White House Counsel Gray delivered the final chapter in the FBI probe of Defense Secretary-designate Tower to the Senate yesterday, a 140-page document that Gray said examines the former senator's life style and financial dealings but offers no evidence "to indicate that he is unfit" for office.

Administration officials said the document indicates that Tower "drank excessively" in the 1970s, but they said the FBI "corroborates the senator's assertion that he has drunk only in moderation in the last 10 years."

...White House spokesman Fitzwater said Bush read segments concentrating "on the most recent allegations" and concluded that "the senator should be confirmed and there is nothing in the report that suggests he shouldn't."

[Sens.] Nunn and Warner said they hope for a committee vote on Tower by the end of the week, perhaps as early as Thursday. "We're not going to hold up a vote in the committee any longer," Nunn said as he awaited the report. He and Warner said that, if new allegations surface, they will "deal with them" as the confirmation process continues.

CHINA EAGER FOR RETURN OF 'OLD FRIEND'

BEIJING -- China's leaders regard President Bush's upcoming visit as an opportunity to assure him that Beijing's improving relations with the Soviet Union will not harm its extensive ties with the U.S., according to analysts here.

The Bush visit is also being welcomed for two other important reasons: it puts the world spotlight on China at the outset of a new U.S. administration and it allows China a chance to strengthen ties with "an old friend."

The Agency for International Development, after spending tens of billions of dollars in 25 years of trying to help Third World nations stem poverty, has concluded that the program largely failed to achieve its objectives and suggested that a complete overhaul may be necessary.

In a 158-page report released today, AID asserts that "only a handful of countries" receiving U.S. aid since the 1950s "has ever graduated from dependent status."

[The report] clearly is aimed at justifying the basic Reagan administration approach toward development, which stressed enlarging private-sector activity in debt-ridden Third World nations and encouraging them to drop socialist-oriented policies.

EC LEADERS LAUD TRUCE IN BEEF WAR

BRUSSELS -- European Community foreign ministers today welcomed the beef war truce and delayed implementation of retaliation for U.S. measures against some imports from Europe because of the EC ban on exports of hormone-bred American meat.

A conference official said the ministers were satisfied with the U.S.-EC agreement reached Saturday in Washington to set up a task force to work out technical arrangements within 75 days for the export to the EC of U.S. beef and beef products not treated with hormones.

IRANIAN MOSLEM LEADERS CALL FOR END TO TIES WITH BRITAIN

NICOSIA -- After Britain announced it was pulling its ambassador from Tehran, Iranian Moslem leaders urged their government to cut ties with Britain over the publication of "The Satanic Verses," the Iranian news agency IRNA said Tuesday.

The agency said the Combatant Ulema of Tehran, a group of experts in Islamic law and theology, issued a statement Monday condemning the "conspiratorial publication of Salman Rushdie's slanderous novel."

"British colonialism and the Great Satan have played a basic role in insulting the Prophet Mohammad," the statement said. (Reuter)

EC Recalls Diplomats From Iran

BRUSSELS -- European governments today recalled their ambassadors or chief diplomats from Iran and suspended official visits to and from that country while denouncing Ayatollah Khomeini's death threats against a British novelist as "incitement to murder."

The European response...seemed to mark the maximum display of anger possible short of a break in diplomatic relations....

The British foreign secretary, Geoffrey Howe, announced that London unilaterally is taking the protest a step further. He said Britain is withdrawing its other four diplomats in Tehran along with Charge d'Affaires Browne, and strongly hinted that Iranian diplomats in Britain will be asked to leave....

"Normal relations will be impossible as long as Iran fails to adhere to the principles of respect for law and sovereignty in other nations," Howe declared. He said the move toward increased contacts can be renewed only when Iran "renounces the use or threat of the use of violence."

IRAN'S RIVALRY WITH SAUDIS SEEN AS FACTOR IN BOOK ROW

LONDON -- So thoroughly has Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini dominated world headlines in calling for Salman Rushdie's death that little attention has been paid to his somewhat belated role in attacking the British author's novel, "The Satanic Verses."

For months before Khomeini abruptly condemned the British author to death last week, Rushdie himself had accused not Iran, but Saudi Arabia of financing -- and leading -- the opposition to his bestselling book that started in mosques in Britain soon after its publication here in September.

Whatever else motivated Khomeini -- or those aides influencing Iran's 86-year-old spiritual leader -- to raise the ante in the campaign against the book and call for Rushdie's death, Iran analysts say they are convinced a major factor was a desire to upstage his Saudi rivals.

