

Dear Amb. Wisner:

I am writing to invite you to participate in talks with a Russian delegation on December 16, 1992, to discuss avenues to expand cooperation in science and technology. At the summit in June of this year, Presidents Bush and Yeltsin issued a Joint Statement on Science and Technology in which they tasked me to meet with Russian officials to discuss this subject. Dr. Boris Saltykov, Russian Minister of Science, Higher Education and Technology Policy, will lead the Russian delegation.

To prepare for these discussions I convened two meetings with the private sector this summer on August 13 and 14. The first meeting consisted of the professional societies, associations, and foundations. Members of various business enterprises in the private sector met on the second day. Participants at both meetings advised the government of their S&T-related activities, both those in progress and planned, and factors which from their perspectives affect their S&T interactions with Russia. Subsequent to this meeting, the Committee on International Science, Engineering, and Technology (CISSET) of the Federal Coordinating Committee on Science, Engineering, and Technology (FCCSET) reported analogous information on government activities.

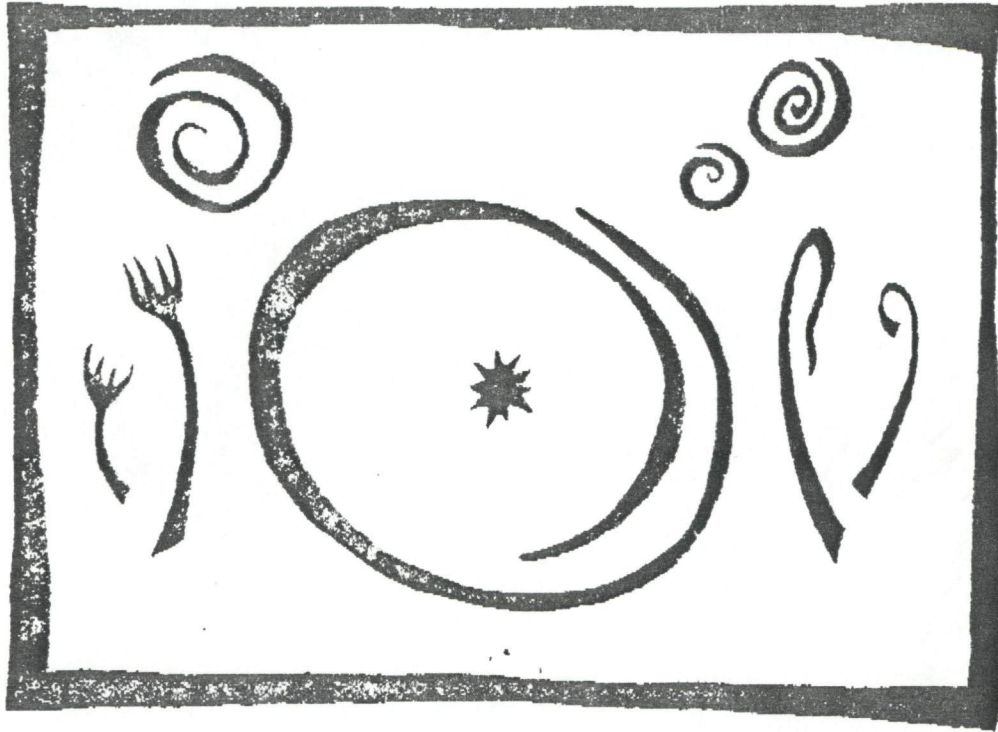

Dear Dr. Ratchford:

Thank you for your letter of December 4 and an update to the discussions on Science and Technology in Russia. It is good to hear there is progress from these meetings.

Although this additional material I have involves Ukraine for the most part rather than Russia, there may be a parallel interest for possible discussion at your December 16 meeting. One of my colleagues and a member of our delegation to the Soviet Union in 1991, has been working with Kiev Polytechnic University to establish the International Center For Occupational Safety & Environmental Protection. This will be a 28 unit certification program for graduates. He is currently working to establish an exchange program between KPU and an American university in California, and they are nearing an agreement.

He has also held discussions, as a preliminary to a joint venture, with interested individuals at a university in Moscow. At his invitation, one of their officials visited him in California earlier this year. The hope was to develop a similar program to the one at KPU along with the exchange program concept. However, the discussions have reached somewhat of an impasse due to rather substantial equipment needs at the Russian university in order to move forward in the conceptual stages of program development and a corresponding funding problem that has arisen on this end.

As I mentioned in my August 25 letter, we have also identified a nucleus of safety professionals who would be interested in teaching in the FSU but funding is likewise a problem to properly compensate them. I mention this since Dr. Allan Bromley's earlier remarks indicated that more private sector involvement is needed for the success of our efforts to strengthen S & T in Russia. He further noted that 100 proposals are already being funded by our agencies and that joint proposals are favored.

I hope these thoughts and comments will be of assistance in your preparations for the December 16 meeting with Minister Saltykov. Based on the results of this meeting with the minister, I could see value in a January meeting to discuss these results with us, particularly if they are substantial in nature and would lead to positive future action.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment. Due to this shortness of time until the December 16 meeting, I am sending this response by fax with the hard copy to follow.
