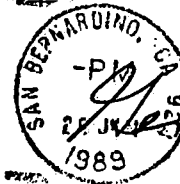

BUSH DECRIES WASTE IN ARMS BUYING 'Tighter Controls And Higher Standards' In Procurement Pledged

NORFOLK -- President Bush, framed by the superstructure of the aircraft carrier USS America, promised Tuesday to seek "tighter controls and higher standards in weapons procurement" and to "wring the last drop of waste and mismanagement out of the way we buy our weapons."

Bush's voice was hoarse and strained from a bad cold, and he paused periodically between paragraphs to cough. He said later, "I feel okay, but I wasn't sure if I could get through that brief address." As he lunched with crew members on the ship, he said he was "just croaking away." Bush's cold has persisted since last week.

...Without referring to the defense procurement scandals that flourished in the years he was vice president, Bush singled out cost overruns for criticism, saying that while they are not a new problem, "they are still wrong, and hurt the national security, particularly when budgets are tight."

"You deserve the very best equipment and weapons," he said. "You are getting them most of the time now, and we're determined that you will get them all of the time." Bush also pledged to "expand the national consensus that is necessary for proper support for our nation's defenses."

WRIGHT TESTS SUPPORT FOR VOTE ON PAY

Proponents Of Raise Fear Speaker's Move Could Backfire

House proponents of a 51 percent congressional pay increase responded with anger and dismay Tuesday to a decision by Speaker Wright to test sentiment for holding a vote on the raise, suggesting that an unusual survey of House members ordered by Wright could backfire, causing the leadership's strategy for getting the raise to unravel at the last minute.

Wright, appearing confident that a majority of House members would not favor a vote that probably would lead to rejection of the pay package, said he would abide by the results of the survey begun Monday and hold a vote if most members want one. Wright's office did not make any results known last night, but a random survey by the Washington Post indicated that Wright's confidence may be misplaced.

The Post survey of 36 randomly selected House members Tuesday indicated there is strong opposition to the pay raise and equally strong sentiment in favor of bringing the issue to a vote before the Feb. 8 deadline.

Of those polled, 25 said they opposed the pay increase while nine said they favored it and two refused to answer.

PANEL CHAIRMAN REVIEWING JUDICIAL PAY INCREASES

The chairman of a House subcommittee that oversees federal courts says he will review proposed big pay raises for senior judges who do no legal work.

Rep. Kastenmeier "believes he will have to look further into the senior judge question," staff member Mary Dixon said Tuesday.

Dozens of federal judges who technically are semi-retired but who do not hear cases stand to gain large pay raises unless Congress rejects a government salary package due to take effect a week from today. The AP reported earlier this week that as many as a fifth of the federal judiciary's "senior judges" no longer hear cases but are in line for the increases anyway.

Dixon said Kastenmeier plans to review the matter soon with the subcommittee's lawyer, but "believes he has at least a month to figure out a way" to scuttle the salary increase even if Congress does not vote it down by the next week.

FED'S GREENSPAN DISAGREES WITH BUSH ECONOMIC FORECAST
Strong Growth Is Called Not 'Probable'

Federal Reserve Chairman Greenspan disagreed Tuesday with the forecast of strong economic growth and sharply falling interest rates on which the Bush Administration is basing its budget planning.

"Technically, it is feasible," Greenspan told the Joint Economic Committee. "Is it probable? No, it is not."

The forecast, left behind by Reagan administration economists and adopted by the Bush team, calls for a 3.5 percent increase in the U.S. GNP, adjusted for inflation, between the fourth quarter of 1988 and the fourth quarter of this year. It also calls for the interest rate on three-month Treasury bills to average 6.3 percent this year, 2 percentage points lower than the level Tuesday.

...While he challenged the strong growth forecast, Greenspan rejected the view held by some private economists that the nation will drop into a recession before the middle of this year.

"Despite the fact that the expansion is more than six years old, it does not have geriatric characteristics" -- such as large amounts of unwanted inventories in many industries -- that help generate recessions, he said.

BRADY VIEW OF LBOS IS ASSAILED House Panel Wants Solutions To Problem

House Ways and Means Committee members scolded Secretary Brady Tuesday for failing to provide solutions to the problems of leveraged buyouts and expressed skepticism about his view that LBOs are caused by tax treatment of corporate dividends.

SEC Chairman David Ruder, who followed Brady at a Ways and Means Committee hearing, disagreed with the Treasury Secretary's analysis of the causes of LBOs and said they actually were rooted in the rise of junk bond financing.

Several committee members who were looking for answers to what they see as LBO problems appeared to be disappointed when Brady said, "I do not have a concrete suggestion to make."

Rep. Andrews told Brady, "I hope we can get specific leadership suggestions from you and advice on a course of action."

Rep. Pickle also appealed to Brady to "give us leadership" on the issue.

Administration Reluctantly Supports Cutting Deduction On Debt

The Bush Administration is giving qualified support to cutting the tax deduction for interest on debt incurred in leveraged buyouts, saying it prefers fairer tax treatment of traditional forms of raising capital.

"If you're going to make a change -- and clearly we're not suggesting one -- we would suggest that you look in the area of perhaps limiting interest deductions and using that money to give a break to corporate owners of stock," Secretary Brady told the House Ways and Means Committee on Tuesday.

Brady said the "driving force" behind the LBO phenomenon is that companies can avoid a 34 percent corporate income tax rate by raising capital through debt rather than stock.

He said the Treasury Department also has been attempting to find a way through IRS regulations or a legislative proposal to make the tax treatment of stock-equity and bond-debt financing more equal.

"The LBO problem would disappear with a level playing field," he said. "But so far we haven't been able to come up with a way to do it."

DEFICIT PANEL SEES MINOR ROLE IN BUDGET BATTLE

Members of the government commission on reducing the federal budget deficit met Tuesday and agreed on one thing: Their badly divided panel has a very slim chance of playing an important role in the upcoming budget fight between the Bush Administration and Congress.