SHEVARDNADZE AND MUBARAK TALK IN CAIRO Soviet's Initiative Includes Israeli Talks

...Shevardnadze met alone with Mubarak for two hours. He gave him a message from President Gorbachev and invited the Egyptian to make "an official and friendly visit" to Moscow -- an invitation that Mubarak accepted, a spokesman said.

It was apparent from Shevardnadze's remarks that Moscow and Cairo have few disagreements over a Middle East peace initiative, to be built around an international conference hosted by the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council.

Sharq's resignation follows Najibullah's removal of several non-members of the ruling party from his cabinet, and his weekend declaration of a national emergency and the creation of a military council to run most aspects of government. These steps underscore the determination of Najibullah and his closest allies in the party to fight for survival, at least for the time being.

...Efforts by Islamic fundamentalist factions within the mujahedeen, apparently with the support of some Pakistani government officials, to push through their candidate for prime minister of an interim government have been blocked by more moderate rebel factions.

"If the elections are held in democratic conditions, which implies giving time to allow us to take part, it would mean the end of the armed struggle because we are ready to recognize the results," Shafik Handal told reporters.

IRAN-EUROPE

NBC's Tom Brokaw: Since author Salman Rushdie's weekend apology for his book brought only more vivid death threats from Ayatollah Khomeini, Great Britain and the European Economic Community struck back -- diplomatically. The 12 Western European countries which make up the Common Market ordered their top diplomats home from Iran. They also suspended high-level visits to and from Iran and Iranian diplomats in their countries will be restricted in their travels.

NBC's Peter Kent reports Britain will go even further than the other countries and withdraw all of its embassy staff from Tehran. In continuing defiance, though, Ayatollah Khomeini used a public appearance to make clear his death sentence against Rushdie still stands, even if Rushdie eventually repents fully. Moderates in the government may well be trying to diffuse the incident, but it's clear the Ayatollah is still in religious and political control. In Paris, the spiritual leader of Shiite Moslems across Europe suggest that the aging Khomeini does not really understand what he's doing, that he's being manipulated by religious subversives. (NBC-Lead)

ABC's Barrie Dunsmore reports the concerted action was stronger than anticipated. In Iran today, the Ayatollah made one of his infrequent public appearances. As he looked on, the deputy speaker of Iran's parliament repeated Khomeini's latest death threat. Today's developments appear to abruptly halt what was a warming trend in its relations with the West. Some analysts believe that stopping that trend was the real reason for the Ayatollah's latest hard line. (ABC-2)

CBS's Tom Fenton reports President Khomeini, who had the rug pulled out from under him by the Ayatollah, on a visit to Yugoslavia had no comment. Rushdie's book has now caused at least seven deaths and hundreds of injuries in riots around the world. And tonight it has brought Britain and Iran to the brink of rupture. (CBS-2)

TOWER NOMINATION

Brokaw: A strong new endorsement of John Tower from President Bush.

This one came after the President received a new FBI report on his nominee for secretary of defense. And White House officials are hoping Tower's confirmation will come soon.

NBC's Andrea Mitchell: The FBI's sixth and presumably final report on Tower was delivered to the White House before being sent to Capitol Hill. 140 pages long, White House officials have said it contains nothing to prevent Tower from being confirmed. The President gave a thumbs up when asked about the report.

(TV COVERAGE: President giving thumbs-up sign on arrival from Camp David.)

But the White House has been wrong before about Tower's background and the extent of congressional doubts about the nominee. Sen. Nunn is still worried about something he says the FBI might not be able to answer: possible alcoholism.

(Sen. Nunn: "The question in my mind has been for some time and continues to be was there a drinking problem? If so, was it recognized and dealt with? And number three, is it currently a problem?")

Even if that had cleared up, Tower had other problems. Today the Senate Armed Services staff questioned a former State Department security officer about alleged security breaches by Tower's arms control team in Geneva in 1985. Congressional sources told NBC News that the security officer detailed a major security breakdown in Geneva: 440 separate problems involving the handling of top secret documents: classified documents left out on desks, other documents found in people's living quarters, top secrets discussed openly outside the secure bubble. All this while Tower was in charge. Tower was also accused by the man of personal indiscretions: of keeping a mistress on the Geneva clerical staff even though she could not type.

(Rep. Dingell: "The situation in Geneva apparently, though, according to what the subcommittee can ascertain, was rather chaotic when Mr. Tower was there.")

