SENATE'S DEBATE OVER TOWER BECOMES PARTISAN FREE-FOR-ALL Bush Fails To Lock Up Any Democrat's Votes

A tense, sharply divided Senate opened formal debate yesterday on the embattled nomination of...John Tower with Democrats claiming he has "a record of alcohol abuse" that makes him unfit for the "very top of the nuclear chain of command" and Republicans contending he has been unfairly trapped in a "cobweb of fact, fiction and fantasy."

As the arguments on the Senate floor began, the White House conceded that President Bush has failed so far to persuade any Democrat to support Tower, and three more Democrats -- Sens. Sarbanes, Sanford and Cranston -- came out against his confirmation.

The administration needs to hold all 45 GOP senators and pick up five of the 55 Democrats to prevent the first rejection of a President's cabinet choice in 30 years and a major embarrassment to Bush a little over a month after his inauguration.

After about an hour of debate, the Senate plunged into some of the more lurid details of accusations against Tower, including refuted tales of an encounter with a "voluptuous" Russian ballerina dancing naked on a piano.

Senate Dems Urge Tower's Rejection In Opening Debate

Senate Democrats, opening debate on John Tower's fitness to run the Pentagon, urged his rejection Thursday on the grounds someone with a drinking problem does not belong in the nuclear chain of command.

In a clash that held many elements of a trial, Republicans countered that the evidence against Tower is a "cobweb of fact, fiction and fantasy," from "unidentified flying witnesses."

Leaders of the GOP minority warned the Senate is on the brink of "soap opera or...civil war," and argued that President Bush is entitled to his nominee, a person no senator has said is professionally unqualified or who has been seen by colleagues incapacitated by alcohol during the twenty-four years he served in the Senate....

A final vote on Tower is not likely to come until next week and as the debate opened a UPI survey of members indicated 12 undecided or keeping quiet on their decision. Those leaning for or against Tower split chiefly along party lines....

Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn...opened the bitter debate by declaring the Tower was unfit to hold the sensitive position.

"We're not talking about the secretary of interior. We're talking about someone who is next to the President in the nuclear chain of command," said Nunn, who also sighted conflict of interest questions....

The senior Republican on the committee, John Warner, took to the floor like a defense lawyer, declaring, "I rise with pride...to endorse the recommendation of the President of the United States that John Tower, former U.S. senator...be secretary of defense." (Eliot Brenner, UPI)

[Tower's] supporters said the charges were part of a campaign of innuendo against him and no government officials would be left in Washington if the standards being applied to Tower were applied to everyone else....

Sen. McCain told the Senate [air force sergeant Bob] Jackson [who made the allegations] was not at the base when the alleged incidents occurred.

McCain said Jackson reported to the base in February 1976, was last on duty there March 16, 1977, and was permanently retired in April 1978 for psychiatric reasons....

Maine Republican Richard Cohen said the Armed Services Committee had discounted Jackson's testimony.

"What we're trying to say is that this is part of the treatment that Senator Tower has received (with reports) coming over the transom and under the door."...

Republicans are casting doubts on the [FBI] summaries, saying they are based on statements by anonymous people and uncorroborated.

Democrats say there is an accumulation of evidence, much of it attributed to people who have no motive to lie, that Tower drank heavily and acted indiscreetly.

FED CHAIRMAN WORRIED ABOUT PACE OF BUDGET TALKS

Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan, preaching his budget sermon on Capitol Hill for the fifth time in 10 days, chided Congress Thursday for dragging its feet on reducing the deficit.

...Greenspan warned that the longer the Congress waits to cut the deficit, projected to total \$163 billion this year, the greater the risk of upheaval in financial markets.

"I'm concerned that you won't move as rapidly as you ought to," the Fed chairman said.

"Allowing deficits to persist courts instability in the near term and threatens potentially significant reductions in the United States' standard of living," he said....

Greenspan said deficit reduction was so vital he would favor, if all else failed, across-the-board spending cuts foreseen by the Gramm-Rudman law to get the budget down to \$100 billion in fiscal year 1990.

But he immediately added, "I hope you don't wait to get to that point."

FDIC ASSUMES CONTROL OF 37 INSOLVENT THRIFTS

Brady Sees 200 In Agency's Hands In 6 Weeks

The FDIC took over 37 more insolvent thrifts yesterday in its drive to assume control of all failed S&Ls under President Bush's plan to save the foundering industry.

The FDIC was named managing agent for the 37 thrifts with \$7.9 billion in assets in five states, bringing to 73 the total of insolvent institutions enrolled in the joint oversight program announced by Bush on Feb. 6....

Treasury Secretary Brady...said [yesterday] 200 of the worst-case thrifts "should be in the hands of federal authorities" within the next six weeks....

Hours after Brady addressed it, the bankers association agreed to support the Bush rescue plan and to work on Capitol Hill for provisions it considers essential.

BUSH RULING NEAR ON AIRLINE STRIKE

President Bush's senior advisers believe he should allow a strike to begin at midnight Friday against Eastern Airlines, administration officials and industry executives said today.

The White House said Bush would decide whether to intervene to postpone a walkout just hours before the strike deadline between Eastern and its machinists union....