The high-level, bipartisan NEC once was envisioned as the most promising vehicle for crafting a deficit-reduction program that both the Republican White House and the Democratic Congress could accept.

But Tuesday, members glumly acknowledged that the only way they could possibly fulfill that promise would be if President Bush asked them to produce a report later this year rather than by the current deadline of March 1.

BUSH TO PROPOSE CURBS ON MEDICARE

President Bush plans to propose a \$5.5 billion reduction in the projected growth of Medicare, closely following the budget his predecessor, Ronald Reagan, submitted earlier this month, Bush's budget director said Tuesday.

Richard Darman of the OMB was on Capitol Hill for informal meetings with members of Congress lining up support for Bush's first budget, which will be presented to Congress next week. He said that the members of Congress had not proposed other methods of reducing health expenditures.

THORNBURGH SETS TASK FORCES TO HIT FINANCIAL-MARKET FRAUD

Attorney General Thornburgh, pledging a crackdown on "crime in the suites," Tuesday announced the formation of special task forces in six U.S. attorneys' offices nationwide to prosecute securities and commodities fraud.

The task forces, to be composed of 15 prosecutors and additional investigators...will combat "the kind of criminal activity that's carried out under the guise of respectability in the financial and securities markets," Thornburgh told a news conference at the Justice Department.

Probes into fraud in the financial markets "are difficult and require the sophisticated efforts of experienced prosecutors," Thornburgh said. "They are not made by breaking down the door and seizing the evidence." (Ruth Marcus, Washington Post, F3)

FAA ORDERS INSPECTIONS OF WIRING ON BOEING JETS Larger Concern About Quality Control Implied

After three weeks of reports of crossed wiring on Boeing planes, the FAA Tuesday ordered inspections of the wiring on all Boeing Co. commercial airliners manufactured since 1980.

The sweeping order affects 741 aircraft flown in the U.S., including the widely used 737, the slightly larger 757, and both of Boeing's wide-body jets, the 747 and the 767.

The FAA last month issued three orders for wiring inspections. Although the inspections are relatively inexpensive and simple to perform, the far-reaching nature of Tuesday's order, which involves an entire generation of aircraft manufactured over an eight-year period, suggested to some aviation industry observers that the government has larger questions about Boeing's quality control.

Conservative activist Paul Weyrich Tuesday told the Senate Armed Services Committee that he has observed numerous instances of heavy drinking and socializing by Defense Secretary-designate John Tower with women other than his wife, reviving public controversy over Tower's private life just as it appeared to have subsided.

But in a closed-door session after he publicly questioned Tower's "moral character," Weyrich, a key figure in the New Right movement of the early 1980s, was pressed to confirm his allegations and could not provide sufficiently specific corroboration, according to senators who attended the session.

"I have not heard anything...that will require further investigation," said Sen. Exon. "Most of what I've heard has to fall in the hearsay category," said Sen. Dixon.

While Weyrich's testimony is not expected to derail Tower's nomination, committee members signaled grim-faced discomfort during the public testimony as Weyrich publicly resurrected charges about Tower's lifestyle that senators had probed in private and dismissed as largely unsubstantiated rumor.

But after questioning Tower and others at a closed hearing Tuesday, Sen. Nunn and other lawmakers suggested that the majority of the committee isn't pushing the nominee to remove himself from important decisions. "It's awfully hard to draw a line where you would recuse yourself [from a decision] and when you wouldn't," the chairman said.

BUSH'S EPA CHOICE DECLARES 'NEW ERA'
Reilly's Advocacy At Hearing Contrasts With Predecessors

President Bush's choice to head the EPA Tuesday declared a "new era" in environmental regulation, pledging aggressive prosecution of polluters and innovative solutions to the nation's "daunting" ecological problems.

"Rarely, if ever before, has there been such a need for leadership on the environment," William Reilly said at his Senate confirmation hearing. "I expect to be a strong advocate for the environment."

Although he offered no concrete plans to illustrate Bush's professed commitment to the environment, Reilly was a marked contrast, both in tone and substance, to his predecessors in the Reagan administration.

Reilly Promises Investigation Into Superfund

William Reilly, President Bush's choice to head the EPA, told a Senate panel Tuesday that, if confirmed, he will immediately launch an internal agency investigation of alleged mismanagement of the Superfund hazardous waste cleanup program.

Reilly, appearing before the Senate Environment committee, also promised to deal with medical waste disposal, to help draft a compromise Clean Air Act reauthorization bill and to oversee tough enforcement of other environmental statutes.

"I firmly believe we must usher in a new era in the history of environmental policy -- an era marked more by reconciliation of interests, by imaginative solutions...by the resolve to listen and work out our differences," Reilly said.

"It is in everyone's interest to protect the planet we share, at a time when evidence is mounting of the earth's vulnerability to destabilization," Reilly said in an opening statement that stressed themes of bipartisan cooperation and compromise.

HEARINGS ON HEALTH POSITION FOR SULLIVAN ARE POSTPONED

Hearings on Dr. Louis Sullivan, President Bush's choice for Secretary of HHS, were postponed indefinitely Tuesday at the request of the White House.

The request was made, officials said, because the FBI had not completed its background check of the nominee and because Sullivan had not completed his financial disclosure forms. Administration officials said the delay represented no softening in Bush's support for his selection.

Asked if the Sullivan nomination was in trouble, a White House spokesman answered no. He added that Bush advisers continued to maintain a "unanimous feeling of support" for the nominee, who has found himself enmeshed in the emotional issue of abortions.

...Democrats on Capitol Hill expressed skepticism about the White House explanation for the delay. The hearings were supposed to begin Wednesday before the Senate Finance Committee.

"I'm surprised," said Sen. Bentsen, the committee chairman. "It seems to me they had plenty of time."

