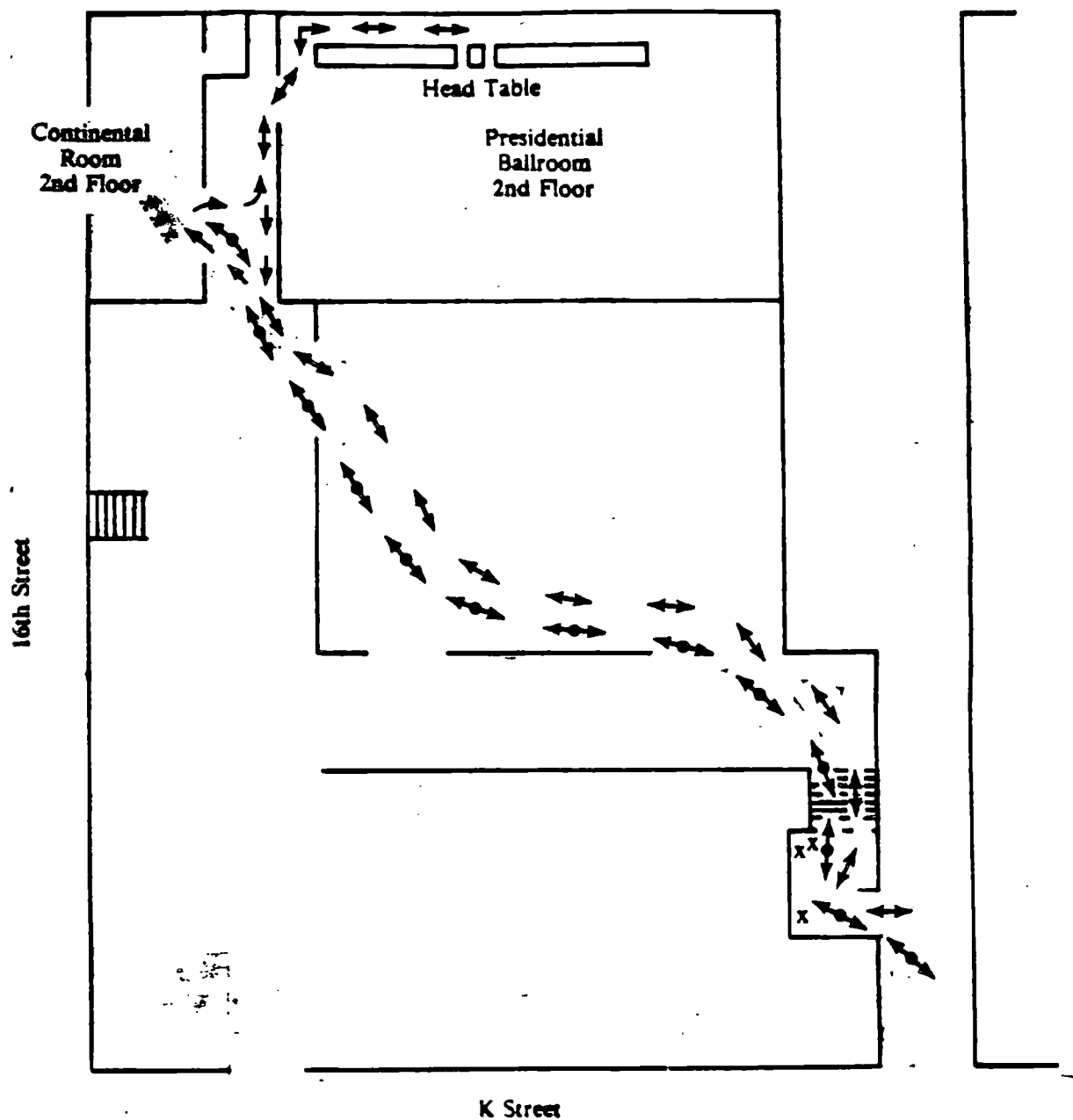

portant, fairly well-educated (51 percent had college degrees), and easily charmed press—a portrait not unlike today's Washington journalistic establishment.

The Washington correspondents consort with statesmen," Rosten wrote. "They dine with ambassadors and Cabinet members. They are at the White House in a special reception ball. They are not strangers to full dress and the requisites of social status. Their help is sought by persons and organizations trying to get an issue; their displeasure is avoided.

They are aware, by virtue of the deference paid to them . . . that they are factors of political consequence. [Italics added.]"