Administration officials said Bush's decision could have political and economic repercussions extending far beyond the troubled airline.

With the union threatening to expand a strike into the railroad industry, 33 senators, all but 2 of them Democrats, wrote Bush on Wednesday urging him to prevent a work stoppage. The two Republicans, Sens. Specter and D'Amato, are from states heavily dependent on rail service....

Strike At Eastern Likely As Pilots Reject Offer

A strike against Eastern Airlines appeared certain yesterday after the pilots union rejected a last-minute contract offer designed to keep the airline flying in the event of a walk-out at midnight tonight by the International Association of Machinists.

Already yesterday, there were indications that the strike would quickly boil out of Eastern and into other parts of the nation's transportation system. Machinists union officials in New York said rail commuters in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut would be greeted with pickets Monday morning in an effort to shut down railroad service to the nation's largest metropolitan area....

Eastern, which has insisted it will continue to operate in the event of a strike, said it will spell out contingency plans for continued operations today.

Mediators See Progress In Effort To Avert Eastern Air Strike

Federal mediators said Thursday there was "movement" in the last-ditch talks aimed at averting a threatened Saturday strike by 8,500 machinists and baggage handlers against Eastern Airlines, one the airline says could mean the end of the carrier.

The AFL-CIO said meanwhile that key member unions would refuse to cross any picket lines put up by the International Association of Machinists....

The machinists claim the law allows them to mount a secondary boycott against Amtrak and other airlines to increase pressure for the settlement, which would make travel between Florida and the Northwest very difficult during the popular vacation season.

National Mediation Board chief negotiator Harry Bickford said at a news conference that "an amended proposal was made from one party and it is being considered."

He said, "some interesting developments have occurred" and that often breakthroughs come in the waning hours of negotiations.

ADMINISTRATION TO SEEK \$4.25 MINIMUM PAY

The Bush administration will propose increasing the federal minimum wage to \$4.25 over the next three years and creating a universal "training wage" of nearly a dollar less for new hires, government officials said yesterday.

The decision to boost the wage from the \$3.35 it has been for nearly a decade was reached yesterday after more than a week of White House debate over the size of the proposed increase and the scope of the training wage.

Labor Secretary Dole is scheduled to present the administration proposal this afternoon in testimony before the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee.

Labor Department officials said the administration would insist on a training wage as a part of any legislation to increase the minimum wage.

FBI REJECTS COMPUTER USE ON SUSPECTS

FBI Director William Sessions has rejected a proposal that would have allowed law enforcement officials to use computers to track suspects who have not been charged with a crime.

The proposal was part of a \$40 million dollar overhaul of the FBI's massive computer network, the National Crime Information Network.

In a letter received yesterday by Rep. Don Edwards...Sessions said he supports all other purposes of the proposed computer systems upgrade.

EPA CHIEF URGES BUSH TO JOIN ALLIES IN CFC PHASE-OUT GOAL

EPA Administrator William Reilly yesterday urged President Bush to join U.S. allies in Europe in a move to phase out all ozone-depleting chemicals by the end of the century, according to administration officials.

Reilly's recommendation at the White House meeting of the Domestic Policy Council was made hours after environmental ministers of the European Community voted to eliminate the popular chemicals -- chlorofluorocarbons -- by the year 2000....

Reilly is leaving today for an international conference on CFCs hosted by Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher in London that is due to start on Sunday.

CHINA OBJECTION TO DISSIDENT DIDN'T REACH KEY BUSH OFFICIALS, U.S. SAYS

The U.S. Embassy in Beijing was told in advance by Chinese officials that they objected to inviting dissident Fang Lizhi to a dinner hosted by President Bush, but the objections failed to reach top levels of the White House, a senior administration official said yesterday....

The invitation of Fang "turned out to be extraordinarily sensitive to the Chinese," said the official, suggesting that the sharp Chinese reaction had been unexpected. "There come these things and some of them are just extraordinarily sensitive. Others they let go by without saying a word. Sometimes it is hard to tell which is going to be which."

...The senior administration official...said the invitation to Fang "was not the President's idea." He said the U.S. Embassy in Beijing had sent to Washington a proposed guest list for the dinner. He said the Chinese "had been talking to the embassy" and saying "they didn't like it and... they thought they should have been notified or consulted."

When the guest list reached Washington, however, the potential for difficulty was not conveyed to top Bush advisors, he said.

U.S., SOVIETS NEAR TALKS ON CENTRAL AMERICA

The U.S. and Soviet Union are moving toward new and more intensive discussions on resolving conflicts in Central America and are likely to discuss the issue next week when Secretary of State Baker meets Soviet Foreign Minister Shevardnadze for their first talks of the Bush administration, official sources said yesterday.

Underscoring the more cooperative bilateral attitude was the disclosure yesterday by Soviet Ambassador Dubinin that both countries are going to allow mutual increases in their embassy staffs, reversing the 1986 reductions triggered when the Reagan administration ordered 80 Soviet officials to leave the country because of concerns about espionage.

Moscow's willingness to discuss Central America was indicated during a call to the State Department last week to present a foreign ministry statement on the recent meeting in El Salvador of five Central American presidents, U.S. sources said....