GOP LAWMAKERS ACCUSE PARK SERVICE OF 'ARSON' IN YELLOWSTONE FIRE

Western conservative lawmakers Tuesday accused the National Park Service of "arson" in its handling of last summer's fires in Yellowstone National Park.

Several GOP congressman used a House subcommittee hearing to denounce the "let it burn" fire management policy of the park service and the U.S. Forest Service.

"In the private sector it would be called arson," said Rep. Marlenee. "In the bureaucracy and among environmental groups it's viewed as God's will or something akin to faith healing."

"Try and clear cut an acre and a cry goes out of devastation beyond repair, but burn one million acres and it's seen as an act of cleansing," Rep. Craig said sarcastically.

AIR FORCE TANKER CRASHES IN TEXAS

ABILENE, Texas -- An Air Force tanker laden with jet fuel crashed and exploded in a huge fireball seconds after takeoff from Dyess Air Force Base Tuesday, killing the 18 adults and one child aboard.

Killed were the plane's seven-person crew, based at K.I. Sawyer Air Force Base in northern Michigan, 10 passengers taken on at Sawyer and two passengers who boarded at Dyess.

SURVEY OF MATH, SCIENCE SKILLS PUTS U.S. STUDENTS AT BOTTOM

An international comparison of mathematics and science skills released Tuesday shows American 13 year-olds scoring at the bottom, with South Korean students performing at high levels in math at four times the rate of U.S. students.

In both math and science, U.S. students also scored worse or not better than students in the three European countries and four Canadian provinces who also participated in the survey.

..."Few comparisons are more odious than the ones embodied in this little book," said Bassam Shakhshiri, assistant director for science and engineering education at the National Science Foundation. "The lack of preparation for further education and future employment that these American teen-agers demonstrated is nothing short of frightening."

WRIGHT, IN 'GOOD FAITH,' DELAYS LEGISLATION REQUIRING FAST NOTICE OF COVERT ACTS

Speaker Wright, making what he called a gesture of "good faith" toward President Bush, said Tuesday he would postpone indefinitely action on legislation requiring the president to notify Congress within 48 hours of approving any covert intelligence operation.

Following an hour-long meeting with Secretary Baker, Wright said Baker "assures us that Bush will abide by the letter and spirit of the law" requiring that the president give "timely notice" of covert activities against foreign countries.

That issue has been a flashpoint for tensions between Congress and the executive branch since the Iran-contra affair became public in late 1986.

AFGHAN BOMBING TO END, SOVIET SAYS General Scoffs At Charge Of 'Scorched Earth' Campaign

KABUL -- The top Soviet general in Afghanistan said Tuesday that once the pullout of his forces is completed, by the Feb. 15 deadline, Moscow will no longer use its airpower to support the government of President Najibullah.

Lt. Gen. Boris Gromov also ridiculed State Department charges that withdrawing Soviet forces are conducting a "scorched earth" campaign, but he acknowledged heavy civilian casualties in a Soviet-Afghan drive to clear the strategic Salang Highway that links Kabul with the Soviet frontier.

Gromov defended the operations near the Salang Tunnel and in the Panjsher Valley as essential to keeping open the lifeline of Kabul, which has been experiencing severe shortages of food and fuel during the harshest winter Afghanistan has faced in a number of years.

"Where did the State Department get this information? When did a representative of the State Department visit the area?" Gromov asked sarcastically.

NEW EVIDENCE STRENGTHENS SUSPICIONS OF FIRM'S LINKS TO LIBYA

OFFENBURG, W. Germany -- Testimony from important new witnesses and examination of confiscated documents in the past week have strengthened prosecutors' suspicions that the West German chemicals firm Imhausen-Chemie GmbH made shipments to Libya, the two state prosecutors presiding over the inquiry said Tuesday.

But the prosecutors warned in an interview that it may be very difficult to prove that Imhausen helped the government of Moammar Kadafi build a factory designed to make chemical weapons, as the U.S. has alleged.

"I don't think Mr. Kadafi will come and testify as to whether it is a poison gas plant. It's not in operation yet.... One can't be sure what kind of factory it is," Werner Botz, the chief state prosecutor in Offenburg, said.

WEST GERMAN FIRM REPORTEDLY SENT INDIA ATOM ARMS MATERIAL

A West German firm sent the Indian nuclear program some highly sensitive nuclear weapons material obtained from the U.S., according to a report this week in the West German magazine Der Spiegel.

The alleged 1984 reexport to India by the Degussa Co. of U.S. beryllium, which enhances the explosive power of plutonium in atomic weapons, is the latest in a series of reports that German firms have aided nuclear and chemical weapons development in Third World countries.

Under Commerce Department regulations, the reexport from one foreign country to another of substantial amounts of beryllium requires additional U.S. permission in the form of a reexport license. An official in the nuclear field said permission to ship this material to India would have been denied if the West German firm had requested it, in view of potential nuclear weapons uses.

The Spiegel account, which is under study in U.S. agencies, said the West German government knew of the beryllium reexport at the time and had not objected. A spokesman for the West German Embassy in Washington had no information about the transaction and no comment on the magazine story. (Don Oberdorfer, Washington Post, A19)

ADMINISTRATION TO NAME ARMACOST AS JAPAN AMBASSADOR

The Bush Administration has decided to name a veteran professional diplomat, Michael Armacost, as U.S. ambassador to Japan, State Department and congressional officials said Tuesday.

The White House had no immediate comment.

The closely held decision was to be announced in conjunction with this week's visit to Washington by Japanese Prime Minister Noboru Takeshita.

Officials said that the decision was made this week by President Bush and Secretary Baker after some intensive jockeying for the job.

CONTRA BACKER TO GET STATE DEPT. POST

Bernard Aronson, a Democrat who helped then-president Reagan's efforts to build support for Nicaragua's contra rebels, will be nominated by President Bush to become assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs with a mandate to seek a bipartisan approach to future U.S. policy in Central America.

