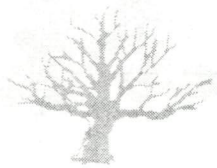

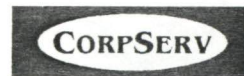

The President today announced his intention to nominate William Harrison Courtney, of West Virginia, to be Ambassador of the United States of America to Kazakhstan. This is a new position.

Dr. Courtney currently serves as the Charge d'Affaires in Kazakhstan. Prior to this, he was Deputy United States Negotiator for the U.S.-Soviet Defense and Space Talks, United States Mission in Geneva, Switzerland. Dr. Courtney was Deputy Executive Secretary for the National Security Council, 1987. From 1984-1986, he was Special Assistant to the Under Secretary of State for Political Affairs at the Department of State; and Deputy Director of the Office of Strategic Nuclear Policy in the Bureau of Politico-Military Affairs at the Department of State, 1983-1984.

Dr. Courtney was graduate from West Virginia University (B.A., 1966) and Brown University (Ph.D., 1980). He was born July 18, 1944 in Baltimore, Maryland. He is married and has two children.

# U.S., Kazakhstan Press Nuclear Weapons Talks

*Issues Not Fully Resolved, State Dept. Says*

Kazakhstan President Nursultan Nazarbayev arrived here yesterday for a three-day official visit and plunged immediately into discussions with Secretary of State James A. Baker III about nuclear weapons issues that are crucial to ratification of the 1991 Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty (START).

A State Department official said following the Nazarbayev-Baker meeting that the issues between the two countries have not been fully resolved, although Baker had been encouraged over the weekend by a telephone call from Nazarbayev about the negotiations.

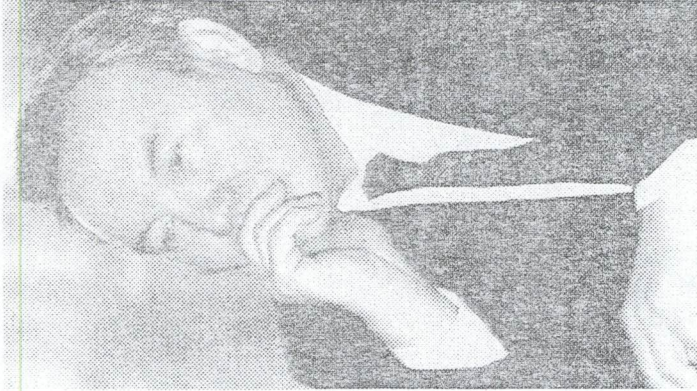
Discussions of the issues involved are also continuing with Russia, Ukraine and Belarus, the three other states of the former Soviet Union that have nuclear weapons on their soil, according to State Department spokesman Margaret Tutwiler.

Earlier in the day, reporters were given a more optimistic version of the negotiations by an official briefer at the White House, who said basic agreement had been reached with Kazakhstan on all pending nuclear-related issues but details needed to be "confirmed" with Nazarbayev after his arrival.

One key question is Kazakhstan's commitment to cooperate in the elimination of the 1,400 strategic nuclear warheads on its soil and generally adhere to START, which was signed last July by the United States and the now-defunct Soviet Union. The United States is also seeking a commitment from Kazakhstan to sign the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) as a non-nuclear weapons nation "in the shortest possible time."

Nazarbayev said at a news conference here last night that a collective security agreement last Friday by Kazakhstan, Russia and four other former Soviet states "changes the security atmosphere entirely" and makes it possible for Kazakhstan to sign the NPT as a non-nuclear weapons state. He did not give a date. He also said he and Baker agreed on an exchange of letters on Kazakhstan's nuclear obligations.

Kazakhstan has said in the past it is seeking special security guarantees from the United States, Russia and China. Tutwiler said, however, that "the United States has not considered any new security assurances to Kazakhstan," though she reaffirmed the 1968 U.S. commitment to seek immediate action by the U.N. Security

Council in case of nuclear aggression or threats against any non-nuclear weapons state that has joined the NPT.

Two weeks ago President Leonid Kravchuk of Ukraine reached agreement during a visit here on Ukrainian adherence to START, approving a protocol to the treaty that was worked out with Washington and submitted for acceptance as well to Kazakhstan, Belarus and Russia—the other former Soviet republics that have nuclear weapons on their soil.

U.S. officials say there is a good possibility that Kazakhstan and the others can agree on the protocol in the next several days. If that happens, the protocol could be signed

this weekend by Baker and the foreign ministers of the four former Soviet states, all of whom are expected to be in Lisbon for an international conference on assistance to the former Soviet Union.

The signing of such a protocol would permit the Senate to move ahead with ratification of START, which calls for major cuts in U.S. and Soviet strategic arms. The treaty was submitted to the Senate last November, but has not been acted upon because of uncertainty about the nuclear commitments of the former Soviet republics.