As Rosten describes it, the same press corps that worshiped Franklin Roosevelt, who butted them up, had made life miserable for his predecessor, Herbert Hoover, because he had treated them with high-handed imperiousness. "Mr. Roosevelt's colloquial manner soothed journalistic egos still smarting under the rebuffs of his predecessor . . . and reporters are all for a man who can give them several laughs and a couple of top-head dispatches in a twenty-minute visit."

The press corps may act more ferocious today, and some public figures are treated harshly, but a little show of obeisance can turn the average Washington reporter from tiger to tabby. Nancy Reagan's "Let Them Eat Cake" image disappeared after she went before the Gridiron Club and, in what was essentially an act of contrition, made fun of herself with a parody called "Second-Hand Clothes." She was such a smash that former White House press secretary Jody Powell cracked, "It's a good thing Hitler didn't come over and make a couple of funny speeches at Gridiron. He would have had the entire Washington press corps at his feet."

A little strategically granted access works wonders, too, as Dan Quayle's press these past few months proves. Just before Christmas, he was spotted having lunch with Meg Greenfield, George Will, and Charles Krauthammer. He also has been holding off-the-record, "get-acquainted chats" with such well-known journalists as William F. Buckley Jr., Hugh Sidey, William Safire, Fred Barnes, Ken Adelman, Pat Buchanan, and Bob Novak. "He's interested in getting to know people—not just those who covered him on the campaign," says David Beckwith. "And he's going to be doing more of it."

IS THE PRESS GETTING MORE POWERFUL?

Back in 1978, Jimmy Carter complained that an "Iron Triangle" of federal bureaucrats, congressional committees, and special interests stood in the way of government reform. Ten years later, Ronald Reagan invoked the same phrase, but the culprits he singled out were Congress, special interests, and the media.

Politicians increasingly are obsessed with the press, which has grown larger and seemingly more powerful with every passing year. But is the press as powerful as the politicians and

the reporters themselves seem to think?

The answer is, it depends. News reports have maximum impact in the absence of countervailing forces. In the early stages of the presidential primaries, for example, negative disclosures killed off the candidacies of Gary Hart and Joseph Biden. But once the voters got into the act, they turned a deaf ear to the pundits and the pollsters in primary after primary. Nor did it matter how many times the public heard or read stories describing how Ronald Reagan slept through his presidency. His personal appeal was such that he left office with the highest approval rating of any chief executive in modern times.

Reagan was the first President to realize he could ignore newspaper reporters and take his case directly to the American people on TV. Similarly, George Bush geared his presidential campaign to television, reducing the "print-heads," as TV reporters call them, to a state of helpless rage.

But politicians ignore the reporters from the major newspapers at their peril. These are the journalists who dig up most of the stories that wind up on the evening news, and their tone is widely copied by the rest of the media. When David Broder gives a long, respectful airing to a book that takes a favorable look at Dan Quayle, the signal to other reporters is unmistakable: It's time to take this guy a little more seriously.

THE DECLINE OF THE INK-STAINED PUNDIT

HIGHLIGHTED
IN ORIGINAL

The day before George Will took aim at George Bush, describing the "sound of his tinny art" as Bush tried to ingratiate himself with the political right, Will told an audience in Florida that he planned to give the Vice President a working over. "If he survives it, the power of the written word is gone," Will said.

Will had failed to notice that the golden age of punditry is over. There are trail guides in the media today—widely read people like Broder, Robert Samuelson, and William Safire, whose views often color the way the press sees an issue. But the day when millions of people didn't know what to think until they had read Walter Lippmann is over.

Politicians used to rely on columnist-giants like Arthur Krock, Marquis Childs, and Joseph Alsop for guidance, too. As a favor to his old friend, Ambassador Joseph Kennedy, Arthur Krock helped young John F. Kennedy rewrite *Why England Slept*. Later, Krock was instrumental in securing a Pulitzer Prize for JFK's *Profiles in Courage*.

Lippmann, the most influential columnist in American history, wrote speeches for Al Smith, helped get Wendell Willkie nominated, and advised every President from Woodrow Wilson to Lyndon Johnson.

After Lippmann went into semi-retirement in 1967, no one emerged to inherit his mantle. Politicians had already become infatuated with television, preferring the company of anchor-men to that of syndicated columnists. Newspapers like the *Los Angeles Times* and the *Washington Post* further undercut the syndicated