One sign of improving U.S.-Soviet relations is the agreement last month that Dubinin disclosed to increase the ceiling on diplomatic personnel allowed to reside in each capital....

The new accord...will permit the U.S. and Soviet Union to add 20 persons to their embassy and consular staffs by Aug. 1 and 15 more after that for a total of 286 on each side.

BUSH SAYS SANDINISTAS MUST HONOR PLEDGE OF DEMOCRACY

The White House said Thursday it expected Central American presidents to lean on Nicaragua to keep its pledge of democratic reforms before carrying out their plan to disband the contra rebels.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said President Bush stressed that message to visiting Guatemalan President Cerezo, one of the signatories of the recent Central American peace initiative.

"The two presidents discussed the Central American peace process and the need to carefully monitor Sandinista performance in meeting their public promises," Fitzwater said....

Bush and [Secretary of State] Baker have made a commitment to develop a bipartisan policy that stresses diplomacy over the military-oriented strategy of the Reagan years.

The two have expressed support for continued non-lethal aid to the rebels, which State Department spokesman Redman said would be one element of an "integrated approach" including "incentives and disincentives" to move Nicaragua's leftist Sandinistas toward democracy.

NICARAGUAN POLL SHOWS AN EROSION OF SUPPORT FOR SANDINISTAS

MANAGUA -- An independent poll published here today shows that the ruling Sandinista party has suffered a dramatic erosion of support since the last elections, in 1984, but could still win in voting next year because of weak opposition....

The survey showed that 33 percent of those polled said they would vote for the Sandinista National Liberation Front, the government party, which won 67 percent of the vote in 1984....

Thirty percent said they would vote for the opposition, made up of 14 parties ranging from Marxist to conservative. Another 30 percent remain undecided, and the rest said they wouldn't vote....

Nicaraguans are broadly opposed to the U.S.-funded rebels, or contras, according to the poll. Only 2 percent said the contra's struggle is positive for Nicaragua, and 61 percent called it negative. Forty-two percent blamed Nicaragua's economic distress on the U.S. trade embargo in effect since 1985, while 40 percent blame it on mismanagement by the Sandinista government.

REBEL REFUSAL OF CEASE-FIRE HIT U.S. Calls Guerrillas' Peace Move 'Suspect'

The U.S. yesterday criticized as "extremely unfortunate" the rejection by El Salvador's leftist guerrillas of the unilateral cease-fire declared by the Salvadoran armed forces Tuesday in an effort to draw the rebels into peace talks with President Duarte's government.

"As President Duarte has recognized, violence and democracy just don't mix," State Department spokesman Charles Redman said in response to reports that guerrillas of the FMLN had attacked government forces.

"The central question concerns whether or not the FMLN is willing to participate in the democratic process and end the violence," Redman said. He added that recent peace proposals by the FMLN were "particularly suspect" in light of its rejection of the cease-fire.

Guerrillas Accuse Army Of Violating Its Truce

SAN SALVADOR -- Leftist rebels said Thursday the army is violating its cease-fire by moving into territory controlled by the guerrillas.

"That demonstrates the falsehood of the supposed cease-fire," said the rebel's clandestine Radio Venceremos.

A top colonel said the army has "the legal and moral obligation" to defend against guerrilla attacks despite the cease-fire.

PANAMA'S OUSTED CHIEF FAVORS EASING U.S. SANCTIONS

Ousted Panamanian President Delvalle has urged the Bush administration to ease economic sanctions against Panama if Gen. Noriega guarantees free and honest elections.

In an interview with The Washington Times, Delvalle...said the Bush administration's failure to develop a coherent policy threatens to waste an opportunity of ridding the country of Noriega during the presidential and legislative elections scheduled for May.

"We're 66 days away from the election. The United States does not have a policy toward Panama...and this is where Panamanians and the United States can combine in a strategy and avail themselves of a better possibility to succeed," Delvalle said in the interview....

GERMAN COMPUTER HACKERS HELD FOR SPYING FOR SOVIETS

BONN -- Authorities have arrested three West German computer hackers on suspicion that they carried out international electronic espionage and sold sensitive data to the Soviet intelligence service, the KGB, officials said today.

The ARD television network...said the hackers helped the KGB gain access to computer data banks at the Pentagon, the nuclear arms laboratory at Los Alamos, and NASA.

The KGB also received computer passwords and other materials from nuclear, space and commercial electronic data banks in W. Germany, France, Switzerland, Britain and Japan, ARD said.

RELIEF GROUPS IN SUDAN GET BOOST FROM SOVIETS

The Soviet Union, at Washington's request, has urged Ethiopia to press Ethiopian-backed rebels fighting in southern Sudan to cooperate more fully with private U.S. and Western relief groups to save hundreds of thousands of civilians there from starvation, administration officials disclosed yesterday.

They said the Soviet action was the first concrete sign of an emerging cooperative effort between the superpowers to end the civil war that has brought the government of Sudanese Prime Minister Mahdi to the brink of collapse.

Deputy Assistant Secretary of State Kenneth Brown, testifying before the House subcommittees on Africa and hunger, said the U.S. has been "in repeated contact" with the Soviets over the Sudan situation. The most recent exchange, he said, concerned "the relief side and the use of Soviet influence through the Ethiopians on the SPLA (Sudanese People's Liberation Army) to help with the relief."