Bush Administration and congressional sources confirmed Tuesday that Aronson, 42, is Secretary Baker's choice for what is arguably the most controversial policymaking job that the new Administration must fill at the sub-Cabinet level.

DIPLOMATIC TRIUMPH FOR SEOUL AS HUNGARY NAMES AMBASSADOR

SEOUL -- South Korea scored a diplomatic triumph Wednesday when Hungary became the first communist country to exchange ambassadors with Seoul.

Hailing the agreement signed in the South Korean capital, President Roh said it "tore down the last wall of the Cold War" and would help bring peace and reconciliation between East and West.

Roh told Hungarian Deputy Foreign Minister Gyula Horn: "I hope Hungary will maintain friendly relations with North Korea and help the North to open its doors."

U.N. SHELVES STATEMENT CONDEMNING ISRAEL

UNITED NATIONS -- The U.N. Security Council, citing U.S. opposition, Tuesday shelved a statement condemning recent Israeli military measures against the Palestinian uprising in the Israeli-occupied territories.

Diplomats said the U.S. rejected the statement initiated by non-aligned nations because it singled out the Jewish state in the violence between Israeli soldiers and Palestinians opposed to 21 years of occupation of the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

The statement called on Israel to respect the 1949 Geneva Convention protecting civilians in time of war. (UPI)

QUAYLE TO BEGIN VISIT TO VENEZUELA, EL SALVADOR

Vice President Quayle, carrying what he said is a message of "democracy, democracy and more democracy," begins a three-day trip today to Venezuela and El Salvador.

Much of the leadership of Latin America will gather in Venezuela for the inauguration of the new president, Carlos Andres Perez, and El Salvador is preparing for new elections at a time when U.S. policy in the region is under intensive review.

Aides to President Bush and Quayle described the trip as primarily a listening session in which the Vice President carries no new proposals but is to act as a conduit to Bush for several heads of state. Quayle aides said the Vice President also is anxious to meet personally with leaders who know him only through American news media coverage of the 1988 campaign. (Ann Devroy, Washington Post, A8)

POLITICAL PRISONERS BEING FREED, SAYS SOMALI SEEKING U.S. AID

Somali Prime Minister Mohamed Ali Samater said here Tuesday that his government is freeing "all political prisoners" and improving other human rights in hopes of convincing Congress and the Bush Administration to release \$55 million in U.S. economic aid to Somalia.

But Samater ruled out any talks with the opposition Somali National Movement, which last May nearly seized control of northern Somalia.

"Who do they represent?" he said. "We are not going to talk to the SNM. We're going to talk to the people of the north. We're going to talk to local leaders." (David Ottaway, Washington Post, A11)

IN SUDAN PEACE EFFORT, U.S. MEETS A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE GUERRILLAS

Senior Bush Administration officials have met here in the last few days with a leading representative of the Sudanese guerrilla forces as part of a new American effort to try to end the five year-old civil war in the strategically situated African country.

American officials said the U.S. had offered to mediate between the Khartoum government and rebels in the southern Sudan. And taking advantage of the Soviet interest in ending regional conflicts, Washington has approached Moscow about ending conflicts in northeastern Africa.

Participants in the discussions said that the guerrilla representative, Mansour Khalid, talked by telephone with Brent Scowcroft, the national security adviser to President Bush, and met with State Department officials and an aide to Scowcroft. (Robert Pear, New York Times, A1)

PRESIDENT/TRIP

NBC's Tom Brokaw: President Bush today [visited] an American aircraft carrier where he quickly made clear his message of the day: hold the line on military spending and no more Defense Department scandals.

NBC's John Cachran: For his first trip outside Washington as President, Mr. Bush chose a military setting, the Norfolk shipyard and the carrier America. Despite a lingering cold and a hacking cough, the President wore no top coat in the windy, 50-degree weather. Throughout his young presidency, Mr. Bush has urged high ethics in government. Today he extended his call to those outside government, especially defense contractors.

(President Bush: "I firmly believe that the vital first step to broadening our national consensus on defense is to wring the last drop of waste and mismanagement out of the way we buy our weapons, and that's what we intend to do.")

After his election President Bush told aides he was determined to have people running the Pentagon who will prevent defense procurement scandals. Today Mr. Bush managed to hit that theme again, but he admitted he had doubts he could finish his speech.

(President Bush: "I don't know, I wasn't sure I could get through those so-brief remarks. But -- just croaking away. I feel much better, though, thank you.")

Mr. Bush chowed down with the lower ranks who also wondered about the presidential cold.

(Sailor: "When I heard you on TV the other day, it sounded like you were [hoarse].")

President Bush: "The best thing is to shut up, but you can't do it there, you know. Got these things scheduled.")

Asked why he didn't mention his defense budget, Mr. Bush said, wait for February 9th, when he reveals his budget ideas to Congress. Meanwhile, he'll keep talking, with two speeches tomorrow. Talk is cheap and doesn't add to the nation's budget deficit. But Mr. Bush believes that presidential talk, the use of the bully pulpit, is important and he says that long after he presents his budget proposals to Congress, he'll keep banging away at the need for Americans to be more honest, less selfish, and to work harder.

ABC's Peter Jennings: President Bush pledged today to wring the last drop of waste and mismanagement out of the Pentagon's military purchasing system. TOWER

Jennings: The Senate Armed Services Committee heard testimony from some people who do not think John Tower ought to become the secretary of defense, including one man who had a lot of very unkind things to say about the senator's moral character.

ABC's Jim Wooten: It was exactly what the senators didn't want to hear, not in public, anyway: this powerful, religious-right lobbyist Paul Weyrich challenging the propriety of Tower's private affairs.

(Paul Weyrich: "It is unrealistic to expect moral behavior in matters of public trust from somebody who does not exhibit such behavior in his personal life.")

Chairman Nunn, a Democrat, asked him to come back later to a closed-door session. But wait a minute, said Republican Cohen of Maine.

