sup> COOPERATION WITH THE FORMER SOVIET UNION HAD DEVELOPED TOWARDS THE BOTTOM UP APPROACH. DR. RATCHFORD STRESSED THAT IN THIS APPROACH GOVERNMENT AGREEMENTS MAY OVERLAY THE COOPERATION AS A WAY TO FACILITATE COOPERATION. SULTANGAZIN INDICATED HIS FAMILIARITY WITH THE CONCEPT AND SAID THAT HE WOULD CONTACT THE U.S. EMBASSY ON AGREEMENTS AND HE HOPED THAT IN THE FUTURE A HIGH LEVEL DELEGATION MIGHT DISCUSS THE SUBJECT.

SULTANGAZIN ASKED HOW WE IN THE U.S. MANAGE SCIENCE, AND SPECIFICALLY, BASIC SCIENCE. DR. RATCHFORD POINTED OUT THAT THE NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION (NSF) AND THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH (NIH) WERE THE TWO LARGEST <sup>FUNDING</sup> ORGANIZATIONS, AMONG A NUMBER OF ORGANIZATIONS, THAT FUND BASIC SCIENCE IN THIS COUNTRY. HE MENTIONED THAT THEY USUALLY FUND INDIVIDUALS OR GROUPS, AND NORMALLY NOT INSTITUTES. HE THEN CITED THE EXAMPLE OF THE NSF, ITS PEER REVIEW SYSTEM, AND HOW THIS WOULD LEAD TO

FUNDING OF A PROJECT. SULTANGAZIN WAS VERY INTERESTED IN THIS PROCESS AND INQUIRED AS TO ITS RELIABILITY. DR. RATCHFORD EXPLAINED FURTHER THAT THE SELECTION OF BROAD AREAS OF SCIENCE, E.G. OCEANS, IS A POLICY DECISION. BUT ONCE THAT DECISION HAS BEEN MADE, FUNDING IS ENTIRELY ON A PROJECT BASIS. ~~HE CONTINUED THAT APPROXIMATELY 30% IS DEVOTED TO SUCH FUNDING,~~ BUT THE TOTAL IS DERIVED FROM INDIVIDUAL PROJECT FUNDING. HE ALLOWED THAT SOME HIGH DOLLAR PROJECTS RECEIVE SPECIAL ATTENTION, E.G. SSC, WHEN SULTANGAZIN ASKED FORMS OF SPECIAL FUNDING. JUST BEFORE LEAVING FROM THE EXTENDED MEETING, HE ASKED ABOUT SCIENCE ADVISE TO THE PRESIDENT. DR. RATCHFORD EXPLAINED THE CONCEPT OF THE PRESIDENT'S COUNCIL OF ADVISORS ON S&T (PCAST) AND PROMISED TO FORWARD MATERIAL ON PCAST TO ACADEMICIAN SULTANGAZIN.