ISRAELIS KILL 4 GUERRILLAS; PALESTINIAN SHOT IN GAZA

JERUSALEM -- Israeli forces in southern Lebanon killed four guerrillas Thursday before they could raid northern Israel, the army said, and a soldier in the Gaza Strip killed a Palestinian who tried to stab a fellow trooper....

An army spokesman said the guerrillas belonged to the radical PLO faction Democratic Front for the Liberation of Palestine and were caught near Al Jibbayl village in Israel's self-proclaimed "security zone." Lebanese police said the encounter occurred outside the zone.

BRITAIN CALLS BOOK 'OFFENSIVE' TO ISLAM Howe Statement Seen Move To Mollify Iran

LONDON -- Britain today described novelist Salman Rushdie's novel "The Satanic Verses" as "deeply offensive" to Moslems, in an apparent move to cool off the crisis and avoid a formal break in diplomatic relations with Iran.

Foreign Secretary Geoffrey Howe made the statement to the BBC at the end of a confusing day in which Iran and Britain also argued over which government approached which about the crisis.

The Foreign Office spokesman denied that Howe's remarks constituted a softening in Britain's position.

TOWER NOMINATION

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin tonight with political struggle for the short term and the long. In Washington today, where they've been celebrating the 200th anniversary of Congress, the Senate began the formal debate on the immediate future of John Tower. As of now, there is every reason to believe that when the debate is over, Mr. Tower will not be the secretary of defense. And so on the Senate floor, amid all the earnest talk about Mr. Tower's personal and professional record, we are watching a battle for position between the Democrats in Congress and the President.

ABC's Jim Wooten: In this place so steeped in history that it often goes unnoticed, there was no mistaking history in the making today. Over two centuries deliberating on nearly 550 cabinet nominations...

(Sen. Warner: "...Only eight times has this body seen fit to superimpose our judgement on a President of the United States.") Warner exhorting his colleagues not to make John Tower the ninth -- defending him proudly, he said, against the assertions of Nunn and other Democrats, that he is unfit to serve in the military chain of command.

(Sen. Nunn: "When his history of drinking is such that he would not be selected to command a missile wing, a SAC bomber squadron, or a Trident missile submarine.")

Or, Nunn charged, when Tower, as a private consultant, exploited his experience as an arms negotiator, or when he behaved badly with women, as a retired Air Force sergeant told the FBI, and The Washington Post reported this morning.

(Sen. Gramm: "That accusation is so ridiculous, that it is hard to believe that it ran on the front page of the newspapers.")

Gramm and other Republicans insisted that Tower has been the victim of fiction and fantasy, and McCain, quoting Pentagon records, said the Air Force sergeant was an unreliable witness to anything.

(Sen. McCain: "He was referred to the Wilfred Hall Medical Center for psychological evaluation, was later retired for psychiatric disability.")

And, when Glenn began reciting single word descriptions of Tower from the FBI on his drinking, --

(Sen. Glenn: "'Staggering,' 'inebriated,' 'walking out of a restaurant colliding with chairs and tables.'")

-- Dole said that breached the confidentiality rules of the Senate and threatened the appropriate punishment.

(Sen. Dole: "If somebody wants to stand up here without lifting an injunction of secrecy and start reading out of the FBI report, the sanction is expulsion from the Senate.")

Dole and the Republicans know they don't have the votes yet. ABC News counts: 36 Republicans for Tower, 36 Democrats against Tower, and 25 undecided, including seven Republicans. The language today was senatorial, of course, but just beneath the surface lies a simmering partisan anger. There are some wounds being opened here along with the history being made.

Jennings discusses the Tower nomination with ABC's Brit Hume:

Jennings: While the debate goes on it was hard to detect any real effort by the White House today to push the nomination. Have they given up on the nomination at the White House?

Hume: Not officially. John Tower was down here for a meeting this morning, and he will be here among the guests tonight at a dinner the President is throwing. But the President saw a number of senators two days ago, he talked to a couple of senators yesterday. There were no senators down here today, and what public remarks there were by George Bush today contained no mention of John Tower. His aides privately say that they know that this is a lost cause.

Jennings: So in other words they have really given up.

Hume: I don't think there's any question they've given up, but publicly the President will never abandon John Tower unless John Tower wants to give up the ghost himself, and there's no sign Tower, having said yesterday he'll never retreat of surrender, is ready to do that.

Jennings: Any indication that another candidate is being kicked around down there?

Hume: I just checked on that, and I'm told firmly that the President himself said within the last half hour that there's to be none of that.

CBS's Dan Rather: The John Tower fight drones on. White House officials let it be known that President Bush has failed to persuade a single Senate Democrat to vote yes on the nomination, and he's not sure about all the Republicans. This as the full U.S. Senate began formal debate on confirming Tower. Final up or down vote expected next week and widely expected to be "no." There is growing talk that President Bush is prolonging deliberately the Tower fight, not because he thinks he can win but because he is out for vindication and perhaps to play some politics. Other Republicans reportedly may be out for retribution and revenge against Democrats.