(Sen. Cohen: "I think it's a bad procedure to provide a general indictment of a man's character and then provide details in private.")

So Weyrich provided the details in public. Over the years in Washington, he said:

(Weyrich: "I have encountered the nominee in a condition -- lack of sobriety -- as well as with women to whom he was not married.")

Tower was kept cooling his heels for two hours this afternoon while Weyrich finished his testimony before he could begin his. When it was over, Chairman Nunn was asked what he thought of what Weyrich had told them.

(Sen. Nunn: "Well, you heard him.")

The closed session continues tomorrow with more questions for Tower about alcohol, money and women. As distasteful as it is for the senators, they can't avoid putting it all on the record, their record at least. Still, nobody in Washington believes Tower's nomination is now in jeopardy.

SULLIVAN

Brokaw: The confirmation hearings for Louis Sullivan...now have been postponed at the request of the White House. Administration officials told NBC News the background check on Sullivan is taking longer than expected in part because of a financial scandal at Morehouse College while he was president of the medical school there. White House sources said that Sullivan was not involved in that scandal, but they're being extra careful. Sullivan has drawn some fire for his views on abortion.

Brokaw: The new First Lady was working on still another big problem today, the problem of the homeless. Barbara Bush paid a visit to Martha's Table, a center for the homeless in Washington, D.C. She helped make some of the 1,700 sandwiches that the center provides each day for hungry people. And Mrs. Bush helped in another activity, a reading program for children. (NBC-7)

Rather: First Lady Barbara Bush made a photo opportunity call to a Washington-area soup kitchen and shelter today. She talked up the need for volunteers to help the homeless. She helped make sandwiches herself, distributed cookies to the children of the homeless, and read them a story. (CBS-11)

NORTH TRIAL

Jennings: ...Today, two years and three months after he was fingered as being pivotal in the Iran-contra affair, [Oliver] North finally goes to trial. And the first question is this: with all that's happened in public until now, can he get a fair trial in court?

AEC's Tim O'Brien reports that the first stumbling block in North's trial was the publicity surrounding his case from the beginning. Because of his immunity deal with Congress, permitting anyone aware of anything North said in congressional testimony in 1987 to sit on the trial would violate his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination. Thirty-nine of fifty-five potential jurors had to be sent home today after disclosing on a questionnaire that they knew about North's testimony.

(Laurence Tribe, Harvard Law School: "They are trying to insist on jurors who are not only unbiased but who were apparently unconscious throughout the summer of those hearings into the Iran-contra scandal.")

But Judge Gesell is determined to press on. He refused to excuse a postal clerk who saw North on television but said she didn't pay close attention because "it was like watching the Three Stooges." Independent Counsel Walsh had warned Congress that granting North immunity in exchange for his testimony might make it difficult to find a jury. The problem has obviously been compounded by television. If you paid close attention to this report, you too are now ineligible to be a juror.

ABC's John Martin reports on North's effort to raise money for his legal defense through a speech-making tour. In recent months North has given speeches in more than 100 cities. Campaigning for Republican friends, standing in front of American flags and most of all raising money for his legal defense, at more than \$20,000 per speech. (ABC-1, NBC-1, CBS-3)

AFGHANISTAN

Jennings: The last of the American Embassy personnel in Afghanistan flew out of the capital, Kabul, today and went to India. Most other Western embassies are either closed or closing. The conventional wisdom is that when the Soviets have finally completely withdrawn from the country some time in the next couple of weeks, the Afghans will set on one another and the capital will be even more dangerous than it is now.

ABC's Jim Laurie reports on the state of Afghanistan as the last of the Soviet forces depart. Kabul is in a state of virtual siege. The plane carrying the last American diplomats out encountered a near-miss with a Soviet plane. Food and gasoline are in short supply as most major roads into the city are often cut by rebel forces. But in their last days here, the Soviets are flying in tons of supplies. What is not clear is just how long this city and this government will have after the Russians leave. Pessimists say the rebels will launch quick and bloody attacks and the government will fall within two months. Whatever, the Afghans are in for some troubling days ahead. (ABC-10, CBS-8)

SOVIET EMIGRES

NBC's Stephen Frazier reports on the burgeoning Jewish exodus from the Soviet Union, and the destinations of those leaving. Jewish families eager to leave the Soviet Union now get out by the trainload. Most of the emigres hope to go to the U.S., but until the U.S. grants them refugee status, they wait in Italy. Refugee status was virtually assured in the past, but hundreds are now denied refugee status by immigration officials who say they don't demonstrate they were persecuted against. They call themselves "deny-niks." They can still enter the U.S. as immigrants or if they're sponsored by an American citizens, but both of these courses are complicated by the way these people left the Soviet Union -- on visas for travel to Israel, where any Jew is welcome and where politicians worry that the explosive growth of Israeli Arab families will leave Jews in Israel outnumbered. But most never intended to go to Israel. (NBC-16)

GORBACHEV/SALARY

Jennings: We learned today from a Soviet magazine editor how much money Soviet leader Gorbachev allegedly makes for what he does. About \$30,000 a year, \$2,500 a month.... (ABC-12)

WINNIE MANDELA

ABC's Richard Sergie reports the African National Congress, the outlawed black nationalist group founded by Nelson Mandela, has ordered Mandela's wife, Winnie, to disband a group of young followers who act as her body guards. This highlights a growing controversy over Winnie Mandela's behavior and that of the body guards. The latest outcry involves the Mandela United Football Club, a group of young blacks who act as her body guards. Critics say the youths have been abusive in their practices, and there have been allegations of murder. (ABC-13)

AIR FORCE PLANE CRASH

Jennings: An Air Force tanker jet crashed today while it was taking off from Dyess Air Force Base in Texas. The plane exploded and at least 17 of the 19 people on board were killed. Witnesses said the plane sounded like it was having engine trouble just before it crashed. (ABC-3, NBC-2, CBS-2)