Nunn now promises a committee vote this week. But Nunn may ask for a rare closed session of the full Senate to debate the nomination -- closed to protect Tower from untrue rumors and to hide the names of his accusers.

(Joe Walker, political analyst: "After all, they ran a campaign that emphasized heavily the Horton spot, you know, and there was clearly a racist overtone to that. I don't care what anybody says.")

Brokaw interviews David Duke:

Duke: There's racism going on in this country against white people. It's called "affirmative action." I believe in equal rights for everybody in America. And that's the real issue --

Brokaw: ...You are quoted as saying America is being invaded by hordes of dusty third-world peoples and with each passing hour our economic well-being, our cultural heritage, our freedoms and our racial roots are being battered. Do you believe that?

Duke: Yes, sir, I do. I think that our heritage in this country is being lost. I'm not against the rights of any minorities but I think this country's on its way to being a third-world nation.

Brokaw: Lee Atwater and other prominent Republicans are prepared to disassociate you from the Republican Party because they say that's your own belief, that everyone in this country has a right to disassociate himself or herself from organizations or people with whom they don't want to be associated and they're going to do that to you.

Duke: Well, let me tell you something, sir. I'm every bit as much a Republican as Lee Atwater. The voters voted for me. He needs a lesson in Americanism. If people can vote and elect someone, that's who our representative should be. Mr. Atwater should simply have said, well, the people have spoken. The Republican Party is available for anybody. (NBC-5)

MIDEAST -- WEST BANK

Brokaw reports that on the second day of a general strike by Palestinians, Israeli troops shot and wounded at least 13 Palestinian protesters.

MIDEAST -- SOVIETS

ABC's Dean Reynolds reports on Foreign Minister Shevardnadze's meetings in Cairo with Egyptian leaders, Israelis and Palestinians. He has come with the most serious Soviet peace plan in years. He is promoting an international conference sponsored by the U.N. with all parties involved, including the PLO. He has had no problem selling the idea to President Mubarak or other Arab leaders. Foreign Minister Arens told Mubarak that Israel won't talk to the PLO and that a U.N. conference is no substitute for direct negotiations.

IMMIGRATION -- CENTRAL AMERICANS

Brokaw reports a tough new immigration plan aimed at dealing with Central American refugees flooding into South Texas seeking political asylum will go into effect at midnight tonight. This plan promises speedy processing of the refugees' claims. However, this new policy could create some major new problems.

NBC's Dan Molina reports now all that do not qualify as political refugees will be arrested and face deportation. Under this policy, the government could wind up feeding, housing thousands of refugees almost immediately. The idea is to discourage them from coming in the first place, but the INS can't be sure that will happen. Officials say only a handful of refugees have followed the instructions they were given in South Texas and reported to the Miami INS office. There is a possibility the flow of refugees will simply bypass the beefed-up security in South Texas and cross somewhere else. More may turn to smugglers to get them across.

DRUGS

Brokaw: As the Bush Administration plans its strategy in the War on Drugs, there are no indications whatsoever that this war is being won. From 1980 to 1987, the amount of cocaine flooding this country quadrupled.... Tonight, in the first of three reports, NBC's Brian Ross looks at just how bad this problem is, how far it's going.

NBC's Brian Ross reports from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, in Amish country. Even in these small towns, there is a cocaine problem -- not among the Amish but among enough others here to attract cocaine dealers from thousands of miles away. Like the rest of America, small-town Pennsylvania now has a big cocaine problem. (TV COVERAGE of President Bush's Inaugural Address: "Take my word for it: This scourge will stop." Applause.) But President Bush did not say how, and top law enforcement officials say they have no idea of how they could possibly deliver on the President's promise in the foreseeable future. (NBC-8)

JAPANESE ECONOMY

Jennings reports on Japan's recovery since World War II. Americans are so impressed with the Japanese business talent, that 70% in the ABC-Post poll believe the Japanese will end up owning the U.S. if the U.S. Government doesn't do something soon.

ABC's Richard Threlkeld reports on Japanese ownership in America and financing of American debt. As a taxpayer it's costing you.

Jennings reports further on the ABC-Post poll: 80% are in favor of limiting the number of U.S. corporations which Japanese investors can buy. But even those who feel threatened by Japanese economic power admire the Japanese. 58% look on Japan favorably. (ABC-5)

Jennings: There are many more American success stories in Japan than most Americans imagine. The biggest restaurant chain in the country is McDonald's. Coca-Cola makes more money here than in the States. (ABC-9)