CBS's Bob Schieffer:

(Sen. Nunn: "The secretary of defense must be a person suited by personal conduct, discretion, and judgement to serve second only to the President in the chain of command for military operations. The committee concluded that Senator Tower cannot meet these standards and therefore should not be confirmed as secretary of defense.")

(Sen. Warner: "It is the most incredible cobweb of fact, fiction and fantasy that I've seen in the decade I've been privileged to serve in this institution.")

And so the great debate officially began. Sen. Nunn doing most of the talking for Democrats today. On alcohol, Nunn says the pattern is unmistakable: Tower has a drinking problem which should bar him from holding a sensitive post.

(Sen. Nunn: "We are not talking about secretary of interior; we are talking about someone that is next to the President at the very top of the nuclear chain of command.")

Schieffer continues:

(Sen. Gramm: "Whiskey is not an unknown commodity to the people of America and to the people who have been important in its government.")

There were also sharp differences over Tower's close ties to the defense industry.

(Nunn: "Senator Tower's decision to provide consulting services on arms control matters just after serving as an arms control negotiator, in the view of the committee and in my personal view, crossed the line with regard to the revolving door.")

(Gramm: "By this logic, the ideal guy to be secretary of defense would be a fellow that just came in on a turnip truck who would agree not to ever make a decision related to turnips or to trucks.")

And there were more differences over Tower's alleged indiscreet behavior around women.

(Nunn: "We did find a number of examples of personal conduct which the committee found indiscreet.")

(Sen. Cohen: "Not a shred of evidence that somehow he wouldn't carry out his duties to make sure that people who are serving in our military forces, of women who serve in our military forces, wouldn't be harassed.")

But it was when Glenn started quoting from the confidential FBI file about Tower's drinking that the Republicans cried foul.

(Sen. Dole: "It seems to me it's unfair to the nominee. We can't get anything else out of the report. Now can we have that matter expunged from the record and the media?")

The Tower controversy has spilled all over Washington. At the White House, Barry Goldwater argued Tower should not be disqualified just for taking a drink.

(Goldwater: "If they chased every man or woman out of this town that had shacked up with somebody else or gotten drunk, there'd be no government.")

In a sense, that is the strategy that the Republicans are following: to put Washington on trial rather than to debate Tower's qualifications. Republicans still don't have the votes to win this fight, but two sources familiar with the strategy say their aim now is to show the Democrats that even if they do win, some of them could be badly cut up in the process and that from here on, no victory will come cheap.

Rather discusses the nomination with CBS's Lesley Stahl:

Rather: It appears to be a losing fight. Why are they fighting it to the bitter end?

Stahl: The primary goal is not to have new votes for Sen. Tower. The main goal is to make President Bush look like a tough fighter. They're convinced here that they're probably not going to win, but look at Sen. Tower's speech yesterday when he attacked the Senate. That's the kind of thing you say after you've already lost. The strategy is to have the President out front, persuading the American people that he chose Tower because he's qualified, not because of some old campaign debt. And there's one more thing. As Bob [Schieffer] said, they want to make the Democrats pay.

Rather: They believe the Democrats are playing politics with this, but is bipartisan cooperation overall now dead for at least the early part of the Bush term?

Stahl: No, they're trying to have it both ways. And that's a challenge for the President because while the Republicans are out there attacking the Democrats publicly, he has to try and limit the damage through behind-the-scenes sort of massaging of the Democrats.

Rather: Aren't they doing anything at the White House to get Tower votes?

Stahl: They are. They tried to gin up an avalanche of phone calls and letters to key senators, but John Tower is pro-choice. And the usual people who do that for Republican presidents are the anti-abortion religious groups and they are not participating, so that's fizzled. And there's one more thing. Congressional sources tell us that the Republican governor of Texas, William Clements, is letting it be known that he is not for this nomination. I have to tell you that Gov. Clements himself is denying that. (CBS-3)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: The decisive battle is now underway over John Tower for defense secretary. As the Senate began its debate on Tower today, the White House conceded it has not persuaded a single Democrat to support the nominee.... An NBC News survey found that 50 Democrats are against him at this point; 43 Republicans are for Tower, and seven senators say they're undecided -- that includes five Democrats.

NBC's Andrea Mitchell: It was an historic debate. The first time in anyone's memory that the nation's most deliberative body pondered the issues of booze and womanizing on the Senate floor.

(Sen. Nunn: "It is with a sense of sorrow that I begin my duties on the floor as manager in opposition to this nomination.")

As debate opened, Tower's defenders were grappling with a new charge -- a charge that Senate Democrats believed was leaked by Tower's supporters to set them up -- the charge that as a senator, Tower had been drunk during an inspection tour of a Texas air base.

(Sen. Glenn: "And this sergeant allows how, some years back, he was at Bergstrom Air Force Base, and John Tower came to town on an inspection tour; and he got off the plane, and he was walking around and he was drunk -- and he fondled a female airman.")

Ridiculous, said Gramm, and as it turned out, Tower had only been to the base once, before the Air Force sergeant was stationed there. Republicans also questioned the mental stability of the sergeant. Handling such hot stuff on the Senate floor created more problems.

Glenn started quoting from the FBI report.