FAA/SAFETY CHECKS

ABC's Jim Slade reports the FAA ordered safety checks on virtually all of the commercial jet liners made by Boeing since the end of 1980. The problem is faulty wiring, which continues to surface in spot checks in some of those aircraft. The sweeping order affects 741 airplanes worldwide. The order gives the owners just 25 days to make the necessary inspections and report back to the FAA. In the meantime, Boeing is checking its design and production procedures to see if changes are necessary there. (ABC-2, CBS-1, NBC-14)

POPULATION/CENSUS

Jennings: There was a look into the future by the Census Bureau. The bureau says the population of the U.S. is growing at a slower rate than ever before and will peak in 50 years at 302 million people. That's a 25% increase from today; after the year 2038 the population is expected to decline. (ABC-5, NBC-14)

NANCY REAGAN/DRUG CENTER

NBC's Don Oliver reports on friction from the community chosen for Nancy Reagan's drug treatment center. Residents of Lake View, a development of modest tract houses on the outskirts of Los Angeles, don't want the center in their community because they fear the drug rehabilitation center will lower property values, endanger the children of the neighborhood, and that fleeing patients might increase the crime rate. Nancy Reagan has tried to remain out of the controversy, but already her wealthy friends have raised four of the ten million dollars needed to buy and convert the Lake View Terrace Center. (NBC-6)

ABC's AMERICAN AGENDA/ELDERLY PRESCRIPTION DRUG MISUSE

ABC's Jed Duvall examines the issue of prescription drug misuse by millions of elderly people. It is estimated that the average older American is now taking four prescription drugs. Perhaps the most important reason for drug misuse among the elderly is that many patients and their physicians simply don't spend enough time listening and talking with each other. Instead, the patients simply request drugs, and the doctors comply. (ABC-14)

U.S. STUDENTS/MATH & SCIENCE

CBS's Phil Jones looks at a report comparing thirteen-year-old U.S. students with students of five other countries in math and science skills. In math, South Korean students ranked at the top, with U.S. students dead last, trailing such countries as Ireland and Spain. In science, the findings were much the same. The report found that U.S. students had about the same amount of homework as their counterparts in South Korea, but American kids spent more time watching television. The study also revealed that South Korean parents provide more direction and encouragement to their students than American parents. The authors of this report say there are no quick fixes to save these 13-year-old students who could well become a lost generation in a high-tech world. (CBS-7)

INDIAN AFFAIRS/FRAUD

NBC's Andrea Mitchell reports on allegations of Indians taking advantage of fellow Indians. Through a lucrative real estate deal, Navajo tribe leader Peter McDonald and his associates received large sums of money. But his people live in deep poverty and under primitive conditions. The deal set off a Senate investigation and cries of foul from McDonald's political rivals. McDonald denies any wrongdoing. Senate investigators say they've found widespread corruption by federal officials and some tribal leaders involving as much as half of the \$3 billion the government spends on Indian programs each year. (NBC-8)

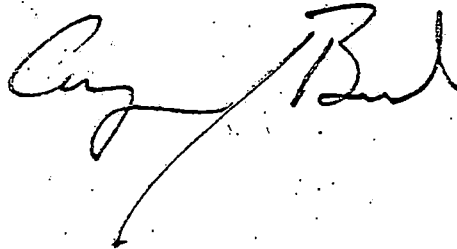

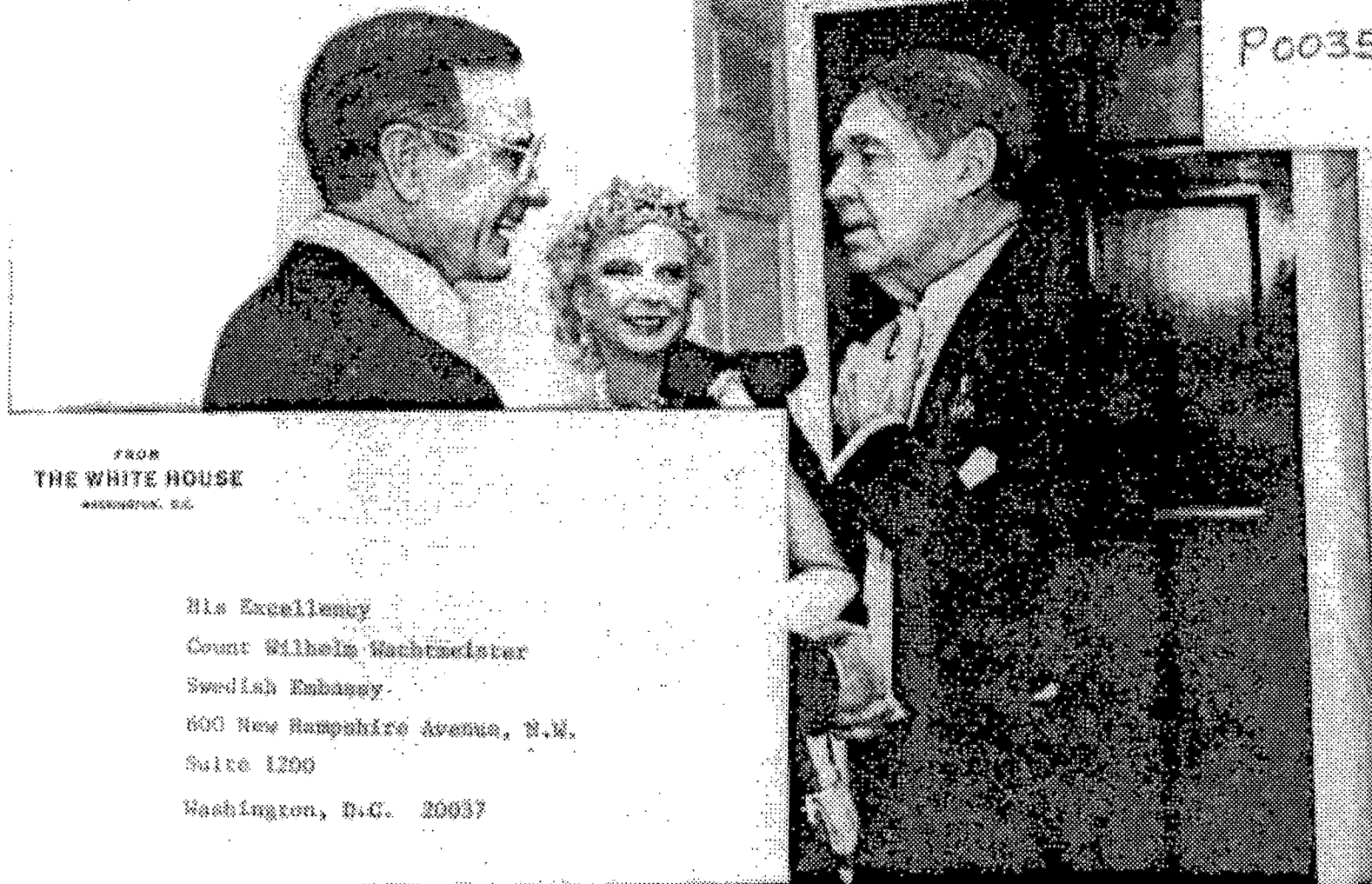

WE CAN STILL LEARN AND WE CAN STILL IMPROVE.

I THOUGHT IT WAS VERY APPROPRIATE THAT ONE OF THE SCRIPTURE READINGS THAT MORNING WAS FROM THE BOOK OF GENESIS: WE ARE EMBARKING ON A NEW ADMINISTRATION. THIS IS OUR TIME OF GENESIS.

WHAT WILL BE THE HOPES AND PRAYERS OF THIS ADMINISTRATION? WHAT WILL WE SAY AND DO? WHAT WILL OUR STORY BE?

THE SCRIPTURES SAY, THAT GOD HAS MADE US IN HIS OWN IMAGE AND IT IS TRUE THAT IN SOME FINITE WAY, WE HAVE BEEN GIVEN THE OPPORTUNITY TO CREATE. WE CAN CREATE PEACE OR WAR, WE CAN CREATE PROSPERITY OR POVERTY.

LIKE MOST AMERICANS, I BELIEVE THAT WE MUST STRIVE TO CONTINUE OUR ECONOMIC GROWTH, AND TO SEE THAT ITS BENEFITS REACH MORE AND MORE OF OUR PEOPLE. WE MUST NEVER STOP WORKING UNTIL THERE ARE HOMES FOR THE HOMELESS, JOBS FOR THE JOBLESS, AND HOPE FOR THOSE IN DESPAIR.

LIKE MOST AMERICANS, I WANT CONTINUED PEACE WITH OUR NEIGHBORS AND BETTER RELATIONSHIPS WITH OUR FRIENDS AND RIVALS ALIKE AROUND THE WORLD.

BUT I HOPE FOR MORE THAN THAT -- THAT OUR CHANCE IS NOT ONLY TO IMPROVE UPON THE STATUS QUO, BUT TO SET A HIGHER STANDARD -- A HIGHER PURPOSE FOR OUR COUNTRY. OUR HIGHER PURPOSE IS TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE FOR THE GOOD. TO ACHIEVE THE QUIETER, DEEPER SUCCESSES THAT ARE MADE, NOT OF GOLD AND SILK, BUT OF BETTER HEARTS AND FINER SOULS.

TEDDY ROOSEVELT OFTEN TALKED ABOUT "GETTING INTO THE ARENA," ABOUT TAKING THE RISK OF DOING SOMETHING AND NOT JUST STANDING ON THE SIDELINES.

THERE IS A WONDERFUL PROVERB IN THE BIBLE -- BILLY GRAHAM SAYS THAT IF YOU READ ONE CHAPTER OF PROVERBS A DAY YOU CAN READ THROUGH THE WHOLE BOOK IN A MONTH. NOT A BAD PRACTICE FOR ANY OF US TO FOLLOW. WELL, THERE IS THIS WONDERFUL PROVERB. IT SAYS, "WHERE THERE ARE NO OXEN, THE STABLE IS CLEAN, BUT THERE IS NO PROFIT IN AN EMPTY STABLE."

CRITICS ARE SOMETIMES VERY IMPRESSIVE PEOPLE. THEIR STABLES ARE SO CLEAN. BUT TO IMPROVE THE LOT OF OTHERS REQUIRES ACTION, AND ACTION REQUIRES RISK, AND THE PEOPLE WHO TAKE RISKS WILL MAKE MISTAKES ALONG THE WAY. THEIR STABLES MAY BE CLUTTERED. BUT WITH RISK COMES REWARD. AND OUR COUNTRY WAS FOUNDED BY MEN AND WOMEN WHO TOOK RISKS.

WHEN I SPOKE TO YOU TWO YEARS AGO, I TALKED ABOUT THE NEED FOR ETHICS. I TALKED ABOUT THE PROBLEMS AND CONTROVERSIES AND SCANDALS THAT HAD COME TO WALL STREET AND TO GOVERNMENT; NO INSTITUTION HAS BEEN IMMUNE, BEFORE OR SINCE.

I'VE CREATED A COMMISSION ON FEDERAL ETHICS LAW REFORM TO TAKE A NEW LOOK AT THE ETHICAL STANDARDS THAT APPLY TO ALL THREE BRANCHES OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. JUDGES MALCOLM WILKEY AND GRIFFIN BELL WILL HEAD THIS IMPORTANT PANEL CHARGED WITH REFORMING AND REVITALIZING FEDERAL ETHICAL STANDARDS.

SOME WOULD WANT ME TO USE THIS OCCASION TO PREACH AT YOU, AS WELL. BUT I MUST SAY THAT I COMMEND THE ACTION YOU ARE TAKING TO LOOK INWARD, TO SET STANDARDS AND RULES OF ACCOUNTABILITY -- FOR FREEDOM CARRIES WITH IT THE DEMANDS OF RESPONSIBILITY.