(Sen. Glenn: "More allegations here: 'staggering,' 'inebriated,' 'walking out of a restaurant, colliding with chairs and tables.'")

A violation of FBI and Senate rules of confidentiality, said Republicans, expunging Glenn's description from the record, if not the videotape.

(Sen. Dole: "What recourse does the nominee have?")

The White House tried to strike back with a former Armed Services chairman.

(Barry Goldwater: "If they chased every man or woman out of this town that had shacked up with somebody else or gotten drunk, there'd be no government. So I think that Senate better start looking at some facts.")

Mitchell continues: Meanwhile, Senate investigators are looking at a new charge they believe to be even more serious: whether John Tower contacted members of the arms control team on behalf of his defense clients after he left the arms talks.

(Sen. Levin: "He gave advice to his private clients on the very same weapons systems which were the subject of inside and confidential information.")

Tower had told the Armed Services Committee he did no such thing. But after leaving the arms team, Tower and an associate each returned to Geneva. A spokesman for Tower says, for reasons not related to business. Tonight the Senate is struggling with how to conduct an open debate without completely destroying John Tower's reputation. Each side is accusing the other of leaks, and this debate is only going to get nastier.

Brokaw: NBC's John Cochran reports that an air of defeatism has set in at the White House. President Bush is expected to continue the fight for Tower until the end, but more out of a sense of duty than any serious hope of victory. (NBC-2)

EASTERN AIRLINES

NBC's Tom Brokaw reports that Eastern Airlines faces a strike by its machinists union at midnight tomorrow. And if the strike goes on, more than 1,000 flights a day in 110 cities, 100,000 passengers daily will be affected. It may force President Bush to declare a national transportation emergency and order a cooling-off period.

NBC's Robert Hager reports that Eastern company sources say a new offer includes a five-year job guarantee to most mechanics and baggage handlers, and wage concessions of \$125 million instead of the previous demand for \$150 million. The union's chief negotiator said the offer wasn't significant, but he expected more movement tomorrow.... Government sources say that President Bush has decided not to intervene immediately to block a strike, but later, if there's trouble, the President would retain the option of calling the strikers back for 60 days' cooling-off period.

(ABC-2, CBS-3, NBC-Lead)

CONDOR MISSILE

Brokaw reports that Condor II, a secret missile being built by Argentina and Egypt, uses secret technology stolen from the United States.

NBC's Fred Francis reports that intelligence sources say the missile could carry explosive warheads of poison gas hundreds of miles, and that Argentina may want to sell it in the third world. Also according to intelligence sources, Egypt got the cash from Iraq, some of the know-how and technology from Italy and West Germany. And in a brazen act of duplicity, Egypt pirated more of the technology from its financial benefactor and friend, the United States.... Argentine President Raoul Alfonsin is being pressed by the U.S. to halt the project. The outcome of that debate...could alter the balance of power throughout the Middle East. (NBC-5)

WEST GERMANY/SPY RING

Rather reports West German officials said they cracked a major high-tech spy ring. They say they seized several suspects and extensive evidence. West German television reported the suspects are computer hackers who got and sold to the Soviets the passwords and codes for U.S. Defense Department and NASA computers. (CBS-5)

MISSING SOLDIER

Jennings: American officials say that a U.S. Army specialist has been missing from his unit in West Germany for the past nine days. Michael Peri is an electronics warfare specialist with access to military secrets. Authorities fear he may have defected to the East Germans or to the Soviets. (ABC-4)

VENEZUELA

CBS's Dan Rather: Thousands of soldiers and police are patrolling the capital of Venezuela. They are trying to keep the peace after three days of bloody riots touched off by government-ordered price increases. The toll in Venezuela: at least 200 dead, hundreds more injured.

CBS's Juan Vazquez reports from Caracas on the violence there. The rioters are sending a message to Washington as well that the main factor that has caused these tensions is the position of the U.S. Government on debt. (NBC-4, ABC-5, CBS-Lead)

BRITAIN-IRAN RELATIONS

CBS's Tom Fenton reports from London on an apparent last-minute attempt by Iranian moderates to head off a complete diplomatic break with Great Britain. The British government is also looking for a way out. Foreign Secretary Howe said Salman Rushdie's book is deeply offensive to Moslems. But Britain insists there can be no talks until Ayatollah Khomeini's death threats against Rushdie are withdrawn, and the Ayatollah rarely backs down. The firestorm of protests over "Satanic Verses" continues on both sides. (CBS-4)

OZONE PROTECTION

Jennings: There has been a major decision today by the European Economic Community to protect the environment. The 12 nations have agreed to eliminate altogether some of the gases which can destroy the earth's ozone layer. They've called for an immediate 85% reduction in the use of chlorofluorocarbons, and they will ban the gases altogether by the year 2000. (ABC-6)

NORTH TRIAL

Brokaw: A witness testified today that Oliver North used the name of President Reagan often to get cooperation in his effort to arm the Nicaraguan rebels. The witness was a manager of North's secret air lifts to the contras. He said North told a former official of El Salvador in 1986 that the President was "totally behind the covert program." (NBC-3)

MEASLES

Brokaw: A major health emergency has been declared in parts of this country because of a disease that experts used to think was history. The disease is measles, and it can be deadly, of course. So far this year measles have killed at least six infants.

NBC's Robert Bazell reports that health officials in Newark, N.J. and many other cities across the country today were inoculating children to try to stop the further spread of the biggest measles epidemic in years. Houston and Los Angeles have had the most cases so far; 13 states have reported outbreaks.... Federal health authorities say all children should be inoculated when they are 15 months old. To contain outbreaks, children should get shots even earlier. Because so many innocent children get no shots, and because the vaccine is not 100 percent effective, officials fear there could be many more cases of measles in the next few years. (NBC-6)

WIFE BEATING

ABC's Carole Simpson reports that according to a federal crime survey, a woman in the United States is battered by a man every 15 seconds. The surgeon general reports that the largest single cause of injury to women is not accidents, like you would think, but physical abuse.

Jennings: In this country the surgeon general, C. Everett Koop, said recently, "We say we're a civilized society, let's act like one. Let's end the battering of women in this country." (ABC-7)

AMERICAN FLAG/ART DISPUTE

NBC's John Cummins reports that veterans today asked a judge to close an art exhibit at the Chicago Art Institute, or to at least find a way to prevent people from walking on the American flag which was draped on the floor as part of the exhibit. The judge did neither. School officials have closed the exhibit to the public for safety reasons. Today the students protested that with a sit-down demonstration, which was crashed by two more veterans. (NBC-9)

TALKING POINTS: THORNBURGH SEND-OFF

MARCH 3, 1989

- I am about to begin a working lunch with Attorney General Thornburgh, General Scowcroft, Secretary Baker, and the man I have asked the Senate to confirm as America's new drug czar -- my good friend Bill Bennett.
- We will discuss a critical national security issue -- how to combat an enemy that subverts our youth and threatens to destroy our future -- drug abuse. Cooperation is the key to victory in this mortal struggle.

- Cooperation must be global if we are to stem this poisonous tide. As Vice President, I went to Latin America to forge an alliance against the drug trade. Dick Thornburgh will continue this mission when he leaves Sunday on a fact-finding mission to three Latin American nations -- Colombia, Bolivia, and Peru.
- Dick goes to Latin America not to lecture, but to learn; not to scapegoat, but to support.
- Dick will tell these three governments that I am committed to a tough zero tolerance policy. Since 1981, the U.S. federal anti-drug budget has grown by nearly 370 percent. More is needed. I am proposing \$6 billion in 1990 for prevention, treatment, and enforcement.

- Dick will impress upon these three governments the need for them to stop supply as we dry up demand. Together, we can create an interdiction effort that is as international as the drug trade itself.

- I know none of us have forgotten the many brave men and women in Latin America who have given their lives for this cause. Many more live under the constant threat of assassination. We are fighting a war without boundaries, in which every nation must be an ally.

- This is the message I have asked Dick to convey to the presidents and justice ministers of Latin America. Bill Bennett and I look forward to hearing his report. This is a critical mission in the war we have declared on drugs.

FROM: SECRETARY CLAYTON YEUTTER

I didn't want to bother you with a report on my Jamaica trip while you were in final preparations for your Far East sojourn, but I did give Brent Scowcroft a verbal summary. I hope he was able to pass some of it on to you; I will herein add a few embellishments.

Michael Manley has always been a charming individual, so it was no surprise to find that he still retains that admirable characteristic. I had met with him in Jamaica a couple of years ago, and that made it easy for both of us to renew the relationship. Nevertheless, he was especially gracious, and I interpret that as a clear indication that he wants to do business with the United States.

The Prime Minister personally signed, as did I, an amendment to our P.L. 480 "Food for Peace" agreement, which has been a big help to Jamaica in the aftermath of the hurricane. He and I then had a private discussion, with only a few people present, which was both substantive and amicable. The Prime Minister had several very relevant questions about how he could best relate to the U.S. Government and to the Congress. I counseled him on all of these, with considerable emphasis given to the Caribbean Basin Initiative and to trade and investment issues.

The Prime Minister regularly referred to four matters as being the heart of his economic challenge: tourism, minerals, industry and agriculture. He is quite optimistic with respect to minerals because Jamaica has been experiencing a recovery in its bauxite sector. He's also optimistic with industry generally, primarily because of the success of our CBI provisions on textiles and apparel. He's worried about tourism because of the hurricane, and was visibly elated when I said I would return to the United States and tell everyone that Jamaica had recovered from the hurricane and was ready for business. He is most concerned about agriculture because world price levels for most of what Jamaica produces are still relatively low.

I met several members of the Manley Cabinet at two social functions in my honor, one hosted by the Prime Minister and the other by Ambassador Sotirhos. They are a quality group--intelligent, articulate, experienced, most of them possessing U.S. graduate degrees. As a group, I'd say they lean more to the left than does the Prime Minister, though he seems to have carefully screened out the radicals. In general I have better vibes about the potential Chief of State relationship with the United States than I do about ministerial-level relationships. But that is only conjectural. We need to be alert, and to judge Manley's ministers on performance during the coming months.