I'VE TALKED THESE LAST TWO WEEKS ABOUT SERVICE AS WELL AND WE'VE PUT IN PLACE A NEW OFFICE IN THE WHITE HOUSE -- THE OFFICE OF NATIONAL SERVICE. I WANT THIS OFFICE TO FOCUS ATTENTION ON NON-GOVERNMENTAL RESOURCES, LOCAL AND COMMUNITY EFFORTS TO SOLVE CRITICAL PROBLEMS. I WANT IT TO HELP ME PERSUADE ALL AMERICANS THAT SERVICE TO OTHERS IS A NECESSARY PART OF ANY SUCCESSFUL LIFE.

MY MESSAGE TODAY IS TO THANK YOU FOR THE GOOD YOU ARE DOING -- TO TELL YOU TO KEEP GOING, TO NOT LET THE MISTAKES AND THE SETBACKS DISTRACT YOU FROM THE GOOD WORK THAT SO MANY OF YOU HAVE DONE.

IMAGINE WHAT AMERICA WOULD BE LIKE IF YOUR SCHOOLS WERE TO CLOSE, AND IF YOUR CHURCH-FINANCED RETIREMENT HOMES WERE TO SHUT DOWN. IF YOUR SOUP KITCHENS WERE TO CLOSE THEIR DOORS AND YOUR ADOPTION SERVICES WERE NO LONGER THERE -- HOW COULD GOVERNMENT STEP IN TO REPLACE YOU?

THERE ISN'T ENOUGH MONEY -- THERE AREN'T ENOUGH PEOPLE. YOU ARE NEEDED. YOU HAVE ANSWERED A NOBLE CALLING.

THANKS TO YOU, AND THE HARD WORK OF OTHERS, MANY MOTHERS ARE NOW OPTING FOR LIFE, AND WE LOOK FORWARD TO THE DAY WHEN ALL MOTHERS OPT FOR LIFE.

AND HOW CAN ANY OF US REST UNTIL LITTLE SCHOOL CHILDREN HAVE THE SAME RIGHT THAT OUR OWN SENATORS AND CONGRESSMEN HAVE -- THE RIGHT TO BEGIN THEIR DAY WITH A MOMENT OF SILENT PRAYER?

ALL YOUR WORKS ARE THE STARS IN THE NIGHT -- THE THOUSAND POINTS OF LIGHT I HAVE SPOKEN OF BEFORE. THIS IS MY VISION OF A KINDER, GENTLER, BETTER AMERICA. PARTNERSHIPS, WORKING TOGETHER TO SOLVE PROBLEMS.

WHEN I SEE MOTHER ANGELICA HERE WITH HER TELEVISION NETWORK TO THE CATHOLICS -- WHEN I SEE MY FRIEND REVEREND GRAHAM -- AND HIS ELOQUENT CALL FOR COMMITMENT -- AND WHEN I THINK OF THE WORK OF THE GREAT EVANGELICAL DENOMINATIONS, I AM REMINDED OF OTHER KINDS OF PARTNERSHIPS AND I AM CONVINCED MORE THAN EVER OF THE MERIT OF YOUR WORK. THIS IS A TIME FOR COMING TOGETHER -- PULLING TOGETHER. THAT'S WHY I NEED YOUR HELP.

AS AMERICANS, WE MUST PUT ASIDE OUR FEARS OF EACH OTHER. WE MUST PUT ASIDE THE STEREOTYPES. ALL OF US MUST LEAVE RELIGIOUS INTOLERANCE BEHIND AND RACISM, TOO.

YOU, THE MEMBERS OF THE NATIONAL RELIGIOUS BROADCASTERS, WITH ALL OF YOUR RESOURCES, CAN PLAY SUCH AN IMPORTANT ROLE TO INSTILL IN A NEW GENERATION, A COMMON SENSE VALUE OF TELLING RIGHT FROM WRONG, A GENERATION FREE FROM FEARS AND BIASES. THESE NEW LIVES ARE, THEMSELVES, PAGES TO WRITE ON.

SO REMEMBER, EACH ACT OF CARING IS A VICTORY FOR US ALL. ONE PERSON'S TRIUMPH IS AN INSPIRATION TO EVERYONE ELSE.

. . . . THIS MORNING, SOMEONE'S CHILD IS ILL.

. . . . THERE IS AN OLD WOMAN SOMEWHERE WHOSE FRIENDS AND RELATIVES ARE GONE, AND SHE IS FEELING LONELY AND DISORIENTED. THERE IS DESPAIR.

CAN WE AS A PEOPLE CONTINUE TO FULFILL THE PROMISE THAT IS AMERICA, THE HOPE THAT BROUGHT MILLIONS OF POOR IMMIGRANTS TO OUR SHORES AND WITH THEIR DREAMS, AND THE DREAMS OF THOSE WHO CAME BEFORE THEM, WHO BUILT THIS MIGHTY NATION.

I BELIEVE THAT WE CAN.

YOUR BROADCASTS TOUCH THE LIVES OF SO MANY PEOPLE IN SO MANY WONDERFUL WAYS. I THINK OF THE CHURCH SERVICES BROADCAST LOCALLY FOR SHUT-INS OR THE ENCOURAGEMENT YOU HAVE BROUGHT TO TROUBLED YOUTHS THROUGH THE AIRWAVES.

CHRISTIAN BROADCASTING CAN LEAD THE WAY IN CAREFUL CONSIDERATION OF WHAT IS TRULY EXEMPLARY. THERE USED TO BE A LIST OF AT LEAST SEVEN WORDS YOU COULDN'T SAY ON THE AIR AND A LOT OF THINGS YOU COULDN'T SHOW ON TV. I THINK THE LISTS HAVE GOTTEN SHORTER THESE DAYS.