Ambassador Sotirhos has skillfully cajoled, and hopefully persuaded, Prime Minister Manley to govern as a moderate rather than a leftist. I truly believe there is a good chance he will do so. Whomever represents us in Jamaica should continue to encourage that outcome. My hypothesis is that Manley has learned from his harsh experience of the '70s. Some of his younger ministers, on the other hand, will have less vivid memories of that period, and may or may not have learned from it.

I watched a videotape of the Prime Minister's inaugural address, and it was very carefully crafted. The United States was the first country mentioned, and the reference carried a positive tone. Ambassador Sotirhos was the only diplomat singled out in the address, and it too was with a most positive tone. My view is that Prime Minister Manley realizes he must have foreign investment and foreign tourists if he is to succeed, and he further realizes that most of that must come from the United States.

✓ What are his probabilities of success? Much higher than most people expect. Jamaicans do not want more political turmoil and the economic instability that brings. If the Prime Minister governs as a moderate, they'll help him. He'll also benefit from some of the fundamentally sound economic moves Seaga has made in recent years.

✓ Jamaica is vibrant! The hurricane rubble is gone--already. And they've had lots of rain; hence, much of their vegetation has returned. The entire country seems to have had a physical and psychological restoration. This is a third world country, but it is poised to do better.

In other words, Prime Minister Manley has come to power at what could turn out to be a very propitious time--for him, and perhaps even for us. If he doesn't flub, he could have a major economic success story in his future.

✓ The Prime Minister wishes to come to the United States soon, primarily to establish personal credibility here. I leave the evaluation of that request to you, Secretary Baker and Ambassador Sotirhos.

The bottom line is that he can be a friend, and perhaps even a supporter, if we manage this relationship well.

Bush supports phaseout of CFCs

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Bush will support a global phase-out of chlorofluorocarbons, chemicals linked to depletion of Earth's protective ozone layer, if safe alternatives are available, the White House announced Friday.

White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said Bush had notified EPA Administrator William Reilly of his support, and Reilly put forward a proposal Thursday.

"The president is in support of totally eliminating CFCs by the year 2000 providing that safe substitutes are available," Fitzwater told reporters.

Bush supported the concept on the campaign trail, and decided this week to support a timetable for elimination by 2000. Reilly will present the U.S. position at the Conference on Saving the Ozone Layer to be held in London this weekend, Fitzwater said.

But at the same time, Fitzwater noted there are no current alternatives available, despite massive research efforts by private companies.

"Alternatives are a crucial part of this," he added, and no new federal funding will be made available because there is considerable incentive for private companies to produce a substitute.

The move, under consideration for some time, would greatly accelerate efforts to eliminate chlorofluorocarbons, or CFCs, which are used in aerosol spray cans, refrigeration and air conditioning, cleaning solvents and foam packaging material.

Under an international treaty known as the Montreal Protocol, about 30 industrial nations, including the United States, have agreed to reduce CFC use by roughly 50 percent by the end of the century.

Reilly's proposal, presented to the president's Domestic Policy Council, calls for full phaseout by the end of the century and follows warnings from scientists that the 50 percent cut will not be adequate to protect the ozone layer, which screens out harmful levels of ultraviolet radiation from the sun.

At a Senate hearing Friday, Reilly said the ozone depletion problem was "more serious than anyone believed."

Reilly said CFCs lasted for decades in the upper atmosphere, meaning that "even if CFC use stopped tomorrow, ozone depletion would continue into the middle of the next century."

Reilly's predecessor at the EPA, Lee Thomas, last year also called for a complete CFC phase-out by the end of the century, citing increasingly ominous analyses of the problem by scientists.

The European Community promised Thursday to eliminate all harmful gases that attack the Earth's ozone layer by the end of the century. Environment ministers of the 12 EC nations agreed the Montreal Protocol should be quickly made more ambitious, conference officials said.

In a statement on the European action, Reilly said Thursday, "The position reportedly taken by the European Community regarding the phaseout of CFCs that deplete the ozone layer is very encouraging news for the world's environment."

Reilly is preparing to fly to London for the weekend conference sponsored by British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher on the ozone layer. Also attending will be Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn.

Scientists say CFCs rise to the upper atmosphere and release chlorine and bromine that, through a complex chemical reaction, breaks apart ozone molecules.

In the last few years, scientists detected a "hole" in the ozone layer above Antarctica during the springtime and similar concerns have arisen about the Arctic. A slight decrease in stratospheric ozone levels worldwide also has been discovered.

Health experts warn depletion of the ozone layer will allow more ultraviolet radiation through to the Earth's surface, causing increased incidence of skin cancer, eye damage and decreased ability to fight off disease. Studies show increased ultraviolet radiation also may stunt growth of plants and damage ocean plankton vital to the marine food chain.

EPA CHIEF URGES BUSH TO JOIN ALLIES IN CFC PHASE-OUT GOAL

EPA Administrator William Reilly yesterday urged President Bush to join U.S. allies in Europe in a move to phase out all ozone-depleting chemicals by the end of the century, according to administration officials.

Reilly's recommendation at the White House meeting of the Domestic Policy Council was made hours after environmental ministers of the European Community voted to eliminate the popular chemicals -- chlorofluorocarbons -- by the year 2000....

Reilly is leaving today for an international conference on CFCs hosted by Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher in London that is due to start on Sunday.
